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ARBOLITES IN INDIA.—The museum of the Asiatic Society in Calcutta has been lately enriched by two remarkable Aerolites, donations from officers in the East India Company's service. The first was presented to the society by one of its members,-Captain Walter S. Nherwill, engaged in the rereme survey, who procured the Aerolite from the Kurrukpoor hills, on the bank of the Ganzes. It is 15 inches in length, 122 inchesia ex-treme breadth, and weights 150 lb.; its original weight, however, was 100 lb ; but several pieces have been broken off for the purpose of analysis, which, according to Mr Piddington, the curator of the geological section of the museum, gives the fol-lowing as the contents of the scoriaceous portions of this formi-dable projectile.—

Mactier, Esq. the magistrate at Bancoarah, in Bengal, who proceeded to the spot, ten miles from Bancoarah, where the Aerolite fell : and saved what portions he could from the depredation of the superstitious natives, who were convey-ing the fragments away as fast as possible for charms, objects of worship, and for medicinal purposes. This Aerolite fell on the 30th of November last, with a great noise, into a soft, muddy rice field, where it buried itself three feet in the soil, having in its fall seattered a shower of frag-ments around, within a radius of twenty feet. The Aervite, judging from circumstances, must have been three feet in length; it is of a beautiful ash colour, friable, soft, and gritty, and some what resembles pummere.
