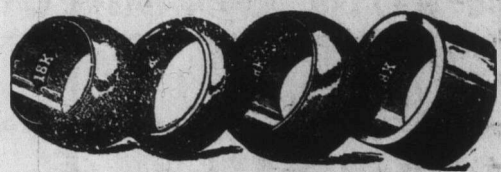

French Evacuating Frankfort

More Hun War Craft Under Transfer -- China Verging on Civil War -- Arabs Object to Zionist Movement -- Political Assassination in Ulster -- United States Railway Strike Drawing to a Close.

FRENCH DIVISION WITHDRAWING

FRANKFORT, April 17. General De Metz with the thirty-seventh division of the French Army of Occupation on the right of the Rhine will withdraw from Frankfort to Wiesbaden next Sunday, according to an announcement made at the French Military Headquarters. The entente division under General Vidalon and the Belgian troops will remain in the newly occupied territory.

HANDLING OVER WARSHIPS.

LONDON, April 17. One German battleship and six torpedo boats allocated to France under the Peace Treaty will leave Kiel today to be delivered to the French Government. The battleships Olenburg and Posen will be delivered April 28 at Rosyth, Scotland.

ANOTHER STRIKE IN ITALY.

MILAN, April 17. The newspapers announce that the general strike initiated in Turin has spread throughout the entire Province. The railway service is being maintained but the number of trains has been greatly reduced. The postal telegraph and telephone services have suspended.

POLITICAL TROUBLES IN GREECE.

ATHENS, April 17. A decree has been officially published proroguing the Chamber for three months. The Opposition Coalition has prepared a manifesto to the people of Greece declaring that the present Chamber is constitutionally non-existent. It demands that special elections be held immediately.

CIVIL WAR IMMINENT IN CHINA.

SHANGHAI, April 17. Serious disturbances have occurred in the Province of Honan and Civil War is imminent, according to advices received by Chinese officials here.

This situation, it is said, is the result of the change of Tughans or Military Governors in the Province by the Peking Government.

THE PALESTINE.

LONDON, April 17.

The Zionists organization announces it is reliably informed from Palestine that the Arabs have demanded the suppression of the Zionist Commission in Palestine within five days, the expulsion of its leaders and the disbandment of Jewish Battalion threatening a massacre of Jews if the demands are not carried out. Zionist reports say the Palestine Administration agreed to accede to the demands but that Field Marshal Viscount Allenby, Commander of the British Forces in Palestine, vetoed the decision.

STRIKERS RETURNING TO WORK

NEW YORK, April 17.

A speedy termination of the transportation tie-up, brought on by unauthorized strikes of railroad workers throughout the United States seemed assured to-day. Switchmen and other employees of the Pennsylvania, Reading and Baltimore and Ohio Lines in Philadelphia district, one of the eastern strongholds of the strike, were returning to work by morning under orders of their strike leaders. The work order affects strikers on all lines between Boston and Washington, including those in the New York district, as the Pennsylvania Strike Committee had been authorized to negotiate for all strikers in the east. The Philadelphia settlement was effected on a basis of promise from the Pennsylvania and Baltimore and Ohio officials, that returning strikers would be permitted to retain their seniority ranking, and would be free from all discrimination because of their having gone out. Strikers at Baltimore, another eastern stronghold, also, were returning this morning, having voted last night to end their strike. In the New York district railroad officials declared men were returning rapidly, and reports from all sections of the country also indicated that the swing back to work was fast gaining momentum. This was reflected both in the increased amount of traffic handled by the lines and loss of enthusiasm for the strike apparent in the attitude of many of the strikers.

MURDER IN ULSTER.

BELFAST, April 17.

What is believed to be the first political assassination on the Ulster border occurred last last evening, when Thomas Mulholland of Dundalk was shot on the street there and died an hour later. Mulholland made a statement to the stretcher bearer Mekeever. He declared he saw two policemen nearby, and called to them, but they proceeded towards the barracks.

D'ANNUNZIO IGNORED.

FIUME, April 17.

Captain Gabriele D'Annunzio has been completely ignored by the Fiumian National Council in the formulation of demands for settlement of the problems relative to the future status of this city. Delegates, appointed by the Council, will meet Premier Nitti and carry on direct negotiations with the Italian Government. Three of these delegates are already in Rome.

A GRUESOME DISCOVERY.

BUCHAREST, April 17.

