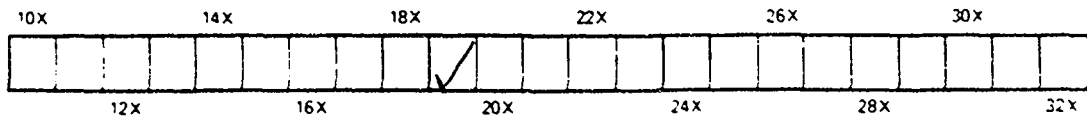

THE LATE MEETING OF SYNOD.

We have neither leisure nor space for any lengthened remarks on the proceedings on the late meeting of Synod. But we cannot allow *this number of the Record* to go forth, without an expression of gratitude to the Great Head of the Church, for His goodness manifested to us in connexion with our late meeting. In many ways has his goodness been manifested. It is through his goodness that we have been preserved with almost unbroken numbers during the year, and that so many ministers and elders were permitted to meet together in conference on the affairs of Zion. We have to thank Him that the Synod was enabled to go through such a large amount of business, we trust, on the whole, in a satisfactory manner. A stranger listening to the proceedings of Synod might have occasionally felt that much precious time was wasted, and that comparatively unimportant matters were occupying the attention of the Synod to the prejudice of more important interests. But we acknowledge, that, on reviewing the business actually done, we have felt astonished at the real amount of it, and at the great number of matters that received attention, in a greater or less degree. We have to thank the Head of the Church, too, for the large measure of unanimity and harmony that prevailed, and for the absence of anything like party spirit. The fact, that on several questions the motions submitted were somewhat numerous, does not disprove our assertion that there was a large measure of unanimity. For, in point of fact, the motions frequently differed but little from each other, and indicated, not so much any marked contrariety of view or sentiment, as a conscientious desire to have the best possible deliverance come to by the Synod.

On one or two particulars important action has been taken by the Synod, which may influence our position as a church, not only now, but in years to come. 1. In the first place, we may mention the reception of Mr. Chiniquy and his congregation at St. Ann's. We trust that, notwithstanding the difficulties which have surrounded this matter, the step taken by the Synod may commend itself, by the results, as the wisest and best. Viewing Mr. Chiniquy and his people more in the light of French Canadians than of citizens of Illinois, we shall have abundant cause for thankfulness, if our reception of them into our church leads, as we hope it may do, to fresh efforts and still greater

success in the evangelization of Lower Canada. One thing is certain, it is our duty to extend largely our sympathy and our prayers in behalf of these interesting members of the church of Christ, exposed as they are to many dangers and trials. 2. The unanimity and good feeling of the Synod with reference to the support of the *Theological Institution* augurs well for the future. We trust that the measures recommended will be carried out with wisdom and zeal, and that the result will be that the College, so necessary for the extension and even the continuance of the Church, will be freed from all embarrassment, and enabled, with vigor and success, to pursue its career of usefulness. 3. The measures adopted with reference to our Home Mission operation; will, we doubt not, soon lead to a matured and well-considered system, which may reconcile divergent views, and result in the rapid and wide extension of the church throughout the land. 4. The emphatic and unanimous voice of the Synod, in the matter of the University endowment and the support of denominational colleges, will remove all possibility of misrepresentation, and show that in this matter the Synod is one.

COLLECTION FOR THE SYNOD FUND.

By appointment of Synod the annual collection for the Synod Fund will be taken up in the various congregations of the Church on the third Sabbath of this month. Participating as all the congregations do in the advantages connected with our *Synodical organization*, it is but equitable that they should all bear their share in the necessary expenses. Were all to do their part, the burden, in any case, would be comparatively light.

It may be observed that henceforth a certain proportion of the expenses incurred in the accommodation of members of Synod, when attending the annual meeting, will be charged on this fund. This should be borne in mind by congregations when taking up the collection.

The collection is to be remitted to the Rev. William Reid, Knox College, Toronto.

Home Ecclesiastical Intelligence.

STATISTICAL AND FINANCIAL RETURNS.—By appointment of Synod the Financial and Statistical Returns are to be published in the *Record*, with the view of their being more extensively read. We publish the Financial Returns in our present number. The Convener of the Committee has taken all pains to have them correct. Should any errors be pointed out we shall be glad to correct them. The Statistical Returns will appear in next number.

BETHESDA CHURCH AND ALNWICK.—We understand that the Rev. Mr. McWilliam is to receive a call from the congregations of Bethesda Church and Alnwick.

MONO—**REV. J. CORBET**.—We observe by the published reports of the Conference of the Wesleyan Church, that the Rev. John Corbet has been received as a minister of that Church. We have reason to know, on the best authority, that there was no reference to the Presbytery of Toronto, with which Mr. Corbet was connected, as to his standing or character, nor any communication on the part of Mr. Corbet with the Presbytery, from whom he received the charge of a congregation, and in whose presence he solemnly vowed to discharge the duties of pastor among the people of his charge. Mr. Corbet, we understand, remains in Mono as Wesleyan minister. We trust the people may be enabled to stand firm in the trying circumstances in which they are placed.

PORT HOPE.—The congregation of Port Hope, vacant since the death of the Rev. J. Cassie, two years ago, have given a call to the Rev. D. Waters, Saugeen.

BOWMORE, STAYNER, & C.—The Rev. James Greenfield has accepted the call from the congregations of Bowmore, Stayner, & c.

REV. G. CHEYNE—BINBROOK AND SALTFLEET.—The congregations of Saltfleet and Binbrook have presented their pastor, the Rev. G. Cheyne, with a handsome covered carriage and harness as a mark of their esteem and an expression of their appreciation of his long and arduous labors among them.

