He explained that a quantity of air had got in the pipes and caused the poor gas while new equipment was being installed. Mr. Wilson has not made a test for some days, stating that he thought it would be unfair to do so while repairs were going on at the plant. Tonight he will test the gas and he thinks it will be good enough to meet the govern-ment's requirements. Sixteen candle power is called for and the inspector says that the power has not dropped below the limit for over two years. When asked if he thought sixteen candle power had been on dur-ing the past few days, Mr. Wilson stated that he did not know, as he made no test. The testing of the gas is reported monthy, a certain average must be made. Mr. Wilson explained that if he made a test and found thero was only fifteen candle power it would make no difference, providing a great-



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