The discovery on the Yacht Ostara, stranded at Sulina, in one of the mouths of the Danube, of dead bodies of eleven noted Russian men and women, each shot through the head, and not a living soul on board, has presented to the Roumanian authorities one of most mysterious tragedies of Bolshevism in the Black Sea. The bodies have been identified as those of members of the noted Russian families of Falsfein and Skakowsky. The discovery was made by soldiers when they went aboard the help to get out the cabin half filled with water. Eleven bodies float around on board the wreck, and public in gold and paper and jewels.

AT VLADIVOSTOCK.

VLADIVOSTOCK, April 10.

(Delayed by Associated Press.) Heavy fighting between Russian and Japanese forces continues at Khabarovsk on the Amur River, and casualties, suffered by each side, are heavy, according to reports received here.

Marine Court Finding.

Sea Captains, Owners and Marine Insurance Agents, should be interested in perusing carefully the text of the finding of the Marine Court of Enquiry in the loss of the motor propelled vessel Dellecna. The evidence adduced at this Enquiry and borne out by the Court, proved that the vessel was not in a seaworthy condition when the ship put out on her final voyage, and that the executive staff on deck and in the engine room were not thoroughly competent. The Navigation laws of Newfoundland are too lax altogether and should be made more stringent. Every ship clearing from any port in Newfoundland for a voyage, whether registered in St. John's or not, should carry a full complement of certified officers in both navigating and engine room departments.

The Passing of Another Veteran.

Private John Devereaux Laid to Rest Yesterday.

The members of the Great War Veterans' Association of Newfoundland were deeply grieved to hear on Saturday that another comrade of the world war had passed away to the Vague Unknown in the person of the late ex-Pte. John Devereaux, of Ferryland. The latter had duly enlisted with the Royal Nfld. Regiment, and during the last months of his service contracted the disease which brought him to death's door, and from which he never recovered. He passed away at Jensen Camp, and the remains were brought to the mortuary chambers of Mr. J. C. Oke, on Saturday. The Great War Veterans remembered their old comrade, and a beautiful cross of Easter lilies and another floral tribute showed the respect of the organization to a friend who had gone West into the golden glow of the sunset. The funeral took place on Saturday night at 11 o'clock from Mr. Oke's building, and was attended by Mr. P. A. O'Brien, Secretary G.W.V.A., Capt. Leo Murphy and several other veterans who were friends of the deceased; the coffin was brought to the premises of A. Goodridge & Sons, where a motor boat was in waiting, and the remains were conveyed to Ferryland where interment took place yesterday afternoon.

MRS. MARGARET CHANCEY.

On Saturday night, at 10 o'clock, Mrs. Margaret Chancey, relict of the late Sheriff Chancey, passed away at the great age of 82 years, after an illness of very long duration. Mrs. Chancey was prominent in Church and philanthropic service, in which she was actively engaged until past her 80th year. Her connection with the late Lady Thorburn, late Mrs. J. E. Peters and others of her contemporaries in the W.C.T.U., and the Poor Asylum Mission, is still remembered with appreciation and gratitude. In the Congregational Church she was a mother, and with her husband, was untiring in effort and zeal. The funeral took place at 2.30 this afternoon from the residence of Mr. J. S. Currie, Monkstown Road. The sympathy of the Telegram is extended to the bereaved relatives.

Ranger's Men.

Disapprove Capt. Windsor's Action.

Some members of the crew of the S.S. Ranger called at the Telegram office to-day and asked us to state that it was on the seventh day of April that the strike of the 120 men of the ship's crew began, although Capt. Windsor said in his statement that it began on March 27th. Further no men were stopped from getting over the ship's side on the date of the strike, as there was nothing to get over for. The crew was satisfied to work the ship to port the 15th inst., after which their articles would expire. "The act of Capt. Windsor in landing us at Catalina, where we got fed on very little hard tack and tea, was not that of a hero," said the men. "In leaving us thus he thought he was doing great, but we were too wise for him. All the blame was laid to the ex-Soldiers and sailors, but these put honors to their names at other places than to the icefields, where Capt. Windsor would have found it hot enough to suit him had he been there."

Side Talks by Ruth Cameron

HOW THE MOVIES HELP—AND HARM.

One hears so very much said from time to time about the effect of the movies on children that I want to present an interesting point of view that a school teacher gave me the other day. She taught last year in a remote country district and this year in a city. I asked her if she found the children different. "Very," she said. "The city children have a much larger background of general information than the country children."

When I asked to what this was due, she said to the greater stimulation of city life, to the shops and—as you have already guessed—most of all to the movies.

