Mr. Joseph Chamberlain submitted his amendment, delaring that the Government's proposal was calculated to degrade the House into a voting machine, depriving the British minority of its constitutional rights, and ought, therefore, to be withdrawn.

veiled.

EDINEURGH, Aug. 21.—The statue of Abraham Lincoln, the "martyr president" of the United States, crected as a memorial of the United States, crected as a memorial to the Scottish-American soldiers of the American civil war, was unveiled here today. After speeches by Sir Wm. Arroll and Henry Leath, the cord holding the wrappings was pulled by Miss Bruce, daughter of the American consul, who was attired as Columbia. The lord provost, the Right Hon. James A. Russell, accepted the gift and promised on behalf of the municipal government that it would be safely guarded.

quarded. nonument represents Lincoln freeing safely guarded.

The monument represents Lincoln freeing the slaves. It is fifteen feet in height, the bronze figure being life size. At the feet of the martyred president is a figure representing a freed slave and battle flags also in bronze. The figure of Lincoln is by the soulptor, George E. Bissell, and costs \$4,000. The entire cost of the monument is placed at \$6,000, which was subscribed for the most part by Americans in Scotland and prominent Sewtchmen. The money was raised through the efforts of Consul Bruce, and the project sprang from his discovery that a union veteran had been buried in the Scotch city in a pauper's grave. The pathetic story attached led Mr. Bruce to the determination that the many union veterans of Scotch birth should have a fitting menument in the chief city of their native land. The Franco-Italian Trouble.

Rome, Aug. 21.—The troubles growing out of the fighting between French and Italian workingmen employed at the salt works at Aigues Mortes, France, threaten works at Aigues-Mortes, France, threaten to involve grave international complications. It is not in Rome alone that the popular indignation is finding vent in demonstrations that are evidently intended to coerce the Government into demanding an apology from France for the attack upon the Italians and the payment of an indemnity. Riots directed against the French have occurred in many of the provincial towns and the situation is considered exceedingly grave.

The most serious outbreak of popular feeling against the French occurred in this city last night when a howling mob at-tempted to burn the French embassy. Some of the rioters carried caus of paraffine. The authorities had anticipated that an attack might be attempted on the embassy, and a

strong force of troops was detailed to guard the building. The rioters, however, attempted to carry out their threats notwithstanding the presence of the soldiers. They refused to disperse and the soldiers charged upon them several times, wounding many with their sabers. Forty-five of the rioters were arrested. The rioting in the provincial towns was only quelled by the use of troops. PARIS, Aug. 21.—Troops are held ready at Aigues-Mortes to protect the Italians in the salt works in case the French workingmen should try to repeat the attack of last Tuesday.

No Show for Royalists. Paris, Aug. 21.—The Chamber of Deputies consists of 584 members, of whom Algeria returns six and the various other French colonies ten. Latest returns show the election of 309 Republicans, 14 "rallies" or Conservative Republicans, and 44 Conservatives. Reballots will be neces

"rallies" or Conservative Republicans, and 44 Conservatives. Reballots will be necessary in 143 districts. Thus far the figures show that the Republicans have gained 46 seats and have not lost one. The Royalists have lost 28 seats.

LONDON, Aug. 21.—Up to this hour (5 p. m.) the returns show the election of 46 Conservatives, 14 Conservateurs Rallies and 330 Republicans. It is now known that reballots will have to be taken in 155 districts. The majorities given to the several Ministers in their respective districts aggregate nearly 25,000 more than their combined majorities when standing for election to the Chambor in 1889. In the last general election the Boulangists returned 35 members. Yesterday they elected only three. The deteat of the Royalists is causing much significant comment, and it is predicted that it means the ultimate extension of that party. The departments is predicted that party. The departments of Vendee, Finisterre and Loire Inferieure, hitherto strongholds of the Royalists, have been wrested from them by the Republicans, who are jubilant over the gains they have need.

The monarchical parties have lost already 50 seats, and the Rallies have failed to convince the electors of their sincerity.

Strike of 1,000 Longshoremon in New York—Parade of Unemployed.

New York, Aug. 21.—Over 1,000 long-shoremen struck to-day on the piers of the Mallory, Ward and Clyde lines, along South street, against a reduction in their wages. On the Mallory Line pier the men were notified that hereafter the company would only pay 25 cents instead of 30 cents an hour. On the Clyde Line docks the men were told that they would hereafter receive only 25 cents an hour for day work and 30 cents an hour for night work. The men protested and quit work in a body. The steamers of the Ward Line are United States mail and are bound by contrast to sail on time. The Saratoga is to sail to-morrow, and as she carries the mails the men are confident they will win. The men on the other lines, when the reduction was announced, quit in a body. On all of the piers of the companies named work is at a standstill, with the exception of pier 29 of the Clyde line where a number of men have been secured at the 25 cent rate.

