SUPREME COURT TO GOSSIP

Will Decide Whether Commission Can Order Companies to Cease Discriminatory Rates.

Wherever it is shown that any company charges one person more than another for the same or similar goods or services, the commission has the right to order the company to cease such discriminatory rates.

For an interpretation of two sections of the Railway Act the Dominion Railway Board will send a stated case to the supreme court to determine whether section 241 is in any way controlled or affected by section 77, and if it is so controlled, to what extent and in what particulars.

The point is raised in the application for an extension of commutation rates to certain places in the neighborhood of Toronto. The railways dispute the jurisdiction of the board and contend that there is no control and that they are perfectly free in the matter of commutation, mileage or excursion tickets to discriminate in whatever way seems good to them.

This contention was clearly brought out by E. W. Beatty of the C. & N. P., who moved the decision to the Interstate commission in a case against the Southern Pacific Railway, in which the latter had issued excursion tickets to the Republicans and Democratic conventions, but had refused them to the convention of the People's party.

Mr. Beatty: "I think we could, my lord, but of course it wouldn't be done." The chairman: "If you contented to hold your own, you could lay out a town plot near another town, build a large hotel, issue commutation tickets to your resort and refuse them to the others. They would take issue with you when you say you have power to exercise all sorts of discrimination under the act. Suppose you built an hotel on the beach and what about the right to issue commutation tickets to all who came to your hotel and not to others in the vicinity?"

M. Beatty: "The act gives us power to give free transport to some and withhold it from others." H. L. Drayton, K.C., appearing for the city, said that the application was also in the interests of an outside population of 200,000 within a radius of 50 miles. There were 22 stations within a radius of 42 miles of Toronto and 47 within a radius of 22 miles. Of these 47 stations, 26 were given commutation rates. There was obvious discrimination.

In comparison with the Montreal suburban district the difference was still more apparent. In that district 75 stations, all of those within a radius of 60 miles, were receiving commutation rates.

The application, Mr. Drayton stated, was broad, and made under all sections of the act that in any way dealt with the question. The application was also in the interests of an outside population of 200,000 within a radius of 50 miles.

The chairman: "This was a freight rate case." Mr. Drayton: "Quite so, my lord, but the principle is the same. In the Brampton case the matter was there dealt with as a matter of evidence and not of jurisdiction. The question was whether Oakville had profited at the expense of Brampton—setting one town against another."

BRITISH BUDGET SHOWS DEPRESSION

Revenue for 1908 Was Seven Millions and a Half Below Estimate—Pensions and Navy Chief Increase to Expenditure.

LONDON, April 28.—David Lloyd George, the chancellor of the exchequer, tonight issued an explanatory memorandum on the revenue and expenditure for the year. He estimated the revenues in 1908-9 as £741,500,000 and the expenditure £820,000,000, showing a deficit of £78,500,000. The budget will be presented in the house of commons to-morrow. It is pointed out that the increased expenditure is due mainly to old age pensions and appropriations for the navy.

TO PROVE HAINS INSANE COUNSEL OUTLINES CASE

30 Witnesses to Testify to Defendant's Irrational Acts, From Childhood Until Crime.

FLUSHING, L.I., April 28.—General Peter C. Hains, the defendant's father, will be the first witness called to-morrow morning in the defence for Captain Peter C. Hains, Jr., continues its attempts to establish the insanity of the young army officer who shot and killed Ann L. Annis at the Bay-side Yacht Club last August. The trial moved to-day with marked despatch, and when counsel for the defence, Attorney Eugene N. Young had completed his opening address, vividly outlining the defence to the jury, the court put in its case to establish proof of insanity.

Gen. Hains will be followed by Major Hains, the captain's brother, and then by some thirty witnesses, all of whom will testify concerning Captain Hains' irrational acts from childhood to the time of his wife's alleged infidelity and her associations with Annis, as contended by the prisoner's lawyers.

Signs of Insanity. Eugene N. Young of counsel for Capt. Hains, in opening the case for the defence, told the jury that evidence would be presented to show that Capt. Hains had been insane as early as May 31, 1898, and was insane at the time he shot Annis.

