UNIVERSALITY OF THE BIBLE.

No volume ever commanded such a profusion of readers, or has been translated into so many languages. Such is the universality of its spirit, that no book loses less by translation. None has been so frequently copied in manuscript, and none so often printed. King and noble, peasant and pauper, are delighted students of its pages. Philosophers have humbly gleaned from it, and legislation has been thankfully indebted to it. Its stories charm the child, its hopes inspirit the aged, and its promises soothe the bed of death. The maiden is wedded under its sanction, and the grave is closed under its comforting assurances. Its lessons are the essence of religion, the seminal truths of theology, the first principles of morals, and the guiding axioms of political economy. Martyrs have often bled and been burnt for attachment to it. It is the theme of universal appeal. In the entire range of literature no book is so frequently quoted or referred to. The majority of all the books ever published have been in connection with it. The fathers commented upon it, and the subtle divines of the Middle Ages refined upon its doctrines. It sustained Origen's scholarship and Chrysostom's rhetoric. It whetted the penetration of Abelard, and exercised the keen ingenuity of Aquinas. It gave life to the revival of letters, and Dante and Petrarch revelled in its imagery. It augmented the erudition of Erasmus, and roused the blessed intrepidity of Luther. Its temples are the finest specimens of architecture, and the brightest triumphs of music are associated with its poetry. The text of no ancient author has summoned

into operation such an amount of labour and learning, and it has furnished occasion for the most masterly examples of criticism and comment, grammatical investigation and logical analysis. It has also inspired the English Muse with her loftiest strains. Its beams gladdened Milton in his darkness, and cheered the song of Cowper in his sadness. It was the star which guided Columbus in the discovery of a new world. It furnished the panoply of that Puritan valour which shivered tyranny in days gone by. It is the Magna Charta of the world's regeneration and liberties. The records of false religion, from the Koran to the Book of Mormon, have owned its superiority, and surreptitiously purloined its jewels. Among the Christian classics, it loaded the treasures of Owen, charged the fulness of Hooker, barbed the point of Baxter, gave colours to the palette and sweep to the pencil of Bunyan, enriched the fragrant fancy of Taylor, sustained the loftiness of Howe, and strung the plummet of Edwards. In short, this collection of artless lives and letters has changed the face of the world, and ennobled myriads of its population.—*Eadie.*

DEATH OF THE FIRST SECRETARY OF OUR SOCIETY.

It pleased God to call home to rest and reward, on Saturday last, the 6th instant, the Rev. James Harris, who was one of the first officers of the Bible Society organized in this Province. He died at his late residence, 512 Jarvis street, having reached the advanced age allotted to few of our race—"four score years." He was chosen Secretary of the "York Auxiliary Bible Society" in the year 1828—45 years ago. The Rev. Alexander Stewart was, at the same time, selected as his associate in the Secretariat. They continued as joint Secretaries until the Seventh Anniversary Meeting of the Society (now called "The City of Toronto Auxiliary Bible Society"), when they were succeeded by the Rev. Messrs. Leach and Merrifield. In the following year, 1837, Mr. Harris was re-appointed Secretary, with Thomas Champion, Esq., as his colleague, and Mr. (now Senator) McMaster as Minute Secretary. In 1839 Mr. Harris finally resigned the Secretaryship and was appointed a Vice-President of the Society, in which position he remained till his death. For several years past he had been unable, from the feebleness which advanced age brought with it, to take any active part in the business of the Society; yet his interest in its prosperity was unabated, and his occasional visits, until very recently, to the Bible Society House, were invariably hailed with satisfaction—for we delighted to do him honour. He passed away quietly and almost suddenly. Only a few of the present generation knew him. But Monday, the 8th instant, the day of his funeral,

attested that he was not forgotten. A large number of friends were present to pay their tribute of respect to his valued memory, among whom were several of the leading lay and clerical gentlemen of the city, including Directors of the Bible and Tract Societies. Mr. Harris was the son-in-law of the late Jesse Ketchum, Esq., one of the most generous benefactors of our Society. We pray that the surviving widow may be abundantly consoled by the precious promises of that Holy Book which it was the constant aim of her beloved husband and her revered father to bestow upon all.

