From Being a Careless Boy, Manuel the questions interesting Europe at present is who will b chosen to wed King Manuel of Por-England has authoritatively denied that Princess Alexandra of Fife, King Edward's granddaughter, is to marry him, and tremming that the little Princess Victoria Manuel. As for the youthful King of Portugal himself, he bothers little about brides and weddings at present.

It was in February, 1908, that Manuel Marie Philip Charles Amelie Louis Michel Raphel Gabriel, Duke of Beja, then a lad of 18, busy with his studies and schoolboy spores has

his studies and schoolboy sports, became King of Portugal and the Algraves through the assassination of his father and elder brother. Since then he has reconstituted his daily grave young man taking life almost too seriously perhaps for his own good. He resembles greatly his beaufful mother and has a fine, expresaive face with dark, heavily shadowed eyes and very black hair. In physique he is slight but erect, and although three or four years ago he was accounted a delicate boy now he

seems sturdy and vigorous.

The greatest love and confidence exists between Queen Amelie and King Manuel. They are more like good friends and companions than mother and son. Together they work for the state. Together they walk, drive and read. Queen Amelie is still beautiful, though since the tragedy which deprived her of husband and son she

has aged somewhat and lost the vivacity which made her considered the "most charming Queen of Europe."

King Manuel takes his duties very earnestly. He is not as dashing or picturesque as the eccentric Alfonso of Spain, but is far more serious and painstaking and has arranged his life in such a manner that no duty is

Rising usually at 7, he has early breakfast, then goes to greet his mother. After a talk with her he takes a walk in the shady park of the Necessidades Palace, with his two favorite dogs, Box, a boarhound, and Tage, an Irish terrier. A little later he takes a turn with the foils or a ride, or plays a few sets of tennis. At 10 he has his bath and then begins the work of the day.

He first goes through his correspondence with his private secretary, the Marquis de Lavradio, and in this task his mother sometimes helps and advises. Then he receives professors from Lisbon and Coimbra universities and pursues his studies with them till the second breakfast, at which meal the members of the royal family re-

At 2 the day's receptions and private audiences begin. These over, the King and Queen go motoring out into the country, and sometimes the King leaves the car and walks, talking with the passing peasants and country folk. After dinner Don Manuel's recreation is bridge with his mother and two others till 11 o'clock. Then when all the ladies and gentlemen of the court have retired the King re-turns to his study and remains there working till late.

The agitation against high food prices which started in the United States has been taken up by Canada. New York led the movement and a citizen combine resulted in the boycott of provision dealers for a stated period, which was soon followed by a drop in market prices. Milk, eggs, butter and meat receded in price, both wholesale and retailers dropped off their profits. Canada followed the lead of her neighbors and has made an effort to arrest the upward tendency of the produce market. That she is warranted in doing so is the opinion of a writer in the Bos-Ion Transcript, who says:-

'That a very powerful combine rules the meat trade in Canada, as well as in the States, is plain from States meats are sold retail in Liverpool and London lower than in New York, Boston, Montreal or Ottawa. Your correspondent knows this from inspection some years ago and from recent inquiry, by letter from visits to England. Proof that the United States meat combine is more exacting than the Canadian is afforded by the fact that retail meat prices are higher all around in New York and Boston than in Montreal, Since these ports alike ship meat to Liverpool, and since the freight across are substantially identical, it sim lar cuts to those sold in Boston at from thirty to forty cents per pound whilst Liverpaol gets the same at less than Montreal.

"In fat meats the farmer is every yielded only from five to six cents per pound for dressed hind quarters to the farmer."