"His father, Gen. Hains, will tell you this defendant would wake in the night trembling and screaming with terror," Mr. Young, continuing his address, said. "His mother will tell you how he was different from other children and stammered in his speech and had to be closely watched and guarded during his childhood."

We will show that Capt. Hains fell down a hatchway when 12 years old and was rendered unconscious from the blow on his head, from which he did not recover for a long time.

Those who brought him across the continent from San Francisco will tell you of his mad actions," said Mr. Young. "He never slept at all during the trip and paced the sleeping car, annoying the other passengers night after night."

ONE MORE FLAG FOR THE G.T.P. CONTRACT

R. L. Borden Says Company Can Disown Eastern Section Until the Quebec Bridge Is Completed.

OTTAWA, April 28.—(Special)—The second reading of the G.T.P. loan bill was reached this afternoon by the Grand Trunk Railway. R. L. Borden offered an elaborate criticism of the government's handling of the enterprise and made the suggestion that before any more favors are granted the company, the government should demand some return in the form of a preference stock. For the loan of ten million dollars the company had put into the Grand Trunk Railway a sum of \$25,000,000. The revenue had been given \$25,000,000 worth of the common stock. The country, the other partner, gets nothing.

It had been informed by competent authority that the Quebec bridge would not be constructed till 1915 or 1916, while the Quebec to Montreal section of the road would be ready five years earlier.

It appeared from the contract that the G.T.P. could not be forced to take over the eastern section until the bridge was ready, in which case there would be a loss in interest and depreciation of ten million dollars or more.

Mr. Borden began by referring to the Liberal hope that the G.T.P. would be a monument to the grand old man, and he thought one monument should be erected at Moncton and another at Prince Rupert. When the project was mooted in the House of Commons, Mr. Borden had proclaimed that he had "mountains of information," but the information then given had been misleading and the university "and request" of \$18,000,000 of cost for the mountain section, compared with the present estimate of the chief engineer of \$20,000,000.

Completion of Quebec Bridge. Mr. Borden asked the minister of railways if he could be assured that the Quebec bridge was likely to be completed. Mr. Graham replied that it was impossible to do that till the plans of the board of engineers were complete.

Mr. Borden said he had been informed that it would be 1915 or 1916; that the Quebec-Moncton section would be completed in 1910, and would cost about \$35 millions, whereas the estimate was 27 millions. What did the government propose to do to operate the road in the interim?

Mr. Graham said the house would appreciate that the fall of the Quebec bridge was "an unexpected condition." The government had under consideration a ferry across the river at Quebec. (Laughter.)

Great credit, said Mr. Borden, had been taken by the government for the character of the grades on the N. T. R., whereas he was able to show that there were grades of one and one-tenth per cent known as "pusher grades." He would not be bound to take over the Quebec-Moncton section until the completion of the Quebec bridge was a serious difficulty.



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LAWSON PROPERTY TO SHIP IN FEW WEEKS

Greater Activity is at Hand For Cobalt and Big Developments Are Promised.

COBALT, April 27.—(From the Man on the Spot).—"Fireworks" may be forthcoming in Cobalt, but amalgamations, absorptions and greater activity are certainly at hand. It is believed here that Nipissing will take over Chambers-Perland within a few days, and Foster has been leased to the Argonauts, a Thos. Nevins note. Foster shareholders are to be congratulated if the same success attends the new regime that has characterized the development of the Big Lake mine.

The Lawson outcrop is probably one of the greatest wonders in the mining world. A few weeks will see regular shipments from this property.

The old Silver Leaf shaft was originally sunk to a depth of over 100 feet with an object by that company of picking up and working the Lawson vein. MINING MARKET UNCERTAIN ANOTHER TEMISKAMING DRIVE

La Rose Makes New High Record at New York, But Reported Strike on Green-Meehan Advances Stock Price.

World Office, Wednesday Evening, April 28. Professional traders again took charge of the dealings at the local mining exchange to-day, general business for outsiders not being much in evidence. The continued jockeying of the market is having the effect of keeping the public aloof until there is some semblance of a steady market.
