

GERMANY'S SUPER WARRIORS.

SPA., Belgium, Dec. 16. The former headquarters of the Kaiser's and his general staff is disclosing some extraordinarily queer facts these days, aboupt the men who engineered the world war. Take one. Hindenburg, Germany's superman, around whom reams of poetry have been written, disclosing him as a fearless Napoleon leading his troops to victory. As a matter of fact he spent a great deal of time in a wonderfully constructed "funk hole," or dugout, underneath the grounds of his villa here. Spa, it may be noted, is almost on the German border, and so far from where battle lines used to be, that it was almost a day's journey in a fast motor car to get within sound of the big guns. The Kaiser, too had a similar hiding place at Neubois, near a comic opera trench system, about which he is said to have par aded for the benefit of motion pictures. At each of their villas there were delicate electrical instruments which would set up a furious buzzing, when ever an airplane approached anywhere near. The Fishing Industry.

A Canadian whaling company on the Pacific coast reports a catch of 999 whales, or 126 more than in the preceding year. As compared with this, Norwegian whalers caught during the year ending August last 736 whales, the oil from which is valued at \$1,800,000. As a result of the demand for whale meat a cannery has been established in British Columbia. from which over 1,000 tons have been shipped to Samoa and Fiji, while orders for 1.000 tons from the United States are in course of execution. In Newfoundland, as a result of the armistice, deliveries of codfish have been heavy. Fishermen, who were holding back for a rise of prices in the spring, in expectation of the war continuing, are selling their stocks as rapidly as the weather will nermit. Big shipments of frozen fish are being

made to Great Britain. pounds of flat fish other than halibut from the Pacific coast have been sold in Canada since the Food Board first arranged for the sale of this class of fish in March 1918. 



### Fishery Award. It is interesting to recall that the

Halifax fishery award in favor of Canada was paid in London by the United States minister about forty years ago. The fisheries of Canada and the United States had been made free to the citizens of both countries by the treaty of 1871, but it was agreed that Canada should be paid a sum commensurate with the difference in value. An arbitration commission was appointed to fix the sum to be paid. Sir Alexander Galt was chosen to represent Canada, and Mr. E. T. Kellogg acted for the United States, while the deciding vote was left with M. Delfosse, the Belgnan minister to the United States. The commission met in Halifax in June 1877, and reached an agreement the following November, whereby the United States was to pay \$5,500,000, Mr. Kellogg dissenting. The justice of this award was

strongly questioned in the United States, the people having become accustomed to getting the best of disputes with Canada, but Congress, to its credit, promptly voted an appropriation for its payment. The entire sum did not go to Canada, as is often stated for the Dominion received \$4,-490,882 as its share, the remainder going to Newfoundland. In the light of subsequent events, the award of \$5,500,000 as the value of the fishing privilege above the reciprocal clauses of the treaty was eminently just—Ex.

### Toll Britain Paid.

(From the New York Tribune.) Americans can be profoundly thankful that no such casualty list as Britain's has been their lot in the war. But they must as well be profoundly humble. The toll that Britain paid in fighting our war for almost four years before we took up our full burden in it, the even greater toll that France paid, makes our contribution to the cause of civilization seem small indeed. British dead number 658,000. The French list has never been published, but the smallest estimate is over 100,000. Our reported dead, from all causes, are but 28.900. and can hardly reach a total of 40,000. Italy's dead are far more. So are Serbia's and Roumania's. Even tiny Belgium's casualty list must surely pass ours. There can be no regret or selfblame for the fashion in which Americans have fought in the war once the nation accepted its responsibilities; there can be regret that these responsibilities were so long unrealized. There must also be in every fair-minded American a hesitation to offer cock-sure opinions to the Allies touching the solution of the war's problems. Are we entitled to rush in with advice and urgent demands in a dispute which for two yeears and a half, while Britons and Frenchmen were dying by the hundred thousand, our governmental head assured us was no concern of ours? Did our leaders show such vision and wisdom in analyzing the causes of the war and determining its issue as to warrant our speaking with confidence in the settlement of its problems? Is it ours to set ourselves, up as seers and prophets? Or should we rather be helpful aids to those who bore the bur-

### High Prices.

Establishment of a price of \$23.50 for Scotch cured Newfoundland herring through the purchase of a New York importer may have upset the calculations of the trade here, for there were none up to a week ago who were prepared to pay more than \$20. in the outports. It is possible that the purchase was ill-timed, in view of the high prices which have been paid at Green Bay by American vessels loading bulk herring there. When fishermen can sell their herring from the nets to these vessels at a premium, an additional premium is usually exacted from the ready purchasers, of cured herring also. At other Newfoundland points it is reported that sales have been made at \$21 and \$22 per barrel, and the price of fresh herring at these points is far lower than that at Green Bay. The time for packing Scotch cure is limited to be sure, but a price of \$23.50 does not seem to be justified, and there is hope that the price may yet come down. In the opinion of those who stand ready to buy, this high level will have to be reduced. The jobbing trade of New York is not likely to buy herring at \$38 or \$40 per barrel here, especially when the consumption demand has gradually decreased as a result of the already established high prices. It is questionable whether Newfoundland Scotch pack herring will sell in New York at anything like these levels when it is possible to buy Alaska herring at so much less .-N. Y. Fishing Gazette.

#### Salt and Pickled Herring.

The slackened demand for salt fish has nowhere been more felt than in the salt and pickled herring department. There has been practically no movement that cannot be described as hand-to-mouth business, and there has been no feature in the market to give it other than a negative character. Split herring of Newfoundland pack has been moving better than most other varities but this has been selling in so small a way during the past few weeks that holders are not urging its sale. The prevailing prices are unchanged, but with many they are nominal figures at present, for there have been no sales to confirm them. As to Nova Scotia herring, there is practically no demand. It may be said of the jobbing trade that it has eschewed this variety entirely, and there are only a few sales reported at marked concessions in price. Importations have been comparatively light, and exports have been small. The aggregate of stocks of split herring on the spot in New York would not total more than a few thousand barrels. Merchants are not looking for any immediate improvement in the situation, but it is expected that there will be a normal demand again after the holidays. Round herring is in light supply and there is only a trifling demand for it at the quoted prices of from \$11 to \$13 for nedium and large, respectively. Marinated herring continues to sell in a small way at \$1.30 to \$1.50 for 10pound pails.-N. Y. Fishing Gazette.
