

Assessment Shows an Increase of \$217,950---Commissioner Grant Is Well Pleased---South London Will Lead With New Buildings This Year.

Assessment Commissioner Grant has finished the assessment work of ward 4, and has prepared the figures. The report shows a gratifying increase in both the population and the

assessment. The population of the ward is given as 14,406.

Last year the population was 13,633, an increase of 773.

The total assessment is \$5,824,491, divided as follows: Land, \$2,144,609; buildings, \$3,399,400; business, \$134,533; income, \$145,949.

The assessment last year was \$5,606,541, divided as follows: Land, \$2,-044,156; buildings, \$3,297,538; gusiness tax, \$129,233; income tax, \$135,614.

The total increase in the assessment is \$217,950. The increase in the land assessment amounts to \$100,453.

The increase in buildings amounts to \$101,862.

The business tax increased only \$5,300, while the income tax is increased



It makes its own treaties under the aegis of the British crown. It has assumed the maintenance of the last British fortress in America. It is to all intents and purposes independent under the crown of Great Britain, a nation within a nation, and content with its present status. It is free from militarism and the maintenance of armies and fleets. in the paths of peace and material and moral progress. Port Huron, Mich., May 14.-That the United Home Protectors' fraternity was in sorry financial straits last March, by virtue of the alleged crooked dealings of its financial secretary, W. L. Wilson, was shown today when Cashier Runnels testified as to the amount of money that the association had in the Commercial National Bank. On March 18 the amounts The matter was laid over until the in the bank, credited to the order's four funds were: Secretary's fund, \$156 49; investment fund, \$108 33; maturity benefit fund, \$42 70; general fund, \$10 89. This makes a grand total of cash on hand at that time of \$318 41.

How Wilson manipulated the inner workings of the order previous to the time that his defalcation was made public; how he pulled the wool over the eyes of those with whom he was associated; how he "jollied" the various investors to such a pitch that they had the utmost confidence in him and the society, was explained in court this morning for the first time, when several of the stockholders gave their testimony.

That Wilson either had drawn the money from the bank or that it was his intention to keep faith with the investors, was proven when the warrants for the various amounts were introduced. Strangely enough, however, each one of those who testified saw the warrant for the first time on the witness stand this morning. With these warrants in their ossession any time previous to the arrest of Wilson, they would have drawn their

money safely. All of these warrants were countersigned by the president, secretary and reasurer of the concern. Apparently the officers who countersigned them were under the impression that the amounts had been paid to the investors, but such was Ald. Saunders thought the proposi- not the case.

ister of finance. In fire insurance the gross cash received by the Canadian companies for premiums amounted to \$5,918,497, while the net amount paid for losses was \$1,867,884. The British companies doing business in Canada received for premiums \$11,002,401, and paid out \$5,073,985. The American companies received for premiums \$3,690,228, and paid out in losses \$1,569,610.






