THE NEW BOOK LADY LATOUR

An Interesting Review of Rev. W. I. Morse's Latest Book of Poems

There has been brought out recently by the Ryerson Press, Toronto, a beautiful little volume of Poems, entitled "The Lady Latour," by a clergyman well known to the readers of the MONITOR, the Rev. W. I. Morse. The author is a native of Paradise, N. S., where his father, Joseph Morse, still resides, but his home now is in Lynn, Mass., where he is the Rector of the Church of the Incarnation, and universally beloved by the members of his congregation. Even though he has taken up his abode among the great people of the land to the south of us, yet as we can see from this volume—apart from the fact that he spends his summer vacations in his pretty bungalow in Paradise—his heart and his spirit are in the Acadian land.

This is the second time that he has entered into the literary world, for he published a volume of verse in 1908, under the title of "Acadian Lays." The writer, however, knowing the interest that is taken in our young men who have made good in countries other than their own, and in the productions of their mind and hand feels that a little information concerning Mr. Morse's second literary effort.

In the preface it is stated that a few of the selections first appeared in the issues of "The Canadian Magazine," Toronto. The others in part deal with the inner life, and some concern that ancient land of "Acadia," sometimes known as "Acadia" which critics often confound with "Arcadia." The selections in part two for the most part explain themselves and are illustrated by drawings from the hand of F. G. Cooper and E. L. Proctor.

The book as already stated is divided into two parts. The literary style is the same in both parts, but the second part bubbles over with humour whilst the illustrations are amusing and laughter provoking besides focusing the lesson given in the text. Taken as a complete whole the little volumes is excellent in conception, sparkling in wit, brilliant in humour, profound in thought, beautiful in imagery, and splendid in execution. The author is, in congratulation in presenting us, in such a pleasing way, the thoughts that have been fitting though his mind.

The book has already been favorably commended. The Rev. E. I. V. Higgins, of Beverly, Mass., a writer of no mean order, one who has already distinguished himself in literary society by productions in verse and prose, has spoken of the volume under review in this wise: "I think he (the author) has shown that the genius of poetry does still haunt a man here and there and other things say beautiful things, and other things which make one think of beautiful things and desire the beautiful. He touches the grave and the gay, the true and the false, the lovely and the unlovely. May he keep at it and bring out many more dictates of his spirit to heal, to help, to comfort, or to rebuke and chasten. He has done what few do, made every line have a plain meaning. Clear thought is the deepest thought, clear water is transparent." Dr. Benjamin Rand, of Harvard University writes of the charming volume which describes with such felicity the Acadian country. "It is an excellent title and the book will keep the memory of this Heroine (Lady Latour) ever fresh."

The title of the book will bring to mind, and as perpetuate, the noble deeds and the indomitable spirit of one of the finest ladies whose names are recorded upon the pages of Canadian history. The poem which gives the name to the volume, though short, yet in lines deep cut as with a diamond, reveals her life vividly, and she appears before us in all the strength of her glorious womanhood in utter contrast to D'Aulney, who shows himself a Knight without honour, without chivalry and without pity.

"No song of amour To Lady Latour. But of honour untarnished as ages show. Brief annals acclaim The pride of her name. And faintly the records yet kindly and glow.

It will take up too much time to describe even briefly all the selections that are given in the volume, so the writer will simply make two or three quotations in order that the readers may have some clear idea as to what the book contains. In the "An Acadian Spring" one who has the artist's eye and skill, who here presses the pencil very softly, there more strongly, who blends the light and the shadow to form an exquisite painting full of colour, and harmony which faithfully represent the reality of the scene. Here are a few verses:

Across some mirrored lake. As evening falls, I hear the night birds give Their vesper calls.

The twinkling bells of Kine Flooz down the vale, And lose their melody Along the trail.

Forth from the old mill-race There comes the roar Of waters falling as They fell of yore.

While far in yonder gorge A restless stream Makes music to the night Wind's gentle dream.

In the writer's estimation the poem "Rhythm" is the one in which the author shows the deepest thought. Deep, as it were, answers out deep. He surveys nature, history, art and that symbol of human affection, the heart, and notices the wonderful, almost miraculous, rhythm there is in each and all.

