RIG RUSH IN COBALT CAMP
WEALTH OF BIG MINES
CAN'T BE MEASURED

Twenty-Five Carloads of Silver Ore a Month Shipped to Smelter and This Can Be Doubled—New Owners of Foster Mine Inspect Property.

Cobalt, Oct. 7.—(Special.)—It is not a boom but a great world-wide rush that is now centering on Cobalt.

The little dingy town, with its cheap houses, its trails for streets, its bare rocks, and stumps, is to-day the centre of the mining excitement of America, and it could be of the globe.

In no other piece of territory, say for miles square, is there any such collection of silver ores, and so many men in so many places watching it with such interest.

The wealth of Cobalt cannot be measured. When you start to do it you find in such apparently extravagant calculations that you are afraid of your own sanity. Let us take, for instance, the Foster mine; but these things can be stated as verities, that twenty-five carloads a month are now being shipped, and a half a month; that there is enough of ore blocked out to make this fifty cars a month inside of thirty days; that these figures are only beginnings.

Big Shippers.
 The Nipissing people say they can send twenty-five cars a month now, with 175 men and only a hurry-up plant in position. They are making arrangements for more plant and more men. The Timmins, the Foster, the Jacobs, the Trethewey, Buffalo, McKinnon-Darragh, Drummond, University and the New Trethewey are all big shippers, and the O'Brien and the Lawson could be great ones, perhaps next to the Nipissing were it not for litigation.

But besides this dozen propositions in the big group there is a second group of at least fifteen others that are shipping, or are ready to ship, such as Silver Queen, Hanson, Nova Scotia, Fortinckham, Beaver, Badger, Columbus, Hudson Bay.

The Timmins mine is, next to the Nipissing, standing ahead of any other in development, and there is every reason to believe that its five owners would refuse \$10,000,000 cash for their forty shares.

Million for Foster.
 The Foster people cleaned up over \$1,000,000 cash for their mine last week. They would probably give three times that for it back to-day. There are others capitalized at \$1,000,000 that are quoted on the market for \$2 to \$3 for \$1 shares that will easily take out their capital stock in pay ore inside of twelve months.

These statements seem extravagant, but the facts are coming along to make them good.

There have been men from all over to see these mines—big mining men and big capitalists—and they simply say they never saw anything like it, that they never heard of anything like it, and then they have to cease trying to describe it. The western miners and western miners call it a freak camp, as something out of their ken.

Big men and the agents of big men are here trying to get the best terms and to get options on the big ones. This is an exceedingly hard thing to do, but it is likely that some of the big changes will be recorded in the next fortnight.

Have Silver in Sight.
 Two special cars and a lot of others left here this afternoon for Toronto and the south. One special car containing the friends of the new owners of the Foster mine, who spent Saturday on that property. That mine has shipped three more to-day. They have ore blocked out in one vein for a distance of 120 feet, a shaft at each end and a tunnel 50 feet long underneath that will of itself give \$600,000 worth of silver, and this is a mere beginning.

They have another vein stripped for 750 feet averaging eight inches wide, that indicates an immense sum that has only to be taken out. All the veins on all the properties so far as worked improve in richness and width as they go down.

Another car of Torontonians who went south to-day, headed by Mr. Pinkerton, have been inspecting a fine iron proposition fifty miles north of Cobalt. The Foster party were more than delighted with what they saw. Among them were W. K. George, the new president, W. H. Blake, Mr. Somers and a dozen bankers and brokers.

TO RESIGN IN PROTEST

BRITAIN'S SURRENDER TO U. S.

BOND MINISTRY KICKS

Strong Hostility in Newfoundland Against Modus Vivendi Arranged by Britain Against Expressed Wishes of Colony.

St. John's, Nfld., Oct. 7.—The Evening Telegram, the premier's personal organ, declares that Newfoundland has been sacrificed once more this time to American fishermen, and that the colonial government and people have been ridden over roughshod in the matter.

The paper further says that the modus vivendi was concluded against the advice and despite the protests of the government, and that it now behoves the government to resist this bureaucratic action and to carry out stringently the Foreign Fishing Vessels Act of 1905, and the Bait Act, which Downing-street officials cannot override, because the law of the land is still supreme in the King's realm.

The Evening Herald says that it cannot credit the statement that the Americans have received the right to ship men in colonial waters, as such action would be inexecutable.