The comprehensive and excellent review of the life and character of Mr. Harris which appeared in the *Globe* of Tuesday, the 10th instant—the day after the funeral—and now given, precludes the necessity of further note from us :—

“Another of the old landmarks of Toronto—the Rev. James Harris—has passed away at the ripe age of 80 years. Mr. Harris was a native of Ireland, and was brought up in the Secession Church of that country. After receiving license from the Presbytery of Monaghan, and officiating for some time in his native land, he came to this country in 1820, reaching Brockville about the 10th of August in that year. The Rev. Mr. Smart, then and for long afterwards the Presbyterian Minister of that town, recommended him to push on to what was then known as York. In accordance with this advice, Mr. Harris came slowly westward, preaching at different places on his journey, and arriving at what is now Toronto on the 28th of the same month. The Presbyterians of the place had never had any regular supply of preaching, and altogether the prospects were not encouraging. At that time there were only two churches in the city, viz., the Episcopalian, under the charge of the late Bishop Strachan, and a Methodist one, situated on King street West. The condition of things in Ontario at that date, so far as Presbyterianism was concerned, may be seen from the fact that there were only two Presbyterian clergymen west of Kingston. One of these, the late Rev. Wm. Jenkins, of Richmond Hill, occasionally visited York and preached to the handful of Presbyterians there, but little had been accomplished by such services. On the first Sabbath of September, 1820, Mr. Harris preached his first sermon in Toronto, and proceeded to organize a Presbyterian congregation. His efforts were energetically seconded by the late Jesse Ketchum, who showed his zeal in a very practical manner by giving a deed of the two lots on which the present Knox Church and adjacent properties now stand, and by building besides a church at his own expense. All the internal fittings were procured by an assessment upon the pews and paid by those who became seat holders. The name given to this church was ‘The Presbyterian Church of York, U. C.’ The new church was formally opened on the 18th of February, 1822, and continued till 1827 to be the only Presbyterian place of worship in the town. In the latter year the present St. Andrew’s Church, at the corner of Adelaide and Church streets, was erected, and from that time the progress of Presbyterianism in the city had been very marked. On the 23rd of July, 1823, a little more than fifty years ago, Mr. Harris was formally inducted as pastor of the new church, and for many years continued as a faithful minister to an attached and always increasing congregation. The ordinary round of a pastor’s work presents few noticeable points for record, and the course of Mr. Harris was no exception to the general rule. He kept the ‘even tenor of his way,’ respected by all, and loved by many, who, from intimate fellowship with him, knew his sterling worth, and his kindly sympathising heart. In 1844 the disruption of the Presbyterian Church in Canada, connected with the Kirk of Scotland, took place. A considerable number at that time left St. Andrew’s Church, and formed a separate congregation on the 23rd of July of that year.

The new congregation resolved to call the late Dr. Burns, of Paisley, nay, actually called him, and had made arrangements for building a new church. Before anything was done a proposal came from the 'York Presbyterian Church,' suggesting that the two bodies should unite and form one church, it being understood that Mr. Harris was willing to retire on an annuity. This was eventually arranged. Mr. Harris retired, but still kept up his connection with the congregation as one of the ruling elders to the very last. Mr. Harris was of a modest, retiring disposition, with no desire to push himself into notice. He saw the city of his adoption grow from the small insignificant York of 1823 to the large and beautiful Toronto of 1873; while the congregation, composed of twenty-eight members, to whom he administered the communion for the first time, on the second Sabbath of September, 1823, has become one of the largest and wealthiest in Ontario—not merely of the Presbyterian, but of any denomination. He has passed away at the ripe age of four-score, after a useful and blameless life, respected by all as a sterlingly upright man, and a consistent minister and member of the Canada Presbyterian Church, of which he has long been honoured as one of the original pioneers and founders. Another of the links which connected the Old York of the past with the Toronto of the present, has thus gone. Comparatively few remember Mr. Harris in his days of active ministerial work; but many will miss from our streets the 'good grey head,' and in days to come his name will be mentioned with honour among those who, in the early times of Canada's struggle, did good service as a preacher of the Gospel, and as an active modest promoter of everything calculated to improve the community in a social and intellectual, as well as a religious, point of view."

British and Foreign.

ITALY.

The progress of Bible distribution in Italy, especially at this stage of her emancipation, must be watched with deep solicitude by all who feel assured that the Scriptures are the *Magna Charta* of religious and civil liberty. The accompanying intelligence, taken from the September number of the *Monthly Reporter* of the British and Foreign Bible Society, is of a most gratifying character. It depicts the condition of religious life in that country, and presents an urgent appeal for a more extensive dissemination of God's Holy Word in that land. Although the article is somewhat lengthy, yet—after carefully perusing it—we did not feel at liberty to make any abridgment.

