My friend is one of  
those beautifully  
hospitable people  
who have the pleas-  
ant art of making  
every guest feel  
thoroughly at home,  
and her house  
must have absorbed  
some of that  
"spirit." For the  
moment I entered  
I felt at home. The  
empty house greet-  
ed me. I missed my  
friend, of course,  
but I felt no sense  
of constraint or

master.

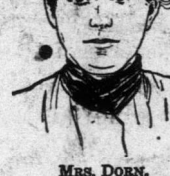
Truly, it is an

### A Fine Policeman

OTTAWA, June 10.—The story of the Ottawa Constable Frank W. Davies near Southesk, Alta., by three Indians whom he tried to arrest is another illustration of how well young Englishmen can serve the Empire even when engaged on such an ordinary vocation as that of a constable of the mounted police.

He came from London, England, some five years ago started farming at or near Wadena, Sask., but evidently soon tired of that task, because in April, 1909, he applied for admission into the Mounted Police and was sworn in on the 9th of that month. Then he gave his age as 25, and stated that his next of kin was his father, Walter Davis, of 25 Roma road, Hampstead, London. There is not a mark against his record, and he is reported by the controller as having been a most efficient member of the force.

Davies was one of those young Britishers who play the game like men. They know their duty and do it even if death be the reward. Prior to starting out on what has proved to be his last case he had

been around the town joking and talking to the boys with whom he was a universal favorite. Just at dusk a terrified Indian hurried into the town. He located the constable, and in broken language told him that two Indians and a "breed" had shot several times at him, at the same time pointing to bullet holes in his hat, coat sleeve, and in a bundle of blankets he carried. The officer immediately started after them and that was the last seen of him alive.

His murderers took his gun, cartridge belt, and horse, and continued on their way south-east.

Mounted Police Corporal Johnston, of Bassano alone arrested the three men, who are now being held for the murder.

### Eight Years in Prison

AND \$3,000 FINE.  
Binghamton, N. Y., June 13.—De-  
livering less than three minutes, the  
jury attending the United States  
Court to-day rendered a verdict of

facts in the case, but could not agree  
whether he was the notorious Edward  
Denno who figured in the Morner  
murder case near Albany. The con-  
nection with the white slave case did  
not come until he had been arrested  
on suspicion of being Denno.

### Volcano Destroys Two Villages.

Kodiak, Alaska, June 11.—Kodiak  
and Woody Island villages are buried  
under a foot of ashes as a result of  
the eruption of Katmai Volcano be-  
ginning Thursday afternoon and last-  
ing forty eight hours. No lives have  
been lost here, but many other settle-  
ments near the volcano must have  
suffered indescribably. The revenue  
cutter Manning was in port here  
when the eruption began, and fur-  
nished refuge for all the inhabitants  
of the town, 500 men, women and chil-  
dren, doubtless saving many lives.  
The Manning is now serving distilled  
water and Government rations to the  
destitute people, the water sup-  
ply having been polluted and the  
spring filled with ashes.

Communication Cut Off.

The naval wireless station was de-  
stroyed by fire, and the Manning's  
wireless equipment is too weak to  
work with Godovia. Despatches are  
being sent by tug to Seward with an  
appeal for all available craft to come  
to the assistance of the people in the  
vicinity. The property loss will be  
enormous.

As soon as the hall of ashes, sand  
and hot pumice stone began, the of-  
ficers of the Manning ordered everyone  
in Kodiak and nearby villages to board  
the ship.

For more than forty hours the peo-  
ple were huddled together in the  
darkness of midnight. Saturday night  
it grew lighter, the Manning worked  
out of the narrow channel and head-  
ed for the open sea. She had not  
proceeded far when the pall lifted,  
and she returned to Kodiak.

The First News.

The first direct news of conditions  
on Kodiak Island, which was almost  
devastated by the eruption of Kat-  
mai Volcano, was received yesterday  
when the tug Printer arrived, bring-  
ing Lieut. Searles, of the revenue cut-  
ter Manning, and with J. E. Erskin,  
a merchant of Kodiak, who appealed  
for assistance for the stricken peo-  
ple on the island. Lieut. Searles said  
that the food supply at Kodiak was  
sufficient to last only fifteen days.  
All the crops on the island were de-  
stroyed and millions of fish were  
killed by the sand and ashes that fell  
into the water.

