

What Some Women Never Learn

A great many married women learn very early in the game the gentle art of husband managing. Quite as many women never learn the art at all. Indeed it is astonishing how many women there are who think they have good brain capacity and who would never question their own ability to run a business, or learn a profession, and yet do not manage in a lifetime of opportunity to learn the ins and outs of one man's character.

Among my acquaintances is a well educated, charming woman who has been married about ten years. Her husband is a splendid man but an incorrigible tease. Although he loves his wife dearly he spends a great deal of time and effort in trying to—as he elegantly puts it—"get her goat." I said "a great deal of effort." I take that back. It requires scarcely any effort at all. So little indeed that I rather wonder it still remains a sport to him. His methods are so obvious that everyone else in the company knows that he is only teasing her, but she always takes it as literally and as seriously as if she never had any experience with his ways before. Being a serious minded person, the teasing troubles her greatly. To stop it, all she has to do is to learn when he is trying to tease her, and not be teased. And she has not been able to do that in ten years. Everyone in the company understands that man—except the one person who has had the most opportunity to study him.

Women who never learn that certain little tricks and habits of theirs irritate and antagonize their husbands are another class which it is difficult to understand. I know of a pathetic little woman who is grieving her heart out because she thinks her husband does not care as much for her as he used to. And yet she keeps on saying and doing certain little things which a child could see irritates him. She interrupts him when he is trying to tell a story; she contradicts him about little details; she asks him questions about his private affairs in public, etc., etc.

Other women make the fatal mistake of weakening their powers of protest by nagging about matters which they cannot ever change, and in their hearts know that they cannot ever change. When they want to protest about some important matter, some matter in which their husbands might really have been influenced by them, the force of their protest is gone.

To study the time of day, the condition and the mood in which a man is most approachable is the A. B. C. of wifely diplomacy. And yet there actually are women who never learn these details, and who broach delicate subjects to their husbands before breakfast or at some other unpropitious moment and then wonder that the interview goes badly.

Wifely diplomacy is an interesting study for any married woman. No woman who has not mastered this course deserves a diploma as a finished student in the great art of home making.

LONDON GOSSIP.

The "All-Red" Route. There is no foundation, I am told, for the report that an order has been given to Messrs. Swan, Hunter, and Wigham Richardson, Wallsend, for the construction of two 25-knot steamers, the purchase price of which, it was said, would barely exceed the cost of the Cunard liner Mauretania, owing to the adoption of some patent tubular system. These boats were proposed to be run between Great Britain and Canada in connection with the "All-Red" route schemes, but unfortunately the True firm has no knowledge of the contract. So far as the project for shortening the distance between the mother country and the Dominion and also providing an express trans-Pacific service is concerned, I believe that satisfactory progress is being made with it. Negotiations are proceeding between the syndicate which has the matter in hand and the Canadian authorities for the laying down of another trans-continental railway and the creation of a port at Cape St. Charles, on the south-east coast of Labrador. Some well-known people are interested in the plans, to carry out which will, however, involve an enormous expenditure.

Protecting the Child.

A humane and necessary statute for the protection of child life in this country, came into operation on September 15. It is the Children (Employment Abroad) Act, and it aims at the suppression of certain abuses by which, under fraudulent and invalid "contracts," very young persons were taken abroad to fulfil mischievous engagements of a highly demoralizing character. The results have been deplorable. Hitherto the recruiting of these child victims has been carried on by bogus "recruiting agents," whose specious advertisements and glowing promises were designed to deceive unsuspecting parents. The new act strikes vigorously at this system. Now no child may proceed to employment abroad without a license issued by a Bow Street Magistrate, who must be satisfied that the contract is fair and reasonable. The application for the license must be accompanied by the consent of the parent or guardian, and the contract must be endorsed by the Consul in London of the country to which the child is proceeding. Every care will be taken to guard against abuse, and even then no license in the first instance runs for more than three months. The new statute, with its salutary provisions, comes none too soon, but it is none the less a notable addition to the code for the protection of children, which has been greatly amplified in the last few years.

A Warning to Architects.

