CIRCUMSTANTIAL EVIDENCE

Rideau Record: A farmer near Burrit's Rapids was fined \$25 and costs for watering his milk. It will take a long while to make that up in milking, not to speak of tons of soap to wash out the stain and yet there may have been a mistake. We know of a farmer who lives near a lake where there are many campers in the summer. His milk-can was alongside the road and handy for the campers. The cheese maker found his milk "poors" on several mornings in succession. He was worried. He knew the farmer and could not bring himself to believe that he (the farmer) would either skim his milk or add water, but decided something had to be done. He told the farmer and convinced him that he did not consider he was responsible. For hours that farmer suffered all the agonies of an honest man convicted by circumstantial evidence, but made up his mind to watch his milk can from the time it was placed on the stand until it was taken away in the morning. He did not have to wait long after the sun went down. First one camper and then another dipped out a sealer full of nice yellow cream and hiked away, while the loser bit his tongue and held himself in check, until all had been served. The next day he read them a lesson and restitution was forthcoming. How different it might have been had the cheese maker taken action without giving the farmer a chance to learn of the other person or persons who were responsible for the condition of his milk.

A Hard Winter Predicted

Weather prophets are already predicting a severe winter, their prognostications being based on the following "signs"—that corn husks are thick, with stalks leaning to the west; that geese, ducks and chickens are growing a thick down under their feathers and a bony substance on their feet; that squirrels are prepared to lay up unusual supplies of provender; that tool stools on old logs have many wrinkles; that owls have retired to the woods much earlier than usual, and that weeds in the woods have never been known to grow so thick in the fall, all of which are sure signs of a hard winter.

DESTROYING MUSTARD

Prof. Todd of the Provincial Secretary's Department, who is superintending the agricultural work at the Guelph and Whitby farms, reports an experiment recently tried to rid the land of wild mustard. A place comprising one hundred acres was selected near Brockville this summer which was sown in barley and oats. The land was sprayed with a diluted solution of sulphate of copper. After a few weeks had elapsed an examination was made, and Prof. Todd reports that every trace of the wild mustard had disappeared.

To test the value of this treatment other sections of the Province will be selected next year and the same method applied, in the hope of ridding the entire agricultural district of this weed pest.

The result of the Brockville test is not generally known in this section and a treatment of one of the many fields near Athens infested with the weed would be watched with interest.

GOLF TWO MILES UP.

Thibet Has the Highest Course in the World.

The chief claim to fame that Gyantse possesses is the part it played in the Thibetan mission of 1904; in time, perhaps, this fame may be eclipsed by the fact that it boasts the highest golf course in the world. The next highest is the course of Guimerg, in the Himalayas, which is only 8,800 feet above the sea level, but Gyantse, standing at a height of 12,100 feet, easily bears off the palm for golf at a high altitude. Gyantse does not, to the casual observer, suggest golf, nor does it even appear to be able to furnish room for golf courses; but where Scotchmen congregate, though their total number be only three, a course had to be made, and it has been.

Provided the conditions are willing, golf is possible all the year round, the unsuitable months being January, February and March, these being the months of the famous, or rather infamous, dust storms. The course is one of nine holes, situated on the right bank of the Niang Chu River; the average length of the holes is 500 yards, the longest being over 800 yards and the shortest 190 yards. There is no grass on the course, the whole surface being a hard baked clay, over which, especially in winter, a film of sand is blown; where this sand drifts a "bunker" is formed. The chief hazards are collections of stones, pits, withered trees, wild brutes and the out of the two last named not even a Braid could play, and it is here that the advantage of the local rules is seen. Some of these may be of interest:

No ball can be lost in Gyantse; if not found within a reasonable time another is put down where the first one is thought to have been lost, without penalty.

The lie of the ball in sand can be improved by scraping round it with hand or club. (Even then the difficulty of the shot has to be experienced to be appreciated.)

All thorns may be removed from the ball.

Bath Day in Agra Jail.

One of the humorous sights of India, says a contributor to the August Wide World Magazine, is the daily bathing parade in a native prison. In the one we witnessed were youthful habitual criminals, varying in age from 9 to 15 years, taking their daily dip at Agra jail. While the governor watches proceedings from the shade of a tree, the prisoners, each man fettered and carrying a bowl of beaten brass or steel, are led out in double file to a stone pavement, on each side of which runs a shallow trough of water. At the command of a native warder, bowls are filled and waist-cloths are washed. At a second order the prisoners scoop water over themselves and then sink smartly to their haunches, one behind another, in parallel lines. Again comes a snappy order from the warder, and each man begins vigorously to rub the back of the fellow in front of him. When the warder judge: the "massage" is complete his voice brings the two lines to a smart right-about-face, still on their haunches, and the vigorous rubbing begins again, each man doing for his fellow what his fellow did for him. The process, while comical, is a genuine illustration of the saying, "You scratch my back and I'll scratch yours," except, of course, to the prisoners whose fate brings them to Agra. There is only half the "treatment" of their fellows.

