LAWS AND REGULATIONS

OF THE

British and Foreign Bible Society.

I. The designation of the Society shall be **THE BRITISH AND FOREIGN BIBLE SOCIETY**, of which the main object shall be to encourage a wider circulation of the Holy Scriptures, without note or comment; the only copies in the language of the United Kingdom to be circulated by the Society, shall be the authorized Version.

II. This Society shall add its endeavors to those employed by other Societies; for circulating the Scriptures through the British Dominion; and shall also, according to its ability, extend its influence to other countries, whether Christian, Mohammedan or Pagan.

III. Every subscriber of One Guinea annually shall be a member.

IV. Every subscriber of Ten Guineas at one time shall be a member for life.

V. Each subscriber of Fifty Pounds at one time, or who shall by one additional payment, increase his original subscription to Fifty Pounds, shall be a Governor for life.

VI. Governors shall be entitled to attend and vote at all meetings of the Committee.

VII. An Executor, paying a bequest of Fifty Pounds, shall be a member for life; or, of One Hundred Pounds, a Governor for life.

VIII. A Committee shall be appointed to conduct the business of the Society, consisting of thirty-six laymen, six of whom shall be foreigners, resident in London or its vicinity; half the remainder shall be members of the Church of England, and the other half members of other denominations of Christians. who shall have most frequently attended, shall be eligible for re-election for the ensuing year.

The Committee shall appoint all officers except the Treasurer, and call Special General Meetings, and shall be charged with procuring for the Society suitable patronage, both British and Foreign.

IX. Each member of the Society shall be entitled, under the directions of the Committee, to purchase Bibles and Testaments at the Society's prices, which shall be as low as possible.

X. The annual meeting of the Society shall be held on the first Wednesday of May, when the Treasurer and Committee shall be chosen, the accounts presented, and the proceedings of the foregoing year presented.

XI. The President, Vice-President, and Treasurer shall be considered *ex officio* members of the Committee.

XII. Every clergyman or dissenting minister who is a member of the Society, shall be entitled to attend and vote at all meetings of the Committee.

XIII. The Secretaries for the time being shall be considered as members of the Committee; but no other person deriving any emolument from the Society shall have that privilege.

XIV. At the general meeting, and at the meetings of the Committee, the President, or in his absence the Vice-President, first upon the list then present; and in the absence of the Vice-President the Treasurer, and in his absence such member as shall be voted for the purpose, shall preside at the meeting.

XV. The Committee shall meet on the first Wednesday of every month, or oftener if necessary.

XVI. The Committee shall have the power of nominating such persons as have rendered essential service to the Society, either Members for life, or Governors for life.

XVII. The Committee shall have the power of nominating Honorary members from among foreigners who have promoted the object of the Society.

XVIII. The whole of the minutes of every general meeting shall be signed by the Chairman.

REGULATIONS

Adopted at the Annual General Meeting of the Society in 1826 and 1827.

I. That the fundamental law of the Society, which limits its operations to the circulation of the Holy Scripture, be fully and distinctly recognized as excluding the circulation of the Apocrypha.

II. That in conformity to the foregoing resolution, no pecuniary aid can be granted to any Society circulating the Apocrypha; nor, except for the purpose of being applied in conformity to the said resolution, to any individual whatever.

III. That in all cases in which grants, whether gratuitous or otherwise, of the Holy Scriptures, either in whole or in part, be made by the Society, the books issued be bound, and on the express condition that they shall be distributed without alteration or addition.

IV. That all grants of Scriptures to the Society which circulate the Apocrypha, be made under the express condition that they be sold or distributed without alteration or addition; and the proceeds of the sale of any such copies of Scripture be held at the disposal of the British and Foreign Bible Society.

LAWS AND REGULATIONS
OF THE
NOVA SCOTIA BIBLE SOCIETY.

- I. This Society shall be called **THE BIBLE SOCIETY OF NOVA SCOTIA AND ITS DEPENDENCIES**; the object of which shall be the same as that of the British and Foreign Bible Society, viz., to encourage the circulation of the Holy Scriptures without note or comment, and to furnish copies of the Scriptures gratis to the indigent, and at reduced prices to those requiring them.
- II. The business of the Society shall be conducted by a President, Vice-President, Treasurer, Secretary, and a Committee.
- III. In order to give effect to the designs of this institution, benefactions and subscriptions shall be solicited, and books opened for receiving the names of benefactors and subscribers.
- IV. Every person contributing annually ten shillings at one time, or a donation of ten pounds, shall be considered a member of the Society.
- V. A general meeting of the members of this Society shall be held every year, before which will be laid the accounts and proceedings of the preceding year.
- VI. The whole of the subscriptions and donations, after deducting the incidental expenses, shall be remitted annually in aid of the funds of the British and Foreign Bible Society.
- VII. Every member of the Society shall be entitled to purchase, under the direction of the Committee, Bibles and Testaments at the reduced prices of the Society, which are as low as possible.
- VIII. The Committee shall be authorized to meet for the purpose of conducting the business of this Society as often as may be necessary, and shall have power to add to their number as occasion may require.

SUGGESTIONS

FOR THE COMPLETE

ORGANIZATION AND WORKING

OF A

BRANCH BIBLE SOCIETY.

ANY BRANCH, which, in the past has not attained eminence as a tributary to the AUXILIARY—whose annual grant has not compared favorably with others in districts of less note as to population, wealth or religious privileges, is earnestly requested to consider the following suggestions of means whereby its latent resources may be made more available in the blessed cause of Bible dissemination,

1. The Bible Society being undenominational, care should be taken to preserve its character, as such, in its Branch organization and operation, and to this end the *committee* and *collectors* should, as far as possible, represent every Christian denomination in its district. The *sheet* in the *Auxiliary's Report* containing the *list of Branches* is divided into four columns; one for the name of the Branch and three for the *chief members* of Committee, viz., *President, Treasurer* and *Secretary*. Where there are more than three denominations in any district, they can be represented by *Vice-Presidents*. When a branch embraces an extensive district, its outlying sections should also be represented by *Vice-Presidents*, who could superintend the work of collecting in their respective localities.

2. At every ANNUAL MEETING (which it is desirable should be held during the *Agent's visit*), the COMMITTEE, if necessary, should be re-cast and *collectors appointed, competent to present the Society's claims, and earnestly interested in the work*; for to zealous collectors, rather than to Committee or contributors, belong the honor of placing the silver and the gold at the service of the Redeemer.

3. Should a Committee be impaired by the death or removal of any of its *chief members*, notice of such should be furnished the Agent at the earliest opportunity.

4. Each Branch should decide upon always carrying on the work of collecting during the month most favorable for such in its district, (of which, also, the Agent should be informed) and, previous to the collector's canvass, the annual reports of the Auxiliary should be distributed among the *best* subscribers, and placed in the hands of other persons likely to become valuable supporters. And during the canvass *all* ministers of the gospel should be notified of the same, and asked to encourage their congregations in a liberal response to the collector's call.

5. When a Committee receives notice from the Agent of his intended visit, no delay should be made in appointing the place of meeting and making such known from the pulpit and press; for the delay of a day may possibly result in the preclusion of the meeting by another of merely local interest, whose object might as well be attained at any other time, whereas *the loss of one day means the loss of a whole year*, in so far as a due visitation of the Branch by the Agent is concerned. All ministers in the district should receive special invitations to be present on the platform, and should also be requested to call the attention of their congregations to the meeting, and urge upon them their attendance. The editors of local newspapers should also be asked to insert a brief notice of the meeting.

6. It is desirable that remittances, with lists of subscribers, should be forwarded to the Secretary or Treasurer in Halifax, not later than Christmas.

7. Any Branch can, if necessary, have its DEPOSITORY, but such should be under its own care. During the Agent's visit, a statement of all Bibles in stock should be duly rendered and payment made to him or the Committee. The depository may be paid a commission of 10% on his sales. *All orders for the supply of Bibles for the Depositor should be sent by the Secretary of the Branch to the Secretary of the Auxiliary in Halifax.*

8. In view of the transcendent aim and ever growing work of the British and Foreign Bible Society, it is hoped that in every locality a *few persons* may feel moved to espouse its cause as their *special Christian Work*, and use their influence in making their Branch an institution deeply established in the popular heart.

EIGHTY-SIXTH ANNIVERSARY

OF THE

(METHODIST) CHURCHES.