BLYTHE AND HULLETT.—Missionary Associations have been lately formed at Blythe and Hullett. Since their formation the following sums have been realized,—Hullett: per Mrs. Leighton, \$14 21; Miss Eliot, \$6 10; Miss Watt, \$11 30; Mrs. Warwick, \$11 03; Church collections, \$4 50, in all \$47 74.

Blythe: per Mrs. McNaughton, \$7 92½; Mrs. Laidlaw, \$4 65; Miss McDonald, \$7 39½; Miss Barr, \$2 21; Mrs. Campbell, \$1 50; Mrs. McGowan, \$1 37½; Mrs. Dunbar, \$1 07, in all, \$26 12½. These sums have been apportioned among the various schemes of the church, as acknowledged in the *Record*.

MEETING OF SYNOD.

The Synod of the Canada Presbyterian Church met in the Central Church, Hamilton, on the evening of Tuesday, 2nd June, and continued in session until noon of Friday, 12th. The opening sermon was preached by the retiring Moderator, the Rev. R. Ure, from Psalm cx. 1 & 2. For his sermon, and for his conduct as Moderator during the past year, Mr. Ure received the thanks of the Synod. After public worship, the Synod was constituted for business, and proceeded to elect a Moderator. It was found that various nominations had been made by Presbyteries, viz., Rev. W. Aitken, Rev. Jas. Dick, Rev. John Baird, Rev. W. Barrie, Rev. W. Caven, Rev. J. J. A. Proudfoot, Rev. J. Skinner, and Rev. A. Topp. The Rev. J. Dick was elected, and took the chair.

The second sederunt was occupied mainly with devotional exercises, which were conducted by the Moderator, Dr. Burns, Mr. Skinner and Mr. Smellie.

The Synod, on motion made and seconded, unanimously agreed to present the cordial thanks of the Synod to John Henderson Esq., of Park, for his late valuable donation of books to each minister of the church.

It was also unanimously agreed to prepare and transmit a dutiful and loyal address to Her Majesty the Queen, and also a congratulatory address to their Royal Highnesses the Prince and Princess of Wales. These addresses were subsequently prepared and submitted to the Synod, and ordered to be transmitted through the usual channel.

The Synod then proceeded to appoint several committees, viz.: a committee to examine and report on the returns of Presbyteries to remits of Synod; a committee to nominate the several standing committees of Synod; a committee to examine the records of Synod, and committees to examine the records of the several Presbyteries.

The Synod also appointed a committee on causes, consisting of fifteen members, to

whom causes coming up from Presbyteries might be referred to, be carefully considered and prepared for adjudication, and who should bring up a finding to be submitted to the Synod.

GENERAL ASSEMBLY.—On the report of the committee, it appeared that five Presbyteries approved of the overture for the formation of a General Assembly, and that seven disapproved of it, considering the proposal as premature. Two Presbyteries had given no report. It was moved by the Rev. A. F. Kemp, and seconded by Rev. J. K. Smith, that a committee be appointed to draft a scheme for the constitution of a General Assembly and District Synods, to be remitted to Presbyteries and Sessions for consideration. It was moved in amendment by Rev. J. Ross, seconded by Rev. D. Cameron, that the overture on a General Assembly, having been disapproved by a majority of Presbyteries, be rejected. The motion was carried, and the Synod in terms thereof appointed a committee. This committee, at a subsequent sederunt, gave in a draft of a constitution for a General Assembly, which is sent down for consideration of Presbyteries and Sessions.

LICENSING OF STUDENTS.—The Synod granted leave to Presbyteries to take on trial for license the following students, viz. Messrs. John Davidson, Geo. Grant, A. Grant, A. McNaughton, W. Lundy, John Thompson, Thos. McGuire, Jas. Mitchell, D. Duff, H. Gracey, James Malcolm, J. B. Taylor and John Morrison.

RECEPTION OF MINISTERS.—On the report of the committee appointed on the matter, the Synod authorized the reception of the Rev. E. W. Garner and the Rev. R. Ewing. The Presbytery of Montreal was authorized to receive the Rev. J. Donaldson, on his producing a regular dismissal from the Presbytery of North River, U. S. The case of Mr. Carruthers was remitted to the Presbytery of Hamilton. It was resolved that in future all ministers applying for admission should personally appear at the meeting of Synod at which such application is made.

TRANSFERENCE OF CERTAIN MISSION STATIONS.—On application duly made, the Synod authorized the transference of the station of Kirkton from the Presbytery of Stratford to the Presbytery of Huron, and of Burns' church, East Zorra, from the Presbytery of Paris to the Presbytery of Stratford.

MODEL TRUST DEED.—An overture from the Presbytery of Kingston was brought before the Synod, setting forth the expediency of drafting a model trust deed for church property, which might be recommended to congregations requiring such deed. A committee was appointed to take steps for the accomplishment of such object, and to report at next meeting of Synod—the committee to consist of Messrs. Kemp, Topp, Andrew Wilson, the Moderator, Hon. J. McMurrich, Messrs. G. Davidson, J. Dalgleish and J. Davidson.

OVERTURE ON FORMS OF PROCEDURE, &c.—In accordance with an overture from the Presbytery of Cobourg, the Synod appointed a committee to consider the whole subject of forms of procedure, &c., and to report as to what may be best for the church both in regard to forms of procedure and of process in cases of discipline—the committee to consist of the Moderator, Messrs. Kemp, Smellie, Middleniss, Gillespie, Baird, Jennings, and the Clerks of Synod.