Wandering Youth.

Sudden disappearances of men and women unhappily are a pronounced feature in the life of all great cities, but London has been the first of the world's metropolises to attempt a tabulation and classification. Last year 2,676 women over 16 years of age were swallowed up in the insatiable vortex of that metropolis without immediate trace. More startling and pregnant with thought to all who are concerned with the problem of safeguarding the young is that, during the same year, 1,118 girls between the ages of 10 and 16 were reported to the metropolitan police as missing. The ultimate tracing of these victims of the dangers of a large city to adolescent womanhood resulted in sad revelations to parents and friends. Some of the missing are still missing and will be. The moral is clear. He who runs may read. Watch, guide and help the youths, girls and boys, who have reached or passed the critical time of maturity. "The thoughts of youth are long, long thoughts."

Breaking the Bank at Monte Carlo.

A distinguished steward of the Jockey Club is Lord Villiers, the son and heir of Earl Jersey. The family has long been connected in a prominent manner with the turf, for the Jersey colors were registered so long ago as 1837. Lord Villiers first registered his own colors in 1904, since which date he has gained many popular successes. He has also been responsible for a sensation at Monte Carlo, for playing on a system he converted a capital of \$12,500 into \$175,000. "This popular racing man, who is not yet forty, can boast of royal blood, for an ancestor of his was a sister of Henry VIII., and Queen-Dowager of France. Lord Villiers is an excellent polo player, and is often found in the hunting field."

Blue Blood.

An Irish chauffeur, when near the House of Lords, had the misfortune to run his car over an old man who had a bottle of blue inside his coat. Jumping from his car, and seeing the fluid rapidly staining the old fellow's breast, he cried to his friend: "Finnekan, it'll go harrud wid us! We've killed wan of thim blue-blooded aristocrats 'at Lloyd George is always talking about!"

Nipped Himself.

A political speaker accused a rival of "unfathomable meanness" and then, rising to the occasion, said, "I warn him not to persist in his disgraceful course or he'll find that two of us can play at that game."

NEATER AND MORE OBEDIENT.

Girl Messengers in London Are Leaving Their Brothers in the Shade.

In London little rosy-cheeked, pig-tailed English girls are threatening to oust from their time-honored field of endeavor the messenger boys whose good-natured slackness has become a tradition and proved their undoing, at last. No longer are telegraph agencies expending their energy in seeking to lead into the sanguine and unsettled minds of youths anywhere from 12 to 18 the precepts of success. Rather, they are basking in the contentment which comes of hiring placidly obedient little girl-damsels who have no desire to wander from the paths of duty and to whom craps and marbles and top-spinning offer not the slightest temptation. "Our girl messengers are certainly all that can be desired," said a London telegraph agency manager, not long ago as he gazed complacently at a row of grave-eyed lassies waiting for orders. "The boys aren't in it. Street accidents and road mending operations have no fascination for them but our girls may be trusted to pass calmly and quickly by such inducements to loafing. Leapfrog helps the boy messengers to banish the monotony of delivering messages and sometimes a good thrilling penny-dreadful perused while sauntering along Fleet street, stimulates a boy messenger's brain, but does not quicken his footsteps."

"But the girls—they have none of these pernicious habits. They go straight about their business without talking or idling. They even refuse to linger at the beautiful hat shops in St. Paul's churchyard, they are so conscientious. We have three dozen girl messengers at work during the day. Of course, we employ boy messengers for night work."

"The girls wear neat blue uniforms and plain straw hats with black bands and at their waists they carry telegram pouches."

"The girls are neater, quicker and more obedient than the boys. That is why I prefer them," the manager said.

A Master of Fiction.

Mr. Thomas Hardy is the grand old man of literature. Though he is no longer able to do much creative work he maintains a very keen interest in current problems, and is alive to the literary tendencies of the age. He is undoubtedly our greatest living novelist, and at least one of his novels is likely to endure as long as the English language. Originally intended for an architect, he devoted his attention to literature, and soon created a great impression by his wonderful delineations of Dorset life. Such books as "Tess of the D'Urbervilles," "Far From the Madding Crowd," and "The Return of the Native," are treasured by lovers of literature throughout the civilized world, and Thomas Hardy enjoys an international reputation. King George is a very great admirer of Mr. Hardy's works, and it was largely owing to his influence, when Prince of Wales, that the novelist was enabled to obtain the crown lands near Dorset, upon which he erected his house. Every spot of the surrounding country has been rendered famous by his novels, and enthusiastic admirers come from all parts of the globe to view the original sites which are depicted with such mastery skill in the novels.