The Annual Meeting of the Nova Scotia Bible Society was held at First Baptist Church on January 12th, 1900, under the chairmanship of REV. A. C. CHUTE. The speakers were BISHOP COURTNEY, REV. W. DOBSON, and C. F. FRASER. The audience room of the church was well filled, and the meeting was one of the best of the kind ever held in Halifax. REV. F. H. ALMON, Secretary of the Society, presented the Annual Report, and a resolution of adoption was moved by BISHOP COURTNEY, who spoke briefly, but with manifest earnestness, on the work of circulating the Scriptures.

There was some analogy, His Lordship said, between Bible Society work and the war campaign in Africa, and the mistake that men had made in underestimating the strength of the foe and supposing a quick end of the fight, was sometimes in danger of repetition among the churches. The Bible against the power of sin was a far greater campaign than that in Africa. It needed skill, and energy, and perseverance in greater measure. Results so far had been wonderful, but at the present rate of progress, thirty generations must live and

of the Nova Scotia Bible Society remind them that their object is to encourage the circulation of the Holy Scriptures, without note or comment, throughout the world, and to furnish copies to the poor, and at reduced prices, to those needing them, and that in order to carry out this design the whole of their subscriptions and donations, after deducting the incidental expenses, are remitted annually in aid of the funds of the British and Foreign Bible Society.

They believe that due consideration of the efforts of the Society to promote the glory of God and the salvation of souls, by the circulation of the Holy Scriptures during the year commencing April 1st, 1898, and ending March 31st, 1899, will show the magnitude and benefit of its operations. Its issues for this year were:—Bibles, 803,236; Testaments, 1,218,348; portions of the Scriptures, 2,437,855. Total, 4,387,152.

The total issues of the Society for the ninety-five years since its foundation in 1804, amounts to 160,009,393 copies. This splendid result represents increased efforts, and corresponding expenditures, especially in some of the foreign fields.

Payments for translating, revising, printing, and binding Scriptures, were \$513,648.31.

For grants, home and foreign agencies, colportage, depots, and other charges, \$578,553.79; total payments, \$1,092,238.10.

The receipts for the year have been:—New income, \$640,330.38. Receipts from sales, \$428,705.83. Total, \$1,069,036.22. An average number of 725 colporteurs have been supported and have sold from door to door the Scriptures, chiefly in the Continent of Europe, and in the great Asiatic countries. They have sold 1,500,000 copies of Holy Scriptures. Last year 552 native Christian Bible-women were maintained, who labored chiefly in India and Ceylon; their work is growing in China and Japan. They read the Scriptures to their sisters who are secluded, shut off from all preachers and churches. They are connected with 30 different Missionary Societies. More than 31,600 women have been read to, on an average, each week; nearly 2,000 have been taught to read for themselves, and over 20,000 copies of Holy Scripture were put into circulation through this agency.

The translation and revision work of the Society, like the river of Ezekiel, continues to grow in depth and volume each year. The number of languages on which active work is going on, will probably reach from 100 to 120. A mighty army of able and devoted translators, is now working to give the people of all lands God's thoughts to them in their own language. In England and Wales the Society has made Bible and Testaments the cheapest books for their size and quality that are published.

They are granted free, or at nominal rates, to multitudes of Sunday Schools and Missions of all denominations. Grants are made to orphanages, hospitals, and asylums; to soldiers' institutes and deep-sea fishermen. It has lessened much the cost of Bibles for the use of the blind, and to the Society many Missions and Mission Societies are indebted for the translations of the Bible their converts use. Such a work, then, deserves and should receive, the willing and liberal support and prayers of all who believe that the Holy Scriptures are God's message to the children of men, and are able to make them wise to salvation, through faith in our Lord and Saviour Jesus Christ.

The Bible Society has for ninety-five years been the great instrument in modern times by which God's Providence is accomplishing the wonderful work of translating the Scriptures; already it has helped the Gospel to speak in some 350 languages and dialects; so that the Bible, which a century ago was a sealed book to four men out of every five, to-day lies open, more or less completely, to seven men out of every ten in the world; such a result bears the manifest seal of a Divine vocation.

The following record of the British and Foreign Bible Society's work for last year, will show how much it needs, and also deserves, increased support:—

1. It issued over 4,419,000 Bibles, Testaments, and portions of Scripture—a record total. Thirty per cent. of these were in English or Welsh. Since the Society was founded in 1804, it has issued over 160 million copies, in 350 different languages.
2. It employed 725 colporteurs abroad, who sold over a million and a half copies.
3. It supported over 550 native Christian Bible Women in the East, chiefly in connection with some thirty different Missionary and Bible Societies.
4. It supervised or assisted translations or revisions of Scripture in 133 different languages—25 of them for India, and more than 30 for Africa. Thirteen of the translations are into new tongues, which had not previously appeared on the Society's list. These figures surpass any previous record of the Society. The thirteen new languages are: Bicol and Ilocano, dialects of the Phillipines; Chitonga, for the Atonga tribe, Central Africa; Bashkir Turki, for a Siberian tribe; Cakchiquel, for Indians in Central America; Koranko, for the Western Soudan; Soga, for Uganda Tribes, east of the Nile; Kurku for a hill tribe in Central India; Kien-yang for south-east China; Dieri, for South Australian aborigines; Fanting and Ranon, for the New Hebrides; Yakut, for Northern Siberia. Nearly 1,000 translators, revisers and assistants, are variously engaged in carrying on this world-wide task, under the Society's auspices, and mainly at its expense.

5. It constitutes a great English Bible supply, The Bible Society, uses the same method as the British and Foreign Bible Society. With comparative ease, that, apart from the cost of Bibles and Testaments, indirectly, by the cases, these Scriptures, gift, carriage paid.

6. While its total payments were contributions were increased by £3, the increase shows how increasing work of the Bible.

5. It constitutes the grand arsenal from which all our great English Foreign Missions draw their indispensable supplies. The Church of England, in all her foreign missions, uses the Holy Scriptures in about 130 languages. With comparatively slight exceptions, all these are supplied by the British Foreign Bible Society. And it may be said that, apart from a few special cases, the bulk of all the Bibles and Testaments used by all Nonconformist and undenominational foreign missions are supplied, directly or indirectly, by the Bible Society. In the majority of these cases, these Scriptures for mission work go abroad as a free gift, carriage paid.

6. While its total receipts amounted to £219,966, its total payments were £224,736—a deficit of £4,770. The free contributions from auxiliaries at home and abroad, have increased by £3,579 last year; but the above-named deficiency shows how urgently the Society's immense and fast increasing work claims the generous help of all lovers of the Bible.

Our last year's collections from city Churches were \$529.79. From branches, including Dartmouth, Truro, and Yarmouth, \$2,214; from annual collections at meetings, \$39.30; making a total of \$2,781.76 from subscriptions and collections, and \$550 from legacies; in all, \$3,331. There are also separate Bible Societies in Pictou and New Glasgow, which belong to the parent Society. A great increase of contributions for the world-wide work of the Bible Society ought to be made by those who love the Bible, in Nova Scotia and Cape Breton.

Free grants have been given from their Depository, in Granville Street, to meet urgent needs in the City and Province; to our volunteers going to South Africa, and to the camp at Aldershot, where they were distributed by the Y. M. C. A. A grant of Bibles and Testaments adapted to the use of the blind has been made by the parent Society, and these books are not only used in the School for the Blind here, but, with other literature, are, through the energy of C. F. Fraser, the Superintendent, circulated in this Province and the other Maritime Provinces, and Newfoundland. The Post Office authorities transmit them free of charge.

Our financial year does not close till 31st of March, so there is time to make earnest efforts to send liberal contributions to our Treasurer, S. H. Black, Halifax Banking Company.

The sales from the Depository during 1899, were \$229.93.

Our earnest travelling Secretary, Mr. MacKelvie, has visited all of our auxiliary Societies in Nova Scotia, addressed many meetings, and advocated the claims of the Bible Society.

The REV. DR. HEARTZ, Pastor of the Church, acted as chairman, and in his introductory remarks advocated the claims of the Bible Society.

In moving the first resolution the REV. DR. FORREST referred to the annual report of the Parent Society and urged on the audience the reading of its interesting account of its useful and world wide efforts to circulate the Bible, and the duty of liberally contributing to its support

The principle of the resolution is to increase the circulation of the Bible. Recognizing, as we do, that "faith cometh by hearing the word of God"—and realizing the need of opening up of doors to the world, we fail to see the wisdom of not sowing broadcast seed.

