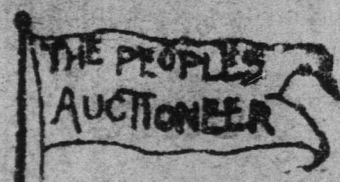

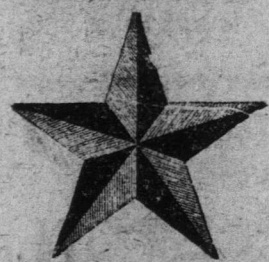

**The Right Way to Fry Fish.**

You can fry fish right by immersing it in deep hot fat. Wipe the fish dry, dust slightly with a little flour into which you have sifted a little salt and pepper. Dip the fish into the beaten egg (one egg with as much water as its shell will hold, beaten lightly together). When taken from the kettle lay the fish on a sheet of brown paper or blotter to absorb any grease.

Do not have the fish cold, as it will lower the temperature of the fat and become greasy before it begins to brown.

Fish is often dipped in batter and quickly put into the hot fat. Make your batter of one egg, one-half cup of water and flour enough to make it smooth and thick. When a rich golden color remove from the fat, put in a pan and set in the oven for a few minutes.

Butter or butter substitute is not desirable for frying or sauteing fish in a frying pan, as it burns too easily. The fat from pork is much better, use the slices of pork around the fish on the platter when served.

**Cane and Belt Worth Thousands.**

Planter Carries a Stick that is Ornamented with Double Eagles and Fob of \$10 pieces.

Atlanta, Ga., Feb. 10.—Most of us prefer to place our valuables in the bank, but here's a man who has such confidence in human nature, or such reliance in his pugilistic ability, that he walks about the streets carrying with him \$4,000 in his hand.

He is Benjamin Beasley Hardin, 62 years old, of Washington, Wilkes County, Ga., where he owns 1,000 fertile acres that produce as much cotton as any other spot in the State. There they call him the king of cotton. In Atlanta and in all other big cities they call him the king of good fellows.

"King Ben," as he is familiarly known, carries with him everywhere he goes a heavy walking cane, decorated with enough wealth to buy and furnish a house and lot and maintain a good sized family. From tip to handle the cane is embedded with \$20 gold pieces and gold coins of smaller denominations. Four diamonds adorn the handle. In all the ornaments are valued at more than \$4,000.

He carries this cane as jauntily and ostentatiously as a \$15 a week silk counter clerk swings his rattan on an off day. Once he took it with him to New York and caused such a sensation in Broadway that the police had to furnish him an escort.

Nobody has ever tried to rob him, though, because "King Ben" stands six feet and several odd inches in his stocking feet, tips the scales at more than two hundred pounds, and is just as able-bodied as he looks.

Then he wears a belt made of leather and ivory and ornamented with \$20 gold pieces, all of which total \$1,000 or more. His watch fob is made of ten dollars pieces and is worth \$300. He fears no man, he declares, and does not take trouble to leave the cane with the night clerk when he retires to his room of nights. He just puts the stick in a corner, throws the belt across the handle and turns in.

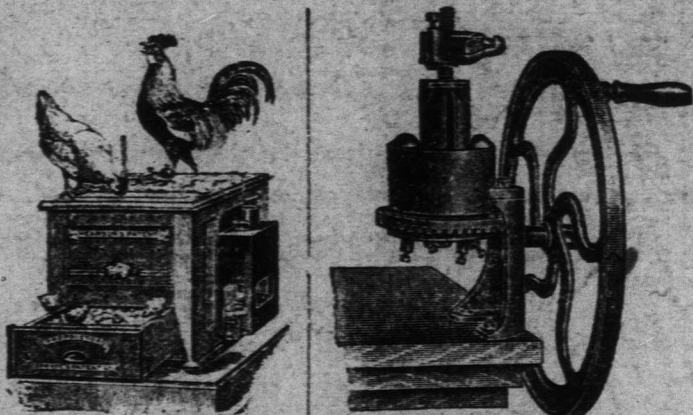

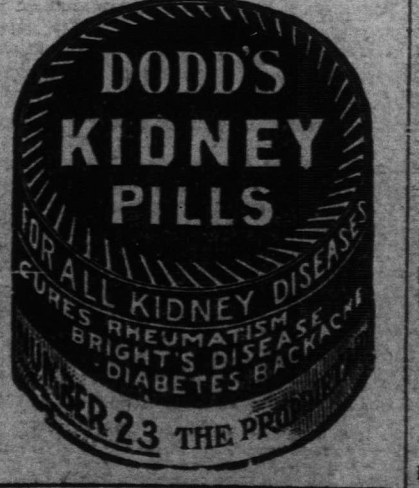

## Cable News.

Special to Evening Telegram.