Geography Becomes Real. Geography, she said, was the study which got the most help from the moving pictures. The theatres present pictures from every country in the world and what would be bare names on the map to the country child, to the city child link up with some pictures of far lands that he has seen.

History also is illumined by the screen. Greek or Roman history is far more vivid to children who have seen some of the figures of Greek and Roman myth and history in the garb of the ancient times. And think of the reality that some of the historical plays gives to American history.

Teaching the Child to Talk Well. "Oral English," she went on to say, also gained much stimulus from the movies. "Oral English—let it be explained for the sake of those who are not in touch with the latest in education—is the big idea at just this time, and a mighty good one, I think. It consists in training the child to get up on his feet and talk intelligently and in good English about something that interests him. The teachers have found that there is nothing about which the speaker will talk so well, or the audience listen so well, as the movies.

As many of them have seen what the speaker has seen, they are on their tiptoes to prompt, or correct, or he has to be on his tiptoes to avoid correction.

So much for ways in which the movies have helped.

Naturally, I asked if there were anything in the other side of the scales.

On the Other Side. "Oh, yes," she said. "One day at recess a little boy in the first grade tied a little boy in the second grade (the aggressor must have been an up-and-coming child!) to the fence and frightened him almost into a faint by shooting a pistol, loaded with a blank cartridge at him. Upon questioning, we found he had seen something like that in a Wild West movie."

The teacher's whole conclusion was that it was the mother's duty to know something of the nature of the shows her children were seeing, and that then—used in the right way—the movies were a great educational force.

Especially is this the case at meal-times. If we are not happy, we are not likely to be hungry. Good digestion, it has been said, waits on appetite. Therefore, if we are wise, we shall take every precaution to render ourselves as happy as we can.

A good rule is never to indulge in any kind of discussion at meal-times. Political and religious problems are particularly to be avoided. These topics have always set people by the ears, and always will. Agreement on such themes is mainly a matter of temperament. People of different temperaments will approach them from different angles.

People sometimes say they are glad they did not live in the Middle Ages. They feel afraid lest they should have been burnt as heretics or massacred as martyrs. They forget that the Middle Ages produced the noblest of all callings—that of the jester.

It was the jester's duty to put at their ease all who gathered round the board. By his sudden sallies of wit and mirth he banished dullness, and made heated controversy impossible. Unlike the doctors, he never killed anyone.

Gone, alas, are the Touchstones of other days! Theirs was a noble task, nobly fulfilled. But if we cannot engage a jester to make us merry, we can at least banish frowns and grumbles at table.

Harsh words and ill-feeling may be as deadly almost as germs. Silence, if it be the silence of real friendship, is a blessing. But gloom and rancour will spoil the best digestions.

Official Correspondence.

FROM MEMBERS OF THE OPPOSITION TO HIS EXCELLENCY THE GOVERNOR.

St. John's, April 15, 1920.

His Excellency, Sir Chas. Alexander Harris, K.C.M.G., K.C.V.O., etc., etc., Governor of Newfoundland:

Sir,—We, the undersigned members of Your Excellency's Opposition Party in the House of Assembly, beg to draw the attention of Your Excellency to the following facts:

In January last a petition was presented to the Supreme Court complaining of the undue return of Mr. William Woodford as Member for the electoral district of St. John's; and alleging that Mr. Woodford had been guilty of certain corrupt and illegal practices. The trial of this petition was set down for hearing in the Supreme Court on the 18th March. On the morning of the hearing the Hon. M. P. Gibbs, K.C., Counsel for the petitioner, addressed the Court, consisting of The Hon. The Chief Justice and Mr. Justice Kent, and moved for the withdrawal of the petition. Their Lordships intimated that in accordance with the English practice, which they held to apply in this Colony, a motion for withdrawal could not be entertained until certain preliminary requirements had been complied with, including the filing of affidavits by all the parties to the petition and their solicitors, showing whether or not any collusion or agreement existed. Afterwards, although no notice of the application to withdraw was given, affidavits from the petitioner and from Mr. Gibbs' junior partner, Mr. Barron, were filed deposing that no agreement had been made

to the best of their respective knowledge and belief; and that the reason for the withdrawal of the petition was that Mr. Woodford had resigned his seat. Some days afterwards, the Court having in the meantime delivered a formal written judgment as to the requirements to be followed in such matters, the Solicitors for Mr. Woodford and Mr. Woodford himself filed affidavits. Mr. Woodford's affidavit was filed on March 24th last; and a copy of it is hereto annexed for Your Excellency's information.

