Synopsis of Canadian Northwest Land Regulations. west Land Regulations Any person who is the sole head of a family, or any male over 18 years old, may homestead a quarter-section of available Dominion land in Manitobal-Saskatchewan or Alberta. The appli-cant must appoar in person at the Do-minion Lands Agency or Sub-Agency for the district. Entry by proxy may be made at any agency, on certain conditions, by father, mother, son daughter, brother or sister of intend-ing homesteader. Duties.—Six months' residence upon and cultivation of the land in each of three years. A homesteader may live within nine miles of his homestead on a farm of at least 80 acres solely own-ed and occupied by him or by his father, mother, son, daughter, brother or sister.
