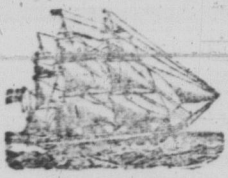


Arrival of the Steamship



Cambria.

The Steamship Cambria, arrived at Halifax on Thursday last, in eleven and a half days from Liverpool. The mail was received here on Sunday morning. In our columns this morning will be found a synopsis of the news.

The Deal market continued firm, with a prospect of an advance on present rates, viz. £28.

The accounts of the harvest operations are very satisfactory, the weather having continued fine, the potato root is not even alluded to.

The reports from the Manufacturing districts continue favourable. Trade generally is brisk.

The principal topic of interest in the English papers is the proceedings of the Roman Catholic Synod lately held at Thurles.

body has published Decrees condemning in toto the Government scheme of National education. This movement appears to be deeply regretted by all the well wishers of Ireland.

The Liverpool Journal and Chronicle, which are understood to be conducted by men of the Catholic religion, both condemn the Decrees of the Synod, and speak of the Government plan of education as one eminently adapted to the wants of that unfortunate country, as tending to unite youth of all creeds in Colleges where their different creeds would be duly, equally respected.

But now the prospect for the future is as black as the history of the past, and the bitter animosities and fierce contentions of which these differences have been the fruitful source, are to be continued under the sanction of ecclesiastical authority.

Public Meetings have been held in several places, at which it was proposed to get up some testimonial of approbation to be presented to the Bishops and Draymen of Messrs. Barclay & Perkins' Establishment for the reception given by them to General Haynau.

The London Times on the other hand states that preparations are making at Vienna to give the general a public reception on his return, and the Emperor is to confer upon him the title of Marshal, and that the Garrison is to renounce him by torch light, and further, that the Austrian Minister in London has been instructed to demand the punishment of the men who assaulted the Butcher!!

A writer under date Havre, Tuesday, states that an arrangement is on foot between Spain on the one part, and England, France and Holland on the other, by which Spain undertakes to pay off all that the English, French, and Dutch or Dutch, on condition that the Nations of the three powers shall assist Spain in defending the Island of Cuba from invasion.

A frightful accident had occurred upon the Great Eastern Railway, by which nine lives were lost. Particulars not given.

The easterly winds having prevailed until yesterday, few vessels have arrived, and the tendency in freight has continued. Employment is proceeding on a large scale for the season, though there is no material change in rates.

Our reports from the manufacturing districts of England continue to be of a favorable character. The woolen cloth trade is active everywhere, and stocks are still further reduced. The demand in the lace and hosiery markets appears steady, both on home and foreign account.

The Belgian official paper contradicts the report that any negotiations have passed of late between the French and Belgian Governments relative to a customs union of the two countries, as was currently reported.

The Admiralty have decided on giving to the General Service Steam Shipping Company the contract for carrying mails to the Cape of Good Hope. The communication will be a monthly one.

Our continental advisers report that in the course of the present month, the ministerial project is expected to appear for the colonization of Hungary from the several Austrian provinces. This subject is exciting much attention, and a company has been provisionally formed, named the Ehrenberg Company which is supported by many German capitalists.

LIVERPOOL, September 21.—The commercial transactions of the week have been of a steady and improved character. Colonial and Foreign produce continue in good demand, and in some instances at higher rates. The Cotton market has exhibited great activity, the sales large, and higher prices. The accounts from the manufacturing districts are favourable, and money plentiful at easy discounts.

The Freeman states that the National Catholic University, which is to be established, will be erected in Dublin, and that active measures to set it on foot will be immediately taken.

In Ireland there has not been a single convert to the Romish doctrines from among the clergy of the English Church.

Inquiries are instituting by the officers of the Government in respect to the facilities afforded by harbour around the west coast of Ireland, for the purposes of a transatlantic Packet Station.

A Deputation from the Trinity Board of London have arrived at Galway, and after making the necessary inquiries, have ordered the construction of two light houses instead of the one now existing in a badly chosen position at Arran. Similar inquiries are going on in Cork.

The sudden death of the Chief Justice of the Common Pleas in Ireland, the Right Hon.

