Strong Hostility in Newfoundland Against Modus Vivendi Arranged by Britain Against Expressed Wishes of Colony.

St. John's, Nfid., Oct. 7.-It was reported to-day that the ministry, following the recent example of the Na-Cobalt, Oct. 7.—(Special.)—It is not a boom but a great world-wide rush that is now centering on Cobalt.





NEW ELEMENT FOUND. Discovery May Show Metals to Be

Complex.

Washington, Oct. 7.- Consul R. Bergh of Gothenburg reports the discovery of a new element by a Swedish scientist. He writes to the state department that J. R. Rydberg, professor in physics at the University in Lund. Sweden, has a new theory about chemical elements. In working on this hypothesis he came to the conclusion there must be an element having less atomic weight than any element heretofore known, in fact, only a small fraction of the atomic weight of

'It is further stated that such an element, the electron, was known be-fore, but that Professor Rydberg has discovered it does not consist of any separate kinds of material. It is thought this discovery will show that metals are not simple elements but metals are not simple elements but are composed of electrons. It will follow also that electron, as the new element is called by Professor Rydberg, is a universal gas which forms an atmosphere which prevails thruout our solar system.