REPORT ON STATE OF RELIGION.—The report of the committee on the state of religion was given in by Rev. J. McTavish, Convener. The report referred to manifest tokens of a work of grace in several parts of the bounds of the Synod. Reference was made to the fact that the queries sent to Presbyteries by the committee had been but partially attended to and answered. This was explained on the part of the Presbyteries concerned by the statement that the queries had not been received in time to be laid before the Presbyteries for their mature and full consideration. Various motions were brought forward with reference to this report, not, however, differing very materially from each other. The motion which was ultimately adopted was one proposed by the Rev. A. Topp, to the following effect: "That the report be received and adopted, that the thanks of the Synod be tendered to the committee, and especially to the Convener for the same; and that it be remitted to them to prepare and issue a pastoral address founded thereon to the members of the church." In connexion with this subject, the Moderator called on the Rev. J. Scott, of London, to lead the Synod in expressing their devout gratitude to God for the many cheering evidences of His favour and blessing furnished by the report of the committee.

DISPENSATION OF THE SACRAMENT OF THE LORD'S SUPPER.—The Synod, at its meeting in 1862, having approved of the proposal to unite synodically in the ordinance of the

Supper at this meeting, and having appointed a committee to make the necessary arrangements, the committee presented a report stating the arrangements which had been made for the dispensation of the ordinance of the Supper, in the Central Church, on the afternoon of Sabbath. A long discussion ensued on the subject, with special reference to the services connected with the ordinance. Various motions were submitted. It was ultimately agreed, on motion of Rev. W. T. McMullen, that the report of the committee with reference to the dispensation of the sacrament of the Lord's Supper be adopted, with the following alterations, viz. that preparatory exercises be engaged in on Saturday evening in this church, and that an action sermon be preached at 3 o'clock on Sabbath, in connexion with the administration of the ordinance. We may here state that on the Sabbath the ordinance of the Supper was participated in by a large number of communicants, composed of ministers and elders of the Synod, and members of the several congregations in Hamilton. The action sermon was preached by the Rev. J. Duff, of Elora, the address at the fencing of the tables was delivered by the Moderator; and addresses before and after the distribution of the elements were delivered by the Rev. Donald McKenzie, of Zorra, and the Rev. J. M. Roger, of Peterborough, respectively. The season was a solemn one; and the Synod, at its sederunt on the following day, placed on its record an expression of satisfaction with the arrangements, and of devout gratitude for any tokens of the gracious presence and blessing of the Great Master of the Feast.

DEPUTATION FROM CONGREGATIONAL UNION.—The Rev. T. M. Reikie appeared as a delegate from the Congregational Union of Canada, and addressed the Synod, conveying in warm terms the cordial fraternal greetings of the body which he represented. A motion was unanimously adopted, reciprocating the sentiments of Christian friendship expressed by Mr. Reikie. The Synod also appointed the Rev. A. F. Kemp, Rev. D. H. McVicar and Mr. James Court, to attend the next meeting of the Congregational Union.

FOREIGN MISSIONS.—On the evening of Thursday, 4th, the Synod called for the report of the Committee on Foreign Missions. The report was given in by Rev. R. F. Burns, Convener. In connexion with the subject of this report, the Synod heard an interesting address from the Rev. James Gordon, missionary elect of the Presbyterian Church of the Lower Provinces. Mr. Gordon is the brother of the Rev. Mr. Gordon, of the New Hebrides mission, who not long ago was martyred by the cruel and superstitious natives. He gave much interesting information with reference to the missions of the church with which he was connected. The Rev. Jas. Nisbet, who had come from Red River for the purpose of attending the meeting of Synod, also addressed the Synod, giving many interesting facts respecting the country in the North West, the state of religion there, and the openings for missionary labour among the Indians in that region.

The report of the mission was received, and the thanks of the Synod given to the committee, and especially to the Convener, and a small committee appointed to prepare and bring up a deliverance on the subject. This committee, at a subsequent diet, brought up the following deliverance:

1. The Synod would return devout thanksgiving to Almighty God for the measure of success that had attended their efforts in connexion with this enterprise during the past year.

2. They would record their approval of the fidelity and zeal with which Mr. Jamieson has carried on the mission work at New Westminster, and their grateful appreciation of the liberality of the people there, in connexion with the church and manse.

3. They would sanction the action of the committee in offering to unite with the committee of the Free Church of Scotland in sending another missionary to British Columbia, and would empower the committee, if they see fit, to send a missionary from Canada on the terms proposed, if the effort to secure one from Scotland should fail.

4. They would tender thanks to Mr. Nisbet, who, at considerable inconvenience, has come to this meeting of Synod, that he might advocate the claims of the Red River mission. They would further bear testimony to the devotedness with which Messrs. Black and Nisbet have fulfilled the trust reposed in them, and would remit to Messrs. Black and Nisbet to make such temporary provision for the settlers of the Saskatchewan as it may be in their power to render.

5. The Synod desiring, so soon as circumstances will permit, to fulfil their obliga-

tions to the Indians, yet, taking into account the state of the Foreign Mission Fund and the existing demands upon it, would not deem it advisable for the present to incur any new liabilities for this purpose; but they would present this object before the people, as having peculiar claims on their sympathies and benevolence.

6. The Synod would renew their expression of sympathy with the church in the Lower Provinces, on account of the fresh trials with which their South Sea mission has been visited, and their earnest hope that their missionary staff may be speedily filled up. They would further convey to Mr. J. D. Gordon, of the church of Nova Scotia, and one of their missionaries elect to the New Hebrides, their thanks for his presence and address, and their earnest prayer that he may be carried in safety to his distant destination, and be blessed in his missionary labours.

