RECENT DEATHS.—Notice is given elsewhere of the recent death of two persons well known in this section of the county. On Wednesday last Cyrus N. Goodwin of Baie Verte passed away after a tedious illness. Mr. Goodwin was one of the enterprising farmers of this part of the county and will be missed among a large circle of friends. He was a prominent Methodist and took a warm interest in Church and evangelical work. Mr. Goodwin and one daughter, wife of Rev. Thos. Stebbings, and several sons survive him. On the same day Mrs. Araminta Trueman, Point de Bute died at her home. Mrs. Trueman was a daughter of the late George Tremblay of Port Lawrence and during her life made many friends, through her kindly and sunny disposition, who will be sorry to hear of her death.

GUN TOURNAMENT.—Posters announce a grand Gun Tournament to be held on the grounds of the Dorchester Gun Club on September 13th and 14th. A large list of prizes including a silver cup valued at \$75 and presented by the citizens of Dorchester will be offered for competition. Besides the usual clay pigeons will be a number of live birds and traps which will give wild fowl shooters ample chance to try their skill. Prizes are offered in all the events. Refreshments will be served free to all taking part in the tournament. An attraction noted on the posters is the murder trial of "Buck" and "Jim" which will be on during the days of the tournament. MR. ALLISON NOTES.—The Boys' Academy is to have this year a new gymnasium fitted up with the best appliances, and a good instructor has been engaged. The student's rooms are being furnished with new iron bedsteads, with mattresses, new clean bedsteads and hard wood washstands and plate mirrors. The floors have been newly painted and everything is suggestive of health and comfort. No boys school in the provinces can equal Mr. Allison's Academy in these respects and in the schoolrooms a most competent staff of teachers is engaged. Of the teachers Mr. Dalpe is a graduate of McGill and has had wide experience. Mr. Young is a graduate of the Ontario Business College and for some time has been a teacher in that institution.

MR. BEER'S WHO has for the last two years been classical master in the Academy, has been appointed to a similar position in a large school in Pennsylvania.

REV. J. E. LANCELEY of Toronto who comes to our beautiful climate for September to escape hay fever, is expected to lecture in Halifax, Amherst, Sackville, Moncton and St. John. Many a good preacher cannot lecture with success, but it is as a lecturer that Mr. Lanceley is said to excel. Among other things he is said to be a fine principle on the platform. It is expected that he will occupy the Methodist pulpit here the last Sunday in September.

MR. W. H. DALPE B. A. has been appointed teacher of classes in the Academy, but will be relieved of part of the work in that Department by principal Harrison to enable him to take charge of the French Classes at the University. Mr. Dalpe is a Canadian French-Protestant gentleman, and a member of the Baptist Church. His thorough scholarship in his native tongue and his literature is vouched for by such competent authorities as Dr. Darcy of McGill, Professor Roux of Grand Ligne and others of equal weight. His acquaintance with English is sufficiently vouched for by the fact that he is graduate of Montreal High School, McGill Normal School (highest academy Diploma) and McGill University (honors in English). Professor Magee of McGill, under whom he studied for Honors in English, refers to his great knowledge of the English language in all its stages as specially qualifies him for teaching French to English pupils. In addition to his special training for the teachers' profession Mr. Dalpe has had several years successful experience as teacher in both French and English. He is an excellent classical scholar too and has prepared a number of pupils for both junior and senior matriculation at McGill. Both University and Academy are to be congratulated on such an addition to their teachers' force.

REMOVING A CONSTABLE.—On Friday last Charles Landry, Hotel keeper, Shediac, was sent up for trial at the county court for resisting Constable Carter in the discharge of his duty. TO LONDON.—The Iron Moulders Excursion to Londonderry on Monday next promises to be one of the events of the season. Preparations are all completed for the day, and those who avail themselves of the trip will be amply repaid by a pleasant and instructive excursion. A great inducement is held out in the iron works which will be visited while in full operation. It is a new sight to many of our iron workers to see their raw state in the native ore into pipe and commercial iron, and this will be shown to all. This alone is well worth making the trip. Everybody attending should have a good time.

W. E. BLAISE Esq., Architect, of Boston, was in town on Tuesday to meet Dr. Trueman with reference to his proposed house. He spent considerable time examining the plans in Nova Scotia, and then took a general look over the town. Mr. Blaise was born in Truro, N. S., but his parents moved to Boston when he was three months old. He, in company with his brother has made an enviable reputation as an architect. They have planned and supervised the erection of many buildings in Nova Scotia and are now in charge of the new Architect Academy.

Dr. and Mrs. Trueman left last night on a two weeks trip to the United States. During their absence Dr. Coleman will look after Dr. Trueman's patients.

