"The reason the Turks continue to fight in spite of wholesale casualties is because they fear the Germans. Every time the Turks charge from a trench there are machineguns behind that blaze into the trench if it is not immediately evacuated. Turkish gunners are now chained to their guns. I have these facts directly from Turkish officers we have captured. The German officers refuse to

speak. "The difficulties the Allies are fightiing under are tremendous. All the water must be brought from the ships in the tanks, gullies and ravines have to be bridged to allow the men and guns to cross. There is a plague of flies and there are no regular hospitals just clearing points for wound-

"But once Achi Baba is taken the Dardanelles are forced. As to pending developments it is significant that within six weeks there will be weather conditions which will compel the Allies to advance or leave the They will never leave. Just after the fleet had left the Aegean the Turkish and German aviators pamphleted our lines with the information that the torrential rains were soon due, making trench life on the peninsula impossible. They also told us in atrocious English that the fleet had deserted us.

Monitors Useful.

"There are now two monitors with the Allies, and although they draw only three feet of water, they have seventeen inch guns aboard, which they fire at Achi Baba. The Turks cannot reply, as the monitors are under the cliffs close inshore and out of sight. Three German submarines were in operation when I left. There was also a brand new one, but we captured it. Their presence rendered the Triumph was an instance of this. These warships was surrounded by about thirty small craft and completely shielded by netting. This Date

DEAN MILMAN died 1868, aged 77, of St. Paul's, London. He published in 1830 the "History of the Jews." treating his subject historically and subordinating the importance of miracles. Old Perliean Nofes.

Our cod fishery here is drawing to a close: with the traps it has been a line it has been very poor indeed. It has not altogether closed as some of our men with motor boats go down into the "Tickle," when weather permits, but the catches of fish which they obtain are not up to those of last year. Four of our schooner masters were at the Labrador this year and they have all arrived home safe and with good catches of cod

Our first arrival was Captain Thos. Strong, schooner Austin, with about 400 otls: then came Capt. Ananias March, schooner Hilda Blanche, with 350 qtls., and the two Rodgers, Capts. James and Samson, arrived yesterday hailing for 350 & 300 qtls., respect-

This Fall has been a very rough one here, during the latter part of last week the sea was mountains high, the oldest inhabitants of the place said they never saw the like. During the heavy sea some of the fishermen met with misfortunes, as their fishing skiffs were driven on shore, but there was no serious loss, with the exception of one, and that was by a man named Mundon March whose skiff was split in two pieces by a heavy sea.

After the sea had abated somewhat the people of this place were rather surprised to hear of a small school of caplin striking the shore; one of two persons obtained quite a number of these small fishes.

Again the time has come around for partridge berry picking, and quite a number of our old folk as well as the young, are busy on the barrens mak-Although the ing their harvest. weather is very cold and stormy, the people are continually berry-picking. The price of berries is very low, they gallon, which is very unreasonable.

By Saturday night's Ethie there arrived a couple of sports from the city who have been very busy since their arrival with their gun and dog. The first day's shooting did not come up to expectations, as some of the sportsmen did not obtain a single bird, while others secured from four, to eight birds.

Our only landing place, the pier, has been altogether demolished of late, and the mystery is to see where the passengers arriving here by the Ethie and Prospero are going to land, if there is any wind or sea it is impossible for them to do so here. There is no doubt if we do not soon get the train here this place will suffer considerably.

Two or three of our local men are now buying codfish for the merchants of the city, and by competition the price of fish is going up. I think the latest offer for cod being \$6.00 per qtl. X. Y. Z.