A warning of the play of international incident sends me a tale concerning an architect, an elephant and some diplomatists, which would seem to show that the last-amed class are now reverting to their normal occupations. Commissioned to erect an elephant house for the Budapest Zoo and giving rein to an Oriental fancy, the architect put up a building in the style of a mosque suitably garnished with minarets and Arabic inscriptions. Everyone was delighted till one day an exploring Turk chanced to stroll into the gardens, and perceiving the head of an elephant peering out of the Saracenic interior, promptly rushed off with a report of the desecration to the Ottoman Consul, who in turn reported it to the Turkish Ambassador, who again reported it to the Porte, which finally caused a polite remonstrance to be addressed to Vienna. At first it seems Austria-Hungary was disposed to treat the matter as a joke, but on the representations being repeated in a more energetic tone, the proud Hapsburg Monarchy yielded and an order went forth to the authorities at Budapest to have the offensive mosque dismantled.

The Campaign in Trinity Bay.

Messrs. Lloyd and Stone, together with Mr. Coaker visited Little Catalina on Friday afternoon. Mr. Targrett, of Hant's Harbour, has not yet joined the other candidates. They will meet him at Hant's Harbour on Saturday. The good people of Little Catalina gave the visitors a most hearty greeting. Flags were raised all over the harbor and as they approached the different parts of the harbour salvos of guns greeted them.

A mighty change has come over Little Catalina, not only in respect of the elections in 1909, but even those of 1904, when we won. It is estimated around Little Catalina, that it will take the People's Party all their time to get together seven voters. From Little Catalina we drove to Elliston, on arriving there we saw that flags were flying and our advent was greeted by the firing of many guns. Immediately the people began to gather with flags and lit torches and by the time we had refreshed ourselves with a cup of tea at Mr. Baker's we joined in the procession which had been gotten up to demonstrate in favour of the Coalition of the Liberal Party and Union.

and when these forces at Elliston had come together it was seen there was in reality little or nothing left on the mats for the Pioneers to pick up. At night the hall was packed and many could not gain admittance. Never before was such enthusiasm seen in Elliston at any political meeting. The people were almost delirious with joy with the Coalition, the Liberal Party, the Fishermen's Union, Sir Robert Bond and President Coaker

er and there will be almost a unanimous vote in favour of Lloyd, Stone and Targrett. The meeting lasted over three hours. There was not the slightest sign of opposition. The people are solid here. They have no use whatever for the Morris Party and Squires and his men are down and out at Elliston. Feeling here has undergone a remarkable change. The feeling here in 1904 when we won was not quarter as strong as it is to-day.

And What We Say in Respect of Elliston Applies to the Other Places Visited.

Early on Saturday afternoon we arrived at English Harbour. The visit was a surprise one as we had arranged to cross the bay for a meeting at Hant's Harbour, but the weather was too thick to go there, so we put into English Harbour. As soon as the good people saw the F. P. U. guns were fired and kept up continuously during our stay here, but for the interval of the meeting, when a few scattered guns were fired by those who were crowded out of the Temperance Hall. A thousand shot must have been fired during the afternoon. We landed at 2.30 and we were met by a big crowd, with

A Guard of Honour lined up on Both Sides of the Road.

These men fired a salute as we passed by and then lined up in the procession and escorted us to the Temperance Hall, which was packed to its full capacity and many were unable to obtain admittance. The speakers were Messrs. Coaker, Lloyd and Stone, and the cheering as the speakers made their points showed how the feelings of the fishermen had been stirred by the Union of the Liberal

Party and the F. P. U. Here almost every man is a Union man and they are all enthusiastic for the Coalition and rejoice that Sir Robert Bond is leading the united forces. The Coalition has caught on in this Bay and the Liberal Party never did a thing more popular among the fishermen than to take up the F. P. U. and the main place in its platform. Mr. Coaker made a most convincing speech and there can be no doubt that the fishermen looked upon him as the mysterious man who has worked wonders for them. Mr. Stone as usual spoke fluently and powerfully. There can be no doubt about the fact that he will be a great acquisition to the speaking and deliberation strength of the next House of Assembly. Dr. Lloyd was enthusiastically welcomed as leader of the team and chief representative of the Liberal Party. He delivered a forcible speech on the situation and put them the question whether they were

The Coalition Immensely Popular.