John Doherty, is announced in the Irish papers. The deceased Judge had held the office nearly twenty years, having been appointed to it in December 21, 1830. By his death the office of Chief Justice of Common Pleas will be the prize of Attorney General Monahan.

Mr. Monahan has accepted the Chief Justiceship at the reduced salary of £4000 per annum.

India.—Later news from India has been received in London, by telegraph via Trieste. The Cholera had broken out in China, and the Governor of Madras had fallen a victim.

The prospect of the Indigo crop was very good. Commercial affairs, both at Bombay and Madras were improving, but at Calcutta trade was less active.

France.—An Orleansist plot had been discovered, but although the documents connected with it do not implicate any particular individual, they contain enough to afford the Paris and London press food for very lengthy articles.

The President had returned to Paris, from his provincial tour, which is said to have been very satisfactory to him.

An agitation has been commenced, the object of which is to procure another three million francs for the President's personal expenses, but the proposition meets with little favour, and to consequence the President will make no more excursions this season.

A large majority of the Provincial Council have passed resolutions in favour of a revision of the constitution, with a view, as is said, to prolong the power of the President, but these resolutions are accompanied by stipulations, that nothing should be done without the consent of the representatives of the people.

About 7000 emigrants are about to leave France for California.

The reported changes in the French Ministry are said to be wholly unfounded. There has been a considerable increase in the revenue for the first eight months of this year, as compared with the same period last year.

The Duchies.—Advices from Hamburg state that on the 12th the Holstein Army made a forward movement with the intention of attacking the fortified bridges across the Schlei, at Alsen, the Danes were driven from their unfortified position, into their trenches, and were cannonaded for about an hour by the Holsteins, but without effect, as soon as the firing ceased and they began to retire, the Danes began to replace the bridge.

Switzerland.—Avalanche or Rocks.—Cure, Sept. 21.—Great alarm was occasioned last night, at 2 o'clock, by the falling of the rocks at Felsberg. Nearly the entire population, roused from their beds by the fearful crash of the rocks, almost an hour previous to their fall, had quitted the village, and stood on the plain beyond awaiting the awful catastrophe. The night was tolerably light, suddenly a tremendous crash was succeeded by thick clouds of dust, and large masses of rock were precipitated from the heights, apparently upon the village beneath. So fearful was the noise that all concluded that the village was buried—In an instant to the spot the inhabitants found a large wall of rocks piled upon the very extremity of the village. About twenty of the blocks were as large as small houses, and numerous others were of rather less dimensions. It is possible that these masses may stand for some time; but the danger is imminent, as they are piled immediately beneath the precipice.

West Indies.—We have later intelligence from the West Indies.

Barbadoes dates are to the 21st ult. The Small Pox was raging there with great violence. Persons who had been vaccinated did not escape the disease. The Island is in a prosperous condition. Thirty five thousand bushels of sugar and upwards had been shipped during the year—a quantity exceeding the exportation in any year during the flourishing period of slavery. A fine crop of India Corn had been reaped.—Potatoes, yams, &c. were thriving.

It appears to be generally understood in Jamaica, that Sir Charles Grey is to succeed Lord Elgin in the Governorship of Canada.

At Savanah-la-Mar, a smart shock of an earthquake was experienced on Wednesday, about 2 P.M.; and the laborers there are reporting trouble. The County Union says their revenue for an imaginary insult is the destruction of trash houses, or the mutilation of cattle.

From Bermuda.—We have received papers from Bermuda to the 15th ult. The Bermudian notices the return of the Brig Swan, with the pardoned convicts on board who had been sent back by the authorities at New York.

We cannot help thinking that the principle is unsound which draws no distinction between men that have been and men that are convicts. Push that principle to its legitimate extent, and you put a Cain like brand on every man who has been convicted of transgressing the laws of his country, even though he have severely expiated such transgression.

The men who have been prevented from remaining in New York, are persons who earned their "free pardon" by uniform good conduct throughout the period of their confinement;—and the Imperial Government has wisely decided that such men shall be liberated before the expiration of the period for which they were sentenced. They may go to any place they please, and had the Swan been pounce to a British port those men would have gone to such port, as others, under similar circumstances, have already done. We assert, that there are no grounds for the imputation which has been indirectly conveyed by some of the New York prints, that the British Government is desirous to send its criminals to the United States.

