Montreal, Dec. 1.—(Special)—General Manager Hays of the Grand Trunk Pacific system returned home to-day from New York, where the company's bond deal was consummated under the following conditions: Some \$14,000,000 of Grand Trunk Pacific bonds have been disposed of to Hays Bros. & Co. of New York and London, at 98 1/2; the bonds, of course, being guaranteed by the Grand Trunk Railway Co., and it is understood that this amount \$6,000,000 will go to the construction of the Fort Arthur branch to the main line, as the latter is built by the government east of Winnipeg while \$8,000,000 will go towards the purchase of the Canadian Pacific.

**SEES FALSE PARADISE, AN EARTHQUAKE'S EFFECT.**

**Great Indian Disturbance of 1807 Described by Prof. Walker.**  
 The great Indian earthquake of June 12, 1807, was the subject of Prof. Walker's address to the Natural Science Association yesterday afternoon at the university. His attention has been attracted by the peculiar wabbling movements of soda-water bottles on a table, but when he saw people running out of the building he hastened out and saw the walls rocking and a crack reaching from the roof opening and closing like the mouth of an alligator. The trees were violently shaken and the multitudes of crows had to take refuge in the air, so that there were five times as many to be seen as he thought were in existence. He felt quite assisted with his position 56 feet from any building, in an open space, heard no noises, and did not suffer from dizziness or nausea. The monsoon rains broke out two days afterwards, and the common roof of all crumbled houses were generally uninhabitable. Northeast of Calcutta, in the foothills of the Himalayas, in the foothills south of Bhutan the results were serious. The centre of the greatest devastation was in Assam, and a series of photographs were exhibited illustrating buildings before and after the shock. Towers were disturbed, many monuments thrown down, and church spires generally destroyed. A cylindrical tower proved stronger than the conical spires which usually snapped off at the distance from the top.

**W. K. George Explains the Desire and Benefits of Protection for the Manufacturer.**

At the Empire Club yesterday a letter was read from William W. Campbell, describing Toronto as "a great imperial centre," and advocating active work in the cause of imperial federation.  
 W. K. George, president of the Canadian Manufacturers' Association, addressed the club on "Canadian Industries, Preference and Reciprocity."  
 "Do you believe that manufacturing industries are benefited by the tariff?" he considered a superfluous question, yet very few audiences were fully aware of the important position held by manufacturers in Canada. Official figures compiled and furnished by Statistics Blue show that the output of factories employing 100 men or more amounted to \$481,953,375, while the value of all agricultural, dairying, mining, forestry and fishing products for the same year, 1900, only came to \$11,666,700. Smaller factories gave an estimated product of \$125,000,000. The manufacturers exceeded all other products by a hundred millions. This does not mean that the tariff is a burden, as in these days of easy transport a factory in Leeds can compete in Toronto with a Montreal concern, and a Massachusetts mill can lay down goods in Winnipeg or Calgary at an equal or less rate than Toronto.

**Construction Company Was Operating it, Horse Was Frightened and Cyclist Was Hurt.**

The City of Toronto and the Dominion Printing & Contract Co. were yesterday joint applicants against a judgment for \$1200 granted to Mr. Kirk for injuries sustained in being knocked off his wheel by a horse driven by Mr. McRidie, that was frightened by a roller engaged by the city, operated by the company, and working near the corner of St. Alban's and Yonge streets last May. The amount awarded the plaintiff was not considered excessive. The point at issue is one of liability.  
 Mr. Pullerton argued that the Construction Company engaged the roller from the city, and also engaged the men usually employed by the city, but that the roller was not under the control of an inspector, whose duties were to see that the material used for mining, forestry and fishing products was of the best quality, and that therefore the city is not liable. There was nothing that the city and company did not do that they could have done to prevent the accident.  
 The trial judge held that there was negligence on the part of the plaintiff, and that the city was not liable. The Construction Company had the right to use the roller, which was not a nuisance, and that the horse was not under the control of the plaintiff. **W. K. George Explains the Desire and Benefits of Protection for the Manufacturer.**

By just, wise and fair revision of the tariff bringing it up to present day needs, a great increase could be brought about in industries, he argued in a way that would be fair to all and burdensome to none. Tariff for revenue would keep nations from using our money at home. He had heard Hon. John Morley when here, and he observed that in the United States they laughed at him when he said the States might have been quite as great under the time-worn shibboleth of revenue tariff.  
 Mr. George had lived in the States for some years, and was engaged in a business employing 100 men, which was imported from Britain to the extent of \$75,000,000 pounds weight. This was under a revenue tariff. Mr. McKinley more than doubled the tariff on two years. It was sold at the same rate, and afterwards at a much lower rate, and the United States millers received 1,000,000,000 pounds weight of tin plate, valued at \$75,000,000 and employing 25,000 hands. The falling off of \$75,000,000 in imports might be added by some as an evidence of falling off in trade, and he warned his audience against unthinkingly accepting arguments based on such a fallacy.