While speaking to a prominent member of the "People's Party," we were told that the Liberal Party had made the biggest mistake in the world by co-operating with the Fishermen's Protective Union, and that the Union had spoiled its chances of popular support by joining with the Liberal Party. We were told that it was impossible for the Union to co-operate with a political party, and that like oil and water they could not mix. Our retort to this is that we shall be content if the political oil floats on the political waters and kills out the breed of mosquitoes which suck the good out of the body politic. Political mosquitoes have played havoc with the People's Party and so disgusted the people by their greed that they are disgusted and are determined to turn them out neck and crop on the 30th of October. Our experience, however, in Trinity is that the people do not regard the amalgamation of the Fishermen's Protective Union and the Liberal Party as an attempt to mix oil and water. They regard it rather as the union of two drops of water which approach so near together that the force of nature does the rest and unites them in one drop, the particles of which so coalesce that it is impossible by any test known to scientists to distinguish one from the other. There can be no manner of doubt, whatever, that the Coalition is immensely popular in Trinity Bay, and that it has added immensely to the popularity of the Opposition and most immeasurably strengthened it. We have had abundant evidence and opportunity now of testing it in private conversation, in speeches at public meetings and by vote, and we find the people are overwhelmingly in favor of it. The Fishermen's Protective Union has a firm hold of the District. The work of Mr. Coaker is universally esteemed and he is considered to have crowned his work by joining with the popular Liberal Party and inducing Sir Robert Bond to lead. Union fishermen, not all workers' combination, but in political parties, and the Coalition has caught on in Trinity Bay. What we were told before we entered Trinity, has been verified fully where we have visited and that is almost all the north side of the Bay, and this is assurance that it is equally true of the south side of the District. A mighty change is in progress and those in the city will have their eyes opened wide when they see the votes polled north by the Coalition. At present we say keep your eyes on Bonavista and you will see the surprise of the elections.

It was one of the finest meetings we have ever attended. The close attention, the deep interest, the kindness of the feelings, the eagerness to seize the points made by the speaker, the intelligence displayed in following the argument, the joy it gave the audience to applaud the speaker, made the meeting an ideal one to address. The like of this meeting was never held here before. Mr. Coaker spoke for an hour and a half. Everywhere people flocked to hear him and are delighted to see him. His speeches never fall on his hearers. His power of appeal is great. There is much magnetism in his personality, and the facts with which he deals come close home to the fisherman's heart. He deals with the common rounds of their daily life and his devotion to their interests is unmistakable. Mr. Stone followed in a pleasant speech which convinced his hearers that the Voters of Trinity Bay have done well to place him on the team, and that their interests demand his presence in the House of Assembly. Dr. Lloyd was the last speaker and spoke for nearly an hour, and was warmly welcomed. He dwelt on the coalition under the leadership of Sir Robert Bond, the value of the Fishermen's Protective Union to the fishermen, the political activities of the union, the amalgamation and the reasons why the people had made their minds to turn out the Government Grabbals. His speech was punctuated frequently with applause and he sat down amidst the plaudits of the assembly. Mr. Coaker then asked the meeting.

As far as we could see every man voted in favor of it, and when he asked them who disapproved of it to raise their hands not one hand in that vast audience was raised. Cheers were then given for the Party, the leader of the candidates and the meeting closed with the National Anthem.

A constant fusillade was kept up during our stay at Trinity and we observed that wherever a flag could be hoisted one was hoisted. We informed them that we had seen the s.s. Kintail enter English Harbour and that she would be along shortly to land the flour that they had ordered from St. John's.

We also invited them over to New Bonaventure to attend a meeting at night. We left them amidst much cheering and a great firing of guns, and made for New Bonaventure and left information with a man making in from the grounds, that we would be there later for a meeting and that the Kintail was behind us with their flour. Then launched out again for English Harbour. As soon as the good people caught sight of us, a gun gave the news, and as we entered the harbor guns were fired from every part of it and flags were hoisted wherever there was a flag staff or a mast. Indeed in some cases sticks were specially stuck in the ground and flags hoisted on them. So anxious were the fishermen to greet us

That putmen on the grounds hoisted their flag.

if they had one on board, and if they had not, hoisted their oilclothes and waved their caps and cheered as we passed them. We have been in the harbor an hour and a half and had dinner before we land. During the whole of that time guns were firing every few minutes and just now a boat load of cheering men have come in in holiday attire and with flags from Pope's Harbor. Everywhere we have been since leaving St. John's, the reception has been remarkably enthusiastic. In past political campaigns we have never seen