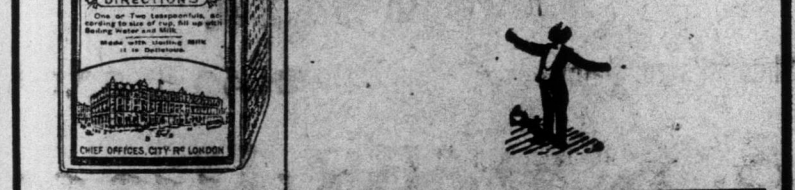

**Imperilling  
Bait Protection.**

On Tuesday we spoke strongly, but not as strongly as the situation warranted, of the action of the Government in taking the S. S. Fiona from her work at this season of the year of preventing our bait being run to St. Pierre and foreign bankers in order to convert her into a yacht for the convenience and pleasure of His Excellency the Governor. In view of the fact that Newfoundland this year will have to face the competition of an extraordinary large Norwegian fishery, fifty per cent above the average, it was imperative for the Government to do their part, and do it well. In seeing that we had not to face in the markets fish caught by foreigners on Newfoundland bait, it is absolutely essential this year that the Bait Protection Service should be strict and stringent.

The Bait Protection Service should have had the first claim on the service of the S. S. Fiona. Another steamer should have been hired for this use of the Governor and his suite. If it was not possible to hire a suitable steamer for the use of His Excellency then the S. S. Fiona should have been kept on bait service until a suitable steamer could have actually been placed on the bait protection service. Some such course as this would have been recommended to any party but one obsessed with picnicking. We repeat No party but a Picnic Party would have taken the S. S. Fiona on bait protection without providing a suitable substitute to take her place before she left the bait grounds, and not until then would she have been released from that service. Instead of following such a course, the Picnic Party Government takes the Fiona away, and she is kept in St. John's undergoing repairs and renovations to take the Governor around on a trip and the bait grounds are left without a steamer to protect them for quite a long time. Then an unsuitable steamer is hired from Halifax, which has to be kept quite a lengthy time at Placentia in order to fit her up for the service, and all the time the bait grounds are left unprotected.

A week ago the s.s. Baleine could have been put on the service, but no attempt was made to charter her or any other suitable steamer, but for some inscrutable reason a tug boat fifty years old was hired in Halifax. No wonder that the Board of Trade should have protested against the unprotected state of the bait grounds. No wonder that the Board of Trade should have officially objected to an unsuitable steamer being hired for the work. What is the reason, at present so inscrutable, for the reckless course pursued by the Picnic Party Government in these matters? There must be some reasons. What are they? So indefensible is their outrageous indifference to the interests of the country that they have been forced by the outcry to change their policy, and the s.s. Baleine was hired and despatched yesterday for the West Coast. Why was she not put on the service immediately the Government decided to place the s.s. Fiona at the disposal of the Governor. If they had determined that His Excellency must have the use of our bait protection cruiser? They have had to hire her at last, forced by the complaints of the West Coast, the Board of Trade and the Press. But why was it not done before irreparable damage had been done to our fishery interests? Time will tell.

The Army and Navy Depot, the well known building on Duckworth Street, and which is occupied by Mrs. Kearney, was up for sale to-day at noon. Mr. P. C. O'Driscoll was auctioneer, but there was no bidding done. This same structure was up for sale last year.

The barque Clutha has been loaded with 6,700 packages fish by Bishop & Sons the past three days but has not yet gone to sea, nor is it known when she can go. This arises from the fact that competent sailors cannot be had in the city, though every inducement has been held out to them. The cause assigned for this state of affairs is that steamer going abroad are taking all the good seamen, and none are left in port to man sailing ships.

The two Nobles, cousins, have each 600 qts. ashore, and the general average is 200 qts. per trap under sail to date. The same applies to Round Harbor and Shoe Cove. At La Scie traps are also doing well, and on the 13th Joseph Morgan hauled 72 barrels. Nothing for hook and line. The captain of the Hilton was speaking to Capt. E. Norris of the schr. Packet at Twillingate, Tuesday. He reported plenty of cod on the French Shore and he came to Twillingate for a new supply of sail for the people. There is also excellent trap fishing in White Bay. A gale damaged many traps on Friday and Saturday last at La Scie.

**The Dredge.**

People are beginning to wonder when the dredge is going to be cleared for Newfoundland. The captain and officers were sent from this port early in May to bring her out. It will be remembered that Minister Piccott insisted on taking a trip to the other side to get her, and that he purchased a dredge instead of having a new one built. She should have left for this port about three weeks ago. Why has she not sailed yet? How is this? When does the Fishery Department expect to hear that she has been cleared by the British Board of Trade for her trip across the Atlantic? What has caused the delay?

