The Northern and Pacific Junction Railway

We understand that at a meeting of the directors of the Northern and Pacific Junction railway, held at the Northern offices here yesterday afternoon, the contract for this important work was let to Messrs. Symmes, Davidson, Hendrie & Co. The missing link between Gravenhurst and Callendar, to give all western Ontario a convenient and direct connection with the main line of the Canadian Pacific, is to be finished by the end of May, 1886. A little less than two years hence, the distance is put down at 114 miles, with, however, the contingency of more or less, as may hereafter be deemed advisable. As the contract is not let for a lump sum, but by measure, or piece work, the railway company retains the power to change the location of the line as engineering and other important considerations may suggest. A fixed price is to be paid the contractors for 50 miles by measure of this kind of work, and so much by measure for another kind of work, and so on. The real object of construction work of all kinds in Canada being by this time pretty well known, railway men, contractors, and the engineering profession, the chances of either large gain or ruinous loss to the contractors are very much less than under the haphazard plan of undertaking the whole mileage for a lump sum. As it may be added that the chances of getting a solid, well-constructed road are very much increased by this method.

The Great Organizer and West Ontario.

To the Editor of The World. Sir: As an elector of West Ontario, I write to thank you for the many stand you have taken in defence of true liberal principles in opposing the attempt of the Toronto "machine" to foist J. D. Edgar upon the Ontario constituency. It is upon the Globe tells us that (Mr. Edgar) is a very able man, and a "great organizer," and that his services at Ottawa could be got there—would be invaluable to Mr. Blake and the party. We know, however, that Mr. Edgar is a director of the Globe. It is not, therefore, surprising (as nobody has ever charged him with being a modest man) that Mr. Edgar in the Globe should not only have a good opinion of Edgar out of the Globe, but that he should also use the columns of his own paper to tell us so. As we believe him to be an interested witness we most respectfully decline to accept his own estimate of himself. Let us briefly examine his public record and see how far his claim to the title of "Great Organizer" is borne out by the facts. In 1871 he received the reform nomination for the local house in the electoral district of Monck. His opponent, the riding fought hard and was defeated. In 1872 he contested the same constituency for the house of commons and was elected by a small majority. In January, 1874, he again contested Monck, and though aided by the Pacific scandal cry, and his ability as an organizer, was again defeated. In April of the same year, he ran for the grand old reform riding of South Oxford—having been forced upon the convention by the Toronto machines—and was beaten by Col. Skinner, a local reformer. Col. Skinner's majority on this occasion was no less than 655. In May, 1875, he for a fourth time contested Monck, and although he had the whole power of the Mackenzie government at his back, and was "greatly organized," yet he was for a third time defeated in the same constituency. In 1876, on the death of the Hon. Malcolm Cameron, he ran for the reform riding of South Ontario and was defeated, though the reform candidate was elected for the same constituency at both the previous succeeding elections. This made five defeats in as many years. In 1878 he again contested Monck and for the fourth time was defeated in that riding. In 1882 he ran for Centre Toronto, organized it and was beaten by nearly 200 majority. From the above facts it will be seen that in a period of seven years Mr. Edgar fought eight election contests, in four different constituencies. In these elections he was defeated seven times, and was victorious only once. All these constituencies in which he was so ignominiously beaten—with the single exception of Centre Toronto—were to-day represented in either one or both houses by reformers. The moral of this is that ordinary mortals succeed where the "great organizer" fails. If further evidence were required on this point we need only refer to Mr. Edgar's attempt to "organize" the reform convention of East York in 1881 so as to prevent that eminent patriot and statesman—Hon. Alexander Mackenzie, from obtaining a seat in parliament. This scheme, like seven-eighths of his election ventures, proved a failure. The organizer got left, and Mr. Mackenzie secured the nomination. In diplomacy Mr. Edgar appears to have been just about as successful as he was as an organizer. In 1874 Mr. Mackenzie sent him on a mission to conciliate British Columbia. In less than four months he succeeded in arraying that province solidly against the government. It appears to us in West Ontario that Mr. Edgar is, as he says of himself in the Globe, truly a "great organizer," but his features consist of organizing defeat, not victory. Does Mr. Blake require the assistance of that kind of an organizer at Ottawa? If so West Ontario declines to be party to it. AS ELECTOR OF WEST ONTARIO.

The Bribery Commission.

The bribery commission has been adjourned until September.
