POSTAL TELEGRAPH OFFICES are operated throughout the Colony at all the principal places. Messages of ten words, not including address or signature, are forwarded for twenty cents, and two cents for each additional word.

A Government cable to Canso, Cape Breton, connects with the Commercial Cable Co.'s system to all parts of the world. There is no more efficient Telegraphic Service in existence.

A ten word message to Canada, exclusive of signature and address, costs from 85 cents to \$1.00.

A ten word message to the United States, exclusive of signature and address, costs from \$1.10 to \$1.50.

To Great Britain, France or Germany—25 cents per word.

Telegrams are transmitted by means of the Wireless Service during the summer season, and all the year round on Steamers equipped with the wireless apparatus, which are due to pass with in the radii of the wireless stations at Cape Race and Cape Bay.

Telegram messages may be obtained at all Post Offices and from Mail Clerks on Trains and Steamers, and if the sender wishes the messages may be left with the P. M. to be forwarded by first mail to the nearest Telegraph Office free of postage.

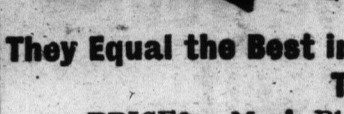

## Will Develop Ore Areas at St. George's, Nfld.

Titanium Taken from Mineral by Electric Smelting Processes.

A new iron industry is to be opened up in the district of St. George's, Newfoundland, an industry which has long been kept back on account of the unsuccessful way of handling the ore. The ore contains titanium and cannot be smelted by the ordinary blast furnace methods, except in very small quantities, say about 10 per cent. mixed in with other ores. Scientists who have been at work now for some years, have at last solved the problem, and the ore can now be smelted successfully by the electric smelting process which eliminates all the impurities.

One of the inventors of this process is Mr. J. L. Evans of Belleville, Ont., and Dr. Stanfield of McGill University, Montreal, who are now turning out the best carbon tool steel, and high speed steels, which is considered superior to any other steel, being free entirely from sulphur and phosphorus.

## Fatal Mine Explosion

22 Newfoundlanders Killed

Sydney, July 25.—The worst explosion in the history of the Cape Breton coal fields occurred at 7.30 a.m. today in No. 12 colliery, New Waterford district. The official estimate places dead at 22, including 30 native miners, 22 Newfoundlanders and 10 foreigners. About 270 men were in the mine at the time and the colliery officials express surprise that the loss of life is not greater. Up to a late hour to-night only a small number of bodies had been recovered. The greater number will be where they are still to-morrow. Great crowds of people including weeping women and children still surround the pit's mouth. It is now believed the explosion was caused by the first shot fired when the men had taken their places at No. 7 landing, blocking the way to the landing, so that rescuers have had to approach by another route than usually used. Heroic work is being done by scores of volunteers, and two young men who were down into the pit this morning on rescue work were suffocated and now lie dead.

## Pte. Stevens Killed in Action

Word was received on Saturday that Pte. Ballingden Stevens, of the Canadian Regt., was killed "Somewhere in France" some time ago. Pte. Stevens was a son of Julia and the late Azariah Stevens, formerly of Barenseid, but for a number of years residing in New Glasgow, N. S. Another brother, Maxwell, is also with the Canadians at the front.

Mr. John Jones, of Shearstown, passed peacefully away on Tuesday last, aged 57 years. The funeral took place on Thursday afternoon at the C. of E. Cemetery. The members of Cromwell Lodge, L. O. A., and other friends attended the funeral.

