WEEK OF PRAYER

The 7th meeting of the W. A. V. C. Conference was held "Last" evening in the Methodist Church, and was largely attended. Prayer was offered by Rev. Mr. Coleman and Messrs. Currie and Appleton. Rev. Mr. Thomas, pastor of the church, presided. In the absence of Rev. Dr. Carr, who was detained at his home by illness, Rev. P. J. Stack house spoke on the subject announced "The Value of Prayer." His text was taken from Luke 11:2 Jesus said that for granted that the Disciples would pray. Prayer is natural. Men have always prayed. The most primitive people have felt the need of putting themselves into some sort of a relation ship to the Great Spirit which spoke to them not only in the great forces of Nature but also in the deep recesses of their souls. His next reference to the value of prayer in temptation and inconspicuous work at length upon the value of prayer as a preparation for Christian service. The whole life of Jesus is an illustration of that statement. It was so with his disciples. Peter was preceded by the upper room prayer meeting. The men who have done the most effective work for God and His humanity have been men of prayer. Think of Luther, who when he had a specially trying day, used to say: "I am so heavy that I must spend at least seven hours in prayer today." Think of the influence of John Knox's prayers said Mary Queen of Scots, "I fear John 7:30 p. m.

MANY APPLICANTS FOR NAVY POSITIONS

Canadian Navy Will Pay Better Wages. Grain Movement Returns.

LAURIER TO GO WEST

OTTAWA, Dec. 29.—The Department of Marine has already received a considerable number of applications for positions in the new Canadian Navy. Several men who have served in the British Navy and who are now in Canada have offered their services, and about one hundred Canadian boys have also sent in their applications for positions on the new warships. Until the new show are commissioned of course, nothing can be definitely done towards enlisting men.

The wages paid to crew and main deck will be somewhat higher than obtained in the British navy, and will be practically the same as paid in the United States navy.

Returns of the grain movement from the western provinces up to the close of navigation as sent to the department of trade and commerce, show that the total amount shipped through Canadian ports was 36,994,597 bushels, and through American ports, 19,813,216 bushels, of which latter, 17,377,184 bushels went to Buffalo. The total number of cars inspected to December 4 was 66,482, containing 14,108,680 bushels. The C. N. R. hauled 40,000 cars, the C. N. E. 18,271, the Grand Trunk Pacific, 8,210.

Mr. Wilfred Laurier will not be able to accept the invitation to visit South Africa next summer on the invitation of the Prince of Wales at the formal inauguration of the new confederation. The journey would involve at least two or three months absence from Canada and it is probable that the Prime Minister will instead take the opportunity to pay his long deferred visit to Western Canada.

WINNIPEG, Jan. 1.—Immigration from the United States during the past year has far exceeded all estimates or anticipations. More than 570,000 thousands have come in in excess of the highest calculations. Early in the year it was thought by sanguine officials that seventy-five thousand might be expected, but there have actually been 92,148. The Immigration Commissioner estimates that the average wealth of each of these is one thousand dollars, which means ninety million dollars in cash added to the wealth of western Canada. In addition to this, there has been realized from the great wheat crop another \$120,000,000, which means a total of \$210,000,000 of new wealth this year, not counting the proceeds of the grain, the ranch, and other sources. The American have taken up in homesteads and oil companies 2,400,000 acres of land, which at the lowest estimate means just a million acres added to the crop next year.

Immigration from Great Britain and the continent of Europe was slightly in excess of the American, amounting to 92,522.

FORGET PRIDICTS GREAT YEAR AHEAD

Says 1910 Will Be Greatest Financially in Canada's History.

PLENTY MONEY.

Montreal, Jan. 2.—Randolph Forget, M. P., the King of the Montreal Stock Exchange is of the opinion that 1910 will be the greatest year financially and commercially the Dominion has ever seen, and he also believes that this will extend all over the continent. "None but adepts can properly realize the amount of money in this country waiting opportunity for safe speculation of legitimate investment."

Over Ninety Thousand Americans Estimated to Have Come, Bringing Over Ninety Millions With Them—Two Hundred and Ten Millions Added to Wealth of the West

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1910 WILL SEE DALHOUSIE CHANGES

Plans for Improvement and Addition to Business and Manufacturing Plants

INCREASED FACILITIES

The year 1909 having been a fairly prosperous one for the citizens of our little town, a glance into the future may prove to be interesting to many. Street reports appear to support the opinion of your correspondent, the year 1910 will be one of important events for the shiretown of Restigouche County.

The erection of a modern engine house by the I. R. C. located in close proximity to our town station, which was commenced last year, will be a great addition to our railway interest. This will be followed by improved railway passenger accommodation on our branch line and a special passenger car will be placed at the disposal of the tourists during the summer months.

The enlarging of the mill owned by Messrs. Bearinger & Chapin of Toronto, which will afford employment to a much larger number of men, is one of the improvements that the New Year will bring.

A large modern wharf will be erected on Douglas Island by the Dalhousie Lumber Company, Ltd. will be a great addition to the place.

The future dredging of our harbor to allow large vessels to take cargo from our wharves will be an action planned for the year.

The building of a break water by the Dominion Government to protect the eastern part of the harbor from easterly storms can be counted among the new improvements.

