

cost of the roads, there was that large profit for the promoters. The railways concerned are the Calgary and Eamonton and the Qu'Appelle, Long Lake and Saskatchewan. Mr. Scott, in the latter part of his speech, presented the case of the west with vigor for upwards of two hours, enlarging on the needs of more railway accommodation and of the loss which its absence has entailed. Mr. Scott's speech showed careful preparation, was delivered with fluency and force, and added materially to the reputation of the member for West Assiniboia as a debater. There were eleven speakers in the debate today, including Messrs. Vrooman, Murray, Pringle, MacLaren (Huntingdon), Cargill, Parmelee, Ball, Birkett, Beland and Stewart. Some ten or twelve remain, but the end is expected tomorrow night.

Mr. Walter Scott spoke as one who had urged the Government's attention to the question in season and out of season for several years. All the year the people of the west have had to submit to late trains, from half an hour to 24 and 30 hours late. Taking up the question of railway facilities in the west, Mr. Scott said that in Argentina there were 240,000 square miles of wheat lands served by 7,800 miles of railway, while in the west there were 300,600 square miles served by only 2,-550 miles of railway.

Hamilton, Bermuda, Sept. 1. -- A vrious state of affairs exists in Bermuda in connection with 50 irreconcilable Boers, who until recently were cared for by the British Government in one of the prison laagers estab-lished in 1961. They rejected the proposal, although 5,600 of their fellow-prisoners took the oath and were sent home. To satisfy them on this point a prominent ex-burgher, formerly an officer of high ank in the Boer army, was sent to Bermuda by the British authorities. The irreconcilables refused to listen to him, and they also ignored the written estimony of their friends in South

Member Says It's Impossible to Get a Majority.

London, Sept. 1.—The United States members of the Alaskan boundary tribunal arrived in London Sunday. Louis Jette and Mr. Sifton arrived yesterday. In an interview, the United States commissioners state that even if the tribunal fails to reach an agreement it will have the effect of clearing the air on the question.

Lord Chief Justice Alvestone, the British member of the Alaskan boundary commission, called on Elihu Root, yesterday morning, and Ambassador Choate called on him later. John W. Foster, former United States secretary of state, saw Mr. Choate in the afternoon, and they discussed the final arrangements for the meeting of the commission at the foreign office Thursday. Counsel for Canada have issued a statement giving an outline of the controversy, but not expressing an opinion. It is rumored that Secretary White, of the United States embassy, may be chosen secretary of the com-

mission. A member of the Alaskan commission in an interview said that possibly the commission would fail since it would be impossible to get a majority.



WHAT THE TROUBLE IS.

Those who want a tar macadam pavement are warm under the collar these days. To an Advertiser reporter this morning one of the interested residents said: 'The whole trouble with McMechan is

that from the first day he has been opposed to paying the frontage tax, by it. "There is not a day," he said, which a pavement would entail, and he thinks the city should lay the pavement out of the general funds. Ex-Ald. McMechan, of course, denies this, and points to the fact that he is petitioning for an asphalt pavement as proof that he is not "on the cheap." The arguments for and against tar macadam and asphalt are interest-

ing. Residents of King street who want bithulithic macadam appear to regard it as the only pavement on the mar-ket today. They point to Talbot street, which was laid in 1902 by the Warren Bros., and compare it with the asphalt pavement of the Barber Company on Richmond and Dundas streets. Although down a year Talbot street remains firm, clean and solid, without a break, while the records of Engineer Graydon's department show that the asphalt on Richmond and Dundas streets re-

quired repairing the first year it was laid. As is well known, the only firm in America who can lay bithulithic asphalt is the Warren Company, of Boston, and Mr. McMechan and the opponents of such a pavement hold out the cry, "no competition." They claim that the Barber Asphalt Company will lay the class of pavement they want— and that is the best—for \$2 a square yard, though the Barbers taxed the city of London \$2 65 a yard for the same class of pavement in 1895.

OPPOSING ARGUMENTS.

As an offset to the McMechan cry "no competition," it is pointed out that those who want an asphalt pave-ment have placed themselves in the same position by stipulating in their petition that tenders be called Trinidad Pitch Lake asphalt,"the Barber Company owning the property and controlling the output. It is further said that the Barber people insist on putting in their own specifications as to the foundations, etc., and are as independent in such matters as the proverbial pig upon ice.