"There is a rhythm in the sky. The earth, the sea, and history." There is a rhythm in the darkness by the sea. Where myriad shells fulfil their destiny.

There is a rhythm in the heart. That "bourdon" heard least often in the city's mart. But in the silence and alone We catch the sound, the unforgetten tone Which whispers all is well— Conveys sweet promises of hope; or else the knell Of lost efficiency, fatigue, disease, the "cycle ended. Affections lost, ill-comprehended.

In part II we have verses full of humour, verses of which it cannot be said, as is said of compositions of certain divines: Dulness is sacred in a sound of certain divines: There is not a line of dulness in fact, in any part of the volume. Book II especially, is bright and witty, bringing light to the eyes, and laughter to the lips. The author sees the things in life, and he wishes us to see them with him. He possesses to the full a keen sense of humour. Humour belongs to the "order of good cheer," because it makes the heart light and happy. It helps us to throw off dull care and to lessen

CHURCH UNION
An important meeting looking toward local church union between Gordon Memorial Presbyterian Church and Providence Methodist Church of Bridgetown was held in the Board of Trade Rooms Thursday morning last. There was good representation of the laymen of the two churches present, also Rev. Mr. Layton, of Kentville, representing the governing body of the Presbyterian church and Rev. F. Friggins, of Canning, President of Nova Scotia Methodists' Conference and Rev. C. A. Munroe, of Annapolis, representing the Methodist Church. After a general expression of feeling as to the necessity of greater co-operation on account of the scarcity of ministers, the possibilities of better Christian Service and many other phases of the work and advantages of union of the two congregations, a basis of amalgamation or cooperation was put before the meeting and unanimously adopted.

The question will now be submitted to the two congregations and if adopted by a majority of each, will come into effect at once. In the Western provinces of Canada these local church unions are much more common than in the east and in some places the whole community gather in one church instead of three or four as is too common in our country. Recently, even in Ontario, the Methodist and Presbyterian have united in upwards of thirty fields and in this way a large number of ministers have been released to do work elsewhere or where there is a scarcity of ministers, rather than continue in this work of over-lapping.

ANOTHER GOOD PICTURE
The following is a brief story of next Saturday (Christmas) night's picture which will be shown in the Primrose Theatre in Bridgetown. Mary Ann Hubbard, in "In Walked Mary," is the surviving member of a fine old Southern family, and as the story opens the estate is in the sheriff's hand. Everett, of Carleton's Corner, has been diverted from the usual route, owing to the fall of freight rates from \$18.50 per ton to \$7.40. She sailed from Buenos Ayres and Montevideo November 23rd, with 8500 tons of cereals for London and Danzig calling at St. Vincent and Los Palmas for bunkers.

PASSED THROUGH BRIDGETOWN

Governor General and Staff Spent Thursday Night at Round Hill.

The royal train passed through Bridgetown at 7 o'clock last Thursday evening, from Kentville for Halifax via Yarmouth and South Shore points, stopping at several towns along the line.

The royal party spent the night on board their train at Round Hill, running into Annapolis Royal the next morning where they were met by Mayor King and other important officials of the town, escorted to Fort Anne, inspecting the government museum and other places of interest.

At Digby they were also met by Mayor Nichols and officials, the school cadets forming an escort to the Court House.

They were entertained at Yarmouth and various towns along the South Shore His Excellency driving the first bolt in the Canadian fishermen challenger now under construction at Lunenburg. They arrived in Halifax Sunday and were given a royal welcome.

The Duke was accompanied by Captain Canard, A. D. C., and Captain Balfour, militia secretary. Crowds awaited the arrival of His Excellency in the various towns, music was furnished by local bands and streamers of flags and welcome signs were much in evidence.

His Excellency expressed regret that the Duchess was unable to accompany him, but hoped that before his tenure of office ceased, he would return with his family to visit the famous Annapolis Valley.

We hope that on his return the party will be entertained at Bridgetown.