FROM THE UNITED STATES.

Reciprocity.—By reference to the telegraphic report of the proceedings of Congress yesterday, which will be found in another column, it will be seen that the House of Representatives passed a bill, authorizing the Secretary of the Treasury to specially resells from the British North American Provinces to load and unload in ports of the United States, provided similar privileges be extended to vessels of the United States.—This is the first step towards a perfect reciprocity in trade between the two countries, and no doubt it will be followed by others which will make the interests of Canada and other British American Provinces and those of the United States identical. It is also the first step towards the annexation of those provinces to this country—an event which is certain of taking place, and which will be placed on us, in all probability, before we are prepared for it. We do not, for obvious reasons, wish to see this subject agitated immediately. That we will have to encounter it eventually, however, any person with half an eye can see.—New York Herald.

Arrest in this City for Murder.—Between 5 and 6 o'clock on Monday afternoon, officers Danahy and J. J. Connelley, arrested in Union street a man named George Jackson, alias Charles Thompson, charged with the murder of a Police officer, two or three years ago in Portland, a village adjacent to St. John, N. B.—He was committed to jail to await proceedings under the treaty for surrendering up of criminals.—New Englander.

A Large Cave.—A cave exceeding in extent the Mammoth Cave in Kentucky, has been thoroughly explored near Madison, the Capital of Wisconsin. The party who explored it were five days in the Cave, and came out several miles from the place of entrance. They found large quantities of lead ore supposed to be more than 200,000 tons in weight.

Kennedy and Portland Railroad.—All the towns which were necessary have voted to join their credit to the above road, and the \$300,000 of security which was required has been raised. The rate of interest was 25 per cent in favour of the proposition, to 122.

Powder Mill Blown Up.—Two of the buildings of Whipple's Powder Factory at Gambo Falls, Gorham, were blown up yesterday morning about half past 9 o'clock, and a man named Leander White (of Sebago) was killed. As she rode home she grew worse, and told the gentleman who accompanied her that she would die of canine madness. The paroxysms, soon became dreadful, her mouth constantly filling with saliva and flowing out from, which had to be wiped away constantly. Her distressing and hoarse breathing could be heard for many hundred yards. Nature sank under the awful struggle in about twenty-four hours, and death came to her relief on Sunday evening, the day after she was taken ill. What is most awful, and fills the country far and near with a prevailing gloom, is the fact that Mrs. Fulton, a widow and the mother of Miss Sarah, was bitten twice, the first by the same dog, and a negro belonging to her, was also bitten, neither of whom have as yet felt any symptoms of the disease.—American paper.

A Boy Shot.—On the evening of the 11th inst. a very melancholy circumstance occurred in the western part of this city. It appears that a young man named Jonathan Evans, whose parents live on Adelaide Street West, was driving cows on Queen street, near the Lunatic Asylum, where he met a young man named Philip Connor, whose parents also live on Adelaide street. Connor had a gun in his hand, was returning in from a shooting excursion, and young Evans enquired if he had shot anything; Connor replied that he had not, but added that he would shoot him (Evans) and at the same time pointed the gun at him, and either by accident or design the charge, which was of shot, went off and wounded Evans frightfully in the face and body. Immediately after the shot Connor threw his gun on the ground and fled and has not since been heard of in that quarter. Shortly after Evans received the wound he was conveyed to the Hospital, where he now lies, and we are happy to understand that the doctors who examined him entertain hopes of his recovery.—[Toronto Citizen.

At nine o'clock last evening, a fire broke out in a house occupied by Mr. Kennedy at the head of Brown's wharf. The fire originated in the upper story, and was discovered by a son of the occupant. The engines were quickly on the spot, and the engine company worked with their usual alacrity, but notwithstanding their exertions the flames quickly

communicated to the store in front (also occupied by Mr. Kennedy), which, together with the building in which the fire originated was destroyed. We understand that the property was insured.—Colonist.

Large Squashes.—We saw a few days since, two very large squashes, which were raised on the farm of James White, Esq., in the vicinity of this City, one of which weighed 414 lbs.—This is another proof of what our climate is capable of producing when the soil is properly prepared.—New Bruns.