Newfoundland Patriotic Association Employment Committee

The Employment Committee has been appointed by the Newfoundland Patriotic Association to take into consideration applications for employment in civil life from returned Soldiers and Sailors of the Newfoundland Regiment and Newfoundland Royal Naval Reserve who have been granted honourable discharges. The Committee can only perform this duty to our returned soldiers and sailors with the fullest help and co-operation of all those in the Colony who employ labour or require help or service of any kind in which these men may be employed. The Committee will prepare and keep on file a register of all men seeking employment, giving their age, qualifications and experience, so far as possible, of each applicant. This information will be available to prospective employers, and steps will be taken to bring about interview or correspondence between employers and soldier or sailor applicants. Every person or firm when requiring such help for either domestic or business purposes is therefore invited to communicate to the Committee the nature of the help required, and of the work to be done, and such other information as may be useful. For the present the Headquarters of the Committee are at the Colonial Building, St. John's, and communications should be addressed to A. E. Parsons, Secretary of the Employment Committee.

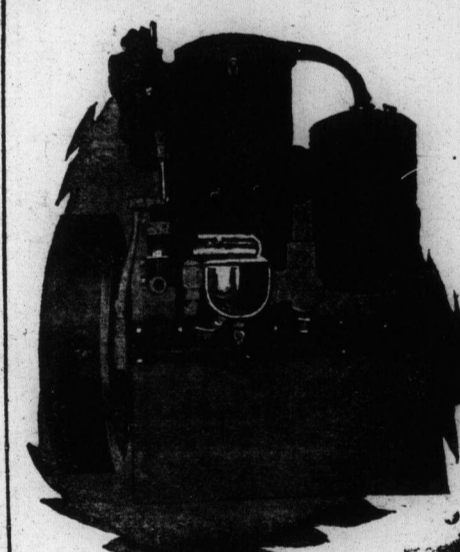

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

**House of Assembly, 1917**

**Official Synopsis of Debates**

**MONDAY, July 9th.**  
The House met at 3 p. m., pursuant to adjournment.  
Petitions were presented by Mr. Downey, the Premier (for Mr. Clapp).  
The Hon. Minister of Finance and Customs introduced a bill relating to Military and Naval Pensions, which was read a first time.  
The Exportation of Timber Bill was read a third time, and sent to the Legislative Council.  
The Pension Bill and Naval and Military Loan Bill were read a second time.  
The House adjourned till tomorrow at 3 p. m.

**TUESDAY, July 10th.**  
The House met at 3 p. m., pursuant to adjournment.  
Petitions were presented by Mr. Hickman, Mr. Higgins, Mr. Currie.  
The Premier, (from the Salvation Army, asking for an amendment to their Incorporation Act).  
The interim report of the Committee on the new Municipal Bill was received and adopted, and the Committee was continued.  
**THE MINISTER OF MARINE AND FISHERIES** gave notice of resolutions re pilotage, and the Premier gave notice of a bill to amend the Prohibition Act.

The House went into Committee of the Whole on Supply.  
**HON. MINISTER OF FINANCE** introduced Supplemental Supply for the last 12 months, totalling about half a million dollars. Most of this was required to cover the increase of cost of maintenance and labor in every department. The Committee passed all the items, reserving the last, and then rose.  
The House then went into Committee of the Whole on Supply, and passed the Retiring Allowance Bill (pensions to several public servants), the War Loan Bill and the Public Service Electric Co. Bill.  
The House adjourned till tomorrow at 3 p. m.

**WEDNESDAY, July 11th.**  
The House met at 3 p. m., pursuant to adjournment.  
**MIN. OF MARINE AND FISHERIES** introduced resolutions to increase the rates of pilotage on steamers entering the port of St. John's. These rates were very low, compared to other ports, and the pilotage found them insufficient to make a livelihood upon, especially in view of the increased cost of living. The resolutions passed the Committee and a Bill was introduced and read a first time.  
**THE PREMIER** moved the House into Committee of the Whole to consider certain resolutions on financial matters connected with the Municipal affairs of St. John's. The new City Charter was so voluminous that it was impossible to have it ready for this session without doing it in haste. It was desirable, however, to pass these sections at once. The effect of the resolutions was to throw the entire tax on property and on the owner of land and building from whom it would be easily collected, while empowering him to collect the tax on property and buildings. There was also a resolution enabling the Municipal Council to deal with the question of housing of the working classes.