The Holy Spirit has been left to us as our instruments. The precious covenant through Jesus Christ of safety and happiness. It has been well said:

I will confine myself chiefly to a few remarks on that portion of the resolution which deals with the Word itself.

The principle laid down in the resolution is that *increased opportunities bring increased responsibilities*. Recognizing, as Christians, the power of the Holy Scriptures to make men wise unto salvation through faith—knowing that “faith cometh by hearing and hearing by the word of God”—and realizing the opportunities afforded us by the opening up of doors which have long been shut, we cannot fail to see the increased responsibility that rests upon us to sow broadcast the word of truth and life.

The Holy Scriptures are a precious legacy which have been left to us by God Himself working through human instruments. They embody the terms of that great and precious covenant which God has established with man through Jesus Christ. They point man to the only source of safety and hope. They are the charter of his salvation. It has been well said of the Bible that it is—

A Book of Laws to show Right and Wrong,
A Book of Wisdom to condemn Folly and make the foolish wise.
A Book of Truth to detect lies and confute error,
A Book of Life to shew the Way from Everlasting Death,
The First Book! The Best Book! The Oldest Book!

The power that the Holy Scriptures have exercised in the past and still do exercise has been indeed a wonderful power. This is seen alike in the nation and in the individual. You will all recall that picture entitled—“*The Source of England's Greatness*,” where her most gracious majesty is presenting a copy of the Scriptures to one of her subjects of a far distant land—and that picture breathes a blessed truth. England's greatness may well be said to date from the days of *an open Bible*, for where there is such, civilization, commerce, literature, progress of every description must exist, and above all the hearts of men—rulers and subjects alike—are brought under the influence of a power that is able to make them “wise unto salvation.” Just as long as England remains true and faithful to her God and to her trust, God will remain faithful and true to her.

When we look at those countries which have been slow to accept God's word and where even to-day there is hostility to the Scriptures, and the Bible is to some extent a closed book, we almost shudder at the state of things. The his-

tories of *France*, and *Spain* and *Italy*, have been most painful ones, and all because of that disregard of God's Holy Word and a failure to accept and follow its precepts. But, thank God, there has been an awakening even in these countries—an awakening that has been brought about in great part by the work of the Bible Society in its earnest prosecution of the trust which it has assumed. That growing evangelical movement among the priests of France, that wonderful dawn of freedom in Italy, the opening up of some of Spain's dominions by reason of the late war, have all brought wonderful opportunities to the Bible Society—which it has not been slow to take advantage of, and by its earnest and persevering work has accomplished much in these as in other lands.

It is marvellous how great are now the opportunities for missionary work of every nature. It is marvellous how God has wrought in the past until to-day it may well be said that there is no nation to which the gospel may not be preached. This time may have seemed long to us in coming, but it has come. God, in His wisdom, did not see fit to open the whole world at once to missionary effort, for mankind would never have been able to assume so great a responsibility, but gradually, little by little, He gave the world opportunities—opportunities that in some cases were eagerly grasped, but in others were basely neglected. We have resting on our shoulders *the accumulated responsibility of 1900 years of Christianity*, and it behoves us, through our representatives in the British and Foreign Bible Society and kindred institutions, to shoulder the responsibility and fulfil our duties. Let us use our utmost efforts to spread the Word of Life that other nations may receive the same benefits which we ourselves enjoy.

But not only has the circulation of the Scriptures been the means of revolutionizing nations—it has revolutionized hearts as well. It will never be known until the last great day how many souls have been won for Jesus Christ and owed their salvation to the power of the Holy Spirit working through a single passage of God's word. When the soul is brought face to face for the first time with the truths of that Word, it is reflected as in a mirror, and having been disclosed to view, it is pointed to the remedy. St. Augustine

When I had o

was first led to give up his dissolute early life by reading the passage, "*Not in rioting and drunkenness, not in chambering and wantonness, not in strife and envying, but put ye on the Lord Jesus Christ and make no provision for the flesh to fulfil the lusts thereof.*" Francis Xavier could trace his conversion to those searching words: "*What shall it profit a man if he gain the whole world and lose his own soul?*" Martin Luther was led to Christ and began his great work of Reformation through the simple yet comprehensive passage: "*The just shall live by faith.*" And many other instances does history give us of the power of the Word itself to make man wise unto salvation, and what it did for them it can do for the individual still.

I have endeavoured to present to you the power of the Word in its relation to the nation and to the individual. Never was there an age when faith in God's Holy Word simply was so much needed as now: In these days of so called Higher Criticism which, however much it may have done and perhaps is still doing that can be classed as good, has been nevertheless the source of more harm, so that people mock and cavil with impunity at God's Word, it behoves us to stick closely to that Word and endeavour to devote ourselves with renewed and unabated energy to its spread. The British and Foreign Bible Society stands for the spread of the Scriptures. It had its origin in the realizing of a need, and for ninety-five years has ever kept that need before it. Never for one single moment has it lost sight of the great object for which it came into existence, and as such it should have from us the deepest interest and increased support of which the resolution speaks.

The REV. MR. WEEKS, in eloquent language, spoke of the benefit the world owed to the Bible and its influence on literature and art. He was followed by MR. J. S. ROUGH, formerly of the China Inland Mission, who said:

It is a real pleasure to me to be here to-night. In China I have had practical and personal experience of the value of the Bible Society. Perhaps if I tell you a part of my experience there it will bring out what a real help the Bible Societies are to the missionaries.

When I had only been in China between five and six

months, a party of five young men, who had been out longer, were being sent to itinerate in an untouched district in the Province of Kiangsi. In such work the rule of the China Inland Mission, with which I was connected, is to send two and two together. I was the only one available as a companion for the fifth man. We started and on one journey I specially remember, we were travelling for six weeks, walking from place to place. We passed through a number of cities, towns and villages, all teeming with people. Our course took us more or less in a circle, yet in all that time we were probably never nearer than fifty miles to a fellow missionary, and did not come in contact with any one who loved the Lord Jesus Christ. We did meet one man though who had bought a New Testament about fourteen years before, and who had evidently read it carefully though unwilling to accept its teachings. He showed us great kindness and who can tell the influence that one book may have had?

On this trip, as is almost universally the case in similar journeys, we took with us a good supply of Scriptures and Tracts. Wherever it seemed wise to do so we gave them away, but as a rule we sold them. The price was of course a nominal one, but we have found from experience that *books bought* are far more likely to be read than those given away. They were bought freely, so wherever we went we were thus able to leave the Written Word behind us. Who can tell the harvest such seed may bring?

Though at that time I had been so few months in China and my knowledge of the language was in consequence very limited, I was still able to sell the books freely. This will enable you to understand the value of the help the Bible Society gives us, and the reduced rates at which the Scriptures are sold make it possible for missionaries to distribute copies of the whole or parts of the Bible more freely than they could possibly do otherwise.

A large number of native colporteurs are engaged by the Society. These for the most part work under the supervision of experienced missionaries in the field. As they go about selling the Written Word they bear living testimony to its value. Frequently they have to bear persecution and

have to suffer for the sake of *the Name*. I heard recently of a Christian native who was selling Scriptures and Books being set upon, tied up and beaten cruelly, his persecutors saying they were beating him as his Jesus had been beaten!

Then there is another way the Scriptures are distributed, and by this means those who compose the official class are reached. Official positions in China are competed for by the writing of literary essays. At the examinations held in different parts of the empire, students who aspire to become Mandarins, gather in thousands. At the doors of the examination hall missionaries or colporteurs sometimes take their stand and, probably aided by a free grant from the Bible Society, offer portions of Scripture to all who will take them. At most places they are generally accepted. After the examinations are over the students scatter all over the land, and thus seed is sown that we should pray to God to bless and give a rich harvest from in days to come.

I doubt if it is sufficiently realized what a boon it is to native Christians to be able to buy good, serviceable Bibles at a price within their reach, and the Bible Society is the means of bringing this about.

I see from the regular report of the British and Foreign Bible Society for 1899, published by the parent Society in England, that during the previous year over a million Bibles, Testaments, Gospels and Portions had been sent out in China alone.

In face of all this I can from my heart second the resolution moved by the Rev. Mr. Weeks.

AGENTS' REPORT.