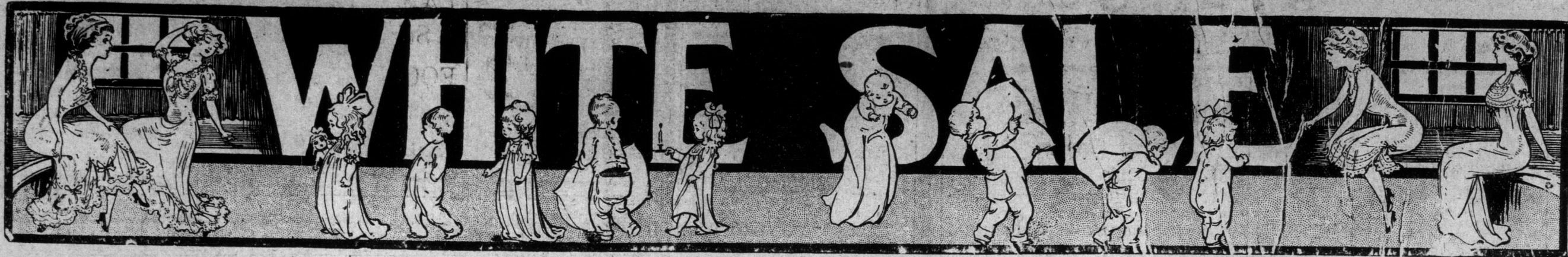

No water could be seen and there were quite a number of the passengers who walked out to Fire Island on the foe. The ship then returned from Cut Throat went through Run By Guess Tickle and landed people for Horse Harbor there and at Double Islands to get to their several destinations over the ice. The winter ice which covered Run By Guess had not broken up at the time the steamer left there. The ship went to Rigollette also, and all the way south had a gale of N. E. wind and thick weather. A jam of heavy ice was on the shore and from Grady to Indian Tickle no water was visible on the outside, there being nothing but ice as far as the eye could see. Indian Tickle was filled with ice and the ship had to force her way through it. She called at all the ports from Rigollette to ship Harbor but from that south to Battle Harbor and away up through the Straits an impenetrable jam of ice pressed in on the land. She could not make any of the ports along that section of the coast and skirted along the outer edge of the ice which from Ship Harbor to Battle Harbor was 10 miles wide. She forced to whip about 2 miles of Battle Harbor but could not get there owing to the tight packed ice. There were 12 sick persons on the Bruce Water and Cartwright Bay on the ship for Battle Hr. Hospital and they had to be landed at St. Anthony and placed in Hospital there. Most of them were very ill and the majority were to undergo operations. Only 8 schooners had reached the Labrador coast up to the time the ship left here. One vessel reached Indian Harbor on the 11th, and one of Munn's schooners was at Flight Island. These vessels got down in 4 and 5 days.

**LONDON, June 18.**  
Lord Charles Beresford, in a letter to the press, strongly criticizes the policy of reduction of British Naval strength in the Mediterranean, and says his programme of three years ago, which involved a cost of \$340,000,000, would have prevented the present crisis. He contends that the general strategic position has now as its objective neither France nor Russia, but another Foreign Power, and that Power alone. The proposal that England's responsibility in the Mediterranean should devolve upon France he regards as a palpable admission of weakness, adding that there are two courses open, one to maintain Britain's naval supremacy, the other to give up the key of the strategic centre of the Empire and rely upon alliances which have always proved disastrous. The navy, he says, is undermanned, 20,000 short of the number necessary for efficiency.

**CHICAGO, June 19.**  
The Roosevelt forces met their second defeat to-day in a session which had for its outstanding feature a remarkable demonstration of nearly an hour's duration. Governor Hadley, of Missouri, and all the Roosevelt delegates joined in the demonstration, while some of the Taft men lost their voices. One enthusiastic Pennsylvanian jumped on the stage and called three cheers for Hadley as the next President of the United States. Hadley led the fight on the Convention floor to oust ninety-two contested Taft delegates and seat ninety-two Roosevelt men in their places. The Convention finally refused to entertain the motion by a vote of 564 to 510. This transferred the fight to the Committee on Credentials, which was appointed just before the Convention adjourned until to-morrow afternoon.

**PARIS, June 19.**  
Russia is the only Power still to hear from in connection with the ratification of the Chinese loan of \$500,000,000, which was virtually agreed to yesterday by the delegates of the group of bankers representing the six Powers. The answer from Russia was expected to have arrived to-day, and the delay is causing unrest among the international banking group, which was already congratulating itself upon the success of the negotiations.

**HALIFAX, June 19.**  
The sealer Hilda R. arrived to-day from a South Pacific and Indian Ocean sealing trip, reporting 2,430 skins, valued approximately at \$50,000. This is the largest catch yet. The Hilda R. is owned by Halifax parties, and has been away for ten months.

What is claimed to be the world's record in rifle shooting was made in Ayrshire by Sergeant Martin, who, firing at 900 and 1,000 yards, made an aggregate 222 out of a possible 225. At 1,000 yards Martin scored 15 bull's eyes in succession.

There were thousands of them of all shapes and sizes extending from Twillingate to Cape Bonavista, and on Monday from the bridge of his ship he counted 150 which were quite near. The greatest care was necessary to guide the ship through them, and at night a bright look out had to be kept and the utmost vigilance observed to clear them. For miles and miles the sea was thickly dotted with them, and crafts could not run at night but had to harbor and anchor till daylight owing to their presence. They ranged in size from the small but dangerous "growler" to great towering floating islands of crystal.

