More Than \$150,000 Decrease in Hotel and Brewery Values.

FALLING OFF IS \$10,000

Population Also Shows Effect of War, Reduction Being

The assessment of ward 2 has been completed by Assessment Commissioner Stephen Grant and his staff and shows a decrease of \$10,764 for the ward. This is due to the adjustments made by the Provincial Government and the court of revision, which bodies jointly cut off \$166,375 on hotels and breweries, a large number of them being in this ward. The court of revision reduced the assessment on lands and buildings to the extent of \$57,125, and the business assessment was reduced by the Government by \$109,250.



HOW TO FIGHT THEM (By Prof. John Dearness.)

To the Editor of The Advertiser:

I put off answering your third question—the one relating to the enemies of the potato—until their work would be attracting the attention of gardeners.

From the point of view of food conservation it is as important to protect the growing crop as to plant it, and even more interesting, if that be possible.

Stalk-borers and two or three kinds of beetles attack the stems and leaves of the potato, but the Colorado beetle is the best kindy and most destructive of its insect enemies. The pretty, littic lady-beetles and their blue-grey, tapering-oblong larvae, which are also numerous on the potato foliage, are beneficial. They live chiefly upon injurious leaf-lice and keep them in check Always spare the "lady-birds" and their children.

Adult Colorado beetles were unusually scarce at the beginning of the season this year, the probable reason being that the hot, dry weather last year prematurely ripened or dried off the potato foliage, and starved out many of the last brood of beetles. 