**LONDON, Feb. 27.**  
Travers Humphries, Public Prosecutor, asking the Police Court Magistrate to commit two women, Lenton and Locke, for setting fire to the refreshment pavilion at Kew Botanical Gardens, said that there were two charges, the first coming under the clauses of the Malicious Damage Act of 1861, which made it a felony, punishable by penal servitude for life to set fire to buildings belonging to the King or devoted to the use of the public. The second charge, under the same Act, carried the same penalty setting on fire any material within such a building. Locke appeared alone, as Lenton had been released owing to ill-health. The Magistrate said such proceedings were extraordinary; prisoners were sometimes released from prison, but not from custody. He immediately issued a warrant for the re-arrest of the woman. Locke also started the hunger strike, but was forcibly fed. She pleaded that she was unfit to conduct her defence, but was committed for trial, \$5,000 bail being allowed on the promise to refrain from further misconduct pending trial.

**LONDON, Feb. 27.**  
Reports of the fighting in Bulair, yesterday, appear to have been inaccurate. An official announcement issued to-day at Constantinople, states the situation is not changed, either at Enclik or Tebatalla, but that the bombardment of Adrianople continues. Turkey has renewed her overtures for peace on the basis of the cession of Adrianople, engaging the good offices of Russia for that purpose. The Bulgarian Cabinet has taken the proposal under consideration, but no decision has been reached yet. It is reported at Vienna that Serbia is sending 30,000 troops with siege and field guns by sea, from Salonika, to assist the Montenegrins in their attack on Scutari.

**LONDON, Feb. 27.**  
A woman was arrested on the All England Tennis grounds at Wimbledon, last night, with bags containing inflammables, whose intention is supposed to have been the destruction of the Pavilion. She was arrested and remanded for further enquiry. Police said they found five cans of Paraffin and other combustibles under the grand stand. The woman appears to have planned systematic incendiarism at the sporting grounds. Two were arrested at the Wimbledon grounds with combustibles, whilst two others at the Roehampton Cricket grounds escaped, leaving behind a note saying that they were acting thus because Mrs. Pankhurst had been refused bail.

**MEXICO CITY, Feb. 27.**  
Confidence in the Huerta Administration appears to wax stronger daily if faith is to be placed in reports issued by the Government authorities as to the rapidly vanishing rebel spirit. Conspiracies against the Provisional President are being whispered about in the capital, where, however, there is at least an outward appearance of harmony. Huerta and Felix Diaz seem to be working together to bring about general peace, which both express themselves as ardently desiring.

**WELLINGTON, Feb. 27.**  
Lady Scott arrived in the Aorangi to-day. She heard of her husband's death while in mid-ocean, off Fiji. As soon as she recovered from the first shock, she said, "I must be brave, as my husband would have wished me to be." She was met here by her brother, Lieut. Bruce, and Commander Edward Evans, who had brought back the sad news and appears to be bearing up bravely under the awful blow.

**WASHINGTON, Feb. 27.**  
Labor Unions may be recognized by President Wilson, by the appointment of William B. Wilson, of Pennsylvania, as Secretary of the newly created Department of Labor. Representative Wilson has been endorsed by the American Federation of Labor. At one time he was Secretary of the United Mine Workers of America.

**LONDON, Feb. 27.**  
At her wedding at Ascot, yesterday, Lady Edwina Roberts, was given away by her father, Lord Roberts. She wore a gown of white, with gold brocade, and long train. All business houses were closed at the bride's request. Her husband, Major Henry Lewin, is a son of Commander Lewin of the Royal Navy.

**LONDON, Feb. 27.**  
Harry Lewis, American waiter-weight, in a case against the Motor Cab Company, for injuries sustained in a taxi, has been awarded \$3,000 damages. Counsel argued that the accident had impaired his vitality and ability to fight.