### Pizarro.



Three hundred and a twenty-one years ago this day Francisco Pizarro, conqueror of Peru, breathed his last with considerable abruptness as the result of being assassinated in the jugular vein by some people with whom he was not on good terms. Pizarro was a discoverer by profession, having learned the trade of Balboa, who established quite a reputation by annexing the Pacific ocean before anybody knew where it was, but as Columbus and Cortez had discovered all of the known world which had not been laid out in town lots he decided to conquer Peru. Pizarro was one of the hardest men to do business with that ever came to this country. He had a very cruel temper, which followed him around from place to place, and he never thawed out or permitted a fleeting smile to locate on his title page until after he had strangled somebody with whom he was not on rapport. Pizarro did not conquer Peru with a shoestring, but found it necessary to kill a large number of people who had never said an unkind word about any member of his family. The ruling sovereign of Peru at this time was a pronounced brunette named Inca, who also carried the keys to the royal mint in his hip pocket. This gentleman took a violent dislike to Pizarro because he could not read or write and kept talking about the demeritization of silver. Pizarro gave a stag dinner at his house one day and invited the Inca and his staff to sit in. Then after dinner, while his guests were idly turning the pages of the photograph album, Pizarro had everybody shot down but the Inca, whom he took prisoner. Pizarro treated the Inca with great leniency. He gave him his choice between being strangled to death in front of the county jail or being set on fire and consumed, together with all of his contents. After reading upon the matter a little and conferring with relatives who had witnessed one or two of Pizarro's incendiary confagurations, the Inca chose the former route as being the more direct, and soon after said goodbye to this world in a voice choked with emotion and a hemp rope, Pizarro then had himself elected governor on a reform ticket, and tapped the Peruvian treasury with so much animation that the inhabitants revolted and announced that they were about to retire him from circulation. Pizarro, however, made some witty remark about the Peruvian bark being worse than its bite and cremated a few more natives. But his doom was at hand. At noon of June 26, 1541, being still wrapped in slumber and a pair of languid Peruvian pitamas, he was set upon by sixteen vindictive inhabitants, who took turns in opening crevices in his physique. Pizarro's death did not cause anybody to go into mourning, and Peru has been trying to forget him ever since.

## Shipping Disast's Meeting on Tuesday.

On Tuesday a meeting was held in the Board of Trade rooms under the presidency of His Excellency the Governor, to take action to raise a fund for the relief of the relatives of those who have been lost at sea recently. The number of those missing is:—

Accompanying the Governor were Lady Williams, Miss Dean, Mr. Fitzherbert, P.S., and Lieut. Gale, A.D.C., and among those present were the Archbishop of St. John's, the Bishop of Newfoundland, the Bishop of St. George's, Rev. Dr. Curtis, Canons White and Bolt, the rectors of St. Thomas's and St. Mary's, Fr. McDermott, Mr. Justice Johnson, Hon. D. Morrison, Mr. G. C. Fearn was appointed Secretary and Hon. John Harris Treasurer.

His Excellency the Governor spoke at some length on the disasters of the sea, making pointed references to the Titanic disaster, before referring to the losses sustained by the families of Newfoundlanders who go down to the sea and carry on their business in the great waters. He was strong in the expression of his opinion that the families of the officers had a strong claim on shipping disaster funds, who he declared were often the biggest sufferers. He thought that the appeal should not be confined to the sea, but should be made to the business men of the outports and the fishermen of the island. He then called upon the Archbishop of St. John's, who said they had all held out the hope as long as there was a chance of any favourable news. It was difficult to make some of the sufferers realize that their breadwinners were lost and they must now abandon hope of their return. The time for action had now come. The Governor then called upon the Bishop of Newfoundland, who thought the time was now ripe for deeds, for the time of speeches had passed by. He thought the appeal should go forth to the whole island. Mr. Outerbridge in response to a call from the Governor for a few words, said he would not presume to speak on behalf of others, who were well able to speak for themselves. In the case of the Greenland Relief Fund, the outports had responded to the appeal for aid. He did not consider the appeal as one for charity, but as a call to islanders whose community of interests rendered it a duty to lend a hand to one another in shipping just as if they were on board a ship. In a second speech, Mr. Outerbridge told of his experience in administering the Greenland Relief Fund, some \$18,771 had been distributed, \$1,651 of which came from interest paid on deposits in the Saving Bank. The winter had received \$40 a year for five years, the orphans \$15 a year until they were 14 years old. A few months ago the last call had been met and \$500 was left which he hoped could be handed over to the present fund.

The Mayor of St. John's also made a sympathetic speech. The Governor then read the names of the following gentlemen, from a list which had been put into his hands and no word from the general committee with power to add to their numbers.


