Madrid, Aug. 9.—Golliger has confessed that he killed Senor Canovas to avenge the Barcelona Anarchists and the insurgent leader Don Jose Rizal, who was executed at Manila, Philippine Islands, on Dec. 30 last as the instigator of the Philippine rebellion.

Spanish Anarchists in London Say They Had Nothing to Do With It. Police Found in the Assassin's Room a Large Double-Barreled Pistol. He Arrived in Barcelona in December from Marcellus. Golli is a Printer and Was Implicated in the Terrible Crime During the Celebration of Corpus Christi.

Madrid, Aug. 9.—Golli has confessed that he killed Senor Canovas to avenge the death of his brother, who was executed at Manila, Philippine Islands, on Dec. 30 last as the instigator of the Philippine rebellion. Dr. Hiral denied that he was a rebel leader, but he admitted that he had drawn up the statutes of the Philippine League.

In Golli's room the police found today a large double-barreled pistol. It is believed that he carried a parcel which is believed to have contained a bomb. The fact that he had this somewhere in the city.

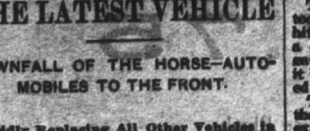

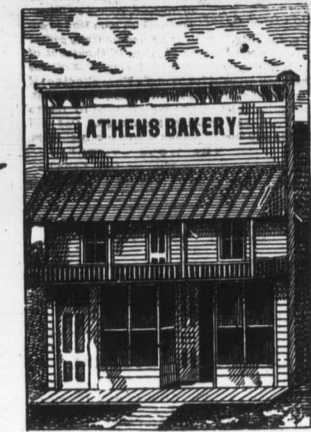

The Athens Citizens' Band will assist in furnishing music for the occasion.

Hold Bear Hunters. A Lanesdowne correspondent says: Several times of late bears have been seen in the vicinity of the Blue Mountain. Last Tuesday some of our best hunters went out to hunt for them, and spent the day among the wilds of the mountains in a fruitless search. They evidently did not have the right scouts with them or they would have found the caves or dwelling places of the bears. Their rifles were loaded for bear without doubt as one crack shot took aim at what he thought to be a large red bird hovering in the distance but on looking where his game had fallen he found a bear. Every fly that he saw appeared to be as large as a bear.

Farm Hands Scarce. Winnipeg, Aug. 6.—The harvest in Manitoba and the North-West will be two weeks earlier than for many years. The C. P. R. estimate that at least 2,500 men will be needed from the eastern provinces for the harvest in this country, and the railroads will shortly inaugurate cheap excursions for harvest hands from Montreal and Toronto. All idle men in the west have gone to work on the Crow's Nest Pass and other railways, and the railroads never so scarce. The men can depend on good wages. Crop reports issued by the railroads to-day show an increased acreage, a heavy yield and a satisfactory state of affairs at all points. Manitoba and Northwest farmers never had brighter prospects.

Who Makes the Bad Butter? The question of who is responsible for the bad butter offered for sale in Athens has been forced upon the attention of residents of this village by anything but a pleasing way during this season. Ill-flavored, bad-smelling, greasy-looking stuff, by courtesy called butter, has been received by merchants in great abundance, but good butter has been decidedly scarce and in almost every case has sold at a premium. A lady in Athens has no difficulty in disposing of all she can make at a considerable advance in the ruling price. The product of a farmer in the Union Valley district, who manufactures largely, finds a ready sale at the highest figure going. And there are others. The process by which this prime butter is produced is no secret; it is not, in the majority of cases, lack of knowledge that causes makers to err in the production of butter, but carelessness due to the fact that merchants will pay, without demur, the ruling price for any kind of stuff offered. The policy that guides the merchants in this respect is well understood.

As a rule, farmers claim that the butter is alright when marketed, and that the bad flavor and odor are due to its surroundings in the collar of the purchaser. There is something in this, as a visit to some of the butter stores of Athens will clearly demonstrate; but this does not account for all the bad butter. Unquestionably, much of it is off-flavor when sold.

At present the average butter-maker receives 18¢ per lb. for her butter, and it is sold at from 12 to 18¢, and in some instances the merchant is glad to dispose of it for half of what it costs him. Some butter is always at a premium and is re-sold by the merchant, under guarantee of excellence, at a profit to himself. It does not pay to make bad butter, and the government or individual that brings this truth home to the people of this district will earn the gratitude of all concerned in the product of the home dairy.
