Algoma Steel Corporation and **Employees Have Agreed** on Conditions.

Marie, Nov. 6.—The employees of the Algoma Steel Corporation and the representatives of the company have agreed upon wages, hours and overtime before the board of concilitation and investigation, whereby the employees receive an addition that airplanes will fiy safely across the Atlantic soon after the end of the war." 





Marshal Foch Is Authorized By the Allies To Receive the Representatives of Germany and To Communicate To Them the Term's of the Armistice.

Amsterdam, Nov. 6.—Gen. E. G. W. von Gruenell, Germany's military delegate to The Hague peace conference; Gen. H. K. A. von Winterfeld, Admiral Meures and Admiral Paul von Hintz, former secretary of foreign affairs, have been appointed members of a commission to deal with the allied powers on arm-

WASHINGTON, Nov. 5.—Marshal Foch has been authorized by the United States and the Allies to receive representatives of the German Government and to communicate to them the terms of an armistice. The German Government is so informed in a note handed to the Swiss minister here today by Secretary Lansing.

The note announces that the Allied governments have declared their willingness to make peace with the German Government on the terms laid down in President Wilson's address to Congress last January, and on the principles of settlement enunciated in his subsequent addresses.

The Allies reserve to themselves, however, complete freedom of action

when they enter the peace conference on the subject of freedom of the seas. It was further stated with reference to restoring of invaded territories that the Allied governments understand that compensation will be made by Germany for all damage to the civilian population of the Allies and their property as the result of the aggression of Germany "by land, by sea, and age done to the civilian population of the Allies and their property by the aggression of Germany by land, by sea, and from the air."

"I am instructed by the president to say that he is in agreement with the interpretation set forth in the last paragraph of the memorandum above quoted. I am further instructed by the president to expect you'to notify the German Government that Marshal Foch has been authorized by the Government of the United States and the Allied Governments to receive properly accredited representatives of the German Government and to communicate to them terms of an armistice.

Publication of details of the armistice terms still is withheld. They may not be made known until the

may not be made known until the Germans have accepted or rejected them as the course followed by the Allies in dealing with Bulgaria, Turkey and Austria. Only the details are in doubt, however, and no one questions that acceptance means abject surrender.

The statement has been authorized that the drastic conditions under which Austria passed out of the war have been followed closely, and in answer to queries for further information officials said tonight the statement of Premier Clemenceau, cabled from Paris tonight by the Associated Press, told the story.

Text of the Note.

The text of Secretary Lansing's note follows:

"I have the honor to request you to transmit the following communication to the German Government."

"In my note of October 23, 1918, I advised you that the president had transmitted his correspondence with the German authorities to the govthe German authorities to the governments with which the Government of the United States is associated as a belligerent, with the suggestion that, if those governments were disposed to accept peace upon the terms and principles indicated, their military advisers and the military advisers of the United States be asked to submit to the governments associated against Germany the necessary terms of such an armistice as would fully protect the interests of the peoples involved and insure to the associated governments the unrestricted power to safeguard and enforce the details of the peace to which the German Government had agreed, provided they

The Allies' Memo.

The president is now in receipt of a memo of observations by the Allied governments on this correspondence, which is as follows:

"The Allied governments have given careful consideration to the correspondence which has passed between the president of the United States and the German Government. EMPLOYMENT OF MEN IN DEFAULT UNDER THE MILITARY SERVICE ACT.

The following Regulations, recently approved by the Governor General in Council, impose strict obligations upon every employer TO ASSURE HIM-SELF THAT EACH OF HIS EMPLOYEES OF MILITARY AGE AND DESCRIPTION IS IN POSSESSION OF DOCUMENTS PROVING THAT HE IS NOT IN ANY WAY IN DEFAULT

UNDER THE MILITARY SERVICE ACT. An employer who is charged with having a defaulter in his employ must be able to prove THAT THE MILITARY SERVICE PAPERS ISSUED BY THE REGISTRAR OR MILITARY AUTHORITIES TO THE EMPLOYEE IN QUES-TION WERE PRODUCED FOR HIS INSPEC-TION at the time when the employee was taken into his employment, and that it was reasonably established to his satisfaction that the man was not in default under the Military Service Act. It should be clearly understood that the Canadian Registration Certificates given on June 22, 1918, at the time of general registration, in no way define the status of a man under the Military Service Act.



Attention is directed to a recent announcement published in the Press by the Military Service Branch, Department of Justice, regarding extensions to be granted to men

EXEMPTED AS FARMERS. It is pointed out that this DOES NOT IN ANY WAY AFFECT MEN WHO HAVE BEEN ORDERED BY THE REGISTRAR TO REPORT to Depot Battalions and who have thereafter received leave of absence from the Military

Once a man has been ordered to report for duty by the Registrar he leaves the jurisdiction of the Registrar and comes under that of the Department of Militia and Defence, and is to be considered as a soldier. This applies to men of the 20 to 22 Class who have been ordered to report by the Registrar in virtue of the cancellation of exemptions by Order-in-Council of the 20th April last, as well as to those ordered to report in the usual way on refusal of claim for exemption, or on expiration

of exemption granted. All men, accordingly, who have been ordered to report, and are therefore SOLDIERS, and who have subsequently been granted harvest leave by the military authorities, MUST, NOTWITHSTANDING THE NOTICE ABOVE REFERRED TO, REPORT ON THE EXPIRATION OF THAT LEAVE, unless they are notified to the contrary by their Commanding Officer or by general notice published by the Department of Militia and Defence.