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Cecil B. Smith Resigns To Accept Winnipeg Offer

Ontario Government Loses Services of Talented Engineer Except in a Consulting Capacity—West Offers Too Many Inducements.

Cecil B. Smith has resigned the chairmanship of the Temiskaming and Northern Ontario Railway Commission, and accepted the offer of the City of Winnipeg for half his time to take charge of the construction of the new hydraulic development works there. Mr. Smith's salary at Winnipeg will be \$5000, for which he gives up \$3000 on the railway commission, but the greater attraction is the connection opened up in the west as a consulting engineer, and Mr. Smith's own professional interest in the Winnipeg works with which he has been associated since its inception.

Premier Whitney was the first to make the announcement on Saturday morning. He stated that the arrangement had been made with the approval of the government, and was very satisfactory to his colleagues and himself. Mr. Smith would continue as consulting engineer to the railway commission, and also continue as chairman of the hydro-electric power commission.

Besides being a member of the hydro-electric power commission, of which Hon. Adam Beck is chairman, and Hon. Mr. Hendrie the other member, and whose duty is to carry out the provisions of the Municipal Power Act, Mr. Smith is also chief engineer of the first hydro-electric power commission, of which Hon. Adam Beck is chairman, and Messrs. John Milne and George Pattinson members. It is this commission which has been collecting information concerning the water powers of Ontario and issuing reports, three of which have been published. Mr. Smith stated that the information required had now been practically all collected. There were still four men in the field, and a fourth and fifth, and perhaps a sixth report would be necessary. This commission will cease to exist as soon as its duties are performed.

Mr. Smith will continue to reside in Toronto. He expects to take charge of the Winnipeg position about the first of next month, and will go west before then. He will spend alternate periods of a couple of weeks or so in the two cities.

Other engineers for the Winnipeg works is the first thing to which Mr. Smith will devote his energies. He expects to select his colleagues in Toronto, where much of the drafting and planning may be done. The preparation of the specifications and tenders for the Winnipeg contracts he estimates will occupy three or four months. Practically all the preliminary work, except the field work, could be done in Toronto.

CHINA AGREES NOT TO INTERFERE WITH ENGLISH CUSTOMS CONTROL

Some London Papers Contend That Britain Has Received a Diplomatic Rebuff and That Written Promise Should Have Been Given.

Shanghai, Oct. 7.—Sir Robert Hart, director-general of Chinese imperial customs, has issued a circular to the foreign colony here, saying that he has received assurances that his status with regard to Chinese customs will not be changed, and that he is satisfied that there will be no undue interference with foreign control of customs.

PREMIERS ARE GATHERING.

Conference with Federal Leader Will Begin To-day.

Ottawa, Oct. 7.—The provincial premiers are commencing to gather for the conference, which opens to-morrow. British Columbia, Alberta and Prince Edward Island premiers are already here, and others will arrive during the night and in the early morning.

It is not expected that much more will be done to-morrow than the preliminary skirmishing and outlining of the procedure.

To-morrow evening Sir Wilfrid Laurier will hold a reception, and on Tuesday night there will be a banquet under the auspices of the Canadian Club.

GIRL SLAIN BY FIEND.

Eight Year Old Child Assaulted and Killed by Negro.

Monessen, Pa., Oct. 7.—Anna Kunkak, 8 years old, was found murdered in a field near here to-day, with her throat cut. From the appearance of the body, the child had been assaulted. She left home early last evening to bring the cow in, and never returned. After an all-night search, the body was found in a lonely spot, partly covered with ashes.

Upon approaching the spot, the men saw a negro running rapidly thru a piece of woods nearby. He is being searched for.