ADVANCE OF THE UNITED STATES DURING ONE HUNDRED YEARS.

In the last number of the Fortnightly Review appears an interesting article from the pen of Dr. Brock, on the above topic. In a single century the United States

has attained to the proud eminence that the leading nations of Europe have reached through slow advances and many vicissitudes during the space of 1,000 to 1,500 years. This surprising development is not by any means confined to commerce, trade, and the industrial arts, but covers all those conditions which are manifest in an advanced civilization.

In 1790 George Washington was serving his first term as the first President of the United States. The settlements were in a narrow strip along the Atlantic coast, extending only a few hundred miles into the largely unexplored wilderness on the west. The average breadth of these settlements along the Atlantic coast and in westerly direction from that coast was about 250 miles. The whole national territory embraced about 830,000 square miles, and extended to the west as far as the Mississippi River. Of this national domain about 341,752 square miles were included in the original States which constituted the American Union at this time. The total settled area constituted about 230,-000 square miles. In addition to this there were remote posts and settlements that embraced an area of about 1,000 square These remote settlements were on the then so-called frontiers in Western New

York, Western Virginia, Kentucky, Tenssee. Ohio and Michigan. The averag population of the United States was 3,929, 214, and the average density of settlement 16.4 inhabitants to the square mile. Ten years later (1800) the national domain had not increased, the line of settlement had extended but little to the west, and embraced an area of about 305,000 square miles. The total population was 5,308,-483, with an average density of 17.3 to the

square mile. In 1800 the largest cities were prominent Atlantic ports, and there were few indications that they would become great centers of population. The large cities with their respective populations, were:

Washington, the national capital, had a population of 3,200. There was no census of New Orleans until 1810, when its population was 17,242. The first census of St. Louis was in 1820, showing a population of 10,049; and of Chicago in 1840, when its population was 4,470. These several large acquisitions of territory, from 1803 to 1867 inclusive, were secured at a cost of \$88,157,389. In the history of the great republic, there have been marked and distinct stages of development. First came the discovery and acquisition of territory, then its settlement by the hardy and industrious pioneers, then the development of the various resources and the establishment of the numerous industries. Finally came the re-finements of society, through the influence of well-established and well-organized schools, churches, and other social institu-

EXIT, TWO-ROWED BARLEY. A writer in the Quebec Journa culture announces that the Dominion Government has dropped the attempt to grow two-rowed barley in Canada for export to

And hereby hangs a tale. No greater imposition was ever perpetrated upon a farming community than was conveyed in the advice given by the authorities at Ottawa to Canadian farmers to stop growing barley for the United States and begin growing dear two-rowed barley for the British market.

The seed, it will be remembered, was bought from Carter & Co., of London, at a cost, according to Minister Foster, of £3 per quarter, \$15 for eight bushels, or \$1 87

But we are informed by a reliable farmer that the agriculturists who obtained this seed two-rowed barley were charged \$4 per bushel for it, though, as it has turned out, it was not worth a tenth of that money. The outrage was so patent that even good Conservative farmers in London township were heard to denounce it recently as even a greater imposition than the Louisiana

The cannibal tree of Australia grows in the form of a gigantic pineappie, seldom reaching a height exceeding ten or twelve feet. Platform Adopted and Their Candidates Nominated.

Platform Adopted and Their Carlos Nominated.

Sylvan Beach, N. Y., Aug. 21.—The State Convention of the People's party got down to business. The report of the committee on credentials showed that 135 delegates were present. The secretary-general stated the report of the committee on platform was not unanimous, as the committee could not agree on all portions of it. He then read the platform. There was a hot fight over nearly every proposition, and a number of amendments were offered to the cardinal principles of the People's party until it was explained that they were taken verbatim from the platform adopted by the National Convention at Omaha. The platform was adopted after a wrangle lasting four hours, and during which considerable unparliamentary language was used. The question of nationalizing the liquor traffic produced a three-cornered fight between the Nationalists, Prohibitionists and Labor factions. The convention finally declared in favor of state ownership of the liquor traffic, with the elimination of all profit. The silver questions, the state cannels and the labor questions brought out widely differing sentiments, and one delegate shouted: "You are trying to ride too many horses at once; better stick to face silver and nationalism." None of the women delegates got a chance to say anything, and Farmer Dean, who was in the chair, had great difficulty in preserving anything like order.

When it came to the selection of candidates for the election in November, one of the delegates suggested a fusion with the Prohibitionists.
