Viscipline Was One of the Hardest

Lessons Because of Make-up of Coatingent

How the mobilization and training amp looked to the recruits when they ame pouring in from all over Canada s told in October Canada Monthly by one of the Queen's Own men.

When the troops first arrived they were more or less, in the words of an energetic young officer, "a rabble," he says. Some had uniforms and sound poots. Some came in plain clothes. Some were well provided for. Many lacked necessary equipment. Some showed the ffects of conscientious drill, others were raw recruits. It was necessary to turn this heterogeneous mass into a disciplined, trained, thoroughly equipped army.

Discipline was the most important point in soldiery duty to be learned, and in many respects the hardest lesson of all. Life under conditions where every man is regarded as the equal of every other man, and where a peremptory command from a boss often ends in a "Go to h—" and a search for a new job, is not conducive to that instant and unquestioning obedience which is exacted in army life. In a good many cases men in the ranks were superior, mentally and physically, to the corporals and sergeants and commissioned officers whom they were expected to obey. For the first two or three days, "talking back" to officers was not uncommon.





WAS A MAN OF NOTE.

Samuel Lane Boardman, a Maine editor, who died last week, was appoint
by the De Burians of Bangor, as well as The Naturalist of the St. Croix and The Year Book of the De Burians. He also edited seven volumes on the agriculture editor, who died last week, was appointed assistant editor of the Country Gentleman in Albany, N. Y., in 1859, when he was but twenty-three years of age. He held the position for two years, when he went to Augusta as editor of the Maine Farmer, a post which he occupied from 1861 to 1878.

In 1878 Mr. Boardman left the Maine Farmer and took a position on the staff of the American Cultivator in Boston. He returned to Augusta in 1880 and for the next eight years he was the editor and publisher of the Home Farm, an agricultural journal which had wide circulation all over the state. Mr. Boardman became editor of the Kennebec Journal in 1889 and remained with that publication until 1892. He became the editorial writer for the Bangor Com-

publication until 1892. He became the editorial writer for the Bangor Commercial and editor of the Weekly Commercial in 1895. He filled both positions until September, 1909, when his health compelled him to retire from active work. Since then he had lived at Augusta, his former home.

Many honors came to Mr. Boardman. He was a member and secretary of the state board of agriculture from 1872 to 1874. From 1874 to 1879 he was a trustee of the Maine State College, now the University of Maine. He was a member of the board of managers of the Maine Experiment station from 1885 to 1887. From 1865 to 1874 he was secretary of the Maine State Agricultural Society. He was also a member of the

Society. He was also a member of the Maine State Pomological Society. Maine State Pomological Society.