To the President and Committee of the Nova Scotia Bible Society:

GENTLEMEN,—In accordance with the custom of the past, I beg to submit my report of Branch Visitation during the past year, the embodiment of which in the published Annual Report will, I trust, not only assure our liberal contributors of our warm gratitude for past favors, but will also be instrumental in evoking praiseworthy action by all its readers, in the formation of this cause, truly regarded as the grandest Christian philanthropy in the world. As I am apprehensive that the preamble in my last year's report was rather lengthy, on this occasion I will merely express my high appreciation of many large gifts indicated by small figures, for the givers of such gave nearly their all; while on the other hand I must confess my disappointment at receiving sums which, though tabulated in the dollar columns, are comparatively small. But on this point, limited page-space forbids sermonizing, and I will only ask the readers of this report to consider the Society's claims upon them as Christians, for their generous support. For what we receive we are grateful, but we greatly rejoice at receiving large gifts towards a great cause, and best agency for the diffusion of Gospel of Salvation. Our soul doth magnify the Lord when He filleth the hungry with good things.

I began my Spring journey among the Branches of the Nova Scotia Auxiliary on March 29th, and continued that trip until the 1st of May. I was agreeably disappointed as to the condition of both roads and weather. Indeed, I have not been so fortunate in that line during the last fourteen years. While in Amherst I gathered some subscriptions, and returned at a subsequent date to finish my canvass, which amounted to \$30.25. I also addressed a congregation on our cause at that time.

On the 30th I had a meeting in SHUBENACADIE, and collected \$5.90—a very small contribution for such a busy village. At MIDDLE MUSQUODOBOIT, on the 31st, we had a fair meeting, and the promise of a canvass of the district at the usual time for such, and as that good branch has never failed to help us in the past, doubtless its contribution will arrive in due time to be included in our coming report.

SPRINGSIDE. While at Upper Musquodoboit I received \$8.22. On Monday afternoon the Rev. D. S. Fraser kindly conveyed me to Burnside Church, where we held a fair meeting. That was the first time I had been in that district of the SPRINGSIDE Branch. I regret that Springside's subscription of \$14.25 was remitted to Halifax too late for last year's report. It will, however, appear in the lists of this year, and I hope that this Spring's contribution will be remitted in time for tabulation in the same Annual. I was favored by our friends there and at DEAN SETTLEMENT for conveyance from place to place on Sunday and Monday, and for their kindest hospitalities.

At UPPER STEWIACKE our meeting was smaller than usual, the road being very sloppy. I received the plate collection of \$1.96, and I am glad to see that your Treasurer has received the handsome sum of \$27.84—in all \$29.80, being an advance of \$5.00 above last year's contribution. On the 5th, when at MIDDLE STEWIACKE, the night was fine and attendance fair. There I received \$18.16 with the Collector's Cards. This place is not as populous as Upper Stewiacke, but we have some liberal supporters there, as the lists amply testify.

On the 6th we had a fair meeting at BROOKFIELD, with plate collection of 84c. Our friends there have manifested their interest in Bible Society work by a good subscription of \$13.60—in all, \$14.44. I rejoice at seeing Brookfield's steady growth in grace.

On Sabbath 9th, and the following Monday, I addressed meetings in NOEL Branch, and received the good sum of \$22.67, and as in past years enjoyed the hospitalities of our kind friends there. On the 11th and 12th I addressed meetings at SELMA and MAITLAND, and collected during my stay there \$13.48. This is the smallest sum that I have received there during my agency. Some of our old supporters were then absent from home, and some complained of very hard times. I may repeat my views, often expressed in former reports, that if the Christian Ladies in Maitland would kindly take this cause into consideration, and form a Collectors' Committee, they could, with very little trouble, roll up a subscription list double the value of the Agent's gatherings, and I think that they would enjoy such work for the Master more than my words can express.

On the 13th I addressed a meeting at CLIFTON, and received the plate collection of \$1.66; this, added to the sum of the Collectors' Lists which I received during summer, makes a grand total of \$38.76. This splendid advance on Clifton's past record is due to the thorough canvass of the district during *summer*, and shows what could be done in some other purely Rural Branches. Many thanks to the Society's friends in Clifton for this very liberal gift.

On Sabbath the 16th, I addressed three meetings in HOPEWELL, ST. COLUMBA Branch, and I am glad to know that St. Columba Section has again rolled up a good contribution. At this writing, as far as I know, Hopewell Section has not yet made a canvass, but I trust our friends there will not forget our cause, and that their contribution will be remitted to Halifax in time for embodiment in our financial columns.

On Monday the 16th, I was disappointed as to a meeting at FERRONA, the day being stormy, but during a second visit in December, I had a fair meeting, with a collection of \$2.45, and the promise of a Branch organization before Spring. On April 18th, we had a small meeting at SUNNY BRAE, when I received \$8.45, and the promise of more contributions later on. On 19th and 20th, we had two very good meetings in BRIDGEVILLE and SPRINGVILLE Branch, with plate collections \$4.38. The collectors, I notice, have in good time gathered the good sum of \$33.63, making a total of \$38.01. This is a quite large advance above last year's gift, for which Committee, Collectors and Contributors merit our deep thanks. We had also a very good meeting in the Methodist Church at RIVER JOHN on the 21st with a plate collection of \$5.56, and I notice that your Treasurer lately received \$18.40, making in all \$23.96. I hope that this advance on last year's offering is a pledge of future favors, and promise of increasing interest in our good cause. On Sabbath 23rd, I addressed two meetings in the bounds of WALLACE Branch, and obtained the plate collection—\$2.00 at Fox Harbor Presbyterian Church, and \$2.03 in Wallace Methodist Church, in all \$4.03. The Wallace lists have not yet come in, but we expect they soon will, and that such will prove as valuable as in the past years. Wallace Branch is among the front ranks of our Rural Branches. On the 24th we had a small meeting in OXFORD. I collected from a few friends on the following day, and returned there in December to finish my canvass, but during both visits I obtained only \$12.21. I saw our Society's old friend, Mr. Weldon Wood, who promised to follow up my canvass of the town at his earliest opportunity. On the 26th I addressed a meeting in Amherst (but not one specially appointed under our auspices) and I collected during my stay in that town \$30.25. Though thankful for this sum, it is only a tithe of what could be raised there by a body of collectors. On Sabbath, 30th April, the Rev. Mr. Jobb gave me the use of his pulpit at SOUTHAMPTON, MACCAN and RIVER HEBERT. At Southampton, no special collection had been previously intimated, but the plate collection of \$2.47 was given me, to which should be added \$1.00 from the Rev. Jos. Seller, whom I lately met on the train. At Maccan I got \$1.65, and at River Hebert \$5.58.

I also obtained from A. J. McDonald, \$3.00 for his sale of Bibles at River Hebert. This closed my Spring trip in Nova Scotia, and I left on Monday to prosecute my similar work in New Brunswick.

I began my second trip in Nova Scotia on the 4th July, on which night, when at PUGWASH, we had the smallest and most disheartening meeting during my experience in this agency. The plate collection, 77 cents, was handed me. The following day I took train for Antigonish, but through some detention of the train I failed in train connection at Pictou, and had to remain one night in New Glasgow. On the 6th I had a small meeting in WHYCOCOMAGH, and next day I gathered there \$7.50. On the 8th I collected \$18.30, at HILLSBOROUGH, GLENDYER and MABOU, and on the following Sabbath held three meetings, at Hillsborough, Port Hood, and Port Hood Island. On the 10th, I obtained on the Island and at Port Hood, \$11.09. In these places, as in the past, I experienced great kindness, and a ready response to my request for subscriptions to our cause.

When at the SYDNEYS and vicinity, I was greatly hindered in the work of collecting—the Carnival being then in full blast. Still, I managed to gather \$48.70 in SYDNEY, \$39.75 in NORTH SYDNEY, \$14.00 at SYDNEY MINES, \$28.50 at GLACE BAY, \$6.36 at BRIDGPORT, and \$3.10 in LOUISBURG. I expect to receive on my next visit to these places very greatly enlarged contributions. In BADDECK I collected \$16.36, at WEST BAY, \$2.50, PORT HAWKESBURY, \$12.25, PORT HASTINGS, \$8.00, and ST. PETER'S, \$5.50. In all these places in Cape Breton, but North Sydney and Port Hastings, I addressed meetings. And in reference to my work in that charming Island, I cannot refrain from again expressing thanks to our supporters there. Everywhere I went I was welcomed by friendly countenance, warm grasp of hand, and cheerfully opened purse. Our thanks are due to the Bras d'Or Steamship Company for a season's pass on the "Marion," of which I availed myself during my journey in July.

