## Boat For Bay Chaleur Service Described

Admiral to run for May

Ottawa April 23.—The North American Transportation Co. (Connollys) who have received the contract of the Baie des Chaleurs Steamer Service after the local company had given up, being unable to secure a boat, have asked the Department of Trade and Commerce to put on the steamer Admiral again during May until they can get out from England a steamer they intend purchasing there. The Department give the following description of the new steamer called "The Britannia." She is of steel, paddle wheels, built at Glasgow, two funnels, 231 ft long (60 ft larger than the Admiral) 27-23 ft breadth, 605 tons gross tonnage, 268 tons net tonnage drawing 7 ft 9 in. light, speed 16 miles per hour with first class passenger accommodation of 219, proportionate stowage and suitable for freight as well. The first order in Council giving the contract to the local company has been rescinded at their request and another order passed awarding the contract as stated above. Mr. Connolly is negotiating with Sir Richard Cartwright who promises that he will see to it that a good service is given. If the Britannia is accepted a crew will have to be sent over for her. Tenders are being called for Port Daniel Wharf Extension. Tenders will be received up to May 16th. Tenders will be shortly called for New Richmond Wharf.

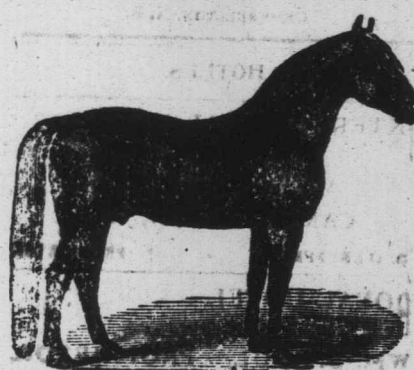

### Verdict of the Jury

In Investigation of the Death of George Marsh

The Coroner's inquest into the death of the late Geo. Marsh concluded last week. Quite a volume of evidence was submitted and space forbids a verbatim report. The evidence of Dr. Pinaut who conducted the post mortem examination showed that the deceased came to his death by congestion of the brain caused by alcoholic liquors. John McIntyre stated that he gave deceased one glass of liquor only during the day, while Stanley Hamilton swore that he gave deceased six glasses of whiskey within fifteen minutes, which he drank on a wager. In accordance with these facts the jury brought in the following verdict:

Geo. Marsh upon the night of the 26th March 1904, died of congestion of the brain caused by the excessive use of alcoholic liquors procured from John McIntyre, he (Marsh) being in an intoxicated condition, said liquor being six ordinary whiskey glasses full, drank on bets within fifteen minutes.

The jury were put to considerable trouble in performing their duty, some of the witnesses having to be brought down from the woods and much satisfaction is felt over the manner in which they discharged their duties.

Every White Ribboner is doubtless following with interest the Anti-Cigarette campaign now being waged in our Dominion. It has found many strong supporters among our representatives at Ottawa, some of whom have stated that the great array of well substantiated facts in regard to the harmfulness of the cigarette was a perfect revelation to them.

Mrs. Waters, Dominion Superintendent of Anti-Narcotics, who has been chiefly instrumental in seeking legislation to suppress the

cigarette evil, has collected and sent out much information on the subject.

That we may get a glimpse of the extent to which this habit is undermining the physical and moral strength of boys, the following items are brought to our notice.

An investigation set on foot in Winnipeg, by the Tribune of that city, revealed that, on their own admission, nearly one-fourth of the lads attending the city schools, used tobacco.

Only last year a deputation of Physicians, Principals of Schools, Ministers, and representatives from the W. C. T. U. and benevolent societies, waited on the Kingston City Council to beg that something be done to guard the school children from the cigarette. The Principal of one of the public schools said that of his class of 25 boys all but ten were cigarette users.

The 154 teachers in the London Schools signed a petition to the School Board asking that the parents of the scholars should be in some way warned of the injury the cigarette was doing.