7. The Synod agree to grant, for the erection of the new church at British Columbia, the sum of \$300, in addition to the \$300 already granted by the committee, and the sum of \$200 for the churches at Assiniboine and Little Britain. They would approve of an effort being made privately, by Mr. Nisbet, to raise funds for the erection of a new school-house at Kildonan. They would also fully sanction the action of Mr. Jamieson in appropriating the proceeds accruing from the school at New Westminster, taught by him during a portion of the year, as follows, viz for the Church Building Fund, \$100; and for the erection of a school-house at New Westminster, \$150.

8. They would recommend the publication of the report for circulation throughout the congregations of the church.

9. The Synod approve of the formation of missionary associations in congregations, wherever they are deemed practicable, as tending to develop a missionary spirit, and a more enlarged liberality among the congregations.

10. Finally, the Synod would affectionately urge on Presbyteries and Sessions to give increased prominence in their deliberations to the Foreign Missions of the church, they would bespeak for them the assistance of the children of the church, already in some measure liberally tendered, and they would commend it to the united prayers and systematic benevolence of all our congregations.

ASHBURN CASE—REPORT OF COMMISSION.—The Ashburn case, which occupied the attention of the Synod in 1862, was again before the Synod. It was brought before the attention of the Synod by the report of the commission appointed last year, and by several appeals and a memorial on the part of the Rev. T. Sharp. The papers having been read, were referred to the committee on causes, already appointed. It may be stated that at a subsequent diet this committee presented a full and elaborate report, presenting all the facts in the case, and expressing the opinion which they had been enabled to form thereon. They expressed disapproval of the action of the Session at Ashburn, in cutting off the dissentient elders and members. They disapproved also, in several particulars, of the action of the commission in the case, although sensible of the great difficulties with which they had to contend. They recommended that the complaint of Mr. Sharp against the commission be sustained, but that Mr. Sharp's appeal against the legality of a *pro re rata* meeting be dismissed, and that two other appeals be sustained only in so far as they were to be regarded as the following out by Mr. Sharp of his complaint against the commission. The report concluded by stating that all difficulty in this case was, in their opinion, now removed, by Mr. Sharp having tendered the resignation of his charge in a spirit which the committee were constrained to commend. The committee finally recommended, that the resignation of Mr. Sharp be accepted; and, that in view of the resignation of Mr. Sharp, and believing that the peace and welfare of the congregations at Ashburn and Utica require it, the elders now constituting the Session at Ashburn and Utica, including the dissentient elders, be removed from office in those congregations, it being at the same time declared that they are still elders of the church, and eligible for re-election; also, that the Presbytery of Ontario be instructed to provide for these congregations, as in the case of a congregation without a Session; and further, to employ all such legitimate and kindly measures as they may deem necessary, in accordance with the laws of the church, to restore unity and harmony in the congregations. The Synod received and adopted the report, and declared in terms of the deliverance recommended in the report.

REPORT OF COMMITTEE APPOINTED TO CONFER WITH PRINCIPAL WILLIS LAST YEAR, WITH REFERENCE TO HIS RESIGNATION.—The Synod having, on Friday, 5th, called for the report of the committee appointed to confer with Principal Willis on the subject of his resignation, the report was given in and read, with a letter from Principal Will-

withdrawing his resignation. Several motions were submitted. That which ultimately was agreed to, was proposed by the Rev. J. Gillespie, seconded by the Rev. W. S. Ball, to the following effect, viz.: That the report of the committee on the resignation of Principal Willis be received and approved; that the diligence of the committee be commended; and that the Synod record their satisfaction in learning that Dr. Willis has agreed to withdraw his resignation.

HOME MISSION REPORT.—The report of the committee on Home Missions was called for on the evening of Friday, 5th, and was given in and read by Dr. Thornton, Convener. The report set forth the proceedings of the committee in distributing the missionaries on their list, and the amount received for the Central Fund, with the appropriation of these moneys. The following motion was adopted with reference to this report: "Receive and adopt the report; commend the diligence of the committee; but inasmuch as this report does not embrace the mission work undertaken by Presbyteries distinct from that which comes legitimately before the Central H. M. Committee, instruct Presbyteries, within six weeks from this date, to forward special reports of their Home Mission proceedings for the past year, to a committee consisting of Dr. Thornton, Convener, Mr. McTavish, and Mr. Baird; that from said reports a full statement of the Home Mission work may be prepared, and presented to the church through the *Record* on as early a day as possible. Further, the Synod express their sincere thanks to the sister church in Ireland, for their liberal grant for Home Mission purposes in Canada, and instruct the Moderator to communicate said thanks with a suitable letter to the Chairman of the Mission Board." The report of the Buxton mission was subsequently read. It was received, and referred to a select committee to report a deliverance at a future diet.

DISSENT AND COMPLAINT OF REV. D. CAW.—The Synod took up a dissent and complaint of Rev. D. Caw, against action of Presbytery of Paris, ordering Session of Dumfries-street church, Paris, to grant a certificate of membership. The papers were read, and parties fully heard. After discussion, the Synod agreed to dismiss the dissent and complaint, and confirm the action of the Presbytery in so far as it declares that there was no ground why the party referred to should be refused a certificate of church membership, and instruct the Presbytery to furnish the party with the certificate to which he is entitled.