**HON. COLONIAL SECRETARY** praised the industry and ability of the Citizens Committee. He thought that in view of the great improvement in the rates of fire insurance in the city ought to be reduced.  
**MR. HIGGINS** endorsed the Bill, and the work of the Citizens Committee. He hoped it would involve any new taxation, but merely introduced a system under which the property owner would be made practically liable to collect the taxes for the city as was done elsewhere.  
**MR. LLOYD** also praised the industry of the Citizens Committee, and regretted that the House itself or its Committee had not been equally industrious.  
**MR. CLIFT** also felt that the thanks of every citizen were due this Committee; but still more to the Commissioners and Mayor Gosling, who had drafted the original Charter. He hoped that eventually it might be possible to effect some reduction in fire insurance rates. The resolution passed the Committee with a trifling amendment.  
The Retiring Allowance Bill and War Loan Bills were read a second time and sent to the Council.  
The House then went into Committee of the Whole on Supply, passed the remaining votes in Supplemental Supply (Roads and Bridges \$50,000, and Marine Works \$50,000 special votes) and the Minister of Finance and Customs introduced Additional Estimates for the coming year, explaining each item.  
The Public Service Electrical Co. (Carton and Heart's Content) Incorporation Bill passed the Committee.  
**THE PREMIER** moved the second reading of the Bill to amend the Prohibition Act. With regard to Patent Medicines and toilet articles containing alcohol, the former Act provided that the Governor in Council should have to punish almost the whole pharmacopoeia. It was therefore proposed in this Bill to admit all medicines save such as were forbidden by the Governor in Council, which would be determined from time to time by a Committee for that purpose. Any article which was found undesirable would then be placed on the "Black List." It was also proposed to introduce into this Bill a variety of provisions from the old Licensing Act designed to facilitate the detection and conviction of offenders.  
**MR. LLOYD** said that the former

amendment would turn every grocer's shop into a drinking shop, unless the Governor in Council immediately upon the passing of the Bill, bestirred himself and published a list of forbidden articles. Provided this was done however, he thought the present amendment would be an improvement.  
**THE PREMIER** said the Governor in Council had already arranged for a Standing Committee to consist of the Government Analyst, the Public Health Officer and Messrs. McNeil and Connors, chemists, who would advise upon such patent preparations as were considered objectionable from a temperance standpoint.  
**HON. COLONIAL SECRETARY** thought it would have been a hardship to have enforced the 1916 Act too strictly during the past year. The Bill was read a second time.  
The Committee then rose until tomorrow.

**THURSDAY, July 12th.**  
The House met at 3 p. m., pursuant to adjournment.  
The Public Service Electrical Co. Bill was read a third time and sent to the Legislative Council.  
The House went into Committee of the Whole on Supply, passed the Additional Estimates without debate and rose.  
The Bill relating to pilotage to the port of St. John's was read a second time.  
The House adjourned till tomorrow at 3 p. m.

**Legislative Council, 1917**

**Official Synopsis of Debates**

**THURSDAY, June 21.**  
The House met at 4:30 p. m., when the Death Duties Bill, Fire Insurance Companies Bill, Copyright Act amendment Bill and the Currency Bill were read a third time and passed without amendment.  
**HON. MR. BISHOP** moved the second reading of the Loan Confirmation Bill, which was to confirm the Act of the Governor in Council by providing for the payment of interest to bondholders under the Loan authorized in 1916.  
The House adjourned to Tuesday at 4:30 p. m.