I visited ANTIGONISH, and during my short stay there collected \$25.00. On Sabbath, 30th July, I had the pulpits at MERIGOMISH and FRENCH RIVER. Unfortunately, no intimation of a plate collection had been given for the former meeting, but at French River I obtained \$4.55. We may yet obtain a collection at Merigomish, but perhaps not in time for this Report.

My third journey in Nova Scotia began on 5th October. I had hoped for a meeting in Truro the following day or on Sabbath, but the time being inopportune, a meeting was decided upon later in the month. I was glad to know that Truro's meeting was quite good, and representative of the

various Churches, and that fine Branch was fortunate in its election of a President well qualified to lead it on in the same progressive and popular lines as distinguished the efforts of its late President, James K. Blair, Esq. Our thanks are due to the Committee and Collectors of Truro, for the grand contribution of \$158.74, which is quite an advance on that of last year. Deeply, too, are we indebted to the Rev. W. J. Armitage, of St. Paul's, Halifax, for his valuable platform service at Truro's Annual Meeting. On Sunday, the 8th, I paid a second visit to CLIFTON, and addressed a meeting at Green Oak, an outlying district of that good Branch. On Tuesday, the 10th, we were at DARTMOUTH'S Annual Meeting, held in the Methodist Church. Although the audience was smaller than usual, it was, perhaps, one of the most interesting held for some years past. The addresses of the Revs. Wilkinson, Stewart, and Gronlound, were exceptionally good and appropriate to the occasion. The plate collection, \$5.52, was handed to me, and your Treasurer has since received \$171.38—in all \$176.90. This is truly grand and gratifying. These figures mean a great deal of work on the part of Collectors, and good management by the Committee of Ladies, all of whom merit our warmest thanks.

We had a fine meeting at ST. CROIX on the 11th. I got the plate collection, \$2.31, and the promise of a house to house canvass next summer. On the 12th, our meeting at BROOKLYN, NEWPORT Branch, was fairly well attended, notwithstanding another of a very interesting nature at the same hour. Again I notice that your Treasurer has duly received NEWPORT'S good contribution, with its large list of subscribers in the same clear handwriting and business form which for fourteen years has distinguished the returns of that Branch. \$47.87 from Newport shows no small labor in its acquisition by Collectors, while the figures also reminds us how much we are indebted to James Farquhar, Esq., the faithful and zealous Secretary.

You will rejoice with me at seeing the splendid contribution of \$104.77, which the Treasurer of that Branch handed me. We generally have large and interesting meetings there, at which, as a rule, all the Ministers of the town are present to render platform service. The music too, is usually up-to-date. Indeed, the gathering has the nature of an annual festival, when the brotherhood meet to rejoice over the triumphs of the Bible, and at their share in promoting its circulation. The plan of Lunenburg's Branch work is admirable. All the ministers of the town fill in rotation the office of President, while the Treasurer and Secretary remain in office,—Gentlemen who have the confidence of the town, and who for many years have cheerfully and successfully carried on or directed the work of collecting. The annual meetings, also, are held in the Churches by rotation. The whole plan is admirably ideal, while the meetings are an inspiration to all assembled. On Sabbath the 26th, I held three meetings at ELMSDALE and NINE MILE RIVER, and per plate collections and individual subscriptions I received the good sum of \$13.09. I heartily thank the Rev. A. V. Morash for his friendly action on behalf of our cause. On the 27th we had a small meeting at MILFORD with a collection of \$2.42. I was fortunate in obtaining a good meeting at LOWER STEWACKE, and a re-organization of that Branch. From the plate I got 93 cents, and I hope our friends there will not forget the promised canvass. I went to PARRSBORO on the 2nd December, and held two meetings on the following Sabbath. On Monday I canvassed the merchants and professional gentlemen of the town, from whom I received \$10.93. Two ladies promised to follow up my work, but at this writing I have no knowledge of their success. I received also from our Depository \$2.66. On the 5th I paid a second visit to OXFORD, the result of which I have previously stated. A greatly-detained train prevented me from arriving at Tatamagouche in time for my purpose. On the following morning I collected from a few friends \$3.00, and proceeded to Brule, where a meeting was arranged for. There I received \$1.68. I was very hospitably treated by people whom I saw for the first time, but still my visit to TATAMAGOUCHE and BRULE was far from being successful. I hope for better success in my future efforts to draw that community into line of Bible Society work. On the 8th our meeting at SCOTSBURN was very small, and panned out only \$2.21. When I can get a Sabbath service there, the friends usually contribute well. On Sabbath the 10th, I addressed four congregations at STELLARTON and WESTVILLE. At each of these meetings I occupied only the time ordinarily devoted to the sermon. My plan, under such circumstances, is to speak at the opening of service in one Church, and the closing of the other—half an hour, say, in each Church. Fortunately, four addresses in one day seldom occur. Yet I much prefer four to one on a Sabbath. You will, I am sure, greatly rejoice to know that both these towns continue to strengthen our cause by very handsome contributions. STELLARTON has given us this year \$78.60, and WESTVILLE \$35.13. Abstract of the Report of Parent Society, 1898-99.

When our Lord ended His earthly life, He left behind Him a twofold legacy, in the Bible and the Church; the power of His Spirit shown in the record of revelation, and in the whole fellowship of the faithful. And Christ's parting command, to preach the Gospel to every creature, applies not only to the Church, but to the Bible. As His Apostles and witnesses go forth to make disciples of all nations, they must carry His missionary Book, or they lack their weapon with which to conquer. And not only must the preacher in foreign lands frame his lips to new and uncouth languages, the Scriptures must learn them too. The immortal Truth must borrow fresh raiment, and clothe itself in many a strange garb, before it can enter as a friend into the huts and tents of far-off tribes, and bring home the message of redemption to every man in his own tongue, wherein he was born.

The Bible Society has been the great instrument in modern times by which God's Providence is accomplishing this wonderful work of translating and circulating the Scriptures. Already it has helped the Gospel to speak in some 350 languages and dialects. So that the Book, which a century ago was a sealed book to four men out of every five, to-day lies open, more or less completely, to seven men out of every ten in the world. Such a result, partial though it be, bears the manifest seal of a Divine vocation. And the paragraphs which follow will indicate, in brief outline how far the Society has continued faithful to this high calling, during the ninety-fifth year since its work began.

SURVEY OF THE FIELD.

It is no easy task to present a bird's eye view of the Society's mission in circulating the Scriptures. Every one has heard of the rustic who came up from the country to see the great city, and went back disappointed; he was unable to see London, because of the houses. There is the same kind of difficulty about the Bible Society's work: we fail to grasp its proportions, because, while it reaches to the corners of the earth, it includes such infinite variety of detail.

AT HOME.

Sunday Schools and Missions of all denominations By similar grants, continually renewed, the Society goes into partnership with almost every religious and philanthropic agency in the country. It joins hands, for example, with orphanages and hospitals, asylums, with soldiers' institutes and theological colleges, with missions to navvies and hop-pickers and deep-sea fishermen. It spends many hundreds a year on Bible women who visit in the slums of London. It puts a Bible into the pocket of every child whom Dr. Barnardo and other philanthropists emigrate to Canada.

ABROAD.

Outside England and Wales, the Society has been happily planted by sister Societies, working in friendliest co-operation, Scotland, in Ireland, in the United States, as well as in northern Protestant countries of Europe. Its own work is mainly in those Continental lands which are still unblessed by the Reformed Faith, and in the vaster and more distant realms of Moslem or heathen worship.

OBSTACLES.

Before we survey these broad fields of Bible work in detail, will be right to particularise two chief obstacles which meet the Society, especially throughout Europe to-day.

The sense of social hardship and misery, and the iron pressure of militarism, have driven multitudes to embrace what are vaguely called socialist or social democratic ideas. Such names in England convey no religious connotation. And Englishmen often forget that "collectivist" doctrines on the continent involve much more than economic theories or political programmes (as to which the Bible Society is entirely neutral); commonly, and among working people they imply definitely secular standards and materialist ideals of life. So that a foreign socialist is generally unchristian, and often bitterly anti-christian, confronting the colporteur with scorn, ridicule and blasphemy.

