



If people would give more attention to deciding what they want in every direction, far less effort, time and money would be spent with disproportionate return than now is.

When you buy a gown or hat, for instance, if you would sit down first and figure to yourself exactly on what occasions and under what conditions you will be likely to wear that gown or hat the most, and then buy in accordance with that, how much more likely you would be to get an article which would give you full satisfaction.

I know a girl who spends a great deal of money on her clothes and yet is always complaining that she has not the right thing to wear to this or that place. Undoubtedly, the reason for this state of affairs is that she does not make up her mind just what she wants before she buys. She sees something attractive or something that is a bargain and buys it without thinking whether it will fill the niche in her sartorial needs or not.

Another girl of my acquaintance, after spending much money on her vacation every year and not being satisfied with the result, said to herself one spring, "The trouble is that I just go to places that my friends recommend without considering whether I will find just what I want or not. This time I am going to decide just what I want and try to get it. What I want is a quiet place where I do not have to dress too much and yet where I will meet interesting, intelligent people. I want a place where horses are cheap enough so that I can have some riding and driving. I would like a place where, I can swim and would enjoy tennis or golf. I must have a good nourishing food, a cool room and a comfortable bed. I am in a position to pay well and if I hunt, don't see why I shouldn't find all these things."

She did, and enjoyed the most pleasant and profitable vacation she had ever had.

All because she found out just what she wanted and went after it. How few people realize just what the want before they choose a vocation.

They take up with this or that profession or occupation, because it is the most convenient, or because they like some single feature of it, without reckoning whether it will give them as nearly as possible the kind of life they want.

It seems to me we should ask ourselves, "Do I like to deal with people, or with books, and figures best?" "Do I like the inside life or do I want an occupation that will take me out of doors?" and a hundred similar questions before we choose an occupation.

But how few people do any such thing? Their choice is mostly governed by circumstances, convention or chance, and they think the resulting dissatisfaction with life is inevitable and foreordained.

But it isn't. Of course, one cannot always get just what one wants even if one knows what it is.

But surely one has a greater chance of doing so than if one sought one knew not what.

We would think a man foolish if he went hunting without deciding what kind of game he wanted to hunt, and hence without taking the proper ammunition wouldn't we?

Why then, should we go gunning for happiness without trying to decide just what happiness means to us and taking the proper ammunition to bring it down?

## Fancy Fair and Sale.

Three cases of scarlet fever and 4 of diphtheria were reported to the Health Authorities during the week. There are in hospital 6 typhoid patients, 6 diphtheria and 5 with scarlet fever! There are 2 typhoid, 4 diphtheria and 7 scarlet fever patients being looked after in their homes. One house has been released from quarantine.

The slender silhouette still holds its own amid all rumors of fuller skirts and trimmed draperies. Narrow skirts are nearly, if not quite as narrow as ever, especially for street wear, whatever the fashion artists may design for us later in the season.

As fashion has indorsed most every kind of fur scarfs and muffs—Caracul, Persian lamb, beaver, wolf, wolverine, fisher, chinchilla, ermine, sable, moleakin, lynx and all the fox family—every woman who possesses fur of good quality will be in style.

The sash is the all-important accessory just now. Many of the new modes, being so simple, are relieved from the conventional by a sash of beautiful materials with colors combined, or a sash of a very effective shade to lighten up the dress.

One-sided effects still hold sway in the realm of neckwear. A central strip of lace, tucked material or embroidery is flanked on one side by an immense frill. Beading, eyelet embroidery, lace heavy and fine may be used at the line of junction, and ball fringe has made its appearance on some novelties.

Most of the fur coats this season are fashioned with straight, graceful lines and rounded at the front. Some are slashed at the side—not for beauty, but to follow fashion's latest whim. Their sleeves are generally long and close-fitting, and finished (without the gathers at the top) like those of a man's coat.

**BERNE, Nov. 17.**  
Violent earth shocks have been experienced throughout Switzerland. In Geneva the street cars were derailed. In this city and in Zurich theatre audiences were thrown into the streets. In the towns along the mountain slopes the inhabitants fled from their homes.

**HALIFAX, Nov. 17.**  
The Court Martial has found Navigating Lieut. White guilty of suffering the Niobe to founder through negligence. He has been sentenced to be severely reprimanded and be dismissed from the Niobe. On account of former good conduct he will not be dismissed from the service or reduced in rank.

**BERLIN, Nov. 17.**  
An earthquake last night, which was felt in a wide area of Central Europe, severely damaged the Castle of Hohenzollern Hachingen in Prussia. At Constance, in the Grand Duchy of Baden, the spire of the Cathedral, the most imposing building in the city, fell. A colossal statue of Germania which crowned the Post Office building, tumbled into the street. The Kingdom of Wurtemberg was shaken hard.