**TUESDAY, June 26.**  
The House met at 4:30 p. m., and adjourned till Wednesday for want of a quorum.

**WEDNESDAY, June 27.**  
The House met at 4:30 and there being no quorum, was adjourned till Thursday.

**THURSDAY, June 28.**  
The House met at 4:30 p. m., and went into Committee on the Loan (Confirmation) Bill.  
**HON. PREMIER** asked if it was the intention to pay interest to subjects of hostile states who were holders of bonds, as he considered this an extraordinary procedure for any British Legislature to adopt.  
**HON. MR. BISHOP** agreed, but said the matter had been before the British authorities and had been sanctioned by them. Moreover, the question had not been raised in the Lower House. However, in order to satisfy Hon. Members he asked that the Committee rise.  
**HON. PREMIER** announced that the Council's Amendment to the Death Duties Amendment Act had passed by the House of Assembly without amendment.  
The following Bills were introduced and read a first time. An Act to further continue to enforce the Act 5, George V., Cap. 4, entitled an Act respecting a Volunteer Force in this Colony and an Act respecting Bills and Estates of members of the First Newfoundland Regiment and of the Newfoundland Branch of the Royal Naval Reserve, after which the House adjourned till Monday at 4.30 p. m.

S. S. Ethie, Capt. Goobie, arrived at Humbermouth Tuesday from Battle Br. and Straits settlements. Capt. Goobie reported as follows to the Resid. Nfld. Co.—Strong east winds and thick weather throughout the trip. East of Red Bay a good sign of fish; no fish west of that place. Fishermen doing well with hook and line; trapping over.

### Published by Authority

For the information of persons belonging to Newfoundland who propose to go to the United States of America, notice is hereby given that the Immigration Laws of the United States, which came into effect on the first May last, provide:

1.—That all aliens entering the United States shall pay a tax of \$8, but children under sixteen years of age, accompanying their father or their mother, shall not be subject to such tax. In the case of persons not remaining sixty days in the United States, the said tax will be returned upon their leaving the country.

2.—All aliens over sixteen years of age, who cannot read the English language, or some other language, will not be permitted to enter.

3.—Amongst other classes of aliens not admitted into the United States are the following:—Idiots, insane, epileptic, paupers, those physically defective and children under sixteen who are unaccompanied.

Cases have been brought to the notice of the Government where Newfoundlanders for one or other of the above reasons have been refused admission to the United States, and much disappointment and inconvenience, as well as expense, has been the result.

### German Casualties

London, July 20.—The German casualties reported in the German official lists during June, but not as having occurred in June, are given out by the War Office here as follows: Killed and died of wounds, 288,819; died of sickness, 3,215; prisoners and missing, 38,000; wounded, 95,906. The totals of the German official lists since the war began are as follows: killed or died of wounds, 1,034,800; died of sickness, 72,960; prisoners and missing, 591,966; wounded, 2,825,581. The naval and colonial casualties are not included.

### Increasing The Amount Of Frosting

Beat the whites of three eggs to a stiff froth, add three table-spoonfuls of sugar and drop the mixture into a basin of boiling water. It will rise to the top in an instant, where it can easily be lifted off and poured into the pudding. This method increases the frosting by one-half the quantity without necessitating an increase in the amount of materials used.

### Three Men Drowned

(Twillingate Sun)

From men here from New Bay we learn some further particulars of the sad drowning of the Rolles a couple of weeks ago. They were coming from Leading Tackles on Thursday and when off the mouth of Northwest Arm a top broke over their boat filling her. One son of Robert Rolfe managed to get on the bottom of the overturned boat, but the other three men lost their hold and were drowned. The young man on the capsized boat drifted ashore on the rocks and made a landing. Here he was found the next day by men who went over from S. E. Arm to look for herring.

### Liquor Control

We are glad that the New Government has dealt with the problems of the Liquor Control. The Board is to consist of three persons appointed by the Governor in Council. The Board will superintend the carrying out of the Prohibition Act, and advise the Government thereon from time to time. The Board is also given wide powers, subject however to the Governor in Council, to make rules and regulations respecting the conduct of the Controller's Department, including the power to limit the quantity of liquor which may be supplied to any person.