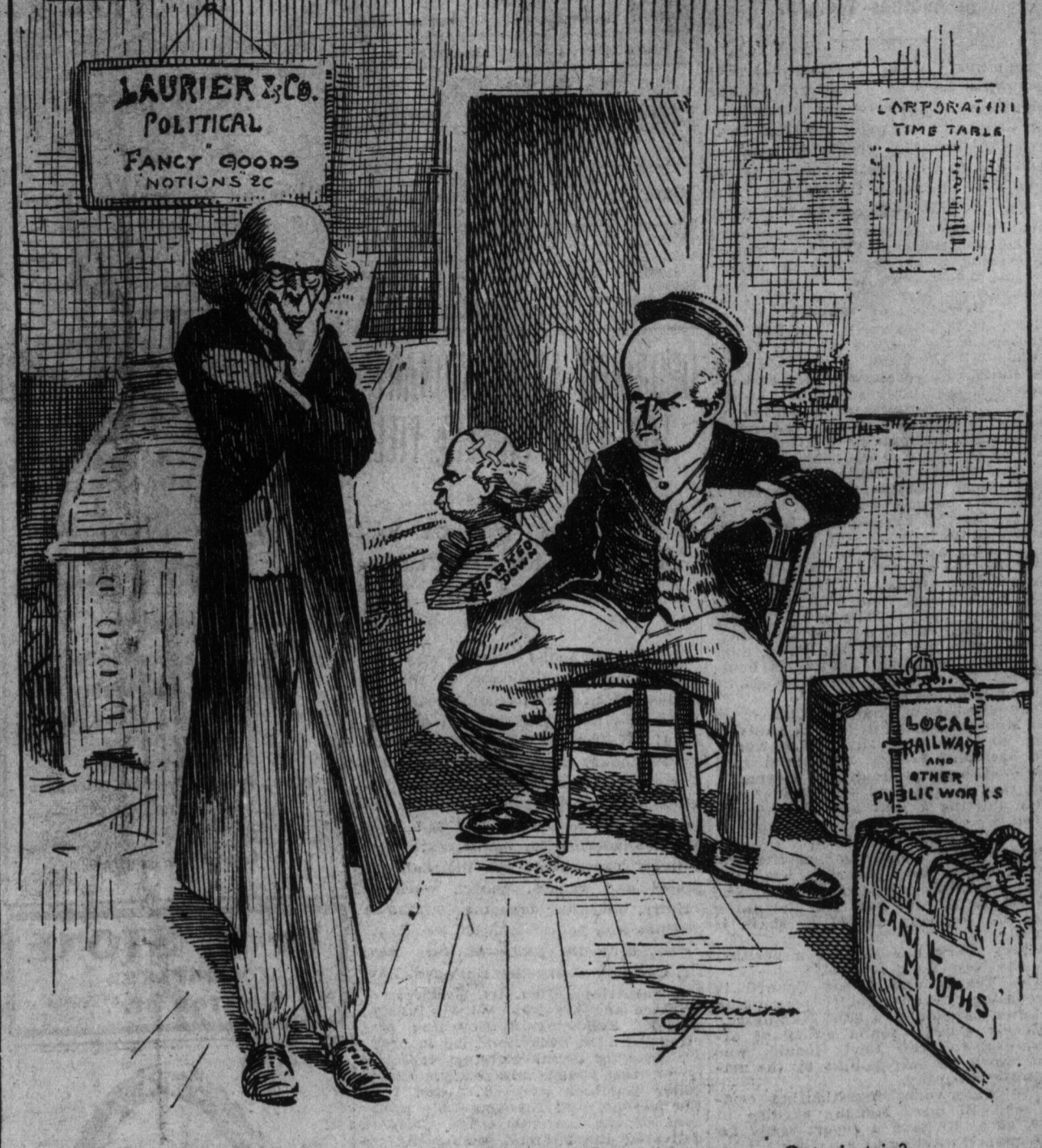
RIOT FOLLOWS SHOOTING.

MAR AUTO RACE GLORIES

Wagner Wins Vanderbilt Cup, Covering Nearly Three Hundred Miles at Over Mile a Minute Speed.

New York, Oct. 7.—Seventeen cars, traveling at the speed of a cyclone, swept ten times around a 2 1/2 mile course yesterday for the glory of the Vanderbilt international cup, and the trail of dead and maimed they left in their smoke makes it almost certain that the mad exhibition of speed will be the last of its kind this country will witness.

Three of the cars traveled the 297 1/2 miles of the course in less than 297 minutes. One car, a French make, driven by a special devil incarnate, Louis Wagner, completed the distance in the incredible space of 180 minutes 10 2/5 seconds, and won the cup.

That was the record of the race. The record of its cost in lives was two men killed outright, a man, a woman and a boy maimed so that they cannot live, and scores of persons crushed and injured. It was this that WIDRER, GEORGE, Long Island City, run down, cut and bruised.

Wagner snatched the palm of victory from Lancia, of the Italian team, who piloted a 120 horse power Fiat, by the small margin of 2 minutes 12 1/2 seconds. Lancia, in turn, was only 18 seconds ahead of Dury, of the French team, who drove a 110 horse power Lorraine-Dietrich car.

