Paris, Nov. 7 .- Via London. - Last night was barren of important happenings along the French front, the war office announced today, there having been only intermittent cannonading on portions of the Somme front and on the right bank of the Meuse in the

German airmen dropped incendiary bombs on Nancy yesterday, but did no damage, according to the official statement. There were no casualties.

Today's statement recepitulates the prisoners taken by French-British troops in the course of the fighting on the Somme front since July 1, giving their number up to November 1 as 71,532 men and 1,449 officers, while the number of guns captured is given as 173 field guns, 130 heavy guns, 215 trench mortars and 981 machine guns.







## MAKE GERMANS PAY FOR ALL SHIPPING NOT LEGALLY SUNK

Piracy Will Give Foe Business After War

UNLESS MADE TO PAY

British Trade Bodies in Move To Block Great Plan of Enemy.

[Canadian Press.]

London, Nov. 7 .- Robt. Yerbeurgh president of the British Navy League, which has been foremost in the conduct of agitation for full payment by Germany for the destruction of Allied and neutral ships, yesterday said he had the support of 217 chambers of commerce in the British Isles and the most influential men in business life

Germany's Intention. "The destruction of British and Allied merchant ships by Germany has inquestionably the object of giving Germany the dominant position as competitor for the ocean-going trade o the world after the war," said Mr. Yerburgh. "It would be equivalent to an act of national suicide if the Allies should allow Germany to retain her merchant shipping intact after peace is declared in the face of the unlawful. indescriminate destruction of Allied hips for which Germany is responsible In torpedoing Allied merchant ships on sight she hopes so to destroy the strength of the Allied merchant marine as to enable her immediately to jump into the leading place of the world's

Must Be Compensation. "The only basis of compensation which could give satisfaction to the Allies is that Germany hand over her mercantile marine, ship for ship, tor for ton, of equivalent values to those sunk by her war vessels against the laws of war. This means that Germany must agree before any possibility of talking peace terms that sh leliver her own ships to the Allies til every one illegally sunk is replaced by a German ship. It will not be enough for Germany to declare her willingness to pay for the torpedoed ships. It is handing over sufficient ships to make up for Allied losses tha demand. Nothing short of that will do.