Nothing further transpired until April 1st, when Counsel for Mr. Woodford moved in Court for a certificate of indemnity to be granted to Mr. Woodford with respect to the matters disclosed by his said affidavit. After hearing Counsel on this motion the Court directed the Registrar to forward to the Attorney General copies of the various affidavits that had been filed in the matter; and the Registrar did so. The Attorney General has not taken any steps to prosecute or otherwise deal with the charges contained in the Woodford affidavit.

We have waited patiently and in vain for this matter to be dealt with by the proper authorities; and now we find that Your Excellency has called the Legislature to meet on April 20th.

We have to publicly and respectfully but firm insistence indicate to Your Excellency that this affidavit of Mr. Woodford's asserts that Your Excellency's Prime Minister, Mr. R. A. Squires, and a Member of Your Excellency's Legislative Council, Mr. M. P. Gibbs, have been guilty of what is in law a criminal act, and what is of even greater concern have been guilty of a gross transgression of public morals. They are, therefore, unfit and un-

worthy to occupy the public positions that they now hold.

We call upon Your Excellency, and we believe that we have the endorsement of the entire public in making this call, to deal with this matter at once, and not to permit the Legislature to open under a Prime Minister who stands charged with such an offence unless and until the charge is satisfactorily disproved.

For the present we make no comment upon the inactivity of Your Excellency's Attorney General.

I beg to submit on behalf of my colleagues and myself that it is essentially a matter for action by Your Excellency, independently of your advisers; and further to emphasize our respectful, but firm, insistence that your present Prime Minister ought not be permitted to sit in the House of Assembly for one minute only, unless and until he has satisfactorily cleared himself of the charge of misconduct under which he now lies.

A Plea for Shorter Hours.

Editor Evening Telegram

Dear Sir,—Is it not about time that some one arose and explained why it is that the office hours of the Government telegraph and Postal telegraph operators have not been shortened as promised by the late administration. As I remember, it is more than six months since the Telegraphers' Strike took place for increased pay and shorter hours. Both of these conditions, it is understood, were agreed to. The first has been carried into effect, but why the second has been allowed to remain in obedience is a matter of surprise to the public, as well as to the members of the service so deeply affected. It seems to be a remnant of the slavery days that obliges one class of Civil Servants to put in a twelve hours day, while of all the others only from five to eight hours are required.

True it is that tidewaters also are supposed to give a twelve hour day service, from 6 a. m. to 6 p. m., but in some of the outports at any rate, this law does not seem to apply. Whether it be by permission of their superior officer—the collector of customs—or through force of circumstances,—no work—it is not unusual to find the tidewater in certain ports putting in only about half their time, while if a postal telegraph official is only twenty minutes late in arriving at his or her office where he or she has to remain confined to his or her work for twelve hours, some very busy members of the community tumble over themselves in their haste to report this serious breach of duty to headquarters. I am no apologist for the postal telegraphic officials of this Dominion, but in all justice and fair play, I think that they are entitled to a square deal, and that their daily hours of service should be limited to eight at most, and that the Government should keep faith with them in the promise made by their predecessors for shorter hours. The following letter, signed "Outport," published in your paper last March, sets forth pretty plainly the case for the P. T. officials, and shows that their demand for shorter hours is fully warranted by facts.

LONG HOURS.

Editor Evening Telegram

Dear Sir,—We hear a lot on the street and read more in the newspapers of the eight-hour day, which seems to be the standard time set for labour throughout the world. But what of the outport postal telegraph officials of this country who are confined to their offices from nine o'clock in the morning until eight at night, and oftentimes much later? Is the twelve hour a day drudgery still to be exacted of these poorly paid members of the Civil Servants while the hours of every other class of labourers, whether Government or otherwise, are so limited or curtailed as to permit of exercise and recreation so necessary to health and personal well-being. Most of the postal telegraph officials in this country, it should be remembered, are of the gentler sex, whose weaker constitutions should not be subjected to the severe test of a close, continuous and painstaking application for twelve hours out of the twenty-four, thus allowing no time for needed recreation. It is contrary to all the laws of hygiene and should be remedied without delay. This is a case where the Ladies' Branch of the N. I. W. A. could, perhaps, do good service.

Does Prohibition Prohibit ?

The Case for the Moderates.

LAWS THAT CANNOT BE ENFORCED.

(By WARWICK SMITH.)