**LONDON, Nov. 17.**

Andrew Bonar Law made his first speech as Unionist leader of the House of Commons at Leeds. He called on the Unionists to work with the object of turning out the Government; bidding them to fight against Home Rule and for Tariff Reform. He made much of the Government's dependence upon the support of the Irish party, emphasizing his remarks by saying, "If there is one National Ireland, there are two which are separated from each other far more acutely than either is separated from the English." He urged a tariff as a means of raising the general level of wages. Though he did not pretend that the tariff was a cure for all evils, he held that it was a help for the greatest of them, namely, chronic lack of employment for the workmen. He dwelt upon the Canadian elections, which he believed would be a landmark in the world's history.





**City Council Meeting.**  
Mayor and full Board were present. A letter was received from Hon. R. Watson, Colonial Secretary, intimating that the Government would retain possession of the building site on Duckworth Street, east of Seaplan's Lane. Mr. W. F. Butler will not be given permission to erect a building there.  
Mr. Fred Canning, of Theatre Hill, protested against the erection of a bakery near his residence. He contended that it would increase insurance rates of his property.  
Councillor Mullaly strongly opposed the erection of the building, permission for which was given at last meeting. He made a strong plea on behalf of Mr. Canning whose protest as a taxpayer should be considered. Engineer Ryan was requested to make an investigation and report.  
W. H. Renale, of the Gas Co., sent in a complaint re the taxes on coal which they use in making gas. The question will be debated at next meeting.  
Inspector General Sullivan requested the Council to order the removal of sign boards over old railway track at Forest Road and King's Bridge Road as they were a source of danger.  
Councillor Mullaly objected. The board was used for advertising, and Head Constable Sparrow reported that it was sound and safe.  
Councillor Coaker suggested that the part of the poets that was under ground might be decayed. It was decided to request the R. N. Co. to remove the signs.  
Engineer Ryan will report on alleged damage by water to James Martin's property, Casey Street.  
The application of W. A. Ellis on behalf of Lever Bros. to use the wall at McBride's Hill for advertising purposes.  
Councillor Mullaly suggested that they be given space at a specified rate per square foot. It would be a source of revenue to the Council.  
Councillor J. Frick said that public property should not be used in this way. It was moved by him, seconded by Councillor Coaker and carried that no bills be posted on the public walls or fences in the city in future.  
S. Wheeler will be allowed to connect the water service, Spencer St.  
A hydrant will be placed at the head of Leslie Street. The drains there will be attended to.  
Councillor Ryan moved that the residents of Peinwell Road, between Rocky Lane and Boncloddy Street, be given a fountain as they are unable to connect with the water service till next spring.  
The employees at the Sanitary Stables will be paid at noon on Saturday in order to have time to buy their groceries.  
The Engineer will report on damage done by water to Nfd. Furniture Co. Tenders will be invited for the erection of steps in Solomon's Lane, west of Telegram Office.  
A. W. Piccott will be informed that the Council is not responsible for damage to Goss's property, New Governor Street, Mr. R. A. Squires, solicitor, has already been notified to this effect.  
The Engineer was ordered to fill in the cut near Mr. Pretty's residence, on Monroe Street.  
Health Officer reported two houses on the South Side and two on this side unfit for human habitation. The owners will be ordered to remove them.  
S. K. Bell asked for an increased water supply, consideration deferred.  
Moore & Co. will be allowed to extend building, Elliot's Hill.  
James Howell will erect a carriage shed on Scott Street.  
J. J. Duff proposed changes in building on Water Street.  
Councillor Mullaly made an excellent suggestion which on being put as a formal motion was carried, viz., in order that citizens may be afforded the best objection to erection of buildings in any locality, the plans submitted be held over for a week.  
Repairs will be made to the sewer on Cathedral Street.  
The shed opposite the Crosbie Hotel was ordered to be removed.  
After passing of pay rolls the meeting closed.

**Forecast Dull Winter.**  
Business people and others who keep track of events say that there is every likelihood of the coming winter being a dull one, especially for laborers and coopers. By the New Year it is thought that little if any fish will remain in the stores in St. John's, as the foreign markets show a brisk demand and great quantities of the staple are being exported by sail and steam, while the Americans are buying green and dry largely. Without fish, laborers and coopers will have little employment, and the outlook is a gloomy one for these two classes of our population.

Enquiries also made by the police show they say the woman has deposits in the Govt. and Montreal Savings Banks aggregating \$1,800, while they are also aware that she is the owner of two houses, one of which was purchased not long ago for \$700. An article of clothing was identified by a lady yesterday, who said it was stolen from her house some years ago. Mrs. Butler takes her detention without showing much sign of perturbation.

**Had Stormy Run.**  
The sch. Gamecock, Simon Hearne, master, arrived here yesterday from St. Mary's after one of the most stormy trips which the skipper ever experienced in his many years of coasting. The vessel left St. Mary's Thursday afternoon and late that night she experienced a terrific storm of N. E. wind with torrential rain. She lost most of her sails in the Bay that night, and as sea after sea swept over her it was feared she would go out on her beam ends. She had only a part cargo of fish, and as tons of water filled the decks the men had to beat away part of her bulwarks to let it escape, but for which the vessel would have come to grief. The men worked the vessel at the risk of being at any moment washed overboard. Captain and crew were greatly relieved on reaching here.