Fourth to finish was Clement of the French team, who piloted a 100 horse power Besard-Clement, while fifth came Jenatton of the German team. In a 120 horse power Mercedes. So close was the finish between these five cars that at the beginning of the last lap any one of them had a good chance to win.

Wagner, the winner, covered the 297 1/2 miles of the course in 4 hours 50 minutes 10 2/5 seconds, which was an average of 29 minutes 1 1/2 seconds for each lap of 2 1/2 miles, or at the rate of 61.46 miles an hour. This time is just a trifle slower than that made by the winner.

EXPLODED BRIBERY CHARGES TO PREVENT E. ELGIN FALLING A VICTIM

Story Now is That London's Bribery Brigade Was Ready to Invade Constituency When Blow Fell That Scattered the Organization.

To save East Elgin from the fate which befell London at the by-election of June, 1905!

That is the reason why John O'Gorman so unexpectedly felt the grip of the law on his shoulder and that is the reason why Lewis and the rest have also been brought to account.

It will be remembered that during last August Hon. Mr. Hyman visited the constituency and was asked to have perfected an excellent organization. It was after this that the writ was suddenly issued and made returnable at the earliest possible date. This was followed by a series of meetings, addressed by the minister of justice and the minister of public works, and a general claim by the government organs of impending victory.

And about this time rumors were current in London that Messrs. Sifton, O'Gorman, Lewis and Squires were about to visit East Elgin.

The London Conservatives were willing to wait and have them caught red-handed, but the supporters of Mr. Marshall objected strenuously to their coming into East Elgin. They recalled the past activity of O'Gorman and Lewis, and insisted that proceedings be taken at once to investigate their past transactions. As anticipated, Sifton and Lewis disappeared immediately, and the farmers of East Elgin were permitted to decide their by-election without interference from London.

And the feather that Hon. Mr. Hyman would have stuck in his cap had East Elgin "switched" is now there.

Sifton, who it is said, has been staying in Buffalo since he left London on Saturday week, is once more "expected" to give himself up. It is said now he will reach the city to-day.

TRANSFER OF LA PRESSE.

Government to Get Control of Great French Newspaper.

Montreal, Oct. 7.—(Special.)—It looks as if the government would soon secure a controlling interest in La Presse newspaper. This rumor has been going the rounds for some time past, but to-day it looks like an accomplished fact.

It is Mackenzie & Mann's interests which are being brought up by Hon. Mr. Berthiaume, the former proprietor of the paper, and other gentlemen, but Mr. Berthiaume will represent the government interest. D. D. Mann has been here all day, and his private car has been invaded all day by people interested in the deal.

It is said that Wm. McIntyre and Mr. Roberts, the man who won such a signal victory over the Montreal Light, Heat & Power Co. are Mr. Berthiaume's associates in the purchase.

Mr. Mann was seen this evening and said nothing had been done. Perhaps the deal has not been completely closed, but Mr. Berthiaume was in La Presse office on Saturday just as if he owned it all.

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HAMILTON HAPPENINGS
NO CHANGE IN GAS RATES
DIRECTORS NEGLECT IT

Mystery in Finding of Body in Bay
and Note Telling of Death
of Another Woman.

Hamilton, Oct. 7.—(Special.)—For some time there have been wild rumors afloat that the directors of the Hamilton Gas Light Company would, at their meeting Saturday, decide to make a reduction in the present rate of \$1 per cubic foot to meet the Natural Gas Company's rate of 35 cents. The directors did not even mention the subject at their meeting and have no intention of making a cut in rates or wiping out the meter rent for the present at least.

Preached of Woman.

The great danger was their becoming hard in their contact with the world and losing their grace and becoming cynical in being brought into contact with the seamy side of business life.

Award Released.
The Street Railway arbitrators' award was released Saturday, when the third arbitrator, Joseph Jardine, cut \$75 off his bill for \$446, and the union and the company agreed to share it equally.

It is likely that an assessor to take the place of the late F. R. Hutton will be appointed Monday. J. M. Robinson is said to have a good chance. J. Eldon Bull is also a strong candidate for the position.

Mysterious Note.
The police have a mystery on their hands. Friday they got a note saying that they would find the body of the writer, who claimed to be from Detroit, in the bay at the Turbina dock. The body of Mrs. Embury, a Hamilton woman, was found there soon after the note was received. Mrs. Embury's family says that the writing in the note was not in their mother's hand, and it is feared that there may be another victim of suicide in the bay.