Frederick Cathedral.—During the past summer the erection of the Frederick Cathedral has been slowly proceeded with, and the mason work is now all but complete. The handsome tower is finished, with the exception of the pinnacles, one of which will likely be completed this afternoon, and the remaining three in a very short time. The spire will be the work of another year. The upper windows in the nave are being furnished with beautiful stained glass, and, except three, are already finished. The beams for the floor of the building are laid, and the walls of the side aisles, and a portion of the chancel are laid.—Head Quarters.

Commissioner's Changes.—Assistant Commissioner General Drake arrived here in the Ship Farnside from London on Sunday last, for the purpose of taking charge of the Department at this station. He had formerly served in Western Australia and Van Diemen's Land. Deputy Assistant Commissioner General Lane, who has been in charge here for some months, proceeds to Cape Breton, where he will be stationed for the present.—[Colonist.

Emigrants Returning!—We learn that a gentleman well known in Woodstock, and he and his family, from that section of the country, to Wisconsin, about two years ago, has recently returned with a view to settle in this colony again, as being much more preferable than the western parts of the United States. We have also heard of a person formerly residing in Charlotte County, who had settled in some part of the Western States, having written to his friends in this Province, giving rather discouraging accounts of that country, and wishing himself and family back again to New Brunswick. Such instances as these should prevent persons from becoming dissatisfied with their present abode, and hastening to the conclusion of leaving the land of their birth or adoption for some supposed El Dorado, which very frequently turns out to be anything but what was expected. We have a noble Province, rich in natural resources, which require to be developed, and in order that its inhabitants may meet with success, little more is wanted than a reasonable amount of industry and perseverance, together with good and cheap Government, suited to the times.—[Ibid.

It has been assumed as a "settled fact" by some portion of the Press, that Chief Justice Chipman must resign the important office which he has filled for so many years with so much ability and credit to the Province.

Some assert the present Attorney General will be elevated to the Chief Justiceship; others, that one of the Puisne Judges (Judge Carter) will succeed Chief Justice Chipman. If the Government are sincere in their oft repeated desires for retrenchment, here is an opening to save the Province

One thing we are sure of—that a large number of the new House will be opposed to the present corrupt, Do-nothing Government.

THE RAILROAD.

We are happy to announce that by the last English Mail, very encouraging and satisfactory letters were received by the Directors of our Railroad, from the London Board. A Locomotive, manufactured for the Company, and a large quantity of Iron Rails, are to be shipped by the 20th of the present month.

A managing Director, from London, is on his way to this town; and, as he was to take his passage in the R. M. Steamer Europa, which was to leave on the 25th ult., may be expected here next week. We congratulate the friends of the St. Andrews and Quebec Railroad, on this pleasing intelligence, and trust that the work will continue to be carried on with energy and spirit. The English Stockholders have performed their part;—let then the Stockholders in this Country follow their example, and as many as are able pay in their instalments,—stand shoulder to shoulder, and give the operations such a spur as will make the croakers hide their diminished heads. The contractors, Messrs Myers, notwithstanding the numerous disadvantages which they laboured under at the commencement, have proceeded so far with the work, as to warrant us in stating, that the ten miles will be completed within the time specified in the contract, and will, when finished, bear comparison with any railroad in British America.

An old uninhabited building known as the Tank House, situated in Phoenix Square, Frederickton, was destroyed by fire on Friday night. It is said to have been the work of an incendiary.

The European and North American Railway.—We observe that Public Meetings have been held in some of the Eastern Counties, for the purpose of taking into consideration the suggestions contained in the Circular of the Executive Committee. The course pursued by the Delegates has been approved and resolutions passed, calling upon the people to adopt prompt and energetic measures to forward the work by liberal subscriptions, &c.

Some persons, through whose land the line of survey has been run, have given a right of way. But if the friends of the line expect to succeed, they must obtain British Capital; and we are happy to notice, by the following from the Courier, of Saturday last, that there is some prospect of obtaining capital from the Mother Country; in which event, there is no doubt of the line being made, notwithstanding Earl Gray is reported to have refused to do anything to promote the erection of the Railway from Halifax to Portland. Be it so.

If proper means are used, it will be built, without the light of the Colonial Secretary's countenance. Let the motto be, "there is no such word as fail." The Courier says:
