The Japanese are increasing their defenses of the position, and have succeeded so far in repelling all the assaults. The Russians have suffered the heaviest losses, and it is ground which the Japanese are con fident in their ability to hold.

Observations indicate that the garrison is feeling the shortage of men. The works against the forts on Sung Shu Mountain eastward are progressing speedily, and all indications point o an early general assault, although the date when it will begin is kept secret. It is expected that the next general assault will prove successful.



Mixed Politics in Quebec.

The situation in Quebec seems to prove that the much-abused party system is rooted in human nature, and is bound to assert itself under free institutions. The Conservative leader, Mr. Flynn, advised his party to efface itself in the recent Provincial elections, A few Conservative nominees refused to obey his mandate, but, strictly speaking, there was no regular Opposition in the contest. Having the field to themselves, the Liberals straightway produced a split in their own ranks. In one of the Montreal ridings a Liberal convention put up a candidate, Mr. Langlois, against the late Speaker of the Legislature, Mr. Rainsville, who was accused of being the tool of private corporations. Premier Parent came to the support of Mr. Rainsville, and indorsed him as the candidate of the Administration. The two English Liberal papers and one French Liberal paper backed up Mr. Langlois, who was elected by a comfortable majority.

In Quebec East, Quebec West and several other ridings, the regular or Government candidates were also defeated by independent Liberals. Premier Parent's difficulties did not end here. Senator Choquette, a prominent Liberal, charged him with supporting Mr. Danteuil, the Conservative candidate in Charlevoix, in preference to the Liberal nominee, Dr. Smotte, because the latter had criticised the Premier. The Senator also made serious occusations against the administration of the Crown Lands Department. As a result Premier Parent has entered suit for

If no Conservatives had been elected at all, the functions of an Opposition would continue to be fulfilled in the next Quebec Legislature. This fissure in the Liberal party, so far from being a weakness, is a symptom of a sound and healthy condition. It shows that Quebec Liberals are not under a dictatorship and that they are not disposed to cohere merely because they have possession of the flesh pots. 

A TRAGEDY OF THE WILDS

Tale of Treachery and Murder From Lesser Slave Lake.

Winnipeg, Dec. 5.-A traveler recently returned from extensive explorations in Peace River district, tells of a ghastly crime committed near Lesser Slave Lake in the latter part of October. Last summer two American prospectors appeared in the vicinity in search of gold. In October a party of Indians ran across their tracks through the bush, followed them up for a friendly pow-wow, and not a detail of the prospectors' movements or their outfit escaped their watchful eyes About two days after the parties separated the Indians heard a shot in the night from the direction of the camp. and on investigation next morning found the camp deserted, but tracks showed that only one man had left the camp. They reported the case to the police at Lesser Slave Lake, who were convinced from the Indians' story that a crime had been committed, made a thorough examination of the prospectors' camp, and in stirring up ashes of the campfire, found shortly after came to Lesser Slave Lake to dispose of his outfit, when he was arrested and sent to Fort Saskatchewan, formally charged with murder.