"The wonders of God's Providence are only to be equalled by the wonders of His grace. Desolation and distress are often the channels along which His mercy flows most freely, and though he may turn a fruitful land into barrenness for the wickedness of them that dwell therein, yet does He often convert the curse into a blessing, and into the dark places of temporal misery shed the bright beams of spiritual light and love. These truths may be exemplified by the record which Mr. Bruce has furnished of Scripture distribution in a locality which last winter was laid waste by a flood. The Po and the Ticino having overflowed their banks, they carried desolation over a large portion of the surrounding country, and Mr. Bruce, thinking the opportunity a favourable one for impressing the minds of the sufferers from this calamity,

obtained permission from the Committee to distribute among them the Scriptures, either gratuitously, or at a reduced price, as circumstances might require. The result, to which he directs attention in the following letter, recalls the reflection of the Psalmist, 'Whoso is wise, and will observe these things, even they shall understand the loving-kindness of the Lord.'

"You may remember my applying to the Committee for leave to give away, as opportunity offered, New Testaments and portions of Scripture among the poor people in the villages on the banks of the Po and Ticino, who had suffered from the inundations of last winter. Not wishing to entrust the work entirely to colporteurs, with the leave of Rev. H. J. Piggott, I secured, last April, the services of a young man at Cremona, who was preparing for his examination in order to obtain a teacher's certificate, and he, with the colporteur Lazza, engaged heartily in the work. They found much to do, not only among the inhabitants of the villages, but also among the working men, who were in large numbers employed in repairing the damage done by the overflowing of the waters. Their first brief tour of a fortnight was so satisfactory, that I asked Signor Barbieri to return in May, which he willingly did, and I sent at the same time three good colporteurs to assist him. The gracious Lord seems to have looked with favour on this effort to spread His Word—to advance His glory.

"They met with a great variety of character and opinion, and, as was to be expected, were not always courteously treated, for the disciple is not above his master. The following extracts from Signor Barbieri's diary will give you some idea of the work done, and of the spirit in which they engaged in it:—

"During my missionary tour of nearly a month, among those who had suffered from the inundations last winter, I have had once more occasion to observe with joy this truth, that "My thoughts are not your thoughts, neither are your ways my ways, saith the Lord." The waters of the Po overflowed their banks, and from the evil He has brought forth good; from the bitter, sweet. I am not referring to the numbers who have found profitable employment in repairing the dykes, nor yet to the considerable material help given to the poor sufferers, but to the fact that God has made the calamity a means, through our weak instrumentality, of rousing many to concern for their spiritual welfare, who before were living without hope, and without God in the world.

"On the way from Ostiglia to Massa, we met a pleasant-looking old man, who, after he had listened to me with great attention, said, "You are quite right. It is needful to repent, and be born again, in order to have eternal life. I have never seriously considered this, and the thought of it frightens me. Who knows if God will have mercy on me?" "Fear not, my good old man," I said, "for God's goodness and mercy are infinite. 'Him that cometh to me, I will in no ways cast out.' As a poor sinner, lift your eyes to the throne of grace, and say like the Prodigal, 'Father, I have sinned.' The blood of Jesus Christ, His Son, cleanseth us from all sin." The old man regretted that we could not talk more of these matters, and concluded by asking me to sell him a Testament, which I exhorted him to read, but not without prayer. He took the Book in his horny hands, kissed it, and assured me he would read it daily, and I pray that he might be taught how precious the Saviour was. Many of the bystanders ridiculed us, but others were moved and bought some New Testaments, and others portions of it.

"One day, when passing before a house where on a former occasion I had sold some Gospels, a poor man stopped me and said, "Sir, the book you sold me is beautiful, for I like to read the words of our Saviour; but it contains what I do not understand: for instance, Romans v. 1; 2 Corinthians v. 17. Having explained to him the meaning of these passages, I told him to read the Book thoughtfully, and ask God to teach him to understand it. "I know," he said, "that I must read it with prayer, but I am so ignorant that I am afraid of making mistakes." "My dear friend," I replied, "never

fear. Read the great love of God towards you in the Cross of Christ, and trust in the Saviour's promise, 'I will not leave you comfortless,' as you may read fully in John xiv., and also see 1 John ii. 27. Never fear erring in what relates to your salvation." He shook hands with me heartily, and begged me to call on him whenever I went that way. Whilst he was talking and thanking me, several workmen came up, one asking one thing, and one another; some to return portions and get a New Testament. There was evidently a desire to read the Scriptures, and will there not be fruit to the Lord's glory?

