Long, I feel that an explana-tion of the lack of certified check accom-panying our tender for the Spruce Lake water main should be given the public. On account of the fact that we are not wealthy men, it was necessary in order to tie up an amount of \$13,750 in a deposit check, to seek additional ac-commodation at our bank. In order to do so the matter had to be referred to the bank's head office. Although a wire was received Wednesday afternoon noti-fying dispatch of reply to our request it did not reach the city by the early Montreal train today and so failed to be in hand at 11 o'clock this morning, the time for closing the tenders. In spite of this we filed our tender. Relying on this explanation to coun-cil and guaranteeing to produce the To the Editor of The Times:

Relying on this explanation to coun-cil and guaranteeing to produce the check before noon Friday, convinced that it caused no injury to competitors, we asked that consideration of the tenders be delayed twenty-four hours. In the past this has not been a rare method of procedure by the council. However, the tenders were opend and the prices made public showing the fol-lowing prices per lineal foot for re-en-forced concrete pipe: The Lock Joint Pipe Co., Ltd., \$15.50; the Atlantic Con-struction Co. (ours), \$12.50. The length of pipe line is 22,000 lineal feet. A difference of \$3 a foot in the tenders shows a possible saving to the city of \$66,000. In view of this fact we requested that our tender be given consideration as

our tender be given consideration as others by the sub-committee of Commisothers by the sub-committee of Commis-sioner Jones and City Engineer Hare, with the understanding that if our pipe was not proven of equal value to that of the Lock Joint Pipe Co., Ltd., we would not ask consideration on account of, our much lower price. It was de-cided not to give our tender any con-sideration.

Slack Water.

New York, July 22-Death by drowning or dynamite-these are chief among the dangers facing the men who are dredging the East River to Long Island und that New York may have another deep-sea passage to the Atlantic. How this undertaking, which will re-quire fifteen to twenty years and an ex-penditure of \$55,000,000 to \$75,000,000 is being carried on was told here today by officials of the dredging company, which

is doing the work. "In Hell Gate we are demolishing Fry-ing Pan reef, which is 480 feet by 360 feet. From eight to ten months will be required to complete this task. A drill boat is being warped across it in parallel paths thirty feet apart, drilling holes into which from 100 to 150 pounds of dynamité is packed and exploded. A dipper dredge, following the drill boat, loads the blasted rock into scows for dumning into holes seventy-five feet deep dumping into holes seventy-five feet deep or more in the river. This leveling of the river bottom removes the source of eddies, smoothing the current. "Pot Rock, another reef in Hell Gate,

"Pot Rock, another reef in Hell Gate, will be destroyed next. Because of treacherous currents for which it is re-sponsible, Pot Rock is known as the wickedest spot in American waters. "The longest slack water period regis-tered in Hell Gate during the last forty years was twenty-three minutes. It is within that slack period that drilling points must be located, charges planted and fired and the position of the plant changed. Divers on this work are gen-erally unable to spend more than fifteen minutes under water at a time, so that they work but half an hour in a twenty-four hour day. four hour day.

"As a precaution against being ram-med by passing craft the navy depart-ment and customs house officials have

med by passing craft the havy depart-ment and customs house officials have warned operators and owners of vessels to keep a safe distance from dredging plants. For non-compliance with this warning eighty-five captains were ar-raigned recently within a period of ten days. Many were suspended for from ten days to six months. "When the collision signal is sounded on one of the dredging vessels, each of the dynamite crew, wearing life belts, grabs a box of the explosive and stands by to jump overboard. "The project of dredging the East River to the Sound was first undertaken forty years ago to provide New York harbor with an entrance which would not require continuous dredging like Ambrose Channel, where five government dredges are constantly removing the in-filtrating sands.
