EXTRAORDNARY SUPERSTITION IN SKYE. -In connection with a case of suicide at Storr in Skye, the "Inverness Courier" says :-- A strange superstition has manifested itself—one which we thought was extinct long ago When it was proposed to inter the remains of the young man in the churchyard at Por-tree, the inhabitants rose on mass, and vehemently resisted the attempt to do so, we believe successfully.