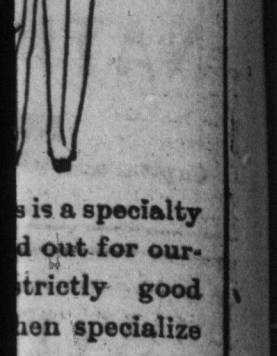
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GREYS. BRAVE OLD BATTAL FOR REGIMENTAL MATCHES

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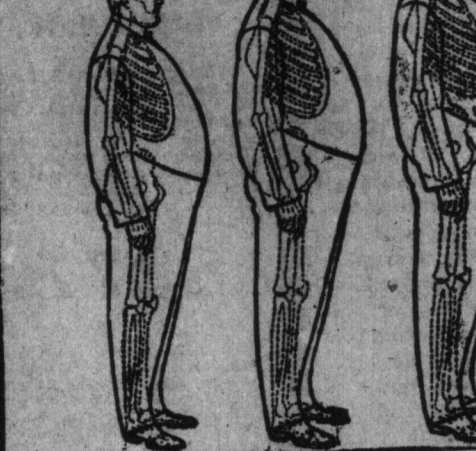

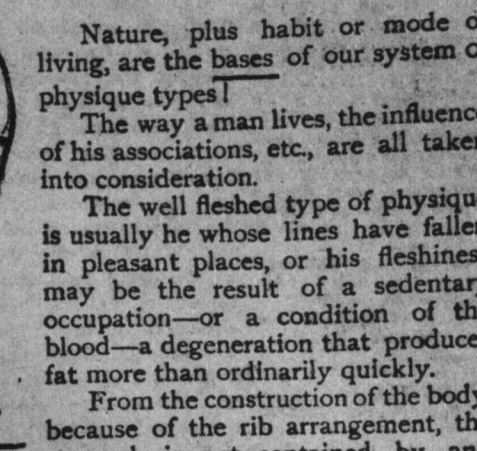

ONTARIO AND BRITISH IMMIGRATION

Advantage should undoubtedly be taken of the interest aroused in the United Kingdom regarding Canada as a field for emigration, to advance the claim of Ontario upon the British agriculturist. Complaints are now being made in the older provinces that the action of the Dominion Government in concentrating its energies on the exploitation of the wheat-growing west has not only caused the stream of immigrants to flow thru them towards the prairie lands, but has caused a direct drain upon their own farming population.

Canada as a field for the British emigrant, recently made by Ernest Terry. During this summer Mr. Terry was sent here by the distress committee of Leeds, Eng., to enquire into the system of sending emigrants, and as to the advantages or disadvantages of using the repayments money for that purpose.

He remained in Canada about six weeks, traveled over a large portion of the Dominion, and a month ago contributed an article to the Yorkshire Evening Post, "giving brief and an unbiased description of what I found were the conditions prevailing, and the prospects for the future, so far as the British immigrant is affected." While, in some respects, not quite so flattering as Canadians are accustomed to expect, his review of the situation in the Dominion is not on the whole unfavorable.

Altho Mr. Terry is not in this passage speaking specially of the selling of emigrants, it is difficult to see how the ordinary emigrant allured by the land advertisements of the Dominion Government and the emigration agencies appeal with greater force to the skilled agriculturist with capital enough to take up an improved farm.

SOCIALISM AND TRADES UNIONS.

Both in the United Kingdom and the United States a wedge is being driven into the ranks of organized labor, and the result is the cleavage into two separate bodies which can be averted. The divisive force is supplied by the socialists, who have been for some considerable time the most active and aggressive section of the labor parties and have attained, at least in Great Britain, a position and influence to which numerically they were not entitled.

SUBSCRIPTIONS GO ASTRAY MISSIONARIES ENDANGERED

Some Peculiar Incidents Which Will Be Further Ventilated To-Night

Any suspicions entertained by the Christian Workers' general mission board as to Rev. G. E. Fisher of Lipincott-street, and his management of certain sums of money entrusted to his care for delivery to missionaries in Northern India will be ventilated to-night in an open special meeting to be held in their church on Clinton-street.

To-night the general board will present a lengthy report summing up the situation from their point of view. W. T. Pepper of the general board said last night that the board did not intend to take any legal action, as was first contemplated, but the board thought that a contributing public had become curious to know why missionaries whom they had taken under their care were persistently writing personal letters, enquiring why the funds had discontinued, while at the same time the secretary held receipts for the amounts in question, and verbal assurances that they had been forwarded in due course, and that same public should learn the straight facts.