**BERLIN, Feb. 27.**  
It has been unofficially announced that the marriage of the Kaiser's daughter, Victoria Louise, and Prince Ernest of Cumberland, will take place on May 24th, the same day on which the Court will celebrate the silver wedding of Prince Henry of Prussia.

**OTTAWA, Feb. 27.**  
Instructions have been issued to Canadian immigration officers to bar Johnson, the negro pugilist, should he try to enter Canada.

Last Evening.  
By far the best public meeting ever held here was that held last night by Mr. Coaker. He delivered a brilliant and elegant speech of two hours and forty minutes, and held the crowded audience spell-bound from start to finish. Talk about the Union, why there can be no doubt of it sweeping the country, for to hear Mr. Coaker speak is to realize what this movement really is, and to say that every toiler is delighted, is to put it very mildly. The people here today glory in Mr. Coaker and "Union For Ever" is their motto. Many men from Coley's Point, and Bay Roberts attended and the audience was a large one, but not a single interruption occurred, and none could be offended at a word uttered by the speaker. Mr. Coaker appeals to the fishermen as no other man ever did and has a grasp of their condition that no other man ever possessed. The speaker was very clear, plain and fluent; no notes were used and his utterances not only enthused the audience, but they could hardly realize that he came from the Backwoods of Green Bay only four years ago unknown and without any means, and to-day controls the future of the Colony. Mr. Coaker will hold a meeting at Bryant's Cove this afternoon and at Island Cove to-night. Our prayer is that God would bless his efforts to uplift the country and people. Long may he live.



The Bruce got into Sydney last evening after being off Cranberry Head for a week.  
**OTTAWA, To-day.**  
At the opening of Common Sense Wilfred Laurier asked what truth there was in the statements that Stefansson is to be dispatched on an Arctic expedition. Borden said the statements were correct. The expedition has been projected to explore the lands over which Canada claims sovereignty. This expedition had been planned by certain American scientific institutions, which have asked the Canadian Government for assistance. It seemed desirable that the expedition should be sent, but also desirable it should be wholly under the Canadian Government. The American institutions had renounced claim to Stefansson's services but might send some scientists with the party.  
**LONDON, To-day.**  
Mrs. Pankhurst, militant suffragette is to be tried at the Old Bailey in April, instead of the Surrey Assizes in June or July, as would have been the case in ordinary course. The authorities made this concession on her promising good behaviour. Nearly 800 delegates assembled in London, representing all parts of the country on behalf of National Union Women's Suffrage Societies. The Conference annual report says the membership has increased 12,000 during the year. The Suffragette Journal states that Sylvia Pankhurst is seriously ill in Holloway jail as a result of a hunger strike necessitating forcible feeding.  
**OTTAWA, To-day.**  
Col. Hughes at the annual meeting of the Canadian Artillery Association, in the presence of His Royal Highness the Duke of Connaught said the people of Canada should be ready to defend their country if necessary. They have a right to do so. I am glad they are waking up to their duty, he said. "We have" applications from 50,000 young men who want to enroll in the Militia, but we haven't money to accommodate them; every man should be ready to defend his country. If not then he ought to pay a tax of \$5 a year towards the upkeep of those who will. This system was followed in Switzerland and was advocated by Premier Louis Botha in South Africa." Col. Hughes maintained too much money could not be spent to improve militia.  
**ILL OF APPENDICITIS.**—One of the firemen of the Nascopie, named Patrick Gosse, was yesterday taken to the hospital. He is very ill of appendicitis and will undergo an operation.  
**ANOTHER SHEBEN CASE.**—Messrs. R. A. Squires and W. J. Higgins, Barristers, arrived here by the shore train last night. Both were engaged in the hearing of a sheben case before Judge Oke, at Harbor Grace. Mr. Higgins appeared for the Crown and Mr. Squires defended. The case was adjourned for the procuring of more witnesses.