"One day, a sharp lad from Venetia came to me and urged me to give him a Gospel, which I did. He then asked me about the Divinity of our Saviour, saying that many of his companions did not believe that He was the Son of God who came to save us. I replied to various objections drawn from Voltaire, Strauss, and others, after which he turned to his fellow-labourers, saying, "You young fellows wish me to believe that Jesus Christ was simply another Garibaldi; prove your assertion to this gentleman." I asked them to state freely any doubts they might have on the subject, on which one of them said, "We say Jesus Christ was a great man, who did much for the liberty of the people, and who, for the well-being of society, laid down his life; but that he worked miracles, or that he was the Son of God born of a virgin, we deny." I told them that if they would listen to me, I would try in simple language to prove to them that Jesus Christ is Divine, and that they should accept him as their Saviour. There were upwards of sixty persons present, and under the shade of a wooden building, I spoke to them at some length of Him who came to save. I showed them how fully the apostles believed all that they wrote concerning Christ, what opportunities they had of knowing the truth or falsehood of the whole story, or any part of it, and how sure they must have been that Jesus Christ was all that he claimed to be, when they suffered trial and even death rather than deny him. At the close many of them shook hands with me, thanking me, and Gerelli and I sold about twenty New Testaments, and very many Scripture portions. The Venetian youth, in particular, thanked me warmly, and said he hoped that Italy would soon become Christian in the Gospel sense of the word. This was not the only discussion we had on this important subject.

"I had many a conversation, chiefly with the operatives employed on the works along the banks of the Po and Ticino. One day, when commending the Bible to a man as a Divine revelation, some one came forward and said "It was all very fine talking, but who could prove that the Bible was the Word of God?" Soon we were surrounded by about forty people, to whom I spoke for half an hour. At the end a stout labourer said that at any rate we must first read the Book, and many came to us for New Testaments or portions.

"One day, some workmen happened to overhear me tell a woman that it was quite right to speak respectfully of the Virgin Mary and the saints, when they began to curse and swear horribly. I said to them very quietly, "My friends, why do you blaspheme? Why take in vain the name of Him who sends us the sun and the rain, who created, who sustains, and who loves you?" They were much astonished at being spoken to in this way. They eyed me, and one after another stopped working, and came round me like so many sheep, to hear what I had to say. I told them that by indulgence in the sin of swearing the heart got hardened, and their separation from God increased. Next I repeated the third Commandment, and some other passages of Scripture. Some excused themselves, saying it was a habit they had got into, and several purchased our little books, promising to read them."

"Jesus accepts all who come unto Him," said my friend Majno (of Mantua) to a workman, who replied, "Then He will accept even me, who am a very ignorant man, and a sinner." "Yes, indeed; if you feel yourself to be such, you are already in a hopeful state. If you go to God like the

Prodigal Son, He will meet you on the way, and give you the kiss of reconciliation.' I then repeated Isaiah i. 18, and some similar passages. Signor Majno sold the men a considerable number of portions and some New Testaments, whilst I conversed with others who came up.

"One day, some young men, hearing that unless they were born again they could not inherit eternal life, said it would be a strange thing if for a few improper words they should suffer God's anger for all eternity. I did my best to vindicate the justice of God, and to show at the same time that He did not wish the death of the sinner—he that believeth shall be saved. Our conversation led to a satisfactory sale of the Scriptures. On another occasion I met with an objector of another kind. I asked a young man if he would not like to possess a New Testament. 'I am young,' said he; 'when I am old' will be time enough to think of religion.' I spoke seriously to him on the sin and folly of delay, repeating to him Eccles. xii. 1, and Luke xii. 40. I left him silent and thoughtful, and turned to some others who were near. As we were going away I heard some one call me, and on turning round I found that it was the young man with whom I had been conversing. He asked me to sell him a New Testament, promising to make a good use of it.

"One day, as we were walking along the banks of the Po, some men who were working below us called out, 'Eh, sirs! is it true that Mazzini is dead?' 'Too true,' I replied; 'and after death the judgment; but blessed are the dead that die in the Lord.' I spoke to them seriously on the importance of being ready for death. They seemed very much astonished, but some of them became purchasers.