The general board had been compelled to scurry around, and by special appeal, raise a considerable sum recently to get their own missionaries out of the bondage of Indian officials for wages due to hired natives. A missionary had written a most appealing letter, saying that the appointment was many months overdue, and imporing help in God's name, lest the natives, who were terribly wrought up, should take their lives.

Mr. Fisher, to whom all money was paid, when asked about it, had volunteered that the mistake must have been made at the other end of the line, for he had mailed the amount promptly.

Since that time the general board's collections have been sent direct, said Mr. Pepper, and Mr. Fisher has been asked repeatedly to show his books, but without avail.

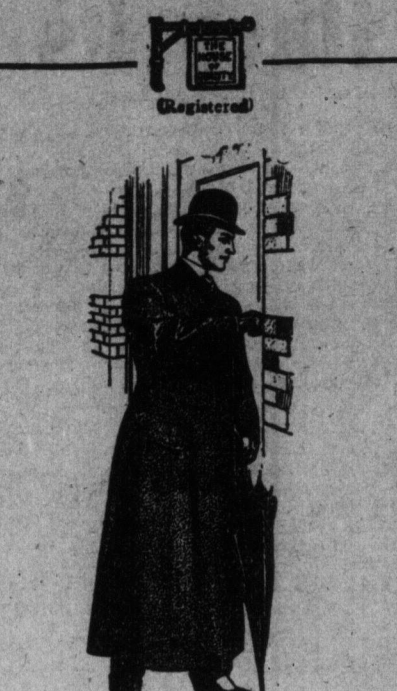

It now appears the discussion of this alliance, which is bound up with far-reaching political consequences, has not reached the stage of an actual betrothal. The intimation that such a marriage was contemplated erroneously developed in court circles into a premature announcement of the betrothal as an accomplished fact.

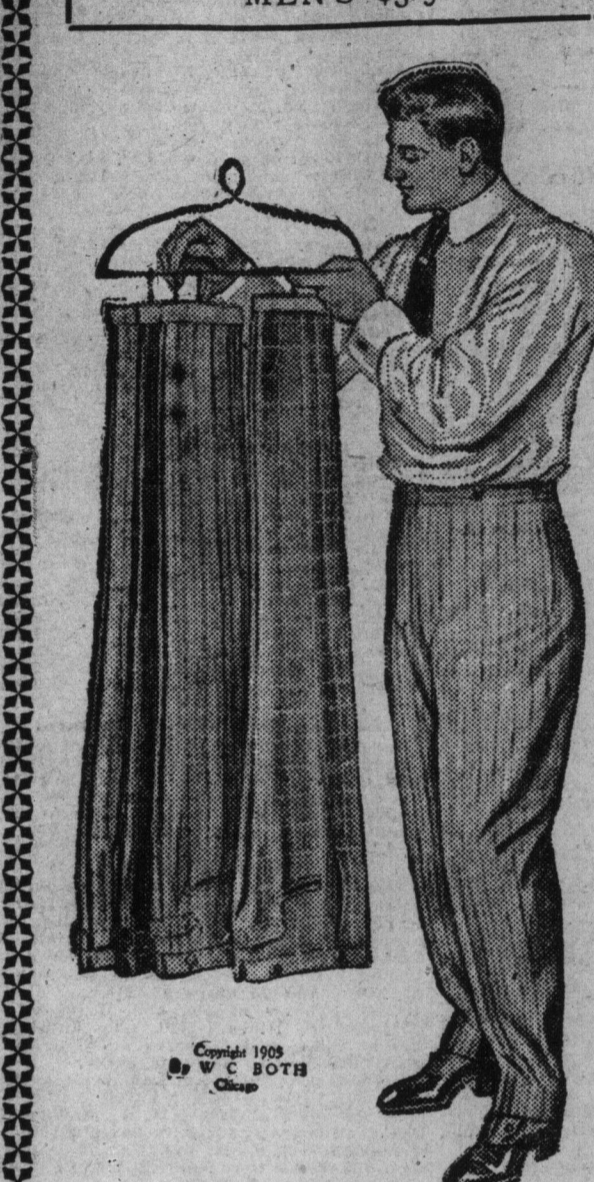