### Nascopie's Rough Run

**MEN WASHED ABOUT THE DECKS.**  
Though the Nascopie-made a quick run across the "herring pond" she was not without her share of stormy weather. As the vessel began to near the Banks she had very severe weather and sea after sea came on board. A. Whiteway, a deck hand, and son of Mr. Eli Whiteway, was forward endeavoring to cover a ventilator, when one very heavy sea boarded her and swept the man aft. He was driven with force against the fore rigging, was rendered unconscious for a while and one of his legs were so seriously injured that it was thought it was broken. The man was treated by Dr. Anderson on arrival here and is lame from the effects of the injury received. The seas which swept the ship broke in the fore-castle door and flooded that compartment with water which for some time was over 4 feet deep there. The men had to leave the place and sleep in other parts of the ship. Another of the crew was thrown down by the sea and cut about the head.

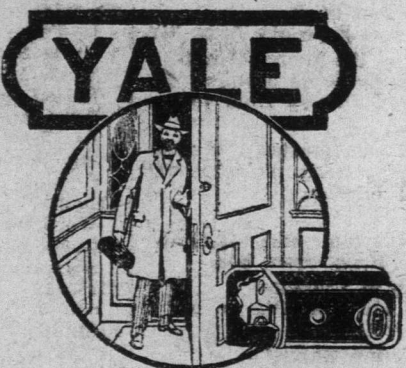

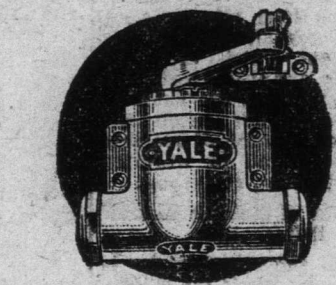

## Bible Society Meeting in College Hall

**A Large Number of People Present—His Excellency The Governor Presiding—Brilliant Addresses by Rev. Canon Bolt and the Rev. C. A. Whitmarsh.**

With fine weather, timely notice, and copious editorial reviewing, it could not be otherwise than that the annual meeting of the Bible Society should be the success that it was. This statement, we feel sure, our readers will be pleased to learn, and we are equally pleased to be able to make it.

At eight o'clock His Excellency Governor Davidson, accompanied by Mrs. Davidson and a large party, arrived at the hall, and were cordially received by the executive of the Society, who escorted the vice-regal party to the platform while the organ pealed forth the strains of the National Anthem under the touch of Mr. Allen. The President, Hon. H. J. B. Woods, announced the opening hymn, "All hail the power of Jesus' name," after which the Rev. Dr. Rogers read the nineteenth Psalm as a Scripture lesson, and offered prayer. The President then called upon His Excellency to do the honors of the evening, so His Excellency was accorded a very hearty welcome. It may be said to be His Excellency's first public appearance since his arrival in our midst, and it is a note to note that he was so cordially welcomed, also that he made such a pleasing impression upon the audience. Perhaps no gathering of the year could be more representative and broad-minded, than that which assembled last night at the College Hall, under the auspices of the Bible Society; and while we feel sure that His Excellency will have the privilege of presiding at many such gatherings during his tenure of office in Newfoundland, it is quite reasonable to conclude that he cannot soon forget the scene which he beheld last evening.

In his remarks, the Governor was quite at home, and displayed much good judgment in all that he said—though suffering from a severe cold, he was remembered that he was but chairman of the meeting, and therefore did not intrude to any undue length upon the time allotted to the speakers proper. At the close of His Excellency's remarks, another hymn was sung, and he then called upon the Secretary, the Rev. The Canon's remarks were very appropriate and logical, and were heard with good effect throughout the hall. Another hymn intervened, and then came the second speaker of the evening, the Rev. C. A. Whitmarsh, of Cochrane St. Church. Like the former speaker, Mr. Whitmarsh showed himself a workman that needeth not to be ashamed. Both the addresses were well timed, and choicely prepared. They were also of the right spirit for such a meeting as that of the Bible Society; and we feel that all the people of the community, and of every sect, could say "Amen" to every utterance of the speakers.

And this is as it should be, for while the Church may differ on certain points of doctrine, we are all agreed on the common teaching of Holy Writ, and we can well afford to come once a year to such a beautiful building as the College Hall, and there join hands in support of the Good Book.  
Following the addresses, there was the usual election of the committee, and other minor matters, with which the public are well acquainted. The meeting was closed in good time, and proved to be one full of inspiration and one that was fresh and attractive from first to last.

We compliment the Bible Society and its Executive, and especially the President, our esteemed townsman the Hon. H. J. B. Woods, upon the great success of the annual meeting; and as they go forth to another year's work they can rest assured that they have the best wishes of the community and the Press at their back.