An improved ferry service between Dalhousie and Quebec points is hoped for, if plans mature for the building of wharves at Fleury's Point and Beloeil.

Fifty more rooms will be placed at the disposal of tourists at Canada's favorite summer resort, the "Inch Arran House."

Further improvements to our streets and sidewalks can be counted upon. A company may be formed during the year with the object of lighting the town with electricity.

Great improvements to property of the Dalhousie Lumber Company, Ltd. carry on their growing lumber operations, will be made during the year.

Dalhousie, which can boast of some good stores, will see further improvements made by our merchants, to their buildings and no doubt, all will do their utmost to advance the interests of our little town.

Rev. A. A. Boucher, P. P. of Dalhousie, was presented at Christmas with a sum of one hundred dollars by his parishioners.

On New Year's Day the usual Sunday Service was held in the R. C. Church here. There was a very large congregation present. Father Boucher preached an eloquent sermon. His advice to his people beginning the New Year was most practical.

The prospects are that the ice will be safe for crossing opposite Dalhousie at the end of the week. Small fish men are awaiting anxiously to place their nets.

TWENTY PERSONS SEVERELY INJURED

Terrible Accident In C. P. R. Station Montreal New Years Morning

CAS EXPLOD!

MONTREAL, Jan. 3.—A terrible accident occurred at 1:20 last night at the Place Viger Station of the Canadian Pacific Railway, by which twenty persons were injured and one seriously and probably fatally hurt. The accident was caused by an explosion of gas under the platform, which occurred just at the moment when a large crowd of passengers and their friends were standing on the platform awaiting the departure of the night train for Quebec. The usual crowd were gathering for the departure of the Quebec train, with many others, owing to the large number of people travelling for the holiday period. Most of the passengers for the outgoing train had got on board, while a number of their friends and other belated passengers still stood around on the boards. Suddenly there was a terrific explosion which broke windows in the train and forced the crowd back in all directions. The wooden platform at the station was bulged up, the crowd driven back, and many of the people standing near were blown bodily into the air. In the long wooden walk, which forms the platform for each train at the Place Viger Station, was filled with confused people and surrounded with groans and shrieks of the wounded, who were thrown in all directions.

It was found that one of the pipes which feed the Pintech gas to the cars had exploded, and that this had led to the injury of between twenty and thirty people, with the probable fatal injury of one lady. People standing on the platform were hurled in all directions, and some of them were picked up fifty feet from the scene of the explosion. Most of the people who were hurt sustained injuries to their legs, very many of them sustaining broken limbs.



AN IMPORTANT MEASURE

Peacocks at one time took the place of turkeys on the Christmas table.

It was mentioned in the despatches a few weeks ago that the legislature of New South Wales had enacted a law by which employers and employees could be punished for causing a lock-out or strike.

The legislators were driven by this idea to a course by the fact that disastrous results are following a strike of coal miners. Sydney was deprived of a portion of its gas supply at one time. Three hundred steamships are now lying idle in Sydney harbor. Under the new law the government took action this week, prosecuting fourteen delegates of the Board of the Miners' Federation, and securing their conviction, with a fine of \$500 each, or two months' imprisonment, for inciting the coal miners to strike.

The colonies at the antipodes have been supposed to be the paradise of the workman. Laws in New South Wales have provided compulsory arbitration and also a minimum wage scale but industrial peace does not follow. The decisions of Conciliation Boards have been rejected, and the courts have been frequently appealed to. Now there is a big strike with most serious consequences for the country at large. The lesson seems to be that unless men—employers and employees—are reasonable and willing to give and take in settling differences, laws will make no difference. Canada has a labor law, but there have been some extensive strikes within the year.

CHINESE PICTAL IS TO DISAPPEAR

Less Opposition Than to Proposed Change in National Costume.

LONDON, Dec. 31.—There is considerable interest among the Chinese in the announcement that the prime minister that he will endeavor to bring about a change in the national costume next year, besides advocating the abolition of the queue. To show that he is in earnest the Prime Minister has himself started to wear military uniform when receiving foreign ministers at Peking.

The abolition of the queue is not for less popular opposition than the adoption of European costumes. The anti-queue party argue that this characteristic appendage is unnecessary that it is an object of derision among foreigners, and that it is not keeping with modern sentiment marking as it does the servitude of China to the Manchu. But the Prime Minister has a more effective argument for Chinese minds when he recalls that the late emperor was in favor of this reform, and respect for the wishes of the deceased greater weight than cold reason among his countrymen.

The prime minister's ambition to bring about a change in national costume naturally arouses opposition among the silk and linen manufacturers and mechanics to whom it would mean a serious loss.

A REMARKABLE CASE OF DECEPTION

They turned away, talking to one another and causing indignant bystanders to remark, "In a few moments they'll all come hurrying back with triumphant smiles and looks, intending to make me tell the truth, as they supposed. The same young woman said, 'You tried to make us believe this fruit was wax, and there is an apple half rotten over there, and wax don't rot.' I explained that it was just a representation, but they evidently thought I was a scoundrel story-teller, for they walked scornfully away. As they went I heard her remark to 'them, I could find out how they preserve those fruits, for she won't tell me'."