ST. MARY'S CASE.—There was a reference from the Presbytery of Stratford, in the matter of the St. Mary's case, which was before the Synod in Toronto, 1862. The case grew out of arrears of stipend to the Rev. D. Beattie, the former minister. The Presbytery having met with difficulties in carrying out the deliverance of last Synod, again referred the matter to the Synod. The deliverance come to was: Sustain the reference; approve the conduct of the Presbytery; reaffirm the principle of moral obligation, and declare that inasmuch as the congregation is in a disorganized state, and has virtually ceased to exist, the Synod find that it is impracticable further to deal with this matter as a congregational liability, and instruct the Presbytery of Stratford to grant certificates to former members of Chalmers' church who, in the judgment of the Presbytery, have done their duty in this matter.

UNIVERSITY QUESTION.—The Rev. A. F. Kemp, on the part of the committee appointed at last Synod, reported what had been done in the matter, and the steps taken to have petitions forwarded from all the congregations of the church. In connexion with this report, the Synod considered an overture from the Presbytery of Cobourg on the subject of public education. Principal Willis briefly explained his views, to the effect that, while he held the principle that secular and religious education could not safely be disunited, he was quite at one with his brethren on the subject of the University endowment. The Synod unanimously agreed to receive the report, and to appoint anew a committee to watch over any legislative action; the committee being authorized to petition against any attempt that may be made to interfere with the endowment of the Provincial University, or further to foster, by the aid of other public funds denominational institutions.

REPORT OF COLLEGE BOARD.—On the evening of Monday, 8th, the important subject of the College was taken up. The report of the Board was read by the Rev. R. Ure, Chairman. The report gave full information as to the number of students, viz., 34, in the theological department, and 26 in the preparatory—total, 60, the state of the funds; the disbursements from the Bursary fund; the amount expended on the library, and the satisfactory management of the boarding-house during the past year.

The report concluded with several recommendations as to the best means of sustaining all the interests of the institution. After reasoning, it was, on motion of Rev. J. Laing, seconded by Hon. J. McMurrich, resolved, That the report of the College be received, its recommendations adopted, and that it be printed as an appendix to the minutes, and with the view of meeting the great deficiency in the income of the ordinary College fund, that the Synod instruct the Board to prepare and remit to Presbyteries a statement of the amount which they may be expected to contribute within their respective bounds—in the preparation of such statement having regard to the numbers and circumstances of the congregations concerned, and instruct Presbyteries to transmit a similar statement to Kirk Sessions, and to visit by reputation any congregations which may not be doing their duty towards the Fund; further, that the last week in February be appointed as the time, on or before which all contributions shall be remitted,—at the same time that congregations that can do so be urged to remit the money as much earlier as possible. It was also agreed that, as in former years, the first Sabbath of October be appointed as a day of special prayer in all the congregations of the church in behalf of Knox College.

PROTESTS AND APPEALS OF MR. W. KENNEDY AND OTHERS.—The Synod had transmitted by the committee on bills and overtures, three protests and appeals by Mr. W. Kennedy and others, against the Presbytery of Hamilton, with reference to certain matters connected with Knox's Church, Hamilton. These cases having been called, Mr. Kennedy appeared, and asked leave, for reasons, to withdraw the appeals. Leave was granted. The Clerk of the Presbytery of Hamilton, on behalf of the Presbytery, appeared, and took protestation that the appeals in the cases before named were fallen from, and craved extracts, which were granted.

The Synod then took up a protest and appeal of Rev. Dr. Irvine against action of Presbytery of Hamilton, deciding to hear parties in the case of memorial of Mr. Jas. Walker. The papers were read, and parties heard. After full discussion the following motion was adopted: Dismiss the appeal, so far as the entertaining of the memorial by the Presbytery is concerned, but with regard to the subsequent steps taken by the Presbytery, in seeking information by treating the congregation and Session of Knox's church as parties, and citing them to the bar of the Presbytery without specifying in what capacity they were to appear, or on what matter they were to be examined, find their course so far irregular, sustain the protest and appeal to this extent, and send back the matter to the Presbytery, to proceed according to the laws of the church. From this finding Mr. Kemp, for himself and others who might adhere to him, entered his dissent.

REFERENCE FROM PRESBYTERY OF GUELPH.—The Synod took up a reference from the Presbytery of Guelph, in the matter of arrears of stipend claimed by Mr. T. J. Hodgskin from Hespeler, and a protest of said congregation against a deed of the Presbytery in this case. After hearing papers and parties, the following motion was adopted. "Sustain the reference, and reverse the decision of the Presbytery of Guelph, declaring that \$80 were due Mr. Hodgskin as arrears of stipend by the Hespeler congregation.

PROTEST AND APPEAL OF REV. D. CAMERON.—The Synod took up a protest and appeal of Rev. D. Cameron, against Presbytery of Montreal, in reversing a decision of the Session of Lochiel, in the matter of Mr. Malcolm McGillivray's application for a certificate of membership. After a full hearing of the case, two motions were submitted. One, proposed by Rev. J. Mitchell, was to the effect that the Synod dismiss the protest and appeal, and sustain the action of the Presbytery. The other, moved by Rev. A. Wilson was to the effect that the appeal be sustained, and the action of the Presbytery be reversed. Mr. Wilson's amendment was carried on a division. From this finding, Messrs. Kemp, McVicar and Watson dissented.

REFERENCE IN WINSLOW CASE.—The Synod took up a reference from the Presbytery of Montreal, in the case of certain parties in the congregation of Winslow, and of Rev. E. McLean. Papers having been read, it was agreed to send the reference and relative documents to the committee on causes. At a subsequent diet the committee reported a deliverance, which was agreed to. The deliverance was to the effect that it would not be for edification that the Presbytery of Montreal should proceed to grant moderation in a call, and instruct the Presbytery accordingly.

