

STRATFORD LIGHT PLANT SHOWS HANDSOME SURPLUS

Over Ten Thousand Dollars in Net Profit After Allowing for Depreciation of Plant.

(Special to The Toronto World) STRATFORD, Jan. 23.—The annual statement of the Stratford light and heat commission, which was issued to-day, shows the affairs of this body to be very prosperous. A net surplus of \$10,218.35 was shown on account of operating plant. Expenditures were \$42.345.35, with receipts as follows: Domestic lighting, \$11.562.49; commer-cial lighting, \$17,033.98; power, \$15.-123.78; street lighting, \$12.130. An allowance of two and one-half per cent. for depreciation amounts to \$3420, making the gross surplus \$13.569.02.
