WORK OF COMMISSION EXPLAINED; WILL MEET HERE IN AUGUST

Restigouche Meetings Should be Largely
Attended as Important Questions will
be Discussed.

AGRICULTURAL RESOURCES

(Special News Service)
DALLHOUSIE, Tuesday.—The Commission appointed during the recent session by the Government for the purpose of thoroughly investigating the agricultural, immigration and colonization conditions and possibilities of the province with a view of securing the greatest benefits possible for the people will meet in Restigouche county in August next. Three places in the county will be visited by the commission. The first session will be held in Campbellton on August 18th to be followed by meetings at Charlottetown and Miramichi. It is expected that delegates will be sent from each school district in the county who will voice the views of the farmers of the district so that the commissioners will secure complete information. Apart from the Hon. Commissioner of Agriculture and W. W. Hubbard, the secretary of the commission, who is well known in Restigouche, the members of the commission is George E. Fisher, a practical and successful farmer, who belongs to the North Shore. Mr. Fisher, who resides in Chatham, has raised large quantities of vegetables for sale in the towns of Chatham and Newcastle. There is nothing to prevent our farmers who reside in close proximity to our towns of Campbellton and Dalhousie from raising large quantities of vegetables, and to get good prices for them. The same may be said of the poultry industry.

Strawberry culture is a profitable branch and this fruit grows successfully in Restigouche; yet very few have tried the experiment. In order to expedite the work of the commission the leading farmers who belong to our four agricultural societies should consider the future and be prepared to give the commissioners some valuable suggestions from a Restigouche agricultural standpoint. To start the ball rolling your correspondent will respectfully make the following propositions to be submitted for the consideration of the commission. First, that in future all government importations of live stock be distributed and sold in each county of the province.

Second, that each agricultural society be obliged to expend half of its funds annually for the improvement of live stock and seed grain. Third, that the Department of Agriculture be authorized to purchase a large quantity of live stock and seed grain for the purpose of distributing it to the farmers of the province.

CONGREGATION WILL RETAIN PASTOR

Large Attended Congregational Meeting Unanimous For Mr. Sellar.

ONLY FOUR AGAINST

(Special News Service)
CHATHAM, Tuesday.—At the congregational meeting of St. Luke's church last evening the meeting would not accept the resignation of Rev. G. A. Sellar.

Mr. Sellar during his remarks said he had been invited to stay a third year and had consented to do so, and had been subsequently asked to resign and threatened with dismissal if he did not comply. This had been done, he said, because a member of the quarterly board had taken offense at his plain speaking, having applied some strictures to himself, and because complaint had been made to his denunciation of the liquor traffic.

He had not decided whether to resign or not but did not feel that he could preach at that time, so he left the pulpit and retired to the basement. Several of the congregation followed him, and Mr. Knight, Y. M. C. A. secretary, preached. There was to be a quarterly board meeting tonight and on the invitation of Mr. Sellar and an anonymous circular, the congregation is expected to attend.

The board said that they did not ask Mr. Sellar to resign but merely decided at a caucus of the majority to ask him to meet the board and tell it over. It seems that this intimation was conveyed to the pastor in such a way by the aggrieved brethren as to give him to understand that he must get out or be turned out and there is a very strong feeling in the congregation against the method of this thing and the assumption that one man is boss of the church.

The quarterly board did not sit on account of some real or pretended informality in the call; but the congregational meeting was held with James Beveridge in the chair and several speeches were made. W. B. Snowball opposed Mr. Sellar strongly and said there were other churches in Chatham.

The chairman and others spoke strongly for the pastor and on motion of J. Y. Merreault, a resolution was adopted, 86 yeas and four nays, reciting the invitation and acceptance and declaring that any departure from the engagement either by board or pastor would be a breach of faith and that the congregation desired Mr. Sellar to remain another year.

W. B. Snowball and three others constituted the negative vote.

England consumes thirty ounces of tobacco per annum a head.

Over 76,000 men are engaged in the fishing industry in Canada last year.

Harrisburg, Pa., is to look after its police force from now on. If a policeman is found intoxicated there he is to be at once dismissed from the force.

The Chateau Frontenac—says the Toronto Star—had a slight blaze the other day. The cause, no doubt, was the local enthusiasm over the Quebec tercentenary.

The report of Dr. Grenfell's experiences in Labrador shows either that the days of heroism are not passed, or that some tremendous liar is writing for the Newfoundland newspapers.

Another automobile has just turned a somersault and killed its occupants. If the auto continues to exercise such fine judgment in choosing its victims there will soon be nothing to complain of.

The burning of the bridge playthings is part of the wedding ceremony in Japan. The bride lights a torch, which she hands to the bridegroom who with it lights a fire in which the toys are destroyed.

Two hundred Chinese boys are to be sent over every year to be educated in American colleges. They will take the usual course of study and graduate with first class honors in law, medicine and business.

The statement of the doctors that all empires are founded on babies is well calculated to jar the complacency of certain bald-headed gentlemen, who rather thought they were the foundation of all human institutions.

Large quantities of crude oil are said to have been discovered floating down one of the rivers of Alaska. No one knows where it comes from, but a German party is now hot on its trail, and hopes to discover an important oil field.

