









The suggestion that, after the contest has fairly opened, McKinley may make a tour of the south is in line with the promise that this year's campaign is to be exceptional in every way. It is a promise that the east will take care of itself; that the section will be solidified for the Republicans by the action of the Democracy at Chicago. The silver states of the west are expected to stand by silver. But why, it is asked, should the south with so much at stake in the line of material development, resist appeals on the score of protection made to it by the chief apostle of that policy in the country? The Republican leaders regard it as one of the puzzles of politics that the south should so long have appeared to favor free trade. They cite the fact that she is enormously rich in undeveloped resources. What a thorough canvass of the south would result in! It would be something of a mystery, if McKinley goes down south it is intended that he will make the path straight for others. It is expected that many of the ablest of the party leaders will follow him. Men like Reed, Channing, Dewey, Senator Hawley, and Senator Allison, would, it is believed, be well received in the south. Their main topic would naturally be the tariff. Louisiana, it is pointed out, wants her sugar industry to grow and flourish. Georgia and the Carolinas want their cotton spinning to increase, while Alabama and Tennessee and West Virginia would be helped financially by a policy which would fix and keep a duty on coal and iron ore. The Republicans, it is thus disclosed, have a very comprehensive plan of campaign mapped out, and it is said to be the intention to vigorously prosecute it.

On the Fourth of July, for the first time, the flag of the United States was flown with forty-five stars on the blue field, indicating the admission of Utah to the sisterhood of States. General orders issued by the War and Navy Departments prepared the way for the change, and for several months past the flag makers have been busy in placing the old army flags will not be all retired at once. Some of the beautiful silk flags cost as much as \$100 a piece, and it is deemed best to wear them out instead of throwing them away. In the case of the naval flags the change is more easily made, for all of these flags are made at the New York and Mare Island navy yards.

The patriotically inclined, appropos of the Fourth of July, are asking that Secretary Herbert be sure to give the new gunboats strictly American names. There has been altogether too much of unmeaning looseness in naming our new warships. There ought to be no "Tritons" or "Amphitrites." We should not have a Vesuvius in the United States fleet. If we were poverty-stricken in the matter of typical and characteristic material there might be some excuse for going abroad in search of names and names to give. We have a large stock of exceeding beauty and propriety to draw from. The popular insistence upon appropriate names has the sanction of fitness, of utility, and of patriotism, and the rule of the Navy Department should be "American names for American ships." Among the prominent examples of possessors of "changed minds" at this political juncture there has just been included the Secretary of Agriculture, for it appears that Hon. J. Sterling Morton was the Greenback-Democratic Farmer's Alliance candidate for Governor of Nebraska in 1884.

And now, in the business depression of most industries, and in the light of recent events in the life of one Grover Cleveland, the pessimists are saying that the cuckoo business is not what it used to be.

## NEWS NOTES.

HENLEY July 7.—Yale was drawn against Leander in the Regatta and their turn came in the third trial heat. Yale got the start, but was soon outstripped by Leander and easily beaten by almost two lengths. Bob Cook, Yale's coach, said his men were not in shape and could not be expected to do better. The crews got away well together, Yale making a better start than was thought would be the case, but the long powerful stroke of Leander did the work, and Yale was beaten. Americans, in crowds along the shore and in boats, cheered to their hearts content, but could not stimulate their men.

## DEMOCRATIC CONVENTION IN CONTROL OF THE WHITE METAL MEN.

A SILVER PLATFORM ADOPTED WITH A PLANK FOR TARIFF FOR REVENUE ONLY.  
CHICAGO, July 8.—The battle of the giants was waged all along the line today, with the silver men in control in the committee rooms and in the convention. The committee on resolutions, where they had a majority of twenty, crushed the opposition, and with a few modifica-

tions adopted the platform adopted by the sub-committee last night. It declares briefly for the free and independent coinage of silver without the co-operation of any other nation; for a tariff for revenue only, sufficient to pay the expenses of the Government economically administered; for a constitutional amendment for an income tax; against federal interference in local affairs; against a third term; for simplicity and economy in natural affairs; against a Pacific rail road funding bill; condemns the issue of bonds in time of peace, and gives a mild endorsement to the civil service law.

A SLAP AT CLEVELAND.  
Senator Hill offered a resolution commending the Cleveland administration for its honesty, fidelity and courage. By a vote of 27 to 17 it was defeated. Everywhere to-day there was talk of a gold bolt and it seems now very probable that there may be a definite action at least a portion of the minority. The leaders, however, to maintain their influence to restrain their followers.

RESULT OF TODAY'S PROCEEDINGS.  
The net result of the day's session was the seating of the Nebraska delegation. This was the signal for a wild demonstration in honor of Bryan, the key orator of the Platte, who is now everywhere recognized as a formidable black horse. The sudden announcement of the determination of the Illinois delegation to desert Bland and vote for Stevenson after the first ballot, fell like a wet blanket on the Missouri candidate. The Alabama Bland men also changed their allegiance, but the Bland men still keep up a brave front. The combination against the Missourian made great progress and confidently expected, before the evening session of the convention, that they had blocked his way to the nomination. McLean's power in the convention was manifest everywhere, and the combination to nominate Teller grew more formidable with each development. The prospects of a gold bolt strengthened the argument of those who favored an open fusion with the silver republicans and the populists as the politics of the situation.

Tarte says that Blair will seek election either in Albert or Sunbury and Queens. Lewis is willing to step aside in the former constituency, and King would do the same in the latter if Blair wished it. Tarte is quite amazed over the fact that at yesterday's conference of the leading liberals to settle upon the personnel of the cabinet, all but two are not yet members of parliament, and the majority debated candidate. There were Blair, Tarte, Mills, Patterson, and Mowat, all of them without seats, yet all to have portfolios in the cabinet. A base political spectacle was never witnessed.—Frederick Gleason.

## GREAT DAY AT MEMRAMCOOK.

CORNER STONE OF LEFEBVRE MEMORIAL HALL LAID.

Over three thousand persons witnessed the ceremony of the laying of the corner stone of the LeFebvre Memorial Hall at Memramcook on Tuesday. Bishop M.D. Malt of Charlottetown, who had as his assistants Father Mohan and F. X. Cormier, formally laid and choir sang Ave Maria Stella, and the national hymn of the Acadians.

Rev. Dr. Hamel of Laval University Quebec, delivered the oration of the day, and addresses were made by Father O'Neil, Judge Landry, Chief Superintendent Inch, Dr. Bileveau of Shediac, Dr. Allison, President of Mount Allison, Mr. Benoit of Nova Scotia, Mr. Powell, M. P., Hon. H. R. Emmerson, Senator Wood and G. W. Cook of Amherst.

The documents deposited in the corner stone included the names of the reigning pontiff, the Queen, the Governor General, the Lieutenant Governor of New Brunswick, Archbishop Bishop, President of the College, a copy of the contract for the Memorial Hall, with autographs of the Alumni Association; copies of the provincial newspapers and a collection of coins of the period.