And side by side with this disbelief and denial stands another antagonist still more formidable and sinister. The Jesuit power which dominates the Vatican and controls the whole policy of the Roman Church, is everywhere and always the relentless foe of the open Bible. Forty years ago, George Borrow characterised the Bible Society as "one of the very few Protestant institutions which the Roman Church entertains any fear, and consequently any respect." And our Agents agree that this implacable hostility grows more bitter and persistent year by year.

From Germany Mr. Morrison writes: "It is the unanimous testimony of our colporteurs that the opposition of the Roman Catholic clergy has never been so violent and so virulent." From France M. Monod writes: "The Jesuit journal *La Croix* has its special object war against Protestants, and does more harm to colportage than the press of the Freethinkers." From Austria Millard writes: "The growing influence of Rome is felt more and more."

By similar grants, continually renewed, the Society goes into partnership with almost every religious and philanthropic agency in the country. It joins hands, for example, with orphanages and hospitals, asylums, with soldiers' institutes and theological colleges, with missions to navvies and hop-pickers and deep-sea fishermen. It spends many hundreds a year on Bible women who visit in the slums of London. It puts a Bible into the pocket of every child whom Dr. Barnardo and other philanthropists emigrate to Canada.

Bearing these facts in mind, we can see the results of the past year.

The atmosphere is threatening the anti-semitic crusade. Monod believes there is no real root as yet.

Imagination is obsessed with prejudice and suspicion. Under such conditions scriptures were 29 years ago. Higher than in 1896. Evangelical agencies have never been since. Evangelical movement. Warmest interest. Secretary of our Paris. Day tens of thousands. Bible or a Testament. As "some kind of

In Belgium where the Evangelical C. socialist miners and the sailors of all nations have dwindled. The laws against bootlegging permit of colportage.

The year which opened with a revolt ended more peacefully. An abundant harvest. Public confidence, a great increase in protection. Attacks of their opponents and poverty could

decreased by no less than 16,322 copies. The total circulation indeed, rose to 105,052 copies, an increase of almost 10,000. This is entirely due to nearly 25,000 Portions, distributed last summer during the exhibition at Turin.

SPAIN.

This year of disaster to Spain has resulted in the opening of some doors which were practically shut against Bible work. The Spanish Colonies had been garrisoned with Spanish friars, and held almost as fiefs under the Pope. In Cuba, in Porto Rico, and in the Philippines, fourteen millions are now emancipated from the yoke of Rome in its corrupt mediæval form, and will henceforth enter upon religious liberty. The Spanish people, as a whole, have accepted their crushing defeat with a certain native dignity. There are loud demands for political regeneration and reform within the kingdom itself. But as yet we hear no distinct note of reform in religion. It is not wonderful that the passionate prejudices stirred up by the war against all things Protestant should have checked our circulation to some extent. The figures show 73,800 copies, against 90,298 in 1897. Yet our colporteurs in Spain have sold 36,452 copies, and 6,000 Gospels were distributed among the sick and wounded soldiers and sailors as they regained their native soil.

PORTUGAL.

Our circulation as a whole, apart from sales to other Societies, has amounted to 9,226 copies, an increase due to improved colportage of nearly 1,000 over the previous year.

GERMANY.

Prince Bismark's death reminded his countrymen how much has happened since the founding of the German Empire. The new Germany is fast becoming a land of factories, a focus of busy and successful trade. Amid this rapid commercial prosperity, with its resultant perils, we rejoice that the distribution of Scriptures by our agencies in Germany reached last year the unprecedented total of 869,460 copies. Our own Agency, which is chiefly confined to the Roman Catholic States and Provinces of the Empire, circulated 269,989 copies, an increase of more than 14,000 on the previous year. Our 32 colporteurs sold 77,545 copies, an increase of 10,000

SWITZERLAND.

Here our circulation has taken a wide leap forward. The various Cantonal Societies, conducted as a rule with great energy and wisdom, carry out the distribution of the Scriptures which they draw from us. Last year we supplied them with nearly 63,000 copies, an increase of over 11,000 on 1897. Swiss colporteurs sold altogether 13,723 copies up and down this playground of Europe.

has resulted in the opening of the Reformed faith, from motives of racial and political sympathy, as well as through religious conviction. Under such favorable conditions the Society's work has been pursued, amid some difficulties and anxieties graver still. Socialist doctrines on one hand and ecclesiastical bigotry on the other confront the colporteur in almost every village. The Jesuits succeed only too well in their inveterate hostility against an open Bible. Through their influence the authorities in Galicia for more than two years refused to renew our colporteurs' licenses, which are now only granted again on less favourable terms, and under new and vexatious restrictions. And in Lower Austria two colporteurs' licenses were refused last year; and though we have appealed and the matter remains *sub judice*, the licenses of two other colporteurs are held back, pending this decision.

Yet in the teeth of all hindrances our circulation has been 100 greater than in the previous year. The strange medley of dialects which this Agency includes purchased Scriptures in twenty-five different languages and dialects. And our colporteurs have added patiently at their task among the fifty millions of people whose homesteads and hamlets chequer the vast expanse from the Danube and down to Dalmatia, and stretch along the course of the mighty river which drains the snows of the Engadine eastward to the Black Sea.

TURKEY AND GREECE.

In Turkey the year just closed has been happily devoid of special story. The massacres have become only a dreaded memory, and the last echoes of war with Greece have died away. Bible work has quietly resumed its normal character. Even in Crete, with the return of peace and settled government, colportage is now being organized under our experienced servant, Mr. Bosdoyannes.

The sales by our staff of thirty-three colporteurs have amounted to 23,394 copies, over 9,000 more than the sales of the previous year by the same men. The total circulation for the whole Agency has been 42,724 copies in some forty languages—a decrease of 500 copies.

In Greece a new era in our work may date from the war. It began, perhaps, out of gratitude for the spiritual help supplied by the Society to Greek soldiers in the field and in the hospital. But genuine quickening of the national conscience has appeared in the midst of national defeat, and bears promise of a true religious revival and reform.

RUSSIA.

The least expected, and, it may be, the most momentous event of 1898 occurred in August, when the young Tsar startled the world by seriously proposing a Conference on international disarmament. It is too early even to forecast the issues of his memorable act. But all Christians must unite in effectual fervent prayer for "peace on earth." And there is perhaps more than an accidental connection between the eirenicon from St. Petersburg and the fact that of all countries outside of England, Russia has in many respects given the largest facilities and the warmest welcome to the Bible Society.

Throughout these enormous territories, our work has been carried on with courage and with patience, and the results achieved give an abundant cause for thankfulness. The year's circulation has been 523,170 copies—an increase of over 20,000. Out of this total no less than 210,709 copies were sold by colporteurs. In Russia the colporteur is welcomed alike by priest and peasant, and often finds his friendliest customers in the soldiers' barracks. Seventy colporteurs have been continuously at work throughout the year, and their sales are nearly 10,000 greater than in 1897, and 25,000 greater than in 1896. Some 23,000 copies of Scriptures have been also granted at nominal rates for distribution in Russian prisons.

SIBERIA.

Mr. Davidson sends a thoroughly cheering report from the Siberian Agency, where such rapid changes are in progress, paving the way for changes greater still. The new Trans-Siberian railroad creeps steadily eastwards, and in four years' time will stretch from St. Petersburg across to Port Arthur, as one of the highways of the world. It will then be possible to travel overland from London to Shanghai in a fortnight, instead of in five weeks, as at present by steamer. Already this iron road is creating traffic everywhere as it advances, quickening immigration, improving agriculture, and carrying into the heart of these vast territories the education and civilization of the West. Bible-work in Siberia has been growing at a corresponding rate. In 1886 we circulated just over 3,000 copies "in the hitherto dark region." In 1893 the total was over 49,000. Our principal increase last year was in colportage sales which reached 21,526 copies, a rise of nearly 6,000 during the year. Mr. Davidson can testify that the confidence of the authorities both clerical and civil, has been won. The Siberians recognise our work more or less as an institution of the country. And latterly our colporteurs do not need to produce their signed permit for free passage, the knapsack and the books are passport enough.

PERSIA.

Though this Agency was vacant for more than three years, its colportage sales increased by over 1,000 copies in 1898, and we look for new progress under Mr. Tisdall, who reached Ispahan on December 31st, 1898,

INDIA.

When Dr. Welldon, the new Metropolitan of India, took leave of the Committee at the Bible House in January, he reminded them that every fifth child born on to the planet is born within the limits of his ecclesiastical jurisdiction. It is difficult to grasp the full meaning of such a fact. Few Englishmen realize that India is not a country or a nation, but a continent, containing scores of nations and languages and creeds, representing all stages between savagery and culture. There are now more than 300 millions of people for whose government we are responsible in India, and of these 73 millions have been added, mostly by the increase of population, since 1871.

