### The Simple Life

SIR THOMAS HORDER ON MODERN

Sir Thomas Horder, the physician, in a paper which he read to the gath ering of American doctors at Wigmore Hall, W., recently, said:

We ought to do our best to induce our patients to return to a simpler life. We must not only point out more clearly and insistently the importance of hygienic rules for the conduct of the bodily functions, but in the sphere of the intellect, and especially of the emotions, we must urge moderation and simplicity

It is difficult for any clear-thinking doctor to avoid the conclusion that the hustle of modern life, the pace at which we go. the nerve strain involved, and the expense of spirit entailed have become a large factor in the incidence of disease, and of diseases of a different type from many with which we were formerly ac-

We have new diseases for old, but the doctor's function remains the same; to study closely his patient and to husband and exploit to the best end all his resources.

### Causes of Cancer.

Sir William Arbuthnot Lane, the surgeon, who also read a paper, said that in his opinion there were two factors in the causation of cancer as chanical and the toxic (due to poison.) He had observed cancer imposed on the mechanical and toxic results of chronic intestinal stasis (slackening or arrest of the blood current) so fre

### Siam as the Land of **Religious Toleration**

"Siam is one of the strongholds of Buddhism, and although the modern tendency to be indifferent to religious matters is as observable in Siam as elsewhere, the people generally give as much attention to the practice of their faith as does the average resident in Christian countries in applying to his daily life the principles of his belief," says W. Nunn, late Adviser to the Siamese Government on Customs, in a paper read before the Royal Society of Arts and recorded in its Journal.

"The Siamese attitude towards matters spiritual-their conception of their duty to God, their fellowmen, and themselves is simple. It is not complicated by the strife of sects, by the competition of conflicting faiths. by intellectual arrogance, nor by undisciplined enthusiasm. It is an attitude of unconcerned belief, quietly held and practised.



### **Empire Crown Cotton**

GREATLY INCRÉASED PRODUC-TION LAST YEAR.

Highly satisfactory progress being made by the Britsh Cotton Growing Association. The industry, ceording to the annual report, is now established on a sound commercial basis in a number of colonies and protectorates. The quantity of cotton which passed through the association's hands last year was 59,583 bales, valued at £1,922,097, against 54,606 bales, of the value of £1,588,480 in 1923. This represents only a small proportion of the total quantity of cotton produced within the Empire, which was estimated at 261,900 bales, valued at £8,373,200. The net profit on the year's working was £103,588, which increases the excess of income over expenditure to £266.077. The association, it is stated, is still engaged in development work, and incurs risks in the interests of cotton growing which would not be entertained by ordinary trading concerns. Profits made in recent years were requisite for financing the rapidly-increasing quantities of cotton now produced in new areas: also for the provision of ginning and baling installations, so as to provide cultivators with a ready market. The results achieved demonstrate that the British Empire is capable of prosubstantial quantities. The rate of fuducing suitable types of cotton in ture progress will largely depend on

CHICAGO, June 13-Walter O'Donell, who earned the reputation of being Chicago's toughest beer and 'alkie" lord by mixing a little blood with the racket when the occasion seemed to demand it-and sometimes when it didn't-was buried here on Friday with all the traditional pomp and splendor accorded to the departed kings of his els.

The O'Donnell brothers-there are seven of them left now-did all they could for Walter. And so did his companion booze runners, and the ward politicians, and the poor folk down by the stockyards who remembered him as a "prince of a guy" with no strings on his purse. Four thousand were there.

Walter's coffin, a silver-trimmed affair, which cost the O'Donnell boys the profits of many a booze deal, rested in a corner of the front room behind a miniature mountain of flowers. Walter's young face, that of a weary fighter, a tyrant humiliated-was visible above a huge floral wreath bearing the simple inscription, "Brother,"

The little room was crowded with friends of the O'Donnells-some of whom will likely figure in the next skirmish in Chicago's perennial beer war. The police were so afraid that something might happen even at Walter's funeral that they came in automobile loads

The funeral was like those of the late lamented Dion O'Banion and the Italian gangster, Angelo Genna, and the others-particularly was it similar in that the funeral was conducted without the benefit of the church ser-

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

In addition to the Professional training of teachers, the Institution will furnish courses for. the first and second years of University work in liberal Arts and pure Science; the curriculum will include English, Mathematics, Chemistry, Physics (and other Sciences) French, Latin, Greek, Spanish, and other subjects for which there may be a demand.

The Memorial College will be associated with the principal universities of North America and the British Isles, and its certificate accepted pro tanto. In the case of the universities in North America, this will reduce the residence abroad to two years.

ENTRANCE EXAMINATION: Junior Associate (Matriculation) of the Council of Higher Education with a general average of fifty per cent. or equivalent examination to be set by the College shortly before the date appointed for the opening.

SPECIAL STUDENTS: Students not desiring the full course may be admitted to any class as special students provided they are able to present evidence of qualification for such class.