DAY OF THANK-GIVING.—On motion of Principal Willis, the Synod adopted the following minute.—The Synod impressed with the duty of recognizing the God of

Providence, appoint, prospectively, exercises of thanksgiving to the bountiful giver of all good for the fruits of the field; empower the Moderator, when it shall appear reasonable, to call on the congregations of this church to engage in such exercises, or to aid by correspondence with others concerned, in securing a general recognition by the community of the good hand of God.

RECEPTION OF REV. C. CHINIQUY.—One of the most important and interesting subjects before the Synod was the report of the committee appointed to consider the application made last year by Mr. Chiniquy and his people at St. Ann's, Illinois, for admission to this church. The report of the committee was given by Mr. Kemp, Convener, and supplementary statements were made by Messrs. J. Scott, of London, and W. Caven, of St. Mary's, the other members of the committee. The subject was discussed at great length. There were five motions brought forward. No motion expressed any feeling adverse ultimately to the reception of Mr. Chiniquy, but several of them were in favour of delay. Ultimately, on the motion of the Rev. J. Mitchell, the deliverance of the committee was adopted. It was in the following terms:—The Synod finding from the report of their committee, that in the year 1861 the Synod of Chicago, O. S., had vindicated Mr. Chiniquy from accusations then brought against him, and that nothing had emerged in subsequent proceedings that might not be accounted for by the feelings of parties in the case, and nothing on account of which they should withhold their fraternal recognition of Mr. Chiniquy, agree, that, considering the interests of religion involved, they receive Mr. Chiniquy as a minister, he disclaiming that in any of his proceedings he designed any disrespect to the Presbytery of Chicago, place him and his congregation as a mission station of the church under the spiritual care of the Presbytery of London; appoint also a committee to advise Mr. Chiniquy in all matters which may be of general interest to the cause of religion among the people associated with him in Illinois; and that this committee be instructed respectfully to inform the Presbytery of Chicago of their decision, and explain to them that the general interests of religion seemed to warrant this step on the part of the Synod.

Mr. Topp entered his dissent from this finding, in which he was joined by Messrs. Donk, A. Wilson, D. Inglis, Baird, Laing, and Cochrane.

FRENCH CANADIAN MISSION AT SANDWICH.—The Presbytery of London presented a report on the mission to French Canadians at Sandwich. The Rev. W. Bennett was heard on the subject. The synod received the report, and remitted the matter to the Presbytery of London, renewing the instructions of last year to take such steps in the meantime as they may see fit, in conjunction with the Home Mission Committee, for providing Christian instruction for the French Canadian people in that district.

RIGHT OF PARTIES TO VOTE AT ELECTION OF MINISTERS, &c.—The Presbytery of Cobourg brought before the Synod, by an overture, the propriety of issuing a declaration as to who were entitled to vote at the election of a minister and officers, and at congregational meetings. The matter was referred to a committee, who reported a deliverance, which is to be sent down for the consideration of Presbyteries and Sessions in terms of the Barrier Act.

SECTION 7TH OF ACT OF UNION WITH REFERENCE TO CONGREGATIONAL PROPERTY—Various memorials and overtures on the subject of the 7th clause of the Act of Union were referred to a committee. A report was subsequently presented which was received and ordered to be sent down to Presbyteries and Sessions, that they may report on the subject to next Synod.

REFERENCE OF PRESBYTERY OF HURON ANENT REV. C. FLETCHER.—The Synod took up a reference from the Presbytery of Huron anent application of Rev. C. Fletcher, to be placed on the same footing as other ministers without charge, and to be admitted to the rights of the Widows' Fund, and the Fund for Aged and Infirm Ministers. Mr. Ure was heard in support of the reference. The Synod, after reasoning, agreed after a vote, that, in consideration of the services of the Rev. C. Fletcher, and of the cause by which he was laid aside from pastoral work, the Presbytery of Huron have leave to place his name in their role, it being understood that his status as a minister should be the same as that accorded on special grounds to certain ordained missionaries of their church.

It was also agreed that the question as to Mr. Fletcher's connexion with the Widows' Fund and the Fund for Aged and Infirm Ministers, should be referred to

the consideration of the special committee on the Widows' Fund for the congregations of the late United Presbyterian Church, to be reported on at next meeting of Synod.

REPORT OF COMMITTEES ON WIDOWS' FUND AND FUND FOR AGED AND INFIRM MINISTERS.—The reports of these two important committees were presented and were sustained. The general Widows' Fund now amounts to upwards of \$36,000; while for the special fund to be raised by the congregations of the late United Presbyterian Church there has been received about \$3,000, one-half of the entire amount to be raised in three years. During the year one new assistant has come on the fund, the widow of the late Rev. James Geggie.

The Fund for Aged and Infirm Ministers has also increased during the year. It was agreed to grant to the Rev. Joseph Young, of Brantford, \$100 per annum from this fund, and \$50 per annum to Dr. Cairns.

EXPENSES OF MEMBERS OF SYNOD.—On the report of a committee appointed at a previous diet, it was agreed that the attention of congregations be called by a notice in the *Record* to the duty of paying the travelling expenses of members of Synod, and that the Synod authorize the committee of accommodation to draw upon the Synod Fund to an amount not exceeding \$250 towards paying the expenses incurred by them in providing accommodation for members of the Court not enjoying the hospitality of private families while residing in Toronto.

REPRESENTATION OF SESSIONS IN CHURCH COURTS.—There were laid before the Synod overtures from the sessions and congregations of English Settlement and Bethel Church, on the representation of sessions in church courts, referring more especially to the case of two or more congregations under the care of one pastor. The Synod referred the overture to the committee already appointed in a book of forms. To the same committee were referred an overture on the Temporalities of congregations, and another on the subject of Citations and disjunctions from sessions.

