

When the weather becomes sufficient-ly warm to start the trees, the spores are liberated from the old leaves and infest the young leaves, reproducing new spores in a very few days. By the time the blossoms are ready to burst there may be many millions of these spores ready to infest them. At this stage the pistil, which will ulti-mately ripen into an apple, is very tender and if attacked by the ravages or a germinating spare, which sands out roots to penetrate its skin, will be killed, and the chances of a crop will thus be ruined. This is how the scab ruins many a crep, and its ravapee are often laid down to imperfect pol-lination or frost. In a large proportion of cases black spot or scab is the true cause of the loss.

It appears that cool, moist weather is the most favorable for the develop-

ment of seab. As it spreads but little during the late summer, the important sprays are the early ones.



In the old days not even the news columns were free from political propaganda. The reader was never sure that he was reading a fair report of a political meeting. There was always the risk that the reports would be colored to suit the newspaper or the party with which it was associated. Indeed, in regard to politics, many of the old newspapers were not "news" papers at all in any honest sense of the word, but party organs.

As a result a good deal of what passed for public opinion was nothing more than heated party feeling. Telling the people to vote for Smith and leave Jones at home is really not moulding public opinion; it is simply an impertinence. The modern newspaper does not presume to supply its readers with ready-made judgments. It believes they are capable of forming their own judgments, and its own duty ends when it supplies them, honestly and in good faith, with the material necessary for reaching their own conclusions.—Exchange.

Some of the diseases of man that may be transmitted by milk are: Septic sore throat, typhoid, scarlet fever, diphtheria and tuberculosis. Some animal diseases transmissible to man through milk are: Tuberculosis; cow pox, which may cause infection of the digestive tract in young children; mastitis, which may cause gastro-intestinal disturbances; foot and mouth disease; trembles; actinomycosis and others. Pasteurization destroys the organisms that are the cause of all the foregoing diseases. In regard to bovine tuberculosis it is known that though adults may be relatively immune to infective the second of the s may be relatively immune to infec-tion from a bovine source, children are quite susceptible, and a considerable percentage of cases of tuberculosis in young children can be shown to be of bovine origin. There are certain biological differences in the bacilli from humans and cattle which make it possible to differentiate these infections. A cow may be dangerous even though the udder is not infected, as the germs are passed out with the excreta before any clinical evidence of tuberculosis is present, and owing to the position of the udder it is almost impossible to keep them out of the pail as they fall in with the tiny particles of manure that are on the cow's body and that silt down in the form of dust. Apart from the recognized disease producing bacteria, it is known that large numbers of ordinarily harmless ones in milk may cause a serious and frequently fatal diarrhea in children during the summer months.