"Some were anything but friendly. One man promised two francs to whoever would drive us away. At another place the people wanted to beat us, and some threatened us with pruning hooks and knives; but the Lord delivered us from all our enemies; praise be to His name! Majno and I left the work with much regret, but it is carried on by three good colporteurs. Both the peasants and the men working to repair the injury done by the inundations were on the whole very friendly to us. Signor Majno, Gerelli, and myself, together sold 36 Bibles, 400 New Testaments, and 483 Gospels, and gave away 71 New Testaments and 1,117 portions of it. We spoke of the glad tidings to perhaps more than 5,000 persons, and have left behind as many friends. The fields are white unto the harvest; happy will those be who are privileged to reap it."

THE UPPER CANADA BIBLE SOCIETY.

The following selection from the Annual Report of the British and Foreign Bible Society for the past year, will be as welcome to the patrons and supporters of our own Society as it is gratifying to its Board of Management. We are thankful to a gracious Providence for the ability and for the *disposition* so to replenish the resources required from us for Bible distribution at *Home and Abroad*, that we continue to meet more than the demands of our own country. The Auxiliary Bible Societies of the Dominion are among the most sacred and strongest links which bind us to the land we all love—the *land of our fathers*. The demands on the income of the British and Foreign Bible Society are becoming increasingly heavy and urgent, from the advanced cost of material and of labour, and from the fact that new and inviting doors of usefulness are every year being opened. We say in deep and prayerful sincerity, we hope the *Upper Canada Bible Society* will, with the prospective

material advancement which promise holds out to our land, be enabled to furnish augmented aid to the great *Home Institution*—aid which will be to some extent commensurate with that advancement.

It may be well to remind the general reader that the statistics given below are taken from our Annual Report for the year ending March 31st, 1872. As our year expires on the same day as that of the Parent Society, our report for the year just closed could not reach London in time for the incorporation of any portions of it in the General Report of the British and Foreign Bible Society for the year 1872-73.

UPPER CANADA.—TORONTO.—It is impossible for your Committee to express in too strong terms their admiration of the Upper Canada Bible Society, and their sense of the zeal and ability with which all its affairs are administered. In regard to compass of organization and the amount of Free Contribution to the Parent Society, there is not another Auxiliary at home or in the colonies that rises to the same level. Its ramifications extend from Sandwich, in the west, to Gananoque, in the east, and it now claims to have planted the first Bible Society in the region of Manitoba. The report from Toronto dwells with much clearness on all the operations of the year, and describes them as partaking of the one feature of progress; and with a population rapidly growing in numbers and in wealth, it is anticipated that onward action and fuller results will characterize each year in succession. The idea of receding is not for a moment entertained. A brief glance at the separate departments of work will convey the best impression of the magnitude of the Auxiliary and the spirit that enters into all its operations. Including those connected with the London and Kingston Auxiliaries, there are not fewer than 385 Branches affiliated to the Upper Canada Bible Society. The receipts for the year were \$33,119, or more than £6,780. This amount exceeds that of the previous year by £713; and with reference to this increase it is remarked that it is the result of steady development, and arises in a less degree than usual from special contributions. The issues of Scriptures have amounted to 42,794 copies, showing an increase of 2,738. Very complete arrangements are made for the visitation of the Branch Societies. The former plan of having two or three permanent travelling Secretaries has been superseded by another, which, so far as it has been tested, answers both in regard to efficiency and economy. The services of ministers of different sections of the Church are enlisted for the care of the Branches over a limited area, and the number required for the work have been found willing, at the invitation of the Committee, to undertake the oversight of the local organizations. Thus during the past year eight of these valuable helpers have gone over the wide field embraced by the Auxiliary, and their labours have given entire satisfaction to the Branch Societies, whose zeal and liberality in the cause of Bible circulation have been quickened by the influence brought to bear upon them. All the Branches send liberal contributions to the Auxiliary, but that at Brantford maintains its pre-eminence in this respect. The colportage work has been conducted on the same scale as before, but additional labourers are proposed for the new Province of Manitoba and the recently confederated Province of British Columbia, as well as for two other districts where such efforts for circulating the Scriptures are imperatively required. Seven colporteurs have been engaged during the past year, and their labours are tabulated in the following figures:—Miles travelled, 12,650; families visited, 18,695; Scriptures sold, 6,442; copies given away, 530. It becomes your Committee to acknowledge with very cordial feelings the large amount of pecuniary help they have received from the Upper Canada Auxiliary. The Free Contributions have reached a total of £1,923 5s. 11d., and £1,801 4s. 3d. have been paid on the Purchase Account. The Hamilton

Branch has sent a contribution of £125 direct to the Parent Society, being the same amount as was liberally forwarded the previous year. The last Meeting of the Upper Canada Society was most attractive and successful, and it was preceded by a sermon preached in the Cathedral Church of St. James's, Toronto, by the Rev. S. J. Boddy, M. A. The Committee are happy to continue their annual grant of £200 in aid of colportage and travelling agents.