THE RELIEF OF EXPLORER PERRY

An Interesting Lecture Given in Bridgetown by Capt. Blakeney

On Tuesday night the "Torch-bearers" extended an invitation to their brother squares to hear an address from Capt. Blakeney on his voyage to the relief of Perry, who had not returned on the date set for his home coming.

Altho the address was of considerable length, the time passed quickly, as is always the case when an interesting address is being heard.

On touching at several points for the purpose of obtaining news of Perry and of procuring an interpreter, they were beset by the Esquimaux and nearly defeated by the howling of the huskies (dogs) and the cries of the inhabitants, who kept exclaiming "Covee" (coffee) "Candee" (candy) and who swarmed over the bow.

When the polar bear region was reached, several American gentlemen, who were on board expressed a desire to have a shot at a bruin. Accordingly when one was sighted, the ship drew in close and the would be hunters put off in a boat for the ice.

The atmosphere is so clear in the far north, distances are not easily calculated and while the hunters thought themselves sufficiently close that is, as close as they might safely venture, they were many times the distance. The shots naturally fell short and Master Bear calmly turned his back and walked off.

Several other attempts were made the results were as unsatisfactory as the first one.

As the ship forged northward the scenery became grand in the extreme. The ice bound coast towered with snow covered mountains with not a tree upon the horizon. The large and expansive ice floes of death, which the ship sought to evade and all the equally fearsome, the awe inspiring ice bergs, drifting about them in the cold grey water, all contribute to impress those who see it, and cause them to be thankful that there is such a place as good old Nova Scotia.

Owing to navigation difficulties, the "Eric" was forced to put in at an almost unknown bay and as a record of this voyage this bay was named Eric Bay, by which name it is known today.

When one of the most northerly harbors was reached the lost "Windward" was sighted and Perry was welcomed by his wife and daughter (Marie).

The Eric spent several weeks in obtaining Esquimaux and dogs for Perry's expedition and in hunting blue deer and walrus. The walrus flesh is enjoyed greatly by the Esquimaux, who get large quantities raw. When the first walrus of the season was captured and hoisted on deck by a strip of flesh about an inch wide, the walrus immediately fell to with relish and procured for themselves large hunks of blubber. The hide is very tough and thick and is used by the natives for harpoon lines, traces, etc. The blue deer is a small mouse colored deer, the flesh of which when dried constitutes a meat called pemmican and will keep for some time. The skin of this animal, which the Esquimaux women cure by chewing it in their mouth makes the warmest and most comfortable clothing.

When an Esquimaux is engaged to work he will not leave his family and insists on them being allowed to accompany him. His time is of no value and he will wander around all day scraping a hole thru a piece of hoop iron in order to fasten a handle to this improvised knife.

Some of the customs practised by these inhabitants of the far North are very barbarous. In many cases the girl infants are not allowed to live but are simply exposed to the cold and allowed to die. The children of the North are carried on the back of the mother for three years, before being taught to walk and as an Esquimaux is of small stature, even when liberated, baby has to be most carefully watched.

If a mother dies and leaves a baby in the sack the child according to custom must be killed before the husband can marry again. Altho the father adheres to this custom he is as heart broken, as is any father who loses a son. If two young lovers' admitions are hurting in the same direction a hunting contest is held and the lucky hunter wins the fair prize.

The seasons of the far north are very much different from ours, consisting of eight months, day, which constitutes the summer, and four months of weird subdued light, which constitutes the winter season. In the winter the abode of the natives are excavations in some hillside and in summer a construction of

The fish are caught from holes in the ice or from unskape one man canoe, paddled by whalerib paddles, while the deer are harpooned and likewise the walrus, which on coming thru the hole in the ice, which he uses for breathing, receives a true shaft from skilled hands.

Venison and bear steak are words which make your mouth water but when we think of the miserable existence which these humans lead, and of their depraved conditions, cannot help but feel thankful to God for the many blessings of civilization which we enjoy.

As Capt Blakeney was for several years Governor at Sable Island we are looking forward to hearing him give us an equally interesting talk next spring. Hoping that I have done justice to the address by Capt Blakeney.