The Conservatives think that the country will approve their course in blocking the supplies necessary for the public business in an attempt to prevent a judicial review of the constitution by their own partisans, they are poor judges of public opinion.

The Chief of Police in Pittsburgh has asked the council there to pass an ordinance which will allow him to lock up automobiles which have broken the speed limit. He thinks that if a man's machine is taken away from him for a couple of months he will pay more attention to the laws when he gets back.

Herbert, youngest son of L. T. Latham, Cadillac, P. Q., went fishing one day last week and when he returned purchased some chocolates and put them in his pocket where there were some small hooks. One of the hooks became embedded in a chocolate and he had swallowed both, but so far without ill-effects.

There has been an epidemic of suicides in St. Petersburg that has lasted for three months. The average number of deaths has been eighty-five a month, and the high record for a single day was reached this week, when no less than eighteen persons died away with themselves. Many of the cases are due to destitution, but dependency has been the prevailing cause.

BRITAIN'S GREATEST QUESTION

A most interesting debate upon preferential trade took place the other day in the House of Lords. Lord Cromer gave an exposition of the imperial side of free trade, and contended that instead of no preference, no empire, the truth lies with the dictum, 'no free trade, no empire.' He analyzed searchingly the new Australian tariff and the absurdities to which sentimentality and attachment leads; exposed the almost incredible sordidness and folly which are present when a tariff is under construction, and hoped that it would be long before this science, or pseudo-science would be introduced into the United Kingdom. It is a system, he warningly declared, admirably adapted to accomplish two things—the encouragement of corruption among minor officials, and the placing of temptation before members to individual interests. As to how some of the colonies regard preferential trade, Lord Cromer quoted a speech made by Mr. H. J. Logan, member of Parliament for Cumberland in the Dominion House of Commons, to the effect that Canada was not going to sacrifice her industries for the benefit of Great Britain; and also the dictum of Sir William Lyne, 'If I can make the tariff prohibitive, I shall be glad. Importers are parasites on the "trade of the Commonwealth." Lord Milner, who has travelled far from his early ideals and his political and economic sympathies with John Morley and W. T. Stead, made a militant protectionist speech, in which he declared 'the idea that the adoption of protection by a country is going to reduce its export trade is exploded by

the facts all around us. Highly protected countries are continually increasing their exports; they must either be paid in goods—in which case protection does not in fact protect, but only raises the cost of things in the home consumer, or, as it has been expressed, 'cause a waste of energy by throwing sand into the machinery, either that, or the protectionist countries are managing to sell without taking anything in exchange.

The only escape from this dilemma as our contemporary says, and as the 'Witness' has often said before, is that they are taking gold for goods. 'But since we cannot eat or wear or sleep on gold, gold is only a ticket for goods which we must at once present to be never seen to remember that you cannot sell without buying, though no doubt you may insist on not taking the full benefit of an exchange, and thus upon wasting some of your substance.' Lord St. (Sir Michael Hicks-Beach) in a speech described as one of great power, reminded the House of Lords of what had happened at the Mid-Devon election. The price of wheat and consequently of bread had increased owing to the deficient harvests and purely natural causes. The electors were disappointed, however, because they had been told that the triumph of the present government would secure them cheap food. Therefore, they promptly voted against the government. But suppose the tariff reformers had won in 1906, and parliament had imposed on wheat a duty of two shillings a quarter? Precisely the same thing would have happened in the winter of 1907 as did happen, and in that case every speaker of the Liberal party throughout the country would naturally have denounced the government for having artificially advanced the prices in addition to the natural, uncaused advance. What would have been the effect Lord St. Aldwyn asked the Unionists of the Upper House, of the country being told that the duty imposed for the benefit of the colonies had increased the cost of the staple life of the poor? Would that have tended to increase the feeling of kindness and goodwill in this country towards our colonial brothers? These are two questions that the home and imperial perfectionists, anxious for power and popularity might well stop to consider.—Witness.

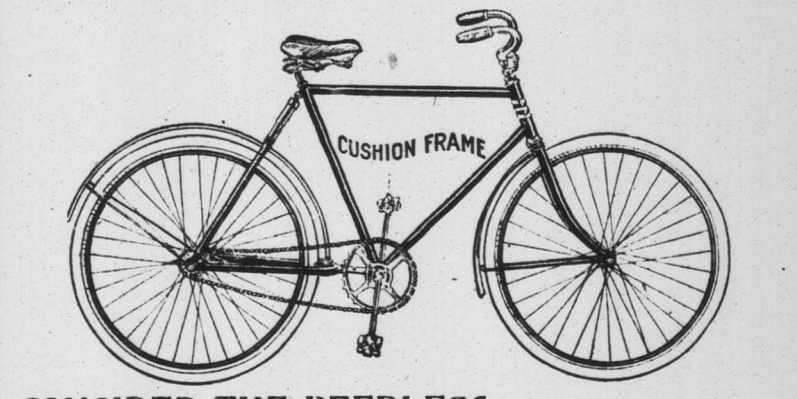

DALHOUSIE, Thursday.—Mr. E. A.