The Society's work in this swarming and polyglot empire is subdivided among six Auxiliaries. Returns from only five of these have as yet come to hand. From their reports, however, we note that the India of 1898, as compared with the India of 1897, has been relatively prosperous. Of the three calamities of war, famine, and pestilence, only the last has lingered. Yet the year 1897, so crowded with troubles, showed a wonderful and unexpected rise in our Indian circulation; in 1898, however, there appears a general slackening. Lahore returns a decrease of 12,000 copies, Allahabad of 12,037 copies, Bombay of 1,987, Madras of 5,546, while Bangalore shows an increase of 7,496. Leaving Calcutta on one side for the moment, this gives a net decrease for 1898 of 20,074 copies—after all, less than 6 per cent. of last year's figures. It is encouraging to find that Indian colportage sales have generally increased.

CEYLON.

The circulation in this island, though the figures are incomplete, shows a slight falling off.

CHINA.

To outside observers, affairs in the Far East have seemed an ugly welter of claims and intrigues by rival foreign powers, amid alternate concession and reaction on the part of the rulers of China. Viewed from within, the year has been full of exceptional opportunities for Bible work. "In every direction," writes Mr. Bondfield, "we have found the open door, and happily have been enabled to take full advantage of it. In Manchuria and Mongolia, Formosa and Hainan, as well as in several of the provinces, our work has developed or strengthened." Once again we can thankfully record an advance in all departments; and the year's circulation has reached the astonishing total of 728,716 copies of Scriptures, an increase of 161,704 on 1897. By far the greater part of this total consisted of Portions, but the circulation of New Testaments has more than trebled. Outside the above total, a quarter of a million of Scripture calendars were also sold. Our sales by colportage alone have increased by 154,476 copies. Over 300 men were at work for longer or shorter periods. Wide districts have been systematically covered, house-to-house visitation has been

carried out in towns and villages, little companies of worshippers have been sought out and instructed, and in many other ways our colporteurs have been both sowers of the good seed and reapers of a ripened harvest.

In no other field are conversions so freely attributed to colportage. Dr. Ross, of Mukden, writes: "Last year several hundreds must have been brought into the Church of Christ through this means." Mr. R. T. Turley reports: "Good use has been made of our colporteurs on the N. E. borders of Mongolia, and little bands of believers are being gathered together in consequence." The Rev. A. Karlsson, of Huen-uen, writes: "One encouraging aspect of the colporteur's work is that many people are coming to our station through reading the Scriptures." The Rev. F. Harmon, of Chou-p'ing, says: "The colporteur has been largely instrumental in establishing two new stations this year." The Rev. G. H. Jose, Tai chow, writes: "At Tien-hai the colporteurs have opened up two new centres for us. There are now several hundred inquirers meeting regularly by themselves for worship, who first heard the Gospel from our two colporteurs." The Rev. J. Bosshard writes: "In the city of Fo-phin a small Church has come into existence during the past year, and a second one, also the result of colportage work, was formed a few months ago at Lin-tshai."

Such are a few of the testimonies found in reports, mostly by missionaries, on this year's work. Taken together, these reports give overwhelming evidence that our labour is not in vain in the Lord. How much the work of the colporteurs has to do with the present remarkable movement in Chinese thought it would be difficult to say. But patiently and persistently, year after year, they have itinerated over vast areas, and brought before millions in the eighteen provinces of China the Name which is above every name, and the regenerating truths which that Name represents.

KOREA.

The circulation, which four years ago was 1,253, rose last year to 34,912 copies. This means, says Mr. Kenmure, "that the native Christians are studying their Bibles, that the missionaries are laying stress on Bible knowledge, and that the people are learning to read—painfully and with many tears, but learning." Our colporteurs have sold 6,205 copies, and their footsteps are marked by little knots of inquirers and believers, while in many places where the Bible Society might have sent colporteurs the native Korean Church has begun to do this work itself.

JAPAN.

Bible work in this Empire is administered by a joint Committee of three Societies—the American, the Scotch, and our own. Last year's circulation increased by nearly 1,000 Bibles and Testaments. And a significant event occurred when the Emperor accepted the gift of an English Bible from the Societies' Committee, and of a Japanese Bible from his Christian subjects. The Buddhist opposi-

And we hear of a Christian Speaker of the Japanese House of Commons, a Christian at the head of the military hospital at Osaka, the Aldershot of Japan, and a Christian chaplain appointed for the first time to the great prison at Tokyo. Such outward symptoms betray Christian ideas slowly penetrating this gifted and facile people, who may well hold the key of the future in the Far East.

MALAYSIA.

From Malasia, "the naturalists' Paradise," the Rev. H. F. Miller, the acting Agent during Mr. Haffenden's furlough, sends a report of further most encouraging progress, especially in the sales of Chinese Scriptures. The circulation in 1898 reached a total of 84,690 copies—an increase of 14,433 over 1897, which itself showed an equal rise over 1896. The growth this year is distributed over different regions of this widely scattered archipelago. In Cochinchina, our energetic Sub-agent, Mr. Walter James, has sold no less than 30,653 copies, most of them Chinese Portions—4,400 more than his wonderful total for the previous year. Throughout this field there is peculiar need for more missionaries to take up and carry on the hopeful work begun by our colporteurs.

THE PHILIPPINES.

It is ten years since the Society's first attempt to work in Manila provoked imprisonment and expulsion, and its books were rigidly excluded by the Spanish priests. Last September, however, the American conquest enabled Mr. Bondfield to despatch our Sub-agent, Mr. B. C. Randall, to Manila with a supply of Spanish, Chinese, and Pangasinan Scriptures. He was the earliest Evangelical worker to enter this long-closed field, where he found a brisk demand for his books, and Gospels have since been sent out to him in three other Philippine languages. We have had great pleasure in placing these versions at the service of the American Bible Society, with whom we are arranging to co-operate on the friendliest terms in their new Eastern dependency. Although during the present unhappy conflict Mr. Randall can do little, he remains at Manila, to take advantage of coming opportunities. His last letter tells of Scriptures distributed in the hospital among wounded Filipinos, as well as among prisoners of war.

AUSTRALIA AND NEW ZEALAND.

Space fails us here to describe the fruitful work of our numerous Auxiliaries at the antipodes, not only within their own borders, but in New Guinea and Melanesia. It remains to refer briefly to two other great continents—Africa and America.

AFRICA.

Perhaps the most significant detail of last year's work in Africa was a grant of Swahili Gospels made to Baptist Missionaries on the Upper Congo. For Swahili is the *lingua franca* of the East African

Coast, and the New Testament was put into it by Bishop Steere. So that this grant shows how Christian Missions have begun to clasp hands right across the deserts and forests between Loango and Zanzibar.

Another similar notable incident was a letter to the Committee from the King of Toro, begging for the Gospel in his own tongue. Toro lies north of the Albert Edward Nyanza, and has been evangelised by the C. M. S. and their converts from Uganda. The King's letter was forwarded eastwards by Mr. A. B. Lloyd before starting on his adventurous journey westwards down to the Congo mouth.

EGYPTIAN AGENCY.

All through last year, Englishmen were watching for news from the Nile. Our pulses quickened when we heard of those victories which rescued the Sudan from a blighting and barbarous tyranny. The destiny which has bound England and Egypt so closely together, must deepen our sense of responsibility for the future of this immemorial land. The Sirdar's College at Khartum is rising among illiterate tribes as a symbol of their education. But on the Bible Society, hand in hand with Christian Missions, rests the duty to spread southwards along the waterway of the ancient river, those sacred and saving truths which neither arms, nor arts, nor sciences can supply.

No other Agency presents such unique attraction, such incalculable opportunities. Three continents converge upon Egypt. While its deserts have become a thoroughfare for British regiments, each winter brings more English and Americans to seek health and rest under its rainless skies. The world's commerce filters through its canal. Men of every colour and speech jostle each other on its quays. Scriptures were sold last year to sailors at Port Said in thirty-one different tongues, to be carried away to the ends of the earth. And thus, by this sole Agency, the coin of the Kingdom is made current from Japan to Jamaica; and from the Gulf of Finland to "the long wash of Australasian seas."