Where it has been shown that many difficulties lie in the way of carrying out the Prohibition Act, this amendment is a step in the right direction, and we trust that men, who will tackle the job thoroughly in earnest, will be selected as a Board. We have many times spoken of the desirability of limiting the quantity supplied to any person, and the Board will have the support of all in arriving at an amount which will prevent such abuses of the Act as we have witnessed during the last six months.

The Board will also have the power to overlook the records of the Controller, and assist him in the responsible stand that it is necessary that he should take sometimes. The Board can in many ways take some of the burdens that now lie upon the shoulders of the Doctors. It can assist those that honestly try to carry out the law, and it can admonish those who take their responsibilities in this matter lightly. We trust the appointments will be made speedily, and that the personnel of the Board will meet as near as possible the approbation of all.—Morning Advocate.

### Strayed Fishermen Land

Cape Race, July 22.—Two strayed fishermen from the schooner Electric Flash, of Grand Bank, reached here this morning. They left their schooner Thursday morning 150 miles south and failed to find her owing to dense fog. The men were without food until they reached the schooner Theresa M. Gray, Capt. McDonald this morning. They left again this afternoon for Renews to connect with train for St. John's.

### The Executive

The whole Executive as now constituted consists of twelve members, four from each of the three leading denominations.

The Church of England is represented by Dr. W. F. Lloyd, leader of the Liberal Union Party, Messrs. W. F. Coaker, J. A. Cliff, and Hon. J. R. Bennett of the old Executive; the Roman Catholic section by Rt. Hon. the Premier, Sir E. P. Morris, Messrs. M. P. Cashin and M. P. Gibbs and Mr. W. J. Ellis, the latest addition to the Executive, while the Methodist section is represented by Messrs. R. A. Squires, J. C. Crosbie and Messrs. A. Hickman and W. W. Halfyard appointed under the Coalition arrangement.—Star.

### Huns Occupy Tarnopol

London, July 23.—The occupation by the Germans of the city of Tarnopol in Eastern Galicia, is reported. The capture of Tarnopol, if confirmed, presents a serious menace to the whole Russian line between Pinsk and the Carpathians. Tarnopol is about 25 miles behind the positions occupied by the Russians when the German counter-attacks began last week. Unless the Russian forces to the north and south can carry out a rapid retreat, they will be threatened from their flank by the advancing Germans.

A new bell was recently installed in the Roman Catholic Church here.

Harbor Grace District is now without a representative either in the Executive or as head of a department in the National Government.