The Toronto School Board was so impressed with the ravages of the habit amongst Toronto children they threw open the schools to a lecturer upon the cigarette, permitting him to address the scholars during school hours.

Mr. C. Ferrier is Principal of the Victoria Industrial School (Mimico, near Toronto), to which incorrigible boys are sent, when parents or guardians can no longer control them. Those over 14 years are not admitted; the average age is 12. The testimony of this gentleman is that fully 75 per cent of all youths committed to his care are cigarette users.

Every such institution on this continent will furnish similar evidence. Not long ago the Supr. of the Illinois State Reformatory said that of the 278 boys confined there 256 were cigarette users, leaving only 22 who were not addicted to the habit.

It is true that in the States since 1899 the manufacture of the cigarette has decreased. It fell 25 millions in 1900 and 55 millions more in 1901, but in Canada there has been a steady increase every year for many years. In 1900 we consumed 116 millions; in 1901, 121 millions; in 1902, 134 millions which is an increase, over 1901 of 13 millions. Is not this terrible.

### Restigouche Rifle Club

At the last meeting of the Restigouche Rifle Club, Mr. Thos Carter was elected Secretary Treasurer in place of E. B. Prichard. It was also decided to ask the Government for a grant for building the second target. The membership of the club is so large that all cannot take part in the shooting in regular matches, owing to lack of time. It is felt that the second target would remedy the matter and there is a reasonable assurance that the request to the Government will be granted. The handsome silver cup won by Mr. Max Mowat last year which was donated by Mr. Shives was presented to the winner and we understand it will be on exhibition in C. F. Clare's Jewelry store for a few days.

The interest in the club this year is already making itself evident and there are prospects for a good season's shooting.

## Dalhousie Doings

The topic of conversation here is the amendments that were made to our Town Act during the recent session of the Legislative Assembly. Among the important changes are the following:

The town is enlarged by making its east boundary the Bay of Chaleur, the south by the south line of a lot of land owned and occupied by John Barberie, thence following the south line westerly to the west line of said lot, thence in a direct line to the north line to a lot of land granted to Parghal Charefort, thence running the said north line of the said Parghal Charefort lot, west to the easterly line of lot of land owned and occupied by Alexander Cook, and on the west by the east line of the Alexander Cook lot, the north by the Restigouche River.

The Commissioners will have the power to appoint a road commissioner for the town.

The Liquor Licenses are increased from \$100 to \$150, two-thirds of the license to be paid to the Secretary of the town for town purposes.

The confirmation of the agreement made between the Municipality of Restigouche and the Commissioners of the town for the leasing of the Mechanic's Hall, so called, to the town of Dalhousie for a period of twenty-one years, the Commissioners to allow all religious bodies the free use of the said hall.

To regulate and license auctioneers, peddlers, transient traders, sale of bankrupt stocks.

Several sections are added to our Act relating to a proper observance of the Lord's Day, suppressing of fires, to enforce the proper cleaning of chimneys, the improvement of our streets and public places, to protect the public health, to suppress gambling houses, to regulate carriages and livery stables, to provide a lighting system for the town.

News has reached here that the North American Transportation Co. Quebec, has obtained the contract for Steamer Service on the Baie des Chaleurs, from Campbellton to Gaspé, and that a new boat will be placed on the route. The Company is negotiating to purchase the iron steamer "Britanny" of Glasgow. It is a boat of 600 tons.

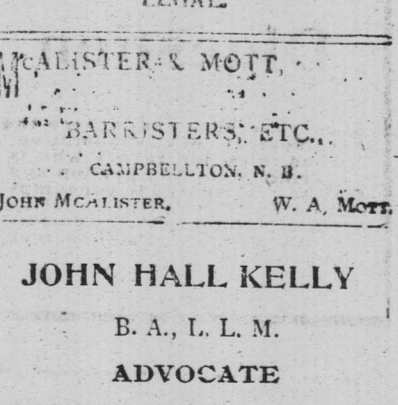