Mr. Weakley, who has been reinforced by fresh workers, can report with keen satisfaction a year of unrivalled progress. In his Agency, which stretches from Cyprus to Zanzibar, the circulation has reached the record total of 28,071 copies—an increase of over 8,000 on 1897.

One of our colporteurs penetrated south as far as Wady Halfa and the Dervish prisoners there; but he has been compelled for the present to return, through the Sirdar's decision to exclude all Christian Missions for a time from the Sudan. Still further south, our East African Sub-agency has been removed from Mombasa to Zanzibar. The Rev. T. F. Shaw was accorded a private audience to present the Sultan of Zanzibar with a specially prepared Arabic Bible, on behalf of the Society.

MADAGASCAR.

In Madagascar, the work is controlled by two Committees which represent all the Protestant Missions in the island

SOUTH AFRICA.

The South African Auxiliary happily unites men of rival races which sometimes come into political conflict. It includes over 250 Branches, which ramify through Cape Colony and the Orange Free State, and spread through and beyond the Transvaal. Pietermaritzburg and Durban possess Auxiliaries of their own.

We felicitate our friends that 1898 proved a record year for their Bible work, both in finance and in circulation. Over 44,000 copies were sold—17,000 in Dutch, 15,000 in English, and 11,000 in native tongues, while the Free Contribution to Landon reached £1,100. Colporteurs, who sold 9,539 copies, have laboured successfully among the Kaffirs of Cape Colony, and the miners round about Kimberley, and have visited many a remote and isolated homestead in the far north of the Transvaal.

WEST AFRICA.

The Rev. C. R. Johnson has charge of this widely scattered Agency, which extends from the Gambia to the Congo. He has achieved striking success in forming Auxiliaries and arousing interest in the chief towns along the coast. And it is wonderful that after about two years' work he can report a circulation of nearly 10,000 copies of Scripture in a dozen different languages. This side of Africa is just beginning to rise out of the ignorance of ages. Education as yet touches only the fringe of the native population. But it is spreading every year, and with it will arrive the Bible Society's opportunity.

WEST INDIAN AGENCY.

Several of the West Indian Islands were devastated last September by a most diastrous hurricane. Free grants of Scriptures have been sent out to the sufferers, who in thousands of cases lost their all. Besides the regular work of the Agency, something has been done for Cuban refugees in Jamaica, and for Indian coolies in Trinidad, British Guiana, and elsewhere. And Bible work has quickened at various points in this extended field.

CENTRAL AMERICA.

Amongst the five Republics of Central America, where a revolution is as commonplace as an earthquake, Senor F. de P. Castells has laboured as Sub-agent with increasing success. Through his influence the new Quiché St. Mark was printed at a nominal charge by the Government press at Guatemala city—a unique event in a Roman Catholic State. Senor Castells sold 1,000 copies of this edition during a four months' tour among the Indians in the high-

lands of Guatemala. Central America will henceforth be recognized as a separate Agency of the Society. As soon as the long-projected canal pierces the Isthmus the Central American waterway will become one of the chief trade routes in the world.

BRAZIL.

Across this remote and difficult region the circulation has been 20,204 copies, a falling off of over 3,000. The diminution was in sales at Sub-depôts. Colportage shows an encouraging increase of 3,337 copies. Senhor J. dos Santos has completed twenty years of service as Agent at Rio, during which he has circulated nearly 300,000 copies of the Scriptures in Brazil.

IN CHILI AND PERU

Our work is still carried on through the Valparaiso Bible Society. And in the Argentine, where the death of Signor Lantaret left without an Agent for the greater part of the year, the vacant position is now filled by his friend and former colleague, Signor Pons.

BRITISH NORTH AMERICA.

Here the Society includes seventeen Auxiliaries, with some 1,200 Branch Societies in active co-operation, which not only circulate Scriptures from Newfoundland to British Columbia and Klondyke, but remit liberal Free Contributions to London. Among the largest and wealthiest Canadian Auxiliaries are Toronto, Ottawa, and Montreal; while the Quebec Auxiliary labours in some of the most arid and difficult fields for Bible work in the world.

It is impossible to close this imperfect review without a sincere and alike of profound and humble thankfulness, and of resolute courage. We dare not grow slack to carry on the mission which God has so signally blessed. The Bible Society to-day seems more necessary than ever. We have joined in the glorious centenary psalm of the Church Missionary Society with all the deeper fervour, because we know that its work would be crippled to-morrow if ours were to cease. And we unite as heartily in the thanksgivings of the Religious Tract Society, knowing how all its noble effort builds upon the circulation of the Scriptures. Has any Christian enterprise a surer sanction, or a richer promise? "If he shall not lose his reward," says Thomas à Kempis, "who gives a cup of cold water to his thirsty neighbour, what will not be the reward of the man who, putting good books into the hands of their neighbours, opens to them the fountains of eternal life?"

Since this abstract was published the war in South Africa has led to increased distribution by the Bible Society of the Holy Scriptures. More than 38,000 copies of English Bibles and Gospels have been distributed as gifts among regiments now operating in the South African Republic.

BRAZIL.

In this difficult region the circulation has been over 3,000. The diminution was not large shows an encouraging increase. Santos has completed twenty years of work which he has circulated nearly 100,000 copies in Brazil.

CHILE AND PERU

Through the Valparaiso Bible Society the death of Signor Lantaret left a vacancy for part of the year, the vacant position was filled by his former colleague, Signor Pons.

NORTH AMERICA.

Seventeen Auxiliaries, with some of them in active co-operation, which not only has added ground to British Columbia but has also secured Contributions to London. American Auxiliaries are Toronto, Montreal, and the Quebec Auxiliary labours in the world. It is an imperfect review without a sincere expression of thankfulness, and of resolute courage in the mission which God has committed to the Society to-day seems more necessary than ever. The glorious centenary psalm of praise is sung with all the deeper fervour, because we are so crippled to-morrow if ours were not supported daily in the thanksgivings of the people. How all its noble effort builds up the Kingdom of God on earth. Has any Christian entered the world for the promise? "If he shall not leave his father and mother, and who gives a cup of cold water to a thirsty man, what will not be the reward of the man who gives it to the hands of their neighbours, of the life?"

published the war in South America. Distribution by the Bible Society has been more than 38,000 copies of English Bibles, which are sent as gifts among regiments.

being sent for South Africa. Two thousand copies of Scriptures, at the request of the Chaplain General, the Rev. Dr. GEHILL, have been sent to the Imperial Soldiers' Hospital DeAar, Cape Colony. Dutch and English Scriptures are supplied to the wounded in other military hospitals, and to the prisoners and refugees in Cape Colony and Natal. They are sent also to Pretoria for the wounded Boers and English prisoners there.

400,000 French Gospels have been printed for free distribution at the Paris Exhibition. Testaments have been given to our own volunteers by Bible Societies of the Dominion.

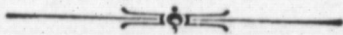
Does not this association of Christian men, women and children for the purpose of spreading the Holy Scriptures throughout the whole inhabited earth which has done so much good in the past and at present, and has led to the formation of kindred institutions in the British Empire, the United States and the Continent of Europe, deserve the ready support of far more contributions in Nova Scotia and Cape Breton?

The world's need is greatly increasing, if the 160 millions of copies printed since the formation of the Society were in existence they would supply less than one in nine of the estimated population of the globe. And though in most of the important languages of the world some part or the whole of the Scriptures may be read, in many languages the Bible has not yet been translated, and in a majority of the languages where translations exist, only a portion of the Bible is translated, often only a single Gospel.

In order that we may do our part to enable the Society to meet the increased demand for and need of God's Word, caused by the progress of missionary work, and the new avenues now opened for the circulation of the Scriptures

throughout the world, the ministers of the Gospel should press more earnestly on their congregations and Sunday Schools the claims of this Society, on account of the vastness of its work and its missionary character, and the blessing God has blessed the labours of its colporteurs and women, and the reading of His Word when it has gone to its life-giving truths to those whom no missionary reached and led them to seek for more instruction.

While the steadily increasing aid given by the British Society to Home and Foreign Mission work is urged as a reason for all interested in such missions regularly contributing to its fund, urgent efforts are needed to be constantly made to inform the many Christians who are still ignorant of the wide extent of the Society's labors, of the blessings which have followed its work, and of the great need of a vast majority of mankind, now without the knowledge of the Bible, to be supplied with those Holy Scriptures which make them wise to salvation through faith in our Lord Jesus Christ.