CONGREGATIONAL SINGING.—The important subject of congregational singing was brought before the Synod by an overture from the Rev. R. Monteath. The matter referred to a committee, to consider what steps should be taken with a view to improve congregational singing throughout the church, and to report to next Synod.

HOME MISSION ARRANGEMENTS.—The Synod, after hearing the report of a Committee, re-enacted for this year the Home Mission regulations, and appointed a special committee to consider the whole subject, and to mature a plan to be sent down to Presbyteries before the month of November, Presbyteries to consider and report their views on the same before the 1st of April.

REPORT ON THEOLOGICAL EDUCATION.—A report was presented by the committee appointed last year. It was agreed to defer the consideration it until next Synod, and that in the meantime it be inserted in the Appendix to the Minutes.

STATISTICS.—An elaborate report on Statistics was received from the committee, drawn up by the convener, Rev. J. Gray, of Orillia. It presented many features of an encouraging character, but, on the other hand, set forth the sad fact, not only that the stipends of ministers are, in many cases, inadequate, but that in too many cases arrears have been allowed in the payment of the amount promised. This should not be so. The Report, with the Statistical Returns, will appear in the *Record*.

REPORTS OF VARIOUS STANDING COMMITTEES.—Reports were presented before the Synod closed from the committee on the *Home and Foreign Record*, the committee on the Finances of the Church, the committee on Sabbath Schools, and the committee on Sabbath Observance. These, with some other reports, were severally received and approved, and all the standing committees were appointed in the report of the committee appointed to nominate members. To the committee on Temperance was referred a memorial from the Grand Division of the Sons of Temperance.

STATED COLLECTIONS.—The stated collections were appointed as last year:—

For Synod Fund, on 3rd Sabbath of July.

For Widows' Fund and Fund for Aged and Infirm Ministers, 3rd Sabbath of October.

For Foreign Mission, on 3rd Sabbath of January.

For Home Mission, on 3rd Sabbath of April.

The Synod recommend collection for French Canadian Missionary Society on : rd Sabbath of February, or any other convenient Sabbath.

The contributions for Knox College to be made during or before last week of February. Congregations that can do so are urged to attend to this matter sooner.

Cordial thanks were voted to the committee of accommodation, to the trustees of Central Church, and to Christian friends in Hamilton, for the courtesy and kindness manifested during this meeting of Synod.

After a long but not unpleasant meeting the Synod closed its proceedings in the usual way, at 1 o'clock p.m., of Friday, 12th June, and the next or ordinary meeting of Synod was appointed to be held in Cooke's Church, Toronto, on the 2nd Tuesday of June, 1864, at 7½ p.m.

GENERAL ASSEMBLY OF THE FREE CHURCH OF SCOTLAND.

The General Assembly of the Free Church met in Edinburgh as usual on the third Thursday of May. The opening sermon was preached by the Rev. Dr. Guthrie, from the text Mark xvi. 15: "He said unto them, go ye forth into all the world, and preach the gospel to every creature." The sermon was characterized by all the eloquence and power of the eminent preacher. The Rev. Roderick McLeod, of Snizort, was unanimously elected Moderator.

The total amount collected during the year ending March, 1863, had been as follows.

This amount exceeded that of last year by £4,834; but the increase had been chiefly in local congregational funds. There was a falling off in the amounts raised for Colleges and for Foreign Missions.

There was a large amount of business before the Assembly. There was a lively discussion on the subject of innovations in public worship. After lengthened debate, in which Dr. Begg and Dr. Guthrie bore an important part (Dr. Guthrie's congregation have adopted the practice of standing while singing and kneeling in prayer), a motion by Mr. Dunlop, M.P., with an addition suggested by Principal Fairbairn, was adopted, in substance, that the Assembly deprecate the importance attached by some to outward forms and practices, urge on the ministers of the church the duty of seeking to preserve the peace and unity of their congregations, and appoint a committee to consider and report on the legislation of the church on this subject.

Perhaps the most interesting discussion was on the subject of union with the United Presbyterian Church. The leading men in the Assembly took part in the discussion, including Dr. Candlish, Dr. Guthrie, the Earl of Kintore, and others. The Assembly unanimously agreed to appoint a Committee to consider the subject, and to confer with the Committee appointed by the Synod of the United Presbyterian Church, and with the representatives of any other Churches indicated in the overtures. A rider was proposed by Prof. Gibson, to the effect that the principles and

standards of the church should not be compromised, but this rider was subsequently withdrawn. The reports on Foreign and Jewish Missions, and the operations of the Colonial Committee, were interesting. Dr. Duff returns from India to undertake the Convener'ship of the Foreign Mission Committee.

The Rev. Dr. Taylor, of Montreal, addressed the Assembly, in connexion with the Report of the Colonial Committee.

SYNOD OF THE UNITED PRESBYTERIAN CHURCH.

This Synod held its usual annual meeting in Edinburgh on the 11th May and following days. The business transacted was varied and important. The Rev. Mr. Young, of Logie Almond, the oldest officiating minister in Scotland, was called to preside as Moderator.

From the report on General Statistics for the past year, it appears that there are in the church, ministers, 577 (being an increase of 4 during the year), elders, 4,236, probationers, 103, students of divinity, 161, congregations, 577; communicants, 168,245, being an increase of 687 during the year.

The entire income of the church in 1862 was £202,875, being a decrease of £2,291, as compared with the preceding year, but an increase over other years. The average sum contributed per member was £1 4s. 1½d.

