Paris, May 22—Artillery fighting of the most violent character occurred last night on the front southeast of Amiens, the war office announces. Heavy artillery fighting took place also on the southern part of the battlefront, in the neighborhood of Plemont, west of Noyon.

London, May 22-In the sectors east of Arras German trenches were entered at two points last night by British raiding parties, says today's official statement. Fourteen prisoners and a machine gun were taken. On the Flanders front the Germans carried out a heavy gas bombardment of the sector to the

London, May 21—An official statement on aerial operations tonight says:

"Since the beginning of the German offensive, exactly two months ago.

1,000 German airplanes have been brought down or driven down out of control and more than 1,000 tons of bombs have been dropped over the enemy's lines.



# Will Not Accept Cut of \$300

Mr. Pullen's Offer Rejected By City Council

E. S. S. Co. Wharf Lease

Terms for Renewal Outlined-Mayor Hayes to Represent City at Meeting in Victoria, B. C.

In spite of the fact that Commissioner Bullock, at yesterday's meeting of the common council, recommended and moved that the council reconsider its decision in committee the previous day that James H. Pullen take whatever means he deemed fit to collect the amount of his bill for the painting of the sheds on McLeod and Pettingill wharves, but instead arbitrate with Mr. Pullen in the matter, the council adhered to its previous decision in com-

mittee.

His Worship Mayor Hayes will this summer represent the city of St. John at the annual convention of the Union of Canadian Municipalities to be held in Victoria (B. C.), according to decision of council yesterday.

The council was in committee before taking up the order sheet in order to hear A. C. Currie, representing the Eastern Steamship Company, in the matter of the company's application for repairs to the Reed's Point wharf. After hearing the representative of the company the council came out of committee and the matter was settled in general routine.

Increased Wages.

The best practice is to select good, medium sized potatoes and make four sets out of them, cutting lengthwise and then across. There are several potatoc cutters on the market, but while some of these are better than others, the most satisfactory way is to cut by hand. Actual experiment has proved that seed planted as soon as it is cut yields, on an average, eight bushels per acre more than when left unplanted for four or five days. It is very important to plant freshly-cut seed. Leaving the sets uncovered in the trenches lessens the yield. This is worth remembering.

Washington, May 21—Pessimistic reflections upon the future for Germany by Socialist Deputy David, writing in the Schwaebische Tagewacht, are quoted in an official despatch today from Geneva.

"If Germany does not succeed when peace is concluded in dissolving the world coalition, the war will be lost for her," the Deputy says, "for in this case one could not call it a veritable peace. It will only be an armistice, whose burdens caused by armaments will bring us to a state of total exhaustion. We cannot forever hold the entire world under domination.

"The situation of our country is most serious in spite of the successes we have won and those we shall obtain in the future. It is impossible to be mistaken when one cooly considers face to face the resources which the adversaries have at their disposal. A peace dictated by the military has been concluded in the east, and we are already beginning to feel the effects of it."


# Central Powers Plan Big Drive on Italy

Military Operations in the East to be Suspended While Austria Hurls Entire Weight Against Italian Frontier; Important Gains by Allies in the West

Washington, May 21-Further evidence that another great Austrian drive against Italy is impending came today in an official despatch from Switzerland, saying also that the Central Powers planned to suppress all military operation in the east on May 20 to concentrate forces on the Italian front.

Austrian newspapers are quoted as saying this step marks the institution of civil administration again in Bukowina and in Gallicia, and that similar measures are to be taken in Hungary towards Transylvania.

The military importance of the decision is emphasized because it enables the withdrawal of a considerable military force from Galicia and Bukowina, while the Austrian general staff will be able to turn all its attention to the operations against Italy.






