

MISCELLANEOUS.

UNROLLING OF A MUMMY .- On monday, the interesting process of unrolling a mummy was ex-hibited at the residence of Londesborough, London, in the presence of about sixty of his Lordship's pri vate friends. Previous to the operation an explanation was given by Mr. Birch, of the British Museum, of the history of embalment and the art of preparing mummics. Mr. Birch stated that from the inscription on the outer case (which was in a heautiful state of preservation, the colours being wonderfully fresh and vivid) he considered the preeent mummy to be of the second class, though a priestess of Isis, as be inferred from the label, , Anchechesi, " she who lives by Isis, and of the age of about 700 B. C. These conjectures were ful-ly confirmed an the unrolling, which disclosed an al quantity of papyrus, bearing a profusion of the hieratic, or current hand, hieroglyphic characters, descriptive of the profession of the decease ed, where ritual it constituted, and innumerable bleme and devices symbolical of the attributes of her worship. This unwonted amount of papyrus and writing upon it rendered the specimen of extreme interest in the estimation of those qualified to decipher the characters; but Dr. Granville-who while the unrolling was being proceeded with, gave some valuable illustrations of the chemical and mechanical details of mummy making, said that the priestess had evidently suffered from the want of licions governmental control over the Expytian undertakers, who had swindled her relatives by a wholesale use of bitumen, and the consequence was apparent when the bandages were removed, for es were so charred and the muscles so calcined that the limbs broke off in fragments on the

In a few days, Mr. Forbes informs me, they will have 26 retorts in operation, and will extract 8000 lbs daily, worth from \$6000 to \$8000more than two millions annually. Only think of that ! This is only one of several mines, but it is the largest.

GORTHE AND SCHILLER .- It may be remembered that Goethe, in 1927, had delivered over to the keeping of the Government of Weimar a quantity of his papers, contained in a seiled casket, with an

injunction not to open it till 1850. The 17th Mas being fixed for breaking the seals, the authorities gave formal notice to the family of Goethe that they would on that day deliver up the papers as directed by the deceased poet. The descendants of the poet Schiller also received an intimation that, as the papers concerned their ancestor likewise, they had a right to be present. The casket was opened with all due form, and was found to contain the whole of the correspondence between Goethe and Schiller. The letters are immediately to be pubished, according to directions found in the casket. -Galignani.