***BRITISH COLUMBIA.**—The Auxiliary which was formed at New Westminster on the occasion of the official visit of the Rev. Dr. L. Taylor, sank into an enfeebled state, and little interest was taken in its operations. The committee are glad to state that it has been resuscitated through the exertions of the Rev. R. Jamieson, who is acting as Secretary, and who has remitted £10 on the sale of Scriptures. As British Columbia is now incorporated as part of the Canadian Dominion, this Auxiliary will drop its independent organization and assume the position of a Branch of the Upper Canada Bible Society, which is already taking measures to promote its efficiency.

MONTHLY MEETING OF THE BOARD OF DIRECTORS.—During the summer of each year, one of the monthly meetings—owing usually to the absence from town of several members of the Board—is omitted. This year, the August meeting was passed over. The meeting for September was held in the Board-room on Tuesday last, the 9th instant, commencing at 7.30 P. M.—the Hon. Senator McMaster, Treasurer, in the chair. The Rev. James J. Rice read the 12th chapter of Romans, and offered prayer. After the reading and confirmation of the minutes of the July meeting, the Board received applications for employment in the agency work of the Society, and discussed the necessity for the further extension of colportage labour among the lumbermen to the north of Peterboro. A committee was appointed on the subject.

The gratuities for the months of July and August amounted to \$123.29, including the following grants:—To the Canada Congregational Indian Mission, Spanish River, Manitoulin Island, \$30.00; to the Baptist Mission, Onondaga, \$12.78; to the Baptist German Mission, Arnprior, \$9.36.

The meeting, which was well attended, was one of much interest, and closed, after prayer by the Rev. W. H. Poole, at 9.45 o'clock.

* * Parties desirous of communicating with the Bible Society, Toronto, on any of the matters indicated above, will greatly oblige the Secretaries by adhering to the foregoing regulations. Separate communications relating to any of the three subjects named, can, when necessary, be enclosed in one envelope. It will be a great convenience to the Secretaries not to have the matters classified above, mixed together in one communication. They should be kept quite separate.

Stated Meetings of the Board of Directors.—Representation of Auxiliaries and Branches.

Quarterly and other Meetings of the Board.—The Board of Directors shall meet for the transaction of business once in each quarter, and at any other time when called together by the Secretaries, or by any three of the Directors.

Quarterly Meetings of the Board shall be held on the second Tuesday of January, April, July, and October, of each year, at 7.30 o'clock P.M. Monthly Meetings are held on the second Tuesday in each month, at the same hour.

Appointment of Agents.—No Travelling Agent of the Society shall be appointed by the Board, except at one of these Quarterly Meetings.

Representation of Local Branches at the Board.—The President, Vice-President, Treasurer, Secretary, and Agents of each Auxiliary and Branch in connection with the Upper Canada Bible Society shall be *ex-officio* Members of the Board of Directors, at Toronto; and, as such, shall have the right to attend all the Meetings of the Board.

GRANTS TO SUNDAY SCHOOLS.

That in all applications for grants of Bibles to Sunday Schools, the applicant be requested to furnish the Secretaries with an account of the state of the School; the number of Scholars and Teachers; the amount of Funds at the disposal of the Managers; who are its officers; and why it is necessary to make such application; all which should in every case be certified by a Minister of the Gospel, or some other person of known respectability. And further, this Board recommends that the Secretaries make grants in future only to destitute settlements; reporting the same to the next Meeting of the Board of Directors.

PRICE OF THE "RECORDER."

Some of the Branches having expressed a desire to obtain a larger number of *Recorders* than those already forwarded to them, the Board recommends that a small price be paid by each Branch for any additional supply they may be pleased to order, viz. :—Single copies, for the year, 20 cents; ten copies to one address, \$1.50; over ten and under 50 copies, at the rate of \$13 per 100; any quantity over 50 copies, \$12 per 100; in each case including postage.
