THE ABYSSINIAN WAR.

If any reliance is to be placed on a telegram which reached us on Friday, the object of the Abyssinian expedi-tion has been attained and the British army may turn, first its steps, and afterwards the prows of the vessels which conveyed it on its journey to Africa, omewards. If the rumour be true the fact is a most important one for the captives, for most people imagined that Theodore would cut their throats before they could hear the sound of the British bugle. We almost fear that the news is too good to be true, for reliable intelligence received only a few days ago represented the King as having taken up a strong position with a number of big gues pointing in the direction from which he expected the invaders. But suppose it true, of 36,000 men have not been conveyed to Abyssinia, and maintained there so long for nothing, and who in strict justice should pay the costs ? Already the greater part of two millions ster-ing has been absorbed by the expedi-tion, and Englishmen will not be so ling has been absorbed by the expedition, and Englishmen will not be so silly as to lose this amount if the barbarian King or his country is worth it.

THE ROYAL VISIT.

The Prince and Princess of Wales have landed in Ireland, and the cable informs us of the splendour and en thusiasm of their reception. It is seldom that the Irish people have an opportunity of looking upon Royalty, and it is no wonder if they should ap pear a little ill-bred and rude in staring at it, 1 jamming and crushing unity to stare. When Her Ma , visited Ireland many years ago, so anxious were the people to see her that even public works were stopped within a radius of twenty miles from every city through which she passed, and the employees rode, if they could afford it, or walked if they could not, to gaze upon their Queen, until the streets were perfectly packed full of human beings who could not get into windows or on the house tops, and the Royal carriage and cortege could with difficulty make their way. Previous to the accession of Her Majesty. the last Royal visit that was paid to Ireland was by "the finest gentleman in Europe," George IV, in 1821. His reception was enthusiastic, and so highly gratified was His Majesty that on his departure Lord Sidmouth, by his com mands, addressed a letter to the Lord Lieutenant, expressing " his entire approbation of the manner in which all persons acting in civil and military situations in the city of Dublin and its neighborhood had performed their several duties during the period of His Majesty's residence in that part | Puslinch, April 18th. of the kingdom." We hope that when the Prince of Wales sets sail for England he will be able to express himself as highly pleased with his visit as was his illustrious relative. 





SALABLES OF COLONIAL GOVER-NORS.—From a return of the salaries of Colonial Governors just printed, it appears that the two best appointments are those of the Governor of Victoria —each of whom has £10,000 a year. The Governors of Jamaica, New South Wales, Mauritus, and Ceylon have each £7000; the Governors of British Guiana, Gibra tar, South Australia, Hong Kong, and Singapore, £5000; those of Malta and New Zealand, £4, 500; and those of British Columbia, Barbadoes, Queensland, and Tasma-nia, £4000. The other Governorships dwindl: down as low as £500, which is paid to that high functionary the Governor and Commander-in-Chief of Heligoland; who however pecives 5a. 6d. a day half-pay as major unattach-ed in the army. ed in the army.