Article VI.

It ought to be a waste of time to reiterate the axiom that in democratic countries no law of general application can be long enforced against the desires of a majority of the people. But there are some people who think themselves so much superior to the common herd that they would force their ideas down other people's throats. This is the Prussian method. Some of the results of the Prussian method are admirable, but most of them have failed to stand the test. Yet there is no doubt that the Kaiser was patriotic and thought he was doing all he did for the good of the people whom he ruled.

Now, let us take just one law of general application which is observed in the breach. I refer to the Lotteries Act. This is a law which is of the extreme kind, like Prohibition. In practice it is broken consistently. At the same time, curious to say, it is a certain extent under the control of public opinion. What I mean is this: There is no regular, systematic business carried on in lotteries. There

are the "Sealing Sweepstakes," but these are mostly under the control of clubs and the proceeds go towards the upkeep of social institutions. The few that are run as commercial speculations are steadily losing favour. I have seen a wheel-of-fortune operated at a social gathering but the proceeds were intended for a philanthropic purpose. On the other hand the wheel-of-fortune has disappeared from the race-course and certain parties who were operating a game of chance known as "Crown and Anchor" were arrested in Bannerman Park.

Now it is against the law to run any kind of lottery or to sell lottery tickets, yet tens of thousands of tickets are sold every year. The clubs that run these lotteries are the best and most respectable in the community. The men who purchase tickets are the most highly respected in the land and there is scarcely a single religious denomination in the country the adherents of which do not sometimes take a ticket. I know a clergyman's wife who won a prize in a lottery, and as

for lawyers, doctors, merchants, schoolmasters and schoolmistresses, yes and school-children who take a chance, they are more numerous than the spots on a crackle—I mean coach-dog.

The Inspector General of Police has expressed himself as ready and willing to prosecute anyone who breaks the Lotteries Act. All he is waiting for is for someone to lay an information. Who is going to do it? Who will take the risk of seeing his friends cut him dead on the street and his boss finding it necessary to disown him with his service? The good people, who framed the law and who would fight to keep it on the Statute Book, know I am speaking the truth. They all know the facts and can easily get the evidence. Yet none of them will dare lay an information. What is the trouble? What are they afraid of? The answer is Public Opinion.

Newfoundlanders Lost From N. S. Trawler.

Two Newfoundlanders, Michael Drake, of St. Lawrence, and F. Tippet, of this city, belonging to the crew of the Nova Scotia steamer trawler M.F. B., are missing, and believed lost, since the sinking of that ship off Halifax a fortnight ago. The trawler left Liverpool, N.S., on Monday, March 29th for the Banks. After a successful week the trawler left the grounds for Halifax to take on bunker coal. When about 35 miles off that port, the ship was found to be leaking aft. The pumps were started, but were unable to cope with the inflow of water. After about three hours the water reached the engine room and put out the fire. Capt. Kramp decided it was useless to stand by the ship, so orders were given and two lifeboats and a dory were launched.

Before leaving the ship between 8.30 and 8.45 o'clock, efforts were made by flares and rockets to attract attention of other craft, and when the men took to the boats the trawler's decks were almost awash. The weather began to become stormy and the three boats hauled away, and headed for land. In each of the two lifeboats there were eight men, Captain Kramp being in charge of one, and First Officer Turner of the other, the remaining four men leaving in the dory. The three boats kept together for several hours, and Capt. Kramp says that he last saw the other lifeboat about ten o'clock.

She has not since been heard of and is given over for lost. The two Newfoundlanders above named were aboard her. Another Newfoundland-er, John Burton, of St. Lawrence, was a member of the crew, but he was saved.

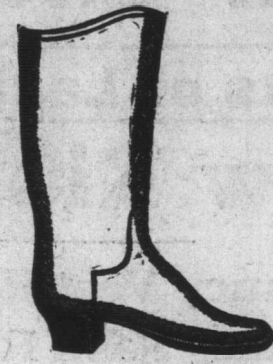

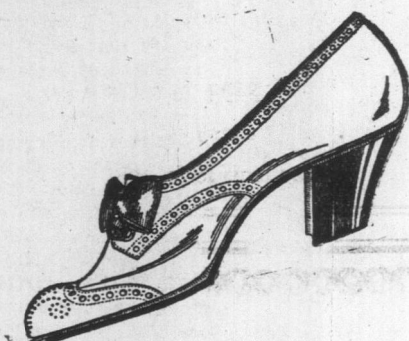