Stock Exchange Strikes.

There are just 18,000 seconds in a day's work on the London Stock Exchange, during every one of which thousands of pounds change hands. The Stock Exchange is always feverishly impatient to hear news of itself, and is, therefore, connected by thousands of private telephone wires with all parts of the kingdom. In addition it has wonderful little newspaper issued a times an hour. This, of course, contains the most recent financial quotations. About fifty special newboys are employed to dash with lightning speed with copies immediately they leave the machine to various financiers, stockbrokers, etc. On one occasion a well-organized strike of these lads completely paralyzed the working of the Exchange for over an hour. As a delay of seconds in distributing news bearing upon the market often causes serious fluctuations in prices, the lads' terms were accepted. Members have, however, provided very effectively against a second strike taking place, by keeping a double relay of lads, neither of the shifts ever being allowed to know the other. So if one struck, the other could be immediately requisitioned.

A Lawsuit in Cricket.

Kentish cricketers once sought to enliven a match by a lawsuit. The story is told in a newspaper of 1728. "On Monday it was determined a suit at law on Dartford Heath by a cricket match between the men of Chingford and Mr. Steed's men; they had a hearing about two years ago before Lord Chief Justice Pratt, when the merits of the case appeared to be that at a match between the above-said players the Chingford men refused to play on the game at a time the others had the advantage. The judge referred the said case back to Dartford Heath to be played on where they left off."

Quebec's Minerals.

The report of the Mines Branch of the Province of Quebec, showing that last year the value of the production of the Quebec mines amounted to \$8,679,788. This is an increase of \$1,360,368 as compared with the preceding year. From about \$2,000,000 in 1890, the value of minerals has climbed to over \$8,600,000—an increase of more than 300 per cent. In 1911 the mines of the province produce asbestos, copper ore, iron ores, mica, graphite, magnetite, and all kinds of articles for structural materials.

NOVA SCOTIA'S TOWER

WHAT NEWLY-DEDICATED MONUMENT STANDS FOR.

The Memorial Which the Duke of Connaught Inaugurated a Few Days Ago is of Special Significance to Canadians—It Marks the Place Where the First Parliament Was Formed.

On one of the hills which give diversity and beauty to the site of the City of Halifax, there now stands a lofty and beautiful stone tower, from whose turret-crowded top can be had a charming view of the historical city and its magnificent harbor.

One hundred and fifty-four years have passed since that first Canadian Parliament was called to order in its opening session, but in order to understand the circumstances that attended its creation it is necessary to go a little further back in our history.

She has also contributed to our public life some of our ablest men, among them being those who have been Prime Ministers of the Dominion. Her contributions to our history, her achievements in solving the problem of colonial self-government, and her contributions to those elements of our population that established, governed and developed this country fully entitle her to the name she bears.

The treaty of Utrecht that brought to a close what is known as Queen Anne's war, gave Acadia to the British crown, and Acadia may be generally described as all that territory now forming the province of Nova Scotia and New Brunswick.

During the first six years of its history, the British possession, Nova Scotia was under military government, which consisted of the commanding the troops there, and his officers. It was the rule of the soldiers and not the civilian.

At this time Sir Charles Lawrence was governor of Nova Scotia. He had repeatedly been instructed by the Government in England to call a House of Assembly, or elective Parliament, but he had neglected to do so because he knew that as soon as such a representative body came into existence he would have less power than he exercised with only an appointed council to be responsible to and to co-operate with.

Early in the spring the British fleet commanded by Admiral Boscawen arrived in Halifax harbor. With it came a large number of transports having on board a powerful army commanded by Amherst, who two years later brought the war to a close on this continent by the capture of Montreal and the surrender of Canada by Governor Vaudreuil.

Then followed the elections—the first Parliamentary elections held in this country, and on October 2, 1758, the first session of that first Canadian Parliament was opened at Halifax, Robert Sanderson being chosen Speaker of the Assembly.

The session lasted from October 2 until April 17, but the House did not sit continuously for there was a long recess. The sittings were held in the Court House, and the members were called together by the ringing of a bell.

That earliest of Canadian Parliaments was dissolved and a second election held.