PROVINCIAL SYNOD IN ENGLAND.—On the report of the committee appointed last year, the Synod sanctioned the constitution of an English Synod, to be, however, subordinate to the General Synod in Scotland, appeals from Presbyteries coming before the General Synod.

MANSE SCHEME.—It was reported that nearly one half of the proposed amount of £45,000 for the Central Fund had been raised, the amount subscribed being £22,670 10s. from 370 subscribers.

THEOLOGICAL HALL, LIBRARY, &c — Satisfactory reports were presented on the Theological Hall, Library, &c. The scheme adopted last year for the superintendence of students had wrought well, and large numbers of students had entered the classes opened by ministers for them. The Hall Library was in a good state, and there was at its credit the sum of £298 6s. 5d.

UNION WITH THE FREE CHURCH.—The subject of union with the Free Church and other non-established bodies was brought up by several overtures from Presbyteries and congregations. A very able and interesting discussion followed—the Rev. Mr. Kerr, of Dunse, Dr. Cairns, of Berwick, Dr. King, of London, and other leading men, delivering able speeches in favour of union. A motion having been proposed by Dr. King, to appoint a committee in relation to this subject, and especially to confer with the Free Church, if they should appoint a committee. Mr. Renton moved in amendment that the overtures in the meantime lie on the table. Another amendment was proposed by Mr. Gunion, of Strathaven, to the effect that “any union must have in its basis no compromise of this Synod's distinctive testimony with regard to the civil magistrate's power in matters of religion.” After full discussion a vote was taken, when there voted for Dr. King's motion 198, for Mr. Renton's 14, and for Mr. Gunion's 3.

Interesting reports were given with reference to the Missions of the church.

The important subject of theological training occupied a large share of attention.

We may observe that the Rev. Dr. W. Taylor, of Montreal, received a warm welcome from the Synod.

SYNOD OF PRESBYTERIAN CHURCH OF CANADA IN CONNECTION WITH THE CHURCH OF SCOTLAND.

The annual meeting of this Synod was held in St. Andrew's Church, Montreal. Principal Leitch was succeeded in the Moderatorship by the Rev. J. Campbell, M.A., of Nottawasaga.

The report on the subject of Queen's College was presented by Principal Leitch. The students in arts, last session, were 37; in theology, 21; in medicine, 81; in law, 5, in the Arts Faculty, studying for the ministry, 18. The subject of theological education was discussed, and referred again to a committee.

It was stated that a student had offered himself for foreign mission service. The

Synod again expressed their sense of the urgent claims of Vancouver's Island and British Columbia as a mission field, and directed the attention of the committee to this point.

With reference to the Juvenile India Mission, it was stated that the children of the schools in Canada had raised \$616 for the orphanage institutions in India, whereby 29 orphans were supported.

PRESBYTERIAN ASSEMBLIES IN THE UNITED STATES.

The General Assembly of the Old-School Presbyterian Church met on the 21st May, at Peoria, Illinois. The Rev. J. H. Morrison, of the Presbytery of Indiana, was elected Moderator. The various schemes of the church were reported as on the whole in a satisfactory state, any embarrassment in regard to missionary finances being occasioned chiefly by the high rate of exchange, \$26,500 more having been required for this purpose during the past year, above what was previously required. A spirit of strong attachment to the Union prevailed. The next meeting of the Assembly is appointed to take place at Trenton, N. J.

The New-School Assembly met in Philadelphia. The Assembly passed strong resolutions on the subject of the Union and of Slavery. The subject of Manses was brought before the Assembly by Mr. J. M. Wilson, publisher of the Presbyterian Almanac, and a committee was appointed to report on this matter.

Both Assemblies passed resolutions for a friendly exchange of commissioners at the General Assemblies. Sentiments in favor of union were freely expressed, and it seems as if the time for reunion were rapidly approaching. Deputations from the United Presbyterian Church, and from the Reformed Dutch Church, were also received.

GENERAL ASSEMBLY OF THE ESTABLISHED CHURCH OF SCOTLAND.

The General Assembly of the Church of Scotland met in the Assembly Hall on the third Tuesday of May. Lord Belhaven and Stenton was again Lord High Commissioner, and Dr. Eisset was succeeded in the moderatorship by Dr. Craik, of St. George's Church Glasgow.

The reports of the Colonial Committee and of the Committee on missions in India, &c., presented many features of interest. In British Guiana there are now ten ministers holding parochial charges, besides one ordained missionary. In Ceylon there are six ministers. Aid has been given to congregations in the Argentine Republic, and in other places. The amount raised for the schemes of the church was about £1,000, in excess of the contribution for 1861-2, the amount raised this year being £19,811 3s. 5d.

INNOVATIONS IN WORSHIP.—The Assembly had before it the subject of "Innovations in worship," brought up by an overture from the Presbytery of Aberdeen. Dr. Pirie seconded by Professor Crawford, proposed a motion condemning the innovations referred to, as likely to impair the peace and harmony of the church, and calling on ministers to remember their ordination vows, and in view of them to avoid even the appearance of evil. Dr. Bisset moved that the Assembly find that no case of innovation had arisen calling for interference, and that it be remitted to Presbytery to take order that no change in public worship be introduced inconsistent with the laws of the church, or subversion of the harmony of congregations. The Procurator of the church moved substantially that the subject be referred to a committee, who shall consider the whole matter in connection with the laws and usages of the church, and to refer to next Assembly whether any, or what legislature action may be necessary or expedient, and that ministers and congregations be earnestly recommended to refrain in the meantime from all innovations calculated to impair the peace and harmony of congregations.

Dr. Pirie's motion having been withdrawn, that by the Procurator was carried by a vote of 157 to 41.
