Such had been the case with the Dominion Iron & Steel Com-pany and many other enterprises. Up to the United States. Mr. Walker is not altogether opposed to reciprocity, but is sure that there is no hope for it, until the Unlied States makes the first move. Canada has taken the initiative for the last time. If the United States were to take the matter up and begin negotia-tions doubless something could be ac-complished, if not too much was under-taken at first. Mr. Walker would ad-vise that at first reciprocity be con-fined to free trade in a limited num-ber of commodities which the great fined to free trade in a limited num-ber of commodities which the great majority of the people of both coun-tries would like to have free. He suggested lumber, local, cattle and wheat as commodities that might be taied. If the experiment were found to be satisfactory to both parties, the scope of reciprocity could be extended. Personally, he would greatly like to see some such approach made to fair trade, but was very skeptical about the possibility of an American initia-tive and was opposed to the Cana-dians making another trial. Not a Dangerous Invasion, Speaking of the American invasion of

Speaking of the American invasion of the Canadian west, Mr. Walker was very optimistic of good results to Can-ada. He was quite sure that the newada. He was quite sure that the new-comers would make good Canadians. Canadian-Americans were nothing new. They could be found all over Ontario. The new settlers are finding things in Canada pretty much as they are in the United States with the difference, if anything, in favor of Canada. Mr. Walker said that he thought the new-comers would find a somewhat better enforcement of law in Canada than in the United States, but added that su-periority. In/this respect was one of the periority inithis respect was one of the blessings of Canada's provincialism, which would pass away with growth.
