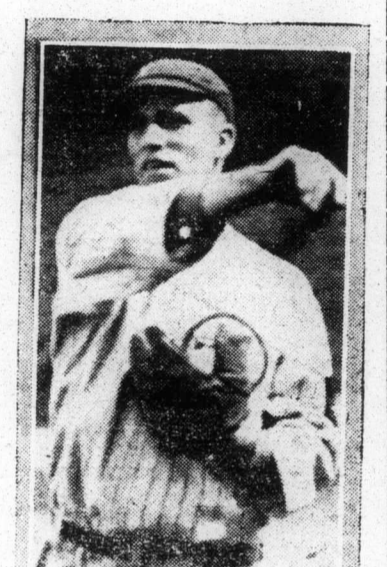
LEAFS LOST SECOND GAME

The threatened strike of baseball players, just prior to the opening of the spring training season, which was promoted and advocated by the Players' Fraternity, has been widely discussed, and in giving a resume of the inside story of why the movement failed to materialize, the Baseball Magazine gives a comprehensive biographical sketch of David L. Fultz, the president of the Fraternity, and the prime mover of the campaign that was but half heartedly supported by the players themselves.

Fultz himself was doubtless one of the first, if not the first, to conceive the design. And he was destined to play the complicated role of both hero and villain of the drama. In many respects Fultz was admirably fitted for the position of leader in a players' organization. He had himself been a famous athlete and a great major league player. He was acquainted with the players' difficulties from the players' viewpoint.

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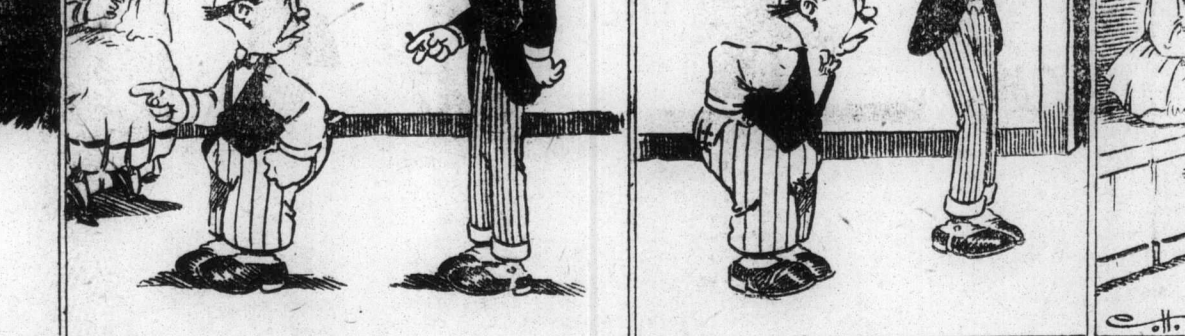

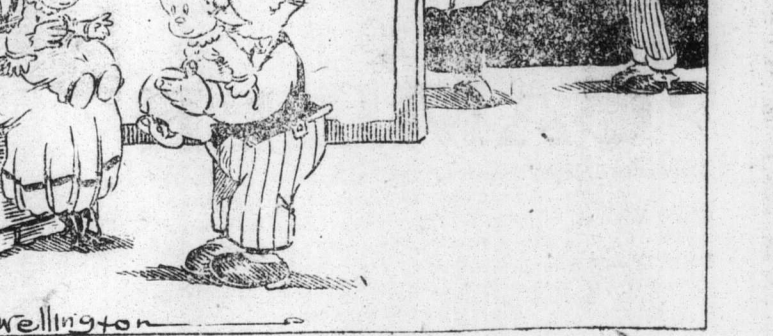

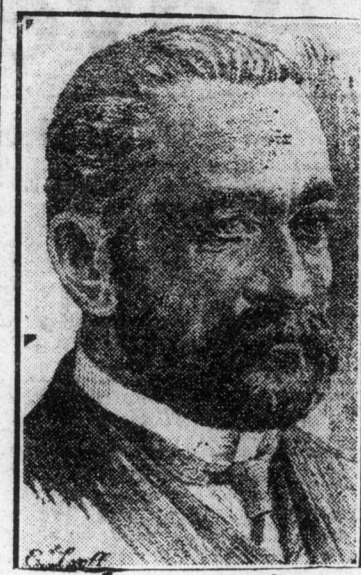

Courier Daily Recipe Column

APPLE SALAD Two cups tart apples chopped, 2 cups chopped celery, not too fine, 1 cup picked English walnuts, a little salt... DRESSING Four eggs, 2 large spoonfuls butter, 2 tablespoonfuls flour, 1 cup milk, 1-2 cup vinegar, a large teaspoonful mustard, 1 teaspoonful salt, 2 teaspoonfuls sugar, a little cayenne pepper...

CELERY SALAD To 1 pint of celery, cut in 1-2 inch pieces and seasoned well with salt and pepper, add a few drops of Tarragona vinegar and 1-2 pint of mayonnaise, 1 cup of cold roasted veal chicken, cut in small cubes. True and tried.

LOBSTER SALAD Put a large lobster over the fire in boiling water, slightly salted; boil rapidly for about 20 minutes, when done it will be of a bright red color, and should be removed, as if boiled too long it will be tough; when cold crack the claws, after first disjointing; twist off the head which is used in garnishing; split the body in two lengthwise, pick out the meat in bits not too fine, saving the coral separately; cut up a large head of lettuce slightly and place on a dish, over which lay the lobster, putting the coral around the outside. For dressing, take the yolks of 3 eggs, beat well, add 4 tablespoonfuls of salad oil, dropping it in very slowly, beating all the while; then add a little onion, a little celery, 1-2 teaspoonful of mixed mustard and 2 tablespoonfuls of vinegar. Pour this over the lobster just before sending to the table.

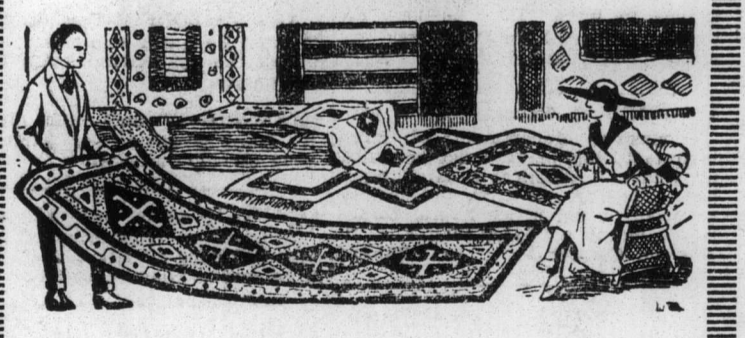

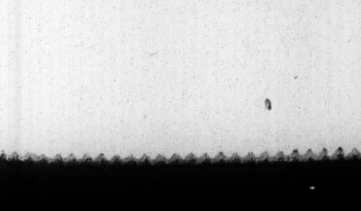

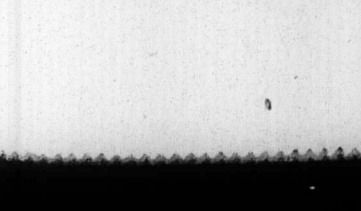