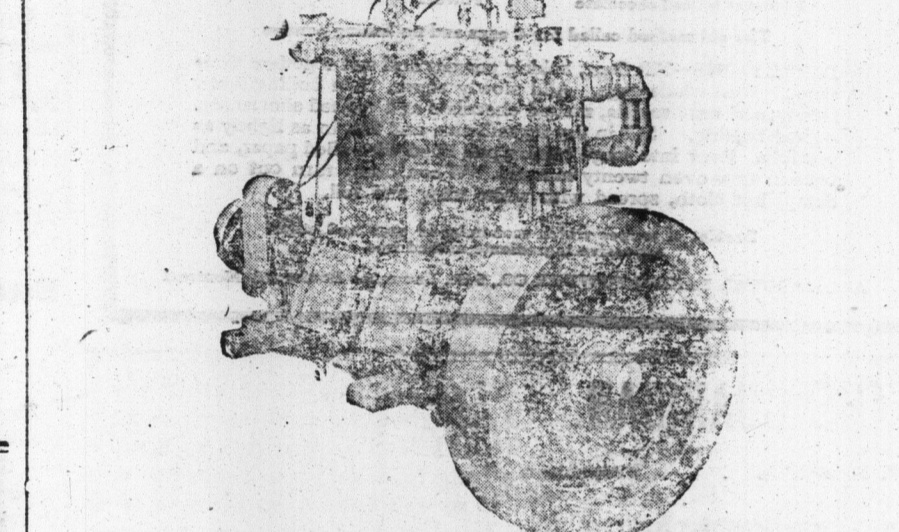

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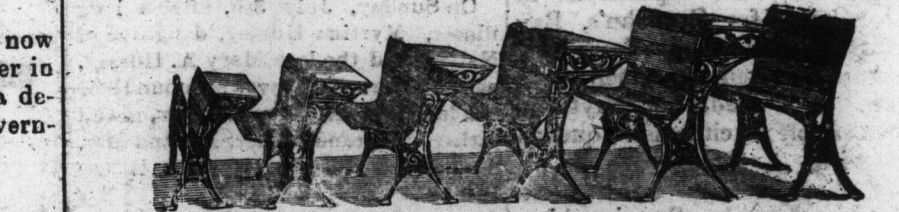

### That Electric Co. Charter

The Public Service Electric Co.'s Charter, to which we referred in a recent issue, has been passed by the Legislature. The Company wanted the right to do business in this Bay as far as Holyrood, but as usual, influences not in sympathy with the interests of the people were exerted and the rights granted only extend as far as Spaniard's Bay.

That is the great trouble with a lot of legislation put through in this country. Men are constantly being sent to the House to represent the people's interests who will allow themselves to be made tools of for the benefit of capitalists and others.

The public interest is only secondary. This is what happened in this case, so we learn. The time will shortly come when the fishermen of Conception Bay will be interested in electrical power to run their motor engines with. We are given to understand that it is the intention of the new company to supply storage batteries to the fishermen, which is said to be very much cheaper than gasoline.

Therefore, for many reasons the public are interested in the success of this company, and we venture to say that the day will come when the public demand will be satisfied.

How so many men who are representatives of the people can be satisfied to see so many things put through the House against the interests of the people is a problem we cannot very well solve. They must either be ignorant of their duty, or else recreant to it, or they must regard the electorate as so much "cullage." Candidly, we are inclined to place the blame on the electorate as much as on their so-called representatives, because of the lack of an intelligent and practical interest in matters which affect them.

### Bad Conditions on Russian Front

Petrograd, July 23.—That chaotic conditions are prevailing on a part of the Russian front, was disclosed in a telegram to Premier Kerensky, the Provisional Government and the Council of Workmen's and Soldiers' Delegates by the Executive Committee and Commissioner of the Provisional Government with the Second Army on the south-western front. The telegram announced the inauguration of stern measures to combat the disaffection. "They unanimously recognize that the situation demands extreme measures and efforts for everything must be risked to save the revolution from catastrophe. The commander in chief on the western front and the commander of the second army have given orders to fire on deserters and runaways. Let the country know the truth, let it act without mercy, let it find enough courage to strike those who by their cowardice are destroying Russia and the revolution." Referring to the threatened disaster, the telegram says: "Most of the military units are in a state of complete disorganization. Their spirit for the offensive has utterly disappeared. They no longer listen to the orders of their leaders and they neglect all exhortations of their comrades, even replying by threats and shots. Some of the elements voluntarily evacuate positions without even waiting the approach of the enemy."

MacIntyre, pastor of the Presbyterian Church of Ogdensburg, performed the ceremony, using the impressive double ring service.

The bride entered the church accompanied by her father and preceded by the matron of honor, Mrs. A. J. Penny, of Hamilton, the bridesmaids, Miss Katherine Bird of Malone, Miss Ruth Briggs of Gouverneur, Miss Harriett Meservey and Ethel Jamison of Canton, Little 4-year-old Miss Portia Van Delinder was flower girl, straying the path of the bride with roses from a tiny white satin basket. The little maid was dressed in soft white crepe-de-chine, trimmed in white ribbons. She wore a band of white satin with white tulle rosettes on each side of her head.

We have it on no less an authority than the Premier himself, who represents St. John's West, that the St. John's Fire Dept. is "purely a municipal service." That being the case, the expenses of the department should be borne by the citizens.
