until the policy of Parliament with respect to the railway has been ratified. Steady progress has been made in the construction of those portions of the railway now under contract. Two additional sections have been recently opened for traffic—on from Winnipeg to the Lake of the Woods and from the Lake of the Woods to Keewatin—so that there are now 254 miles in operation.

You will be glad to learn that the measures adopted to promote economy in the working of the Inter-Colonial and Prince Edward Island Railways have resulted in a large reduction of the differences between revenue and expenditure, and the steadily increasing traffic warrants the expectation that during the current year those railways will be self-sustaining.