In closing we must, however, say a word in reference to the singing and music under Mr. Allen. It was indeed very hearty, and Mr. Allen's presiding at the organ was highly appreciated by those competent to judge of his merits.

## Channel Parish.

The movement to have the Mission of Channel (Cody) referred to in a previous issue of the Telegram, erected into a Parish, has been brought to a successful termination. A petition to the Executive Committee of the Diocesan Synod, signed by representatives of the congregation, received the approval of that body, and on Wednesday evening last the 19th inst., the first Parochial meeting was held in St. James' school-room, Rev. H. J. Read presiding. Having briefly outlined the purpose of the meeting, Mr. Read placed his resignation as incumbent, in the hands of the congregation and retired from the chair. On motion of R. T. Squarey, Esq., J.P., seconded by Mr. William Harnett, Mr. H. J. MacKay was appointed interim Chairman and the election of a Rector was immediately proceeded with. R. T. Squarey, Esq., in a very eloquent speech in which he paid a graceful tribute to the sterling work of Rev. H. J. Read, during his 15 years period as incumbent of this Mission, asked permission to have the resignation waived, and moved that the late incumbent be elected First Rector of Channel Parish. This being seconded by Mr. C. T. James, who referred to the advances made by the Mission during the present incumbency, was put to the meeting and carried unanimously by a standing vote. The newly-elected Rector was thereupon conducted to the chair by Messrs. Squarey and Mackay and reassumed the duties of the office. Formalities were dispensed with for a short time, during which Mr. Read received the personal congratulations of the members present. Business being resumed, Mr. C. T. James, was on motion elected R. T. Squarey, Esq., seconded by Mr. James Evans, elected Secretary-Treasurer of the Parish, and the following were appointed a Finance Committee: Messrs. E. Pike, S. Gillian, (Wardens); A. Chaisson, W. Blackmore, E. Bragg, Geo. Poole, W. Chaisson, Lewis Sheeves, Secy.-Treas. ex-officio. The Rector having thanked the meeting for their many manifestations of good will toward himself, expressed the hope that under the new conditions, the same pleasant relations would continue. Business now having been completed, the Doxology and Benediction brought the session to a close. The newly created Parish starts under the most favorable auspices, and to those who by their efforts brought about the change, the thanks of the congregation have been accorded.

## Anglican Minister

Montreal, Feb. 21.—"I have just returned from Toronto and have only had time to glance hurriedly at the papers," said His Lordship Bishop Fawthrop when asked what attitude he would adopt on the furor which has been created in the ranks of supporters of the Anglican Church here over the action of Rev. Dr. Symonds, rector of Christ Church Cathedral, who preached in a Presbyterian Church, in the parish of a fellow-Anglican minister, without first securing the sanction of the Bishop.

The men's association of the Parish in which Dr. Symonds preached, have demanded the cancellation of his license. Dr. Symonds, who is one of the advocates of the Church Unity Party in his denomination, says he preached in the Presbyterian Church, because he favours a closer union between religious organizations and he also intimated that he would gladly preach in a Roman Catholic Church

in Montreal, if Archbishop Bruché would allow him to do so.

Bishop Fawthrop, of Montreal, began pouring oil on the troubled waters, when this morning he gave out the statement, that "the report that he had intended to take immediate and drastic action was quite unofficial and unauthorized."

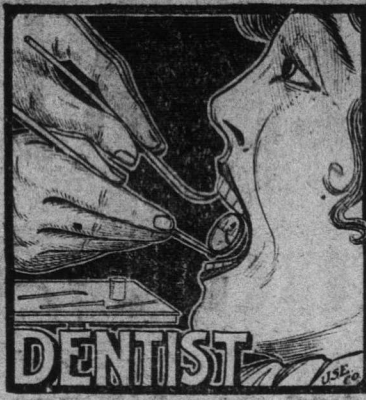

All that piece and parcel of land bounded on the South East by the Bay Bulls Road, and extending along said road from Doyle's Bridge seven miles more or less towards Bay Bulls; thence running South Westerly seven miles more or less at right angles to the general trend of the said Bay Bulls Road; thence about North Westerly seven miles more or less; and thence in a straight line seven miles more or less to the place of commencement. Containing forty-nine square miles more or less.