The Bowser house which is being remodelled by Geo. E. Ford, has been secured by Dr. Trueman until he can get into his new quarters. Owing to the lateness of the season he will not commence building this fall.

Local Matters.

Several prominent bicyclists of Amherst are arranging a round trip on their wheels, through Nova Scotia. The route includes several places in the Annapolis Valley and the expenses are placed at \$12.00.

A boy named Frank Tower son of Cyrus Tower, who at work in the Moncton cotton mill on Monday fell from the third story of the building through the elevator breaking his thigh bone, left side.

Robert Stewart, farmer of Greene Rd., recently lost two horses from the poisonous effects of Paris green, they having broken into a potato field and eaten off the potato tops on which the poison had been scattered.

The two prisoners, "Buck" and "Jim," in prison at Dorchester for the murder of Police Officer Steadman at Moncton; are to be tried together at Dorchester on Sept. 13th by Judge Fraser. The judge has issued an order to Sheriff McQueen to summons 100 jurymen.

On Sunday morning last Mrs. Edward McManaman of Sackville gave birth to two boys and one girl. This is the third time in succession Mrs. McManaman has had plural births, on the two previous occasions bearing twins. This time she is carrying a third child. The mother is doing well and the children are thriving.

Mr. George F. Keith's dwelling house at Butterfield Ridge was burned to the ground on Thursday morning about 4 o'clock from a defective fuse. One Keith and the hired boy removed the contents of the furniture. Keith and his wife are both in Boston, and as far as known there is no insurance.

At a meeting of the directors of the Moncton and Coverdale Agricultural Society on Saturday afternoon. It was decided to purchase the Moncton Driving Park for exhibition grounds. The price named for which the owners of the track will sell is \$3,000. It was also decided to hold an exhibition this fall between the 6th and 15th of October.

The sea-steamboat, intended for the route between Southampton and Fredericton, has been unfortunate. After a number of mishaps the waves from the passing steamer Florenceville, split the screw in two and let the machinery drop to the bottom of the river. [Dorchester Sentinel.]

Something More About Valuation &c.

To the Editor of THE POST, Sir:—Neither "Ratepayer" nor Mr. Alward treat the question of County Valuation with the fairness it deserves. If I understand your contention aright what you maintain is a system that leads to an inequitable distribution of taxation, and your figures show that under the present system such is the case. I am sure that all reasonable ratepayers must be thankful to you for placing the matter thus fairly before them.

The unfortunate Gallagher suit was the result of that part of the system that places the appointment of valuers in the Municipal Council instead of making those officers elective. The brief history of the case is: An improper appointment had been made. The Council feeling that it had done wrong looked about for some way to undo the mischief. Two lawyers were called on and one as a compromise taken from each party. While one was the friend of the man the Council wanted to unseat, the other was the friend of the person who desired the office. One lawyer read the law as it was, the other lawyer would be thought ought to be in it. The majority of the Council made up of men of one political party, and others who in some way were connected with sufferers from the actions of unpopular valuers in his business transactions declared the office vacant, and the Council afterwards by a strict party vote filled it by appointing a party man. The two lawyers are equally responsible for the result in the Gallagher suit, and justify themselves, perhaps, under the plea that they gave legal advice and that before the third lawyer when called on not being in politics, who it is well known would have advised that the valuator could not be displaced, manfully refused to give his advice without being paid, and the proper County officer who entirely concurred with him in what he would have advised to do, was not asked for his opinion. The Gallagher suit resulted disastrously for the County, but was a gold mine for a few lawyers and was the outcome of party politics at the council board, and the oversight in submitting so important a matter to unaided council. Those lawyers been paid one of them could not have taken the course he afterwards followed.

In passing I will say that while the County Judge did not "make the mistake" the COUNCILMAN may be correct. I most heartily say that on the whole the ratepayers of Westmorland know to their sorrow the consequences. The verdict of the County Court in the Gallagher suit was a matter to unseat council. Those lawyers been paid one of them could not have taken the course he afterwards followed.

In justice to myself I will say that Judge Fraser did not "make the mistake" in the Gallagher suit when he attempted to place blame on the head of a County officer, who without right or reason dragged in and attacked a man who was not a party to the case. For some unexplained reason the Judgment of the Supreme Court in the Gallagher suit is not to be found in the County records. I will not here disclose the reasons, but I do not believe that the County Court would have been so easily misled. The judgments of the Supreme Court of New Brunswick when carried out in the County are a matter of course. It is not necessary in order to place blame on the head of a County officer, who without right or reason dragged in and attacked a man who was not a party to the case. For some unexplained reason the Judgment of the Supreme Court in the Gallagher suit is not to be found in the County records. 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
