REMARKABLE CASE of RESUBCITATION.— A little child, daughter of Mr. John Mo-Dongall, Clarence Street, near North, while playing this morning with an egg cup, and leaning over the edge of a tub containing about six inches, lost her bal-ance and fell in head first. When found her feet were sticking out over the tub, and her head covered with water. She was to all appearances dead. Dr. Mord-on was called in and he at once applied Marshall Hall's ready method of restora-tion in case of drowning. This consists of rubbing the body briskly and dousing with cold water, repeating the operation for some time. Signs of life began to ap-pear in about half an hour, and the child is now in a fair way of recovering its former health and activity. This is the most remarkable case of resuscitation that has ever occurred in this neighbor-hood, over an hour and a half having elapsed from the time pulsation ceased until it was restored by the exertions of the physician.—Landon Advertiser.



The car-riages containing the girls &c., are drawn up on one side of the plain, and the young men who are in search of part-ners for life-mostly young Wallachies -form a line on the other. The young men select the girls they think they would like to have, some on account of their beauty, some on account of the worldly possessions they have, and enter into negotiations with the fathers of the girls. These negotiations are mainly confined to arranging how much furni-ture and cattle the girl is to have, the pretty onse having, as unal, a preference, and is conducted with the utmost frank-mess and promptitude on both sides. If a bargain is struck, a priest is called, a short service is performed, the bride bids farewell to her parents, mounts into her husband's chariot, and is borne off to some distant village, perhaps with a man she has never seen before joined to her as her partner for life, the furniture and cattle allowed as her wedding portion following in the rear.