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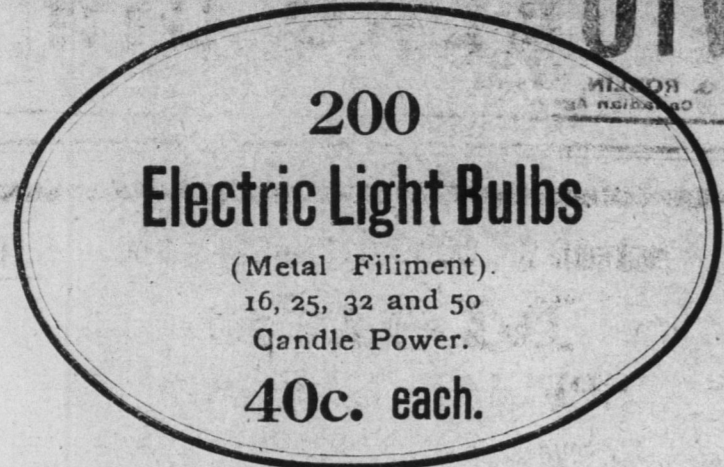

BERLIN, Sept. 30.
The bride of King Manuel is seriously ill, so much so that all suggestions of her taking up residence in England for a month or two are out of the question.

ROME, Sept. 30.
The Italian government, when Parliament opens a month hence, will ask an additional \$20,000,000 for naval construction. Four super-Dreadnoughts of 28,000 tons each will be laid down in December, and built as speedily as possible.

HALIFAX, Sept. 30.
Dr. Grenfell's Mission schooner, George B. Cluett, arrived this morning from Boston, and will take freight here for Labrador.

ST. THOMAS, Ont., Sept. 30.
While running 45 miles an hour, the fast Wabash train from Chicago to New York was derailed near Ren-ton, a small station, a few miles east of Simcoe, this morning. Fifteen passengers were injured, nine fatally. Five coaches were thrown down an embankment.

LONDON, Sept. 30.
The Daily Mail's Sofia correspondent gives the following figures, furnished by the Minister of War, of the Bulgarians killed during the two Balkan wars: In the war with Turkey, officers 313 killed, 915 wounded; men, 29,711 killed, 62,850 wounded, and 3,173 missing. With Serbia and Greece, 226 officers killed, and 14,602 men killed; 50,205 wounded and 3,500 missing. Of the wounded it is estimated that 10,000 are cripples or invalids for life.

DOVER, Sept. 30.
Another of England's famous historic homes was destroyed by fire last night, when Waldershare Park Mansion, the residence of the Earl of Galloway, between Canterbury and Dover, was burned to the ground. The Earl, who was in residence saved many valuable oil paintings from the picture gallery, and some ancient furniture. No evidence of the origin of the fire.

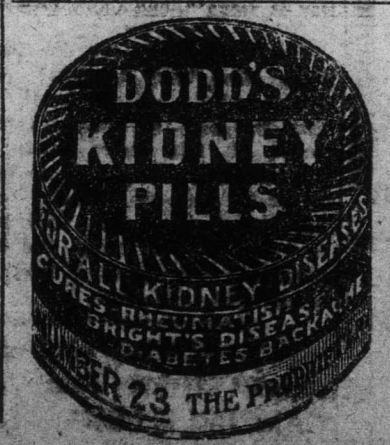

NEW YORK, To-day. Messages telling of the abandonment at sea of the burning steamer Templemore, and the rescue of her crew by the Arcadia, have been received here. The Templemore flashed a wireless call for aid which Captain Boldt, of the Arcadia, promptly heeded, reaching the burning vessel just in the nick of time. The transfer of the crew was effected before daylight while the ocean for miles around were lighted up by the flames.

LONDON, To-day. While reports from Belgrade seek to minimize the trouble in Albania, news from Avlona indicates that the outbreaks are formidable and will afford all Serbia's powers to overcome it. Albanians reported to have won successive victories from Dibrë to Gostivar. Albanian operations against Kruja and Ochrina progressing successfully. A Few Questions Voter Wants Answered.

8. How much brains did Morris use on the Herring Arbitration? We know how much brains he used in drawing his tremendous ten thousand dollar fee!

9. In 1904 the Daily News said: "Morris is Minister of Justice, getting \$2,000 a year and \$6,000 on Arbitrations. The News has said that at the time he was in the pay of the Rats and has challenged denial." Why, has not Morris denied this charge? Does Morris and does McGrath think that the people do not want an explanation? If Morris is a "brainy" statesman he will explain this!
