

TAKES THE BLAME Large Misappropriation From The Mercantile in Memphis—Audi-

tor Makes Discovery

Memphis, Tenn., Feb. 11-Ten direc ors of the Mercantile Bank, one of the nost important financial institutions in the city, filed a petition in Chancery Court here charging that the bank was nsolvent as the result of the alleged nisappropriation of more than \$750,000 Corner Brindley Street by C. Hunter Raine, president of the

In the petition Raine was held solely

Resources, loans and discounts at the time of the statement amounted to \$1,-130,496; actual cash on hand was \$424,784; sums due from other banks amounted to \$489,165; cash items in transit amounted to \$137,778. These amounts, with other items, balanced the amount given as liabilities.

The alleged discrepancy was discovered by a representative of a New York correspondent of the bank, who was sent to Memphis to audit the books of the Mercantile Bank when loans requested were found to be out of proportion to the amounts usually asked for at this season of the year. His report to the directors, which brought the situation to a climax, was the first intimation that the bank was not in a prosperous condition, according to the directors.





Ottawa, Feb. 10—Premier Borden in-roduced the redistribution bill in par-

Ottawa, Feb. 10—Premier Borden introduced the redistribution bill in parliament today, explaining the necessity for such a bill and the provisions of the proposed legislation.

It had been urged that the representation which Prince Edward Island had enjoyed at confederation, namely six members, should be fixed as a minimum for all the time. Mr. Borden said that the number of members for Prince Edward Island had consequently been left blank in the bill, for the reason that the government wished the committee to which the bill would be referred to consider the request of P. E. Island.

The Island now had four members, and it would have only three if the division of the constitutional act was rigilally followed. It seemed somewhat incongruous that any province should have a smaller representation in the house of commons than in the senate. Moreover, Prince Edward Island was a rural province, and it had been the practice to fix a rather higher unit for urban communities than for rural communities. If the rural population of Prince Edward Island, a little less than 100,000, were placed in any other province it would have at least four members in the commons.



Despite the conciliatory tone of both Premier Asquith and Lord Morley,small hope was felt in the lobbies of parliament tonight that the settlement of the home rule question will be reached by consent. The ministers' attitude clearly shows that the government will neither consent to an appeal to the country nor accept a solution based on the exclusion of Ulster from the operation

of the bill. Austen Chamberlain just as clearly indicated that the opposition will accept nothing less than the exclusion of Ulster, unless the government agrees to an appeal to the country. He declared in his speech in the house of commons that the exclusion of Ulster was the only possible basis for a settlement by agree-ment, and that it would be useless for the government to offer less. Civil war was certain if Ulster was not excluded. It is evident, however, that the crisis which has been threatening has been postponed for several weeks.
